WSTC Tracksters Ready for Conference Meet at Hastings

Wayne State trackmen have a big chore Friday and Saturday as they go to the Nebraska College conference meet at Hastings.

After finishing third among the four state colleges last Friday at Kearney, they now have to tangle also with powerful forces from Nebraska's Westleyan, Doane and Hastings.

Peak performances this season indicate the record book may get a wholesale revision at the NCC festival. Only two marks appear reasonably safe, both set by Wayne men last year. They are Merle Maciejewski's 9:29.3 in the two-mile and Fred Kjer's 49 flat in the 440. No body in the conference has run near those times this year.

Wayne's Keith Towns proved at the State college meet that he can be a top contender in the javelin. He gave Wayne its only win with a meet-record toss of 188 feet about 11 feet over his previous best. He was just five inches short of a Wayne school record.

As expected, Kearney State romped off with first place with 127 points. Chase had 38½, Wayne 35½ and Peru 31½.

Kearney had 10 of 16 events. Wayne scored seconds in the 800 run and mile run by Don Weitzenkamp; the 120 high hurdles by Bob Pingel; the 220 by Fred Fetrow, and the 890 relay.

Fetrow placed third in the 100 yard dash, and the mile relay team was third. Scoring fourths for Wayne were Pingel in the 220 low hurdles, Joe Green in the 440 and Dennis Smith in the javelin.

Witt Wins Third in Photo Finish

Wayne High will have four contestants in the State Track meet at Lincoln this weekend. Roger Denesia, high jump, Bill Witt, 100 and 440; and Marlan Lessman and Bob Johnson, 880 relay have all qualified.

Things looked a little shaky for Witt after the Class B district meet at Norfolk. Wayne Coach, Harold Maciejewski thought Witt, who was not selected for a place at all in the 100 yard dash, should have been third.

Maciejewski contacted Rev. Thomas Hitch, who was taking pictures for the West Point squad. Saturday morning the roll of film was developed and the print showed Witt, the only boy in a white uniform and with blond hair a

stride ahead of Pierce's Delbert Straszheim.

The judges reversed their decision and now Witt will be making the trip along with the rest of the squad.

District II NAIA Baseball Tourney Underway at Peru

Wayne State will play Peru State at Peru this afternoon in the first round of the District II NAIA baseball tournament. Concordia and Omaha are matched at the same time in the other playoff bracket.

First round winners will play Friday for the right to move into the next round of elimination before the national meet at Sioux City.

Creighton, currently among the leaders of the Nebraska College Baseball Conference, is not eligible for the NAIA playoff because it does not belong to the organization. Omaha, not an NCCB member, does enter the playoff, however, because it is in District II. Wayne and Peru have not played this year because their double-header was rained out.

The Wildcats will go into the playoff with a 6-4 conference record after a split Saturday with Concordia on the Wayne diamond. The visitors clouted out a 15-8 win in the opener, leading all the way.

Wayne survived a see-saw thriller in the second game when Pat Keitges poked a two-run homer in the last of the seventh to equal a similar smash in the top of the seventh by Concordia's Jim Winkler. Winkler put the Bulldogs ahead, 7-8, and Keitges made the final count 8-7. Both Winkler and Keitges also homered in the first game.

Friday Wayne duplicated Midland twice at Fremont—with Lowell Zimmerman hurling a perfect game in the opener. With the score 13-0, Wayne ended the game by the 10-run rule after five innings. Zimmerman allowed no hits, runs or walks, and his mates gave him perfect fielding.

The second game went 10 innings before pitcher Jerry Wisniewski won the game with a two-run single. The score: 4-2.

Gary Zimmerman started on the mound for Wayne and had the same under control with a 2-2 in the seventh when Coach Gwynn

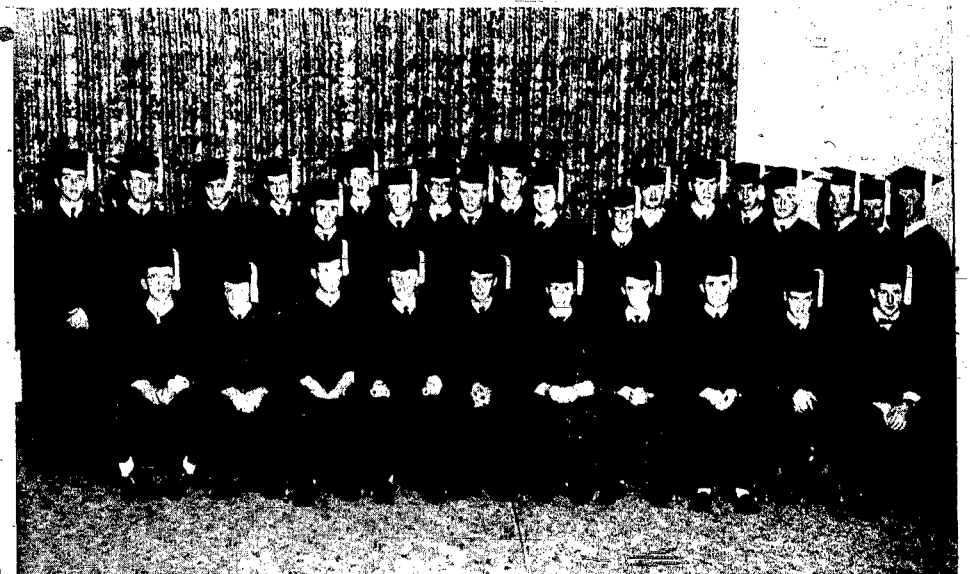

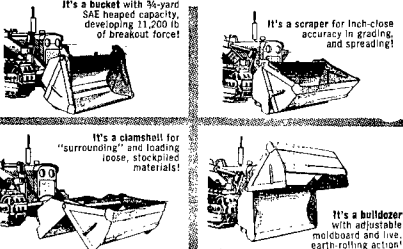

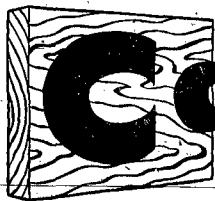

FARM REVIEW AND FORECAST



The TRUE Picture of . . . FARM SUBSIDIES and FOOD COSTS

Have you had the urge to write to an editor or to some well meaning politician to straighten him out on the facts about farm subsidies and the cost of food? If so, you should have some facts that you can use to let them know they are being misled by a lot of publicity unfavorable to the farmer.

Most of the stories you read or hear refer to the \$7 billion subsidy received by farmers in the 1959 budget. They are right, of course, . . .

... except that it wasn't \$7 billion and the farmers didn't get it . . . at least not all of it.

The total budget of \$6.8 billion should be divided into three parts:

PART ONE includes losses on price supports of \$1,000,000,000; Acreage Reserve \$700,000,000 and other supports \$400,000,000. This \$2.1 billion should be charged to farmers without any question.

PART TWO should include payments for conservation, \$500,000,000; loans for electrification, etc. (repaid with interest) \$600,000,000; and research and education, \$300,000,000. These make the farmer more productive and efficient and the benefits accrue to the consumer in the future. They add up to \$1.4 billion.

PART THREE includes foreign disposal of surpluses, \$1,100,000,000; storage and interest, \$1,000,000,000; donations, \$350,000,000; school lunch, \$230,000,000; and reserve for future losses, \$600,000,000. These expenditures of \$3.3 billion are almost half the budget. They do help the farmer by expanding the market — but the big benefits go to others.

Another myth concerns the cost of food. Subsidies are blamed for the high cost of food, in the first place, subsidies have had little effect on food prices and the second place, food is cheap. Cheap food, in fact, is the main reason why the cost of living has increased only moderately in the past few years.

It is true that the market basket of food used as a guide to changes in food costs has

increased by \$243 in the past 10 years. The farmer got \$3 of it.

The big bite, \$130, was taken by labor—because consumers demanded more services in their food and wages increased. Transportation got \$33 and other costs, \$73. Federal taxes increased \$4, which was more than the share to farmers.

The real cost of food should be measured by the effort that has to be made to obtain it. The year 1929 was one of prosperity. One hour's pay of a factory worker would buy 1.2 lbs. of steak. In 1957 it would buy 2.2 lbs. In 1929 an hour's pay would buy about 4 quarts of milk; in 1957, about 8 quarts. For butter, 1 lb. in 1929, 2.8 lbs. in 1957 and for eggs, 1.1 and 3.7 dozen. Food is cheap and getting cheaper.

WHO GETS THE SUBSIDIES?

A subsidy doesn't have to be a direct Government hand-out. Any Government action to improve the position of a person or enterprise or to give them more than they can get in the competitive market place is a subsidy. This is a transfer of income paid for by consumers or taxpayers.

Public acceptance is often dependent on how well the subsidy is disguised or hidden. Most subsidies to business and labor are paid for by the consumers in higher prices and are hard to add up. Most farm subsidies are paid for by the taxpayer, and are more obvious.

It is interesting to note that CCC farm price-support losses from 1933 to January 1, 1958, have cost the taxpayers less than subsidies to business through postal deficits alone during the 10-year period, 1946-1956.

The CCC farm price-support losses from the beginning of the program to January 1, 1958, amounted to \$5,173,746,788.

The House Committee on Appropriations published in the hearings on the agricultural-appropriations bill for the fiscal year 1959 a table setting forth certain Federal expenditures in recent years for business aids and special services. This showed:

Mail Subsidies (10-year period 1946-1956)	\$ 5,968,000,000
Business-reconversion payments (including tax amortization)	43,262,000,000
Subsidies to maritime organizations (1938 through fiscal 1957)	3,500,000,000
Subsidies to airlines (1938 through fiscal 1957)	614,000,000

The table shows in excess of \$50 billion of subsidy or subsidy-like benefits to industry, the greater part of which has occurred since World War II. There's no way to arrive at the dimension of the benefits to industry and labor over the years as a result of Government actions such as the tariff, depletion allowances and other tax benefits, and minimum wage and collective bargaining laws. The same is true of professions and labor groups that are able to restrict entry to a chosen few, the stock options and expense accounts of executives and fringe benefits of employees.

MUCH GOVERNMENT BUSINESS

A significant part of our industrial establishment operates today on Government defense and other noncompetitive contracts without normal risks, and with profits assured. Some 50 of the Nation's largest corporations have received \$80 billion in Government contracts during the past 5 or 6 years. Such contracts cannot be labeled as subsidies to industry but they do reflect certain Federal financial support.

It is notable, moreover, that the Government generally obtains the industrial materials of defense under contracts drawn to assure profits to the producers, whereas the food for the Armed Forces is procured generally without reference to profits or losses of farmers.

Some of the farm programs result in important benefits to other segments of the economy and to many people who are not agricultural producers. This is particularly true with respect to programs for disposal of surplus agricultural commodities acquired under CCC price support and other stabilization measures.

They include Government donations of foods to school lunches, to the Veterans' Administration and to the armed services, and to millions of needy people at home and abroad. These foods go to approximately 14 million school children in the United States, 4.5 million needy persons in this country, 1.5 million people in charitable institutions, and to an estimated 80 million needy people in 85 countries around the world.
