Mrs. Arthur Pollard was elected to be first cook for the school lunch program at a salary of \$150 per month.

Current bills approved by the board amounted to \$2,736.03. Payments made from the building fund to Christiansen and Sons Construction company for the new elementary school amounted to \$34,834.40.


Omahan Speaker at Father-Son Banquet

Four young men as nominees to West Point. The Army will select one.

One principal and five alternates to the Annapolis Naval academy. Ten candidates to the Merchant Marine academy. Other Nebraska Congressmen name an additional 10 each. Three are chosen from the total by the academy.

Emerson Youth Dies Sunday In Accident Near Jackson

Funeral services were held Tuesday at Emerson for John G. Casey, 17, Emerson, who was killed in a one-car crash at the east edge of Jackson Sunday afternoon.

Another 17-year-old Emerson youth, Dan Dittman, is still hospitalized at Sioux City with injuries suffered in the crash. Dittman suffered a broken and dislocated left shoulder, severe neck whiplash and head bruises and lacerations.

Diane Bokemper, 14, and Judy Luth, 15, Emerson, suffered minor injuries and shock. They were released from a Sioux City hospital Sunday after treatment.

State Patrolman Robert Armour said the car driven by Casey, headed west, hit the south railing of a bridge headon. About 30 feet of the railing penetrated the car, he said. The driver evidently lost control of the car. Armour said. There were no skid marks, he added.

Leonard Dickes, 41, Sioux City, was booked at the Dakota county jail Sunday for operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated. After the car was driving struck another in the rear when that car slowed for the wrecker which was removing the Casey car from the scene of the crash, police said.

Police Give Warning On Following Firemen

Wayne police this week warned area residents that city and state statutes forbid drivers to follow local fire department trucks when they are on an emergency call.

The statutes provide for a fine of \$100 for persons convicted of following the fire truck or parking within a block of the fire.

Street Commissioner Henry Victor also cautioned Wayne children about following the mosquito fogger when it is in operation. The heavy smoke generated by the unit makes it virtually impossible for drivers to see children who might be right behind the fogger.



Capitol News

Effects of Long Winter Showing Up In State Business; Interstate Troubling

LINCOLN—It's summer in Nebraska and the memories of the long winter are fading. But effects of the cold and snow continue to show up in state business.

For instance, gasoline tax collections have finally caught up with the pace set last year. They dragged during the first five months of the year. The reason was the long, hard winter which discouraged highway travel and farm work.

May gasoline tax collections totaled some \$3.8 million, compared with \$3.5 million for the same month in 1959 and \$2.8 million for April of this year. Total collections so far this year amount to \$14.6 million, just a few thousand dollars more than the total for the same period a year ago.

The highway department, meanwhile, is still wrestling with break-up of roads in some areas caused by the freezing and thawing of the cold spring. There was trouble of another type on the Interstate highway where settling of the ground has caused dips in the super road between Gretna and Omaha.

The recommendation of Scissors will probably be placed before the Legislature, where it likely will stir up considerable controversy.

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County Agent's Column

RECONDITIONING OLD SILO - Reconditioning an old silo usually calls for coating the inside to make it air tight. Three materials are now being used for the best results - polystyrene or epoxy plastic and heavy plaster.

Blanket recommendations are hard to make because of a great variation in the inside condition of these silos. The best information comes from companies putting up silos. Some of these organizations have repair crews who will evaluate the condition of your silo and recommend the proper procedure.

CUTS LIVESTOCK GAINS - When heat makes animals uncomfortable, production suffers. Keeping livestock cool may be your best paying mid-summer job.

Shade, fans, foggers, sprays and wallows can be used effectively depending on circumstances. Dairy cows in production, steers on feed, laying hens and hogs are most often adversely affected by heat.

It pays to have equipment installed before the hottest days of summer arrive.

REPELLENTS MAY HARM - With the trend toward casual outdoor living, protection from insects through education and research, the division assists growers in increasing yield and improving quality and promotes better practices and methods in the production, storage, grading and shipping of potatoes.

Don't apply directly to lips, close to eyes or on cuts, scratches and open skin sores.

Don't apply to rayon and Dynel fabrics. Most insect repellents will plasticize these fabrics.

Don't allow the liquid to come in contact with painted, varnished and lacquered surfaces. Such finishes may be softened by various ingredients in insect repellents, as will certain plastics.

Don't use near fire or flame; don't smoke while applying the repellent.

Don't throw a pressurized can into a fire or place it on a range where the temperature will exceed 120 degrees. This may cause it to burst.

Don't puncture a pressurized can.

Farm News and Views

EARLIER MATURING corn and soybean varieties may not be the answer to delayed planting. Unless you are in the northern to north central Corn Belt, normal full-season varieties will probably give you the best yields up to mid-June.

After that you should substitute shorter season crops.

GRASS SILAGE quality will be much improved if it is wilted before ensiling. This is especially important if you plan to feed it relatively soon after harvest.

Apparatus unwilted grass silage contains some material which makes it unpalatable.

HOG MARKETINGS will drop more sharply from now to summer than normal. In addition, the number of sows going to market will be down even more as hog producers hold them for an additional litter.

This means that price penalties for heavier weight market hogs will be very small over the next two months, say price research specialists.

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
