Council Reorganizes; Okay Revision of Municipal Code

Reorganization bids on an accounting machine and a new agreement for operation of the municipal golf course provided the main business for Wayne's city council at its meeting Tuesday night.

The reorganization followed a short meeting of the council to dispose of old business. Alfred Koplin then took over as mayor, succeeding Willard Witte, who declined re-nomination after serving two terms.

Koplin renamed all of the city's appointive officers, designating Budd Bornhoff as special counsel to allow him to work on recodification of the city's laws. The recodification was immediately authorized by the council.

Koplin's appointments include Howard Witt, clerk and water commissioner; R. H. Hansen, police chief; Henry Victor, street commissioner; and L. W. Ellis, treasurer. The new mayor also appointed Mrs. R. W. Casper as a member of the hospital board to succeed Edward Grubb.

Two firms submitted bids on an accounting machine for the city clerk's office. Apparent low bidder on the machine was Burroughs Corp., which submitted three alternatives.

The firm submitted bids of \$5,592.25, \$6,120 and \$6,500. The bid of National Cash Register co was \$5,840.43. The National machine was said to be comparable to the low Burroughs bid.

Wakefield Man Dies Sunday In Freak Motorcycle Crash

Glen Voskamp, 38, Wakefield, was killed instantly Sunday morning in a motorcycle accident at the east edge of Wakefield.

Authorities say Voskamp, manager of the Waldbaum egg drying plant, was riding on a motorcycle owned by Bob Penn, an employee at the plant. Voskamp apparently lost control of the machine on highway 35 and 9 at the east edge of town and ran into the side of the municipal water building near the city light plant.

Survivors include the widow and three daughters, Mrs. Martin Keller, Itasca; Pamela, 9, and Debby, 7.

Funeral services were held at 10 a.m. Wednesday at the Christian church, Wakefield.

The accident was investigated by Gus Schutte, Dixon county sheriff; Merle Kingsbury, county attorney and Lawrence Graffis, Wakefield police chief.

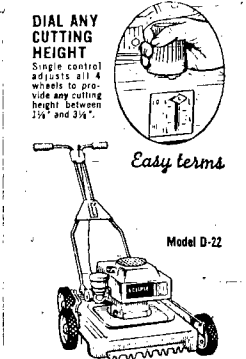

May 23 Vote Slated On Schoolhouse In Merged District

School District 25 voters will go to the polls May 23 to decide whether to authorize issuance of \$33,000 in bonds for construction of a new schoolhouse.

The district, recently enlarged through the merger of four Leslie precinct districts, hopes to start construction of the building in June if it is approved by the voters.

Construction of the new building needs approval of 55 percent of the voters in the district to take effect. The school board anticipates issuing only \$30,000 in bonds. The remaining \$5,000 is for a safeguard. Estimated cost of the new school is \$25,000.

It is anticipated the bond issue will require a special tax levy of approximately four mills over a 10-year period. The district has an assessed valuation of about \$1 million.

Several other developments also occurred on the school redistricting scene this week.

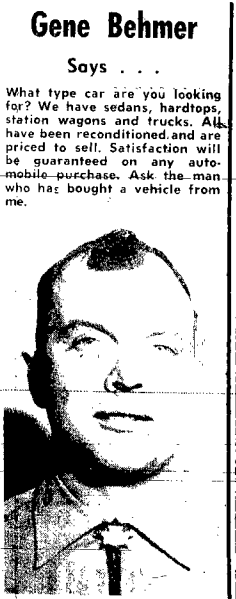

Petitions have also been filed for the permanent transfer of property owned by Herbert Niemann, jr. from District 65 to District 51. Both petitions bear signatures of over 70 percent of the voters in the districts.

Capitol News

New Regulations, Laws Being Studied For Increasing Statehouse Efficiency

LINCOLN—This is the time of year in Nebraska when ideas leading to new laws are hatched. Some of these crop up at hearings by committees of state senators who study state government between sessions. Others develop within the state departments.

But they always turn up, usually being tossed about in the spring for a while, lay dormant generally during the summer, then spring to life in the fall before the legislative session.

Here are a few of the ideas currently being made the rounds in Nebraska's capital city, affecting state government:

The state should establish a five-year plan for mechanizing the processing of paperwork in the Capitol. A business machine consultant says this would save Nebraska \$100,000 per year.

Thought should be given to regulating the poultry industry. This should include the butchering, shipping and storage of poultry used for human consumption. This idea has twice before failed in the Legislature.

Some control is needed on the procedure used in destroying records that have been microfilmed, so as not to lose historically important documents. The state historical society says under the present setup, conceivably, valuable documents not screened by the society, could be destroyed.

There should be study given to unification of the state health and agricultural laboratories, thus fully utilizing expensive equipment.

The subject of drivers' licenses may well be one for some controversial debate in the 1961 Legislature. That is, if there are any attempts to put a lid on the age of those who can drive without taking driving or health tests. This subject has recurred in other sessions of the Unicameral but bit the dust after being watered down by amendments.

The State Health Board is the latest to take a look at the matter. The board discussed the possibility of requiring medical examinations in order to obtain driving permits. It was proposed the matter be taken up with the State Medical Association's House of Delegates and be discussed with the State Safety Patrol and the Motor Vehicle Department.

It has been argued in the past that some day there will need to be some type of regulation on who can drive. But those in the older categories have also argued that it is the teen-age group that causes the most accidents and restrictions should be there rather than on 65-year-old and older drivers.

A new subject has entered the field of public health in Nebraska—radiation control. And the State Board of Health is looking toward establishment of rules on radiation control. This would include all sources of radiation.

Doctors and dentists are the prime users of radio-active products now but soon the Consumers Public Power District nuclear plant at Hallam will be utilizing radio-active material.

Although the Atomic Energy Commission now has control over the Hallam project, State Health Board chairman, Dr. Maurice Frazer, Lincoln, foresees the time when this function will be turned over to the state and he wants to be ready for it.

County Agent's Column

PASTURE POINTERS These pasture management suggestions could be your high dollar job this spring. Divide pastures into two or more units and graze alternately. This practice alone has given much higher returns than continuous grazing.

Applying fertilizer to pastures often pays higher dividends than on cropland. Keep cattle out of pastures until grass has made considerable growth. This top growth is necessary to strengthen the root system and assure maintenance of grass stands.

PREVENT SOIL LOSSES Turnoff and flood damage in our immediate area was lessened by the number of our terraced farms. Maintenance and repair of damaged terraces is important now before spring rains and possible gully washers in early summer. Terrace maintenance can be accomplished by "back furrowing"

with a conventional plow, starting at the top of the terrace ridge and continuing until the "dead furrow" is on the uphill side of the terrace channel. This system raises the height of the ridge and widens the channel to give more carrying capacity. The old adage that "any ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure" certainly applies in this area. The soil losses and related damage from spring gully washers have been pretty largely eliminated on properly terraced fields.

WEED CONTROL CIRCULAR New circular on "Chemicals That Control Weeds" has just been published by the Agricultural Extension Service, University of Nebraska. The circular includes recommendations for controlling weeds in field crops, pastures, ranges and non-crop lands, lawn and turf weeds and troublesome weeds. There also is a section on use of desiccants or chemicals to dry crops and weeds in the field, permitting earlier harvest. Copies of E.C. 60-130, "Chemicals That Control Weeds," may be obtained at county extension offices throughout Nebraska.

Farm News and Views

OAT ACREAGE will be down this year — probably more than the six per cent reduction indicated earlier, say farm experts. The late spring delayed planting and a lot of fields originally intended for oats will be planted to corn, soybeans or possibly grain sorghum in the western Corn Belt. Prospects look good for favorable oat prices this season, although it's doubtful if a long storage period will make use of your facilities. For farmers who feel they can still seed oats and get a crop, farm managers suggest you seed an extra bushel per acre and apply about 25 pounds of nitrogen.

GET STARTED early on fly control by getting fly breeding areas cleaned up. Then use larvicide granules or concentrates to kill fly maggots before they hatch. Farm experts say there are a number of products on the market that are safe to use and will give good control. Most caution will be needed in treating livestock, particularly dairy cows and milking facilities. Make sure the product you use carries approved recommendations on the label before you use it.

SHEEPMEN MUST look forward to several years of lamb and wool prices similar to last year, according to a recent long-range outlook report. They say these prices will be influenced considerably by cattle prices. This year the spring lamb crop is showing a substantial gain in the western range areas. Movement of winter-dropped lambs off grass will hurt prices of fats this summer. But lambs bought after small grain harvest should make you some money.

 - 1/4 teaspoon thyme
 - 1 cup (8 ounces) cottage cheese, sieved
 - 1/4 cup sliced stuffed olives
 - 1/2 cup grated natural Swiss cheese

In a buttered 1 1/2 quart casserole alternate layers of green beans, tomato slices and tuna. Cook onion in butter until tender, about 5 minutes. Stir in flour and seasonings. Gradually stir in milk. Cook until slightly thickened. Add cottage cheese and stuffed olives. Pour over vegetables and tuna. Sprinkle Swiss cheese over top. Bake at 350 for 30 minutes.

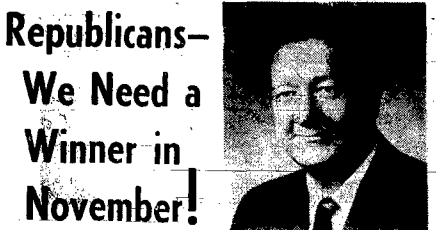
