Development Council Starts Survey of Town Opinions

About 50 women Tuesday began canvassing Wayne to learn community needs and resources. The women carry a questionnaire prepared by the Community Development Council for the survey.

The council is seeking to learn why people like or dislike Wayne, if they are natives of Wayne, how long they have lived in the city and ask for suggestions on ways to improve the town.

"The Wayne Community Development Council was organized to correlate economic, social, cultural and citizenship interests of all people of the community," President S. K. de Freese said.

The council is composed of representatives from various organizations in the city. At present 23 group participate in the council and others are invited to join, de Freese explained.

Purpose of the survey is to aid in long-range planning for the city. The council lists six immediate goals:

1. Study community needs as revealed by the survey.
2. Evaluate resources and proposals.
3. Correlate community activities.
4. Enlist help from outside sources.
5. Promote and support community action by its members.
6. Sponsor projects by joint action.

Canvassers have been asked to return their questionnaires within a week to 10 days. Although a line is included on the form for signature of the interviewers, the questionnaires, may be returned unsigned if desired.

Normal Board OK's Faculty Additions

Robert L. Campbell will join the WSTC faculty in September as assistant professor of health and physical education, President W. A. Brandenburg announced this week. The State Normal board approved the appointment in Kearney.

Plans for the new two-room building are nearly completed.

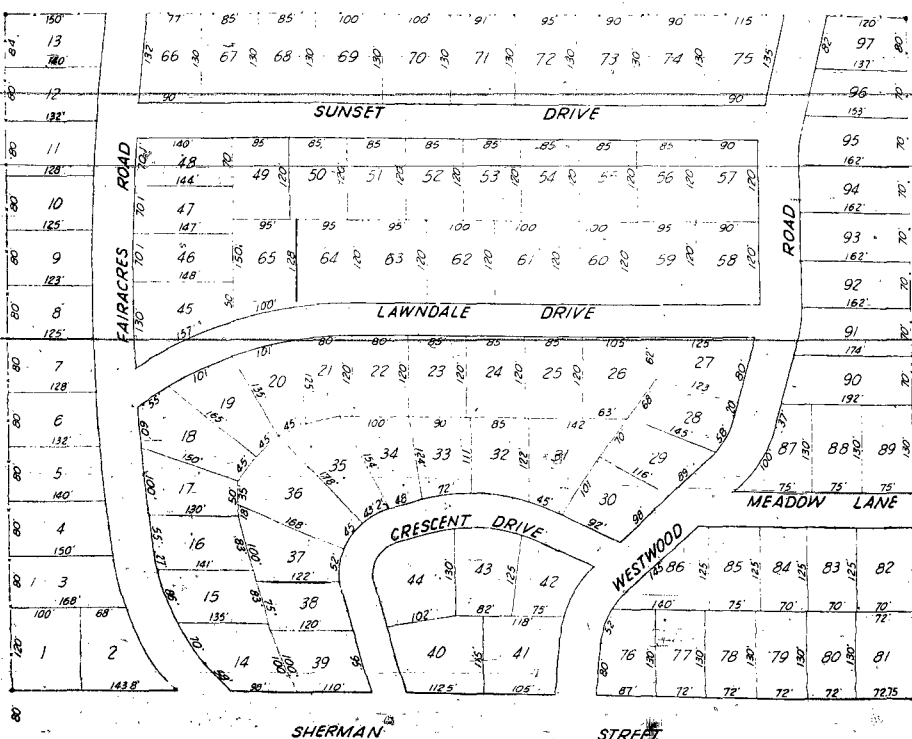
GOP Post-Primary Convention Today; C. Thone to Speak

County Population Down 220 in Early Census Tabulation

Wayne county had a decrease in population of 220 in the last 10 years, preliminary figures from District Census Supervisor Ruby Dunn, Fremont, revealed this week.

The total announced for the county was 9,909, compared to 10,129 in 1950. The Third Congressional district, which comprises all of NE Nebraska, showed a drop of about 3,700, the report continued.

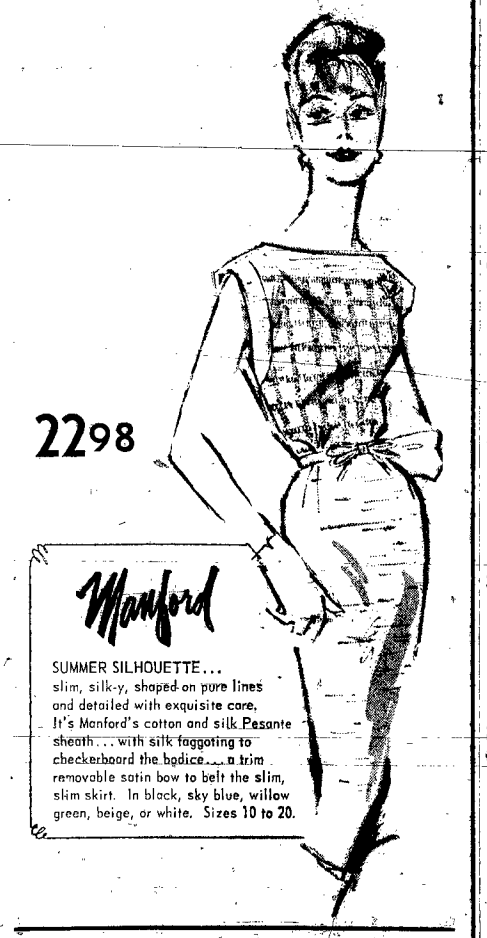

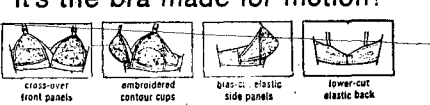

Split Pea Soup Good For Calorie Counters

Old fashioned split pea soup is virtually a meal in itself. It's an economy meal, in fact, both for budgeters and calorie counters. Here is a versatile soup recipe given to us by Ray Kling, local salesman of the Meadow Gold Dairy which illustrates this latter fact. Make it with a quart of whole homogenized milk. If you wish, or with fresh skim milk which will have about 320 calories, he points out. Either way this soup has satisfying vegetable-meat rich flavor.

The recipe was developed by Beatrice Cooke, director of the company's Chicago test kitchens.

Green Split Pea Soup (Makes 4 quarts)
1 pound green split peas
1 pound ham bone or hock
1 medium onion, chopped
1 cup chopped celery
2 medium carrots, sliced
2 tablespoons chopped parsley
2 quarts water
1 quart skim milk
1/2 cup tomato paste
Salt and pepper to taste

Rinse and drain split peas. In large sauce pot combine split peas, ham bone, vegetables and water. Cover; simmer about 1 hour, or until peas and ham are tender. Remove fat from ham. Cut ham into small pieces. Force pea mixture through sieve or food mill. Stir in skim milk, tomato paste, seasonings and ham. Heat until hot.

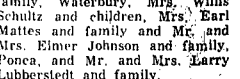

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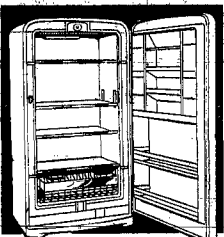


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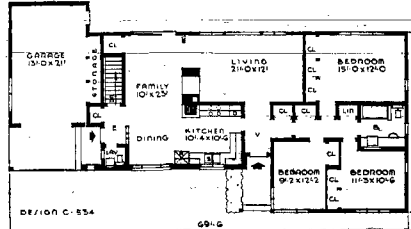

A SMALL HOUSE PLANNING BUREAU DESIGN NO. C-534



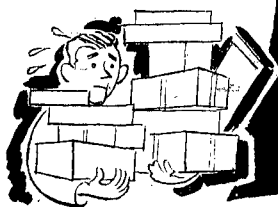
DESIGN C 534 — An attractive low-styled contemporary house. From the side door you enter the family room, kitchen or basement. The living room opens to a large family room with sliding glass doors to a possible terrace. A two-way fireplace is a feature for both the living room and family room. The kitchen makes additional use of the fireplace chimney with a built-in charcoal grill. The central hall routes directly to all areas and serves as a buffer for three generous bedrooms with large

wardrobe-type closets. There is a built-in lavatory and dressing table in the main bath.

Building materials used are brick, vertical V-joint siding with pitch and gravel on the roof to achieve the striking exterior appearance. Containing a full basement, the plan covers 1,476 square feet of living area (not including 297 square feet for the garage) and contains 26,272 cubic feet.
