City Annexes 30-Acre Tract At Tuesday Council Meeting

Annexation of a 30-acre building addition at the northwest corner of the city and approval of the plat of another subdivision provided the main order of business for Wayne's city council Tuesday night.

The council adopted an ordinance annexing the 30-acre Westwood addition owned by Carhart Lumber co. The tract contains 97 residential lots. Tentative approval was given the plat for a nine-lot subdivision submitted by Cecil Wriedt. Formal approval was delayed until the next council meeting upon recommendation of City Attorney Burrhoffs, who said some legal technicalities should be met before final approval is given.

Purchase of a new accounting machine for the city clerk's office was authorized Tuesday. A bid of the Burroughs corp. of \$6,500 was accepted. It was the highest of three bids submitted by Burroughs but lower than the bid of National Cash Register co. for a comparable machine.

Emergency repairs on the west wall of the city light plant were approved at a cost of \$2,200. The city's engineer said the poor condition of the wall was aggravated by installation work on the new generating engine.

A partial payment of about \$240,000 to Cooper-Bessemer corp. for the new engine was authorized after the engineer reported the project is about 60 percent completed.

A request by light plant employees for salary increases was tabled for further study.

Russell Tiedtke asked the council to establish a rate for electrical use in residential electric heating. The request was referred to the city engineers for study and recommendations.

Women's Club Plans Survey To Determine City's Needs

The Wayne Women's club will sponsor a house to house canvass in connection with the Wayne Community Development Council the latter part of this week or the first of next week.

The purpose of the survey is to determine as nearly as possible what people in Wayne consider to be the strong, or weak points of the community.

At present the council has set as its goal, a study of community needs as revealed by the survey. It will make it possible to make long range plans and correlation according to the wishes of the people themselves.

Appointed to the committee in charge of the canvass are Mrs. William Schultz, Mrs. Wilmer Griess, Mrs. F. I. Moses, Mrs. Loyd Jensen and Mrs. John Owen. The Wayne Community Development Council is composed of representatives elected or appointed by various organizations in Wayne. At present twenty-three groups are represented in the council.

Council officers are Rev. Kenneth de Freese, president; Everett Rees, treasurer; K. N. Parke, secretary; and Mrs. F. I. Moses, Mrs. Don Wightman and Dr. Don Merriman, directors.

Approximately 60 volunteers will begin the canvass, each with a territory of one or two blocks. The research division of Northern Natural Gas will tabulate and analyze the results.

Membership in the council is on an annual basis and the regular meeting will be held sometime in June.

Compromise Ends Dispute; Dorm Construction Resumes

Construction on Wayne State's new dormitory resumed Wednesday as Sioux City area contractors and building unions settled a 40-day strike.

A partial crew, including several iron workers, carpenters, plumbers and electricians, went to work Wednesday, and more will return shortly, according to a foreman for the dorm contractor, the Chris Hansen Construction co.

Six unions — iron workers, carpenters, laborers, operating engineers, cement finishers and painters — reached general agreement with the Sioux City Master Builders association about a week ago.

Since then varying settlements have been negotiated with each union, officials of the contractor and union organizations reported.

The wage settlements with each union vary, approximating 15 cents an hour increase for each of the next three years.

Both sides also accepted compromises on five points in dispute. These classes involve a hiring hall, picket line, settlement of dispute, subcontracting and contract termination date. The new termination date will be April 30 instead of March 31.

The bricklayers union still has a later contract date (June 1) and negotiations of a new contract with the contractors is expected before then, officials say.

A Hansen company spokesman on the WSTC job said work will return to full scale in a few days. After the long layoff, some workers are not immediately available.

The dormitory originally was scheduled for completion by school time next September. Whether this can be achieved now is a question. Forms for pouring concrete on the second floor are nearly complete. Then two more stories remain.

Jury Says No to \$27,000 Damages

A verdict in favor of the defendant was rendered by a jury last Wednesday in a district court in damage action filed by Marv Meier, administrator of the estate of Arthur Meier, deceased, against Gayle Wehrer and Herbert Wehrer.

The case went to the jury at 11 a.m., and the verdict was given at 5 p.m.

The plaintiff was asking damages of \$27,903 as a result of a car accident near Wayne which took the life of Arthur Meier May 4, 1958.

A jury will be called next week for the trial in which Vesta Aevermann, administratrix of the estate of Nicholas Aevermann, succ. Dale Rice.

This action seeks \$26,055 for the death damage accident which occurred Oct. 31, 1958 near Wayne.

Albert G. Carlson To Be Honor Guest At Faculty Meet

Wayne State's faculty Tuesday night will honor Albert G. Carlson, who plans to retire after 31 years in the music department.

The occasion is the annual faculty recognition dinner in the student union, starting with a social hour at 6 p.m.

Professor Carlson came to WSTC in 1929 as instructor in piano, organ and theory of music. He had taught previously at Fremont, Scribner, Dodge, Arlington, Valley and Ceresco.

He earned degrees at Fremont Normal school (now Midland College), and the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago, and he studied music with Clarence Adler of Columbia University.

Carlson has composed numerous works for organ and piano, many of them heard by Wayne audiences.

As a hobby Carlson has delved deeply into philology—a subject on which he loves to debate in the College Philosophical Club.

After retiring at the end of summer school, he intends to work on his home at 304 West Tenth, do more gardening than usual, travel and possibly teach music privately.

Ballet Troupe Schedules Wayne Appearance

Wayne area residents will have a rare opportunity to see ballet when the Sioux City Civic Ballet will bring their troupe here for a performance May 20. The company was organized last fall as a non-profit corporation. The troupe's artistic director is Nina Youskevitch Johnson, who teaches creative dance at Wayne State. The ballet's appearance in Wayne is sponsored by the Junior Chamber of Commerce and Pi Kappa Delta, honorary fraternal fraternity.

Wayne county voters went to the polls Tuesday in relatively light numbers. The main interest in the contest centered around the candidates for governor and members of the Legislature from the sixteenth district.

Clarence L. Schroeder and Peter H. Claussen will both have their names on the ballot. Schroeder collected a total of 1,677 votes and Claussen, 1269. L. M. Shultz trailed with 994.

A breakdown of the results gives Schroeder 448 votes in Colfax county, 349 in Stanton and 880 in Wayne. Claussen gathered 614 in Colfax, 381 in Stanton and 274 in Wayne. Shultz received 755 votes in Colfax, 131 in Stanton and 105 in Wayne.

In the gubernatorial race, Mrs. Hazel Abel led the field in Wayne county. Mrs. Abel received 380 votes. Her nearest competitor was John R. Cooper with 263. Dwain Williams received 145; Terry Carpenter, 90; Del Lineman, 64, and George H. Ramsey, 21.

On the Democratic ticket Robert B. Conrath polled 158 votes; Frank B. Morrison, 136; Charles A. Bates, 11, and Tony Mangiamelli, 3.

In the presidential contest Nixon received 470 votes with only a token vote going to Rockefeller and Goldwater.

Kennedy received 177 votes; Stevenson, 24; Humphrey, 16, and Stevenson and Johnson, 3 each.

George Stolz received 150 votes in his bid for county commissioner, second district.

Larry Brock, unopposed on the Democratic congressional ticket as Representative in Congress, Third district, received 307 votes.

Ralph F. Beermann, Republican, received 553 votes; Kenneth H. Beckenbauer, 152; Loran Schmit, 124, and Merle A. Haynes, 96, for Representative from the Third district.

Ray C. Johnson, unopposed on the Republican ticket for auditor of public accounts, received 884 votes.

Richard Larson, Democrat, also unopposed, collected 249 votes.

In the race for lieutenant governor Republicans in Wayne county gave Dwight W. Burney 594 votes; Lester H. Anderson, 142; Marvin Griswold, 136; John C. Donner, 46, and John W. Rost, 13.

Democrats gave Edward A. Dossek 94 votes, followed closely by Norman A. Otto with 93. James L. Hood received 28 and Earl Stimer 12 in the lieutenant governor race.

On the non-political ticket, Adolph E. Wenke received 1154 votes for judge of the supreme court, third district.

Hamilton F. Mitten received 1,002 for the state board of education, third district. David J. Hamer collected 1212 votes in his bid for county judge. There was no opposition in each of these posts.

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EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

You may not agree with an editorial . . . but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

Strangers Pay Your Bills

Suppose you are moving to another community and have to transport your household goods. You can do it in various ways — by hiring a moving company, by renting a trailer and doing the job yourself, and so on.

But one thing is true — whatever the way chosen you expect to pay whatever bills you move carries. You don't expect legions of people you don't know and never will meet to chip in and absorb part of the expense.

This is obvious enough to seem almost simple-minded. However, consider what happens — probably unbeknownst to you — when you take a pack-

age down to the postoffice and send it on its way via parcel post.

You pay a charge based on weight and distance. But that charge does not meet all the costs of the service the postoffice is about to perform on your behalf. In other words, parcel post is, and long has been, operated at an out-of-pocket loss.

So what is the result? In effect, all the taxpayers, who must contribute to funding all government deficits, are paying some of the cost for shipping your package.

Does that make any sense — and is it sound government policy?

It has some people don't know they guess and soon they report their conclusion as something they saw.

Wages and Productivity

The current campaign to extend the Federal wage hour law to retailing which has been exempt ever since the law first went on the books back in depression days — has brought effective opposition.

The case against the extension has been developed at length. It is based on four facts. They are:

- 1) The existing retail exemption does not reflect Congressional objection to a minimum wage law for retailing. Instead, it reflects only the conviction that such laws should be left to the states.
- 2) Each state knows best what minimum wage it may, is needed by its citizens.
- 3) Extending the Federal law to retail em-

ployers would mean disaster to thousands of retailers who couldn't stand the added payroll burden. — 4) Raising the minimum wage, as now proposed, from \$1 to \$1.25 an hour would reduce the buying power of the dollar to a level that would mean real economic trouble for a large percentage of the American people.

These points can be documented, using historical examples and other authoritative data. Arbitrary wage increases which take no account of work productivity or value cannot help but be strongly inflationary — and cannot help but reduce employment opportunity for the marginal and unskilled workers — all the humanitarian considerations on earth cannot get away from that truth.

County Agent's Column

APPLICATIONS DUE MAY 20

Application for certification of oats, barley, bromegrass, sweet clover, alfalfa, a rye due May 20 at the office of the Nebraska Crop Improvement Association, Lincoln. This work comes from Richard Mills, associate manager of the Association. All Nebraska County Extension agents have applications for seed certification and can supply additional information. Mills points out Applications and additional information also may be obtained by writing to Nebraska Crop Improvement Association, Keim Hall, College of Agriculture, Lincoln.

CONTROL SPRING WEEDS

Spring weeds accompany spring pastures. And two of the most troublesome weeds for the dairyman are pennycress and peppergrass. "Right now is the time to control these two weeds," says P. H. Cole, Extension dairyman at the College of Agriculture. "The surest procedure is to use one-half to one pound of 2,4-D per acre as a spray. This should give good control of both pennycress and peppergrass if it is done early enough," he said.

These two weeds are most common in pastures that have been overgrazed and poorly fertilized and a good stand of grass will normally crowd them out. In order to have a good stand of grass, the dairyman must see that his pastures are well fertilized and not overgrazed. "Farmers often ask what they should do to be sure they are using their pesticides safely. Here is the answer provided by the Farm Division of the National Safety Council and the National Agricultural Chemicals Association. . . . First, read the label on the pesticide container — follow the instructions and heed all the cautions. . . . Second, store pesticides where children, pets and irresponsible people can't get into them. A good way is to keep them in a locked shed or closet, away from food and feed. . . . Third, keep pesticides in their original, labeled containers. This way everyone who sees the container will know what it contains. . . . Fourth, dispose of empty containers promptly and in a way that will pose no hazard to humans, animals or valuable plants."

Farm News and Views

AGRICULTURAL INCOME prospects for 1960 look much better than they did a few months back. In fact, net farm income could about equal last year. About the turn of the year it appeared total net income to farmers would drop something like five-percent to seven-percent this year but since there several improvements have occurred. Economists say the outlook for hogs and eggs is much improved. Milk prices should hold close to those of last year and,

while there'll be some softness in the cattle market, there's no big price break in prospect. Much still depends on this year's crop progress but even so it looks like that net income will about equal last year's \$11 billion.

ANOTHER CRACK-DOWN on antibiotics in milk is about to get underway — this time it's aimed at drugs injected into dairy animals. A Washington editor says this may be one of the sources of antibiotics found in milk. It may not all be coming from mastitis ointments. Keep a close watch on the labels of injectable antibiotics you buy. FDA may order manufacturers to attach a warning label telling how long milk from injected cows must be withheld.

SMALL GRAIN harvest will be here in just a few weeks and many of you are possibly thinking about trading combines. Machinery specialists has just recently compiled a guide on combine specifications which may be of help to you. This guide gives cutter bar widths, range in cutting height, cylinder type, size, speed range and many other specifications for 35 combine models of nine manufacturers.

Capitol News

Absence of Key Chairmen Poses Problem At Opening of Next Legislative Session

LINCOLN — There will be some new faces in the Legislature when it convenes this coming January. Hugo Srb, clerk of the Unicameral, says there always is about a third of the membership new when the lieutenant governor raps the gavel for the start of each session.

One of the noteworthy things, however, is that chairmen of key committees of the body will not be on hand for the 1961 session. Heads of budget, revenue, judiciary, government and miscellaneous subjects committees will not be around, nor will Sen. Harry Pizer, North Platte, last session's speaker, who retired from politics.

The absence of these key chairmen will require some careful work in the early days of the coming session to get top senators to fill the posts. An all-important position will be the budget committee and possibly the revenue group. Budget recommendations spending, and revenue, legislation that will produce the money. The problem of a broadened tax base will again be upon the solons and will make the task of the budget and revenue committees more exacting.

There are a variety of reasons for the legislative turnover — low pay, long hours, heavy pressure and on some occasions a solon gets into political trouble in his home district, falling by the wayside at the polls. . . . And for the second straight session there will be a new governor for the Legislature to deal with which could present problems.

License Plates

A drastic proposal to denote safe and unsafe drivers got a surprisingly favorable reception before a committee of state senators. Col. Thomas Corbin, commander of an air division at the Lincoln AFB, proposed the idea. He said blue plates could denote safe drivers, red for those convicted of a traffic offense and black and red for a driver convicted of an offense in an accident in which someone was killed.

Probation System

The state's probation system is working well, a legislative committee has been told. The diagnosis came from District Judges Paul White, Lincoln, and Fay Pollock, Stanton. They told a committee studying the penal and parole systems that 383 persons were put on probation in Nebraska last year and only 100 violated parole. White told the group that the probation system could not work if it were not for investigations made before sentences are passed by judges.

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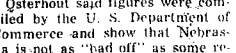

Chili Ham Dish
(Four-Six servings)
3/4 cup uncooked rice
2 tablespoons butter
1 small onion, chopped
1 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons chili powder
2 cups cubed cooked ham
1 No. 303 can red kidney beans
2 1/2 cups skim milk

Cook rice in butter until slightly browned. Add onion and cook 5 minutes. Stir in seasonings. Add ham, kidney beans and skim milk. Cover, cook over moderate heat, stirring occasionally, until rice is tender. (About 20 minutes for pre-cooked rice.) Add more skim milk if rice is too dry.

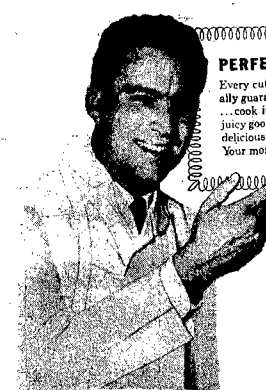

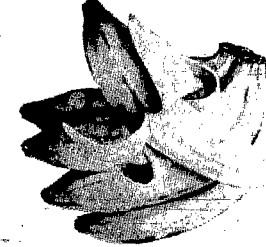

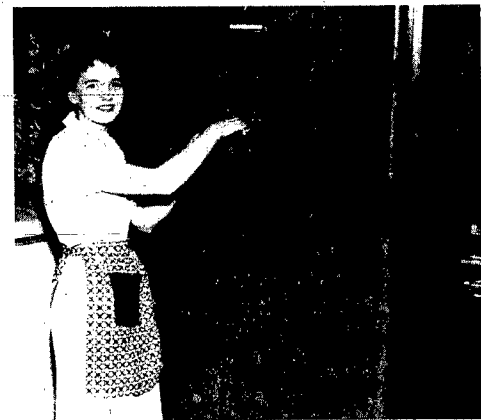
