## Four Area Farms Cooperate In Fertilizer Test Project

Persons driving through NE Nebraska these days are likely to see familiar signs along the roadsides identifying "TVA Unit Test Demonstration Farms."

These "farm-size" fertilizer demonstration plots feature an educational program developed under a contract between the University of Nebraska and Tennessee Valley authority.

The unit test demonstration program in Nebraska was initiated with TVA 10 years ago in six southeastern counties. Some 23 farmers were cooperating with the university and TVA when the counties involved finished their contracts at the end of the 1959 cropping season.

Ten counties in NE Nebraska were added to the program in 1957, bringing in an additional 23 farms. This block includes Antelope, Burt, Cedar, Dixon, Knox, Madison, Pierce, Stanton, Thurston and Wayne counties.

Cooperating farmers in Wayne county are Lawrence Hansen and Felix Dorsey, Wayne, Stan-

ton cooperators include Dwayne Willers, Hoskins, Paul Koester, Allen, is one of the Dixon county cooperators.

A prime objective of the program is to demonstrate the value, best methods of use and economic returns of TVA-produced fertilizers on practical farms under conditions which promote soil conservation.

Test demonstration farms are selected that represent a cross-section of agricultural conditions, including soil types, size of farms and types of farming in the state.

Cooperating farmers are urged to keep accurate records of cropping systems, fertilizer treatments and crop yields from year to year. Free access to the demonstration farms is authorized by cooperating farmers for tours and meetings to show results to others in the community. Permanent checkstrips without fertilizer are maintained in each field so that differences due to fertilizer treatments can be seen.

## Farmers Urged to Inspect Grain Now In Farm Storage

With summer heat beginning, ASC Chairman Carl Sundell today reminded farmers of the importance of inspecting any grain support grain they have stored on their farms for insect damage. If any evidence of damage is found, immediate steps should be taken to correct the situation, Sundell said.

While price support loans are made on a non-recourse basis, the farmer is responsible for the condition of the stored grain and must deliver grain of the same grade and quality as that placed under loan in order to settle the loan in full.

Sundell said his office has recently received word of USDA research indicating that the chemical malathion is a safe and economical treatment for low levels of insect infestation and damage in stored grain.

Researchers report a malathion spray or dust, applied at the time of storage, will effectively protect grain for a full storage season. Provided recommended procedures are followed.

Studies show malathion has no effect on the odor or flavor of bread made from treated wheat. They also show malathion does not impair germination of seed or grain.

## No More Extension On Conservation Reserve Contracts

ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell this week announced that conservation reserve contracts which expire in 1960 or later years are no longer eligible to be extended for an additional period of years.

Previously, contracts entered into for five years or less have been eligible for extension up to the maximum of 10 years upon application filed with the county ASC committee at any time before the original expiration date.

Sundell said the extension on contracts is being stopped at this time because of the fact such extension has the same effect as a new contract and would require the expenditure of additional conservation reserve funds. Under present legislation, no new conservation reserve contracts may be entered into.

The only exception to the cutoff on extensions is in the case of contracts calling for tree planting for which seedlings are not available. Such contracts must be extended one year for each year seedlings are unavailable.

Sundell said the present ruling has no effect on the period of existing contracts. These will continue in accordance with contract terms.

## Interest Continues At 3 1/2 Percent for Most Crop Loans

The interest rate, charged producers on 1960-crop price support loans will continue at 3 1/2 percent per year on all repayments received by the regular non-recourse loan maturity dates, the Department of Agriculture has announced.

County ASC Chairman Carl Sundell points out that this rate applies to non-recourse loans and to that part of a recourse loan which is repaid by the regular maturity date.

Application of the 3 1/2 percent rate to recourse loans if repaid during the regular loan period is designed primarily to encourage early payment of these loans.

Recourse loans must be repaid with interest, but they do not have to be repaid until a full year after the last date for obtaining loans for each of the commodities. The regular non-recourse loans can be satisfied by forfeiture of the collateral securing the loan and interest is charged only on the principal repaid.

Under the law, non-recourse price support is limited to \$50,000 on those commodities determined to be in surplus supply. However, any person may obtain unlimited non-recourse support if he reduces his 1960 production of the commodity by 20 percent below his 1959 production.

Any person may obtain recourse loans for any excess over \$50,000 without reducing his production, but the excess amount advanced must be repaid in full with interest.

Crops determined to be in surplus under this provision of the law include wheat, barley, grain sorghums, oats, soybeans, corn and rye.

## WSTC Enrollment Hits Record 906

WSTC summer session enrollment has gone over the 900 mark for the first time in history, setting a record of 906, Registrar M. B. Childs announced this week. The total includes all resident students, freshmen through graduate level. It does not include those enrolled for correspondence courses. The gain over last summer's 845 students is almost seven percent. The previous record for a summer session was 889 in 1956.

As usual, the women outnumber men, 698 to 208. Wayne Prep enrollment is also up slightly. The campus school has 89 in junior high and 189 in elementary grades.

## Wakefield Family Has Had Fill of Heart Operations; Third Recovers from Surgery

Wakefield — After three months the Roland Barge family is almost back to normal again — but with its fill of heart surgery.

Mrs. Barge, 30, returned home from an Omaha hospital last week after recovering from June 1 heart surgery similar to that undergone by her two daughters in April. She is up and around and is expecting to be able to do her own work in a week or two.

Sandra, 8, and Carla, 7, are completely recovered from successful heart operations. They are able to run about and play as well as other children.

The heart ailment — the mother and daughters had is known as ductus arteriosus. It involves the fetal blood vessel that joins the aorta and pulmonary blood vein.

Surgery for this type of ailment is not unusual, but it is rare that three members of the same family are involved. The congenital condition in the two daughters has been known since birth and was recognized in the mother a number of years ago.

Within the past three years, surgery for this type of ailment has been perfected to a point it was thought safe to operate on the three family members.

The Barges also have two sons, Michael, 5, and Gerald, 3, who have not had the congenital ailment.

Capitol News

State Capitol Space Problems at Critical Stage; Senators' Pay Amendment Vote Set

LINCOLN—The problem of space in the state capitol has reached what many feel is a critical stage. Years ago offices blossomed in areas of Nebraska's sky scraper that were designed only for storage or even just ordinary hallways. In the last decade offices have had to move into the downtown areas of Lincoln and elsewhere throughout the city.

Thus, say those close to the scene, the state is faced with the problem of whether offices should continue to be spread throughout the Capital City. If not, the only solution is a new office building. Money has been laid aside for this from the special property tax levy for state institutions. But at the rate it is accumulating, it would take some years before there would be enough in the coffers to finance a new office building. Best estimates are that it would take considerably more than \$1 million to build a new office structure.

It would be possible to utilize more hall space around interior court yards of the Capitol, but in the past this has been proposed it has brought a storm of protest from those who do not want further encroachment on the beauty of the building.

Even the statehouse press corps has now felt the pinch of space. News-men are headquartered in makeshift offices in a hallway immediately north of the legislative chambers. During a session, the southern hallway is closed and converted into office space for stenographers who take care of correspondence for the senators.

The space problem is caused by the growth of state government which experts say is the result of demands by the people for more services. It is this growth of government, say political scientists, as matched against the ability of Nebraskans to pay, that will probably be the most important problem in state government in the next decade.

Legislature and People

The number of people in Nebraska is directly related to how many senators there are to represent them.

When the one-house Legislature was initiated in Nebraska in 1937, the state was divided into 43 districts, by population, so that one lawmaker represented about 31,580 persons.

But the changing map of Nebraska population-wise, has put more people in cities, especially Lincoln and Omaha, and fewer in rural areas, causing a sharp change in some districts. This has been a gradual movement since the first unicameral session.

There have been tries in the Legislature to bring about a re-alignment of legislative districts. But there has likewise been no success.

County Agent's Column

Demand for feeder cattle will be strong again and the hog outlook is favorable at least until the fall of 1961. These are the predictions of Everett E. Peterson, University of Nebraska economist in the June issue of "Nebraska Farm and Ranch Economics".

"Feed cattle prices will hold up better than expected and feed will be abundant at reasonable prices," according to Peterson. "Seasonal feed cattle price decline will be less than a year ago and the fall low will be near that of last season unless a drought should occur in the range areas."

"The 1960 calf crop increase will be less than the seven percent gain in cow numbers because of higher losses this spring. Imports of live cattle, down 39 percent last year from 1958, are continuing to decline."

"The predicted summer high of \$20 a hundredweight for hogs seems high in view of expected increases in cattle slaughter."

Under a Constitutional provision, only \$37,500 per year can be divided among the senators for pay. The Constitution also permits the Legislature to have as many as 50 members without changing the Constitution.

But they have not seen fit to do so and government students feel one of the reasons is that since the already low pay of \$872 per year would be further reduced per man with more senators, this is one of the main reasons for the disapproval of redistricting.

Another, they say, is the reluctance on the part of senators to have their district boundaries changed for any reason.

Another Constitutional amendment will be on the November ballot to increase the pay of the lawmakers. This proposal has been turned down by voters before.

During a two-year period, a state senator's pay averages out at some \$72 per month. The amendment calls for \$200 monthly.

Safety Patrol

Throughout the years the State Safety patrol has been held in high respect by the average Nebraskan. One of the reasons may be the rigid examinations given to those who want to become a member of the group.

An applicant must be a citizen of Nebraska, have at least a high school education, be at least five feet 10 inches tall, be from 21-35 years of age, have good moral character and be in good physical condition.

Applicants must pass a personal investigation, written examinations and a board of five members. If an applicant clears those hurdles he is given six weeks of intensive training.

Pay is not high and requirements tough. But always the patrol has more men applying for jobs than it can use. The patrol consists of more than 180 uniformed men under direction of Col. C. J. Sanders, himself once a trooper since the early days of the group in the 1930's.

State Institutions

Dr. F. B. Decker, state commissioner of education, says he doesn't expect any difficulties when his department takes over the management of two institutions July 1.

On that date the State School for the Blind, Nebraska City, and the State School for the Deaf, Omaha, will come under jurisdiction of the State Board of Education. For years they have been under supervision of the Board of Control.

A survey of buildings and equipment at both schools is underway this month. Decker said the only difficulty he anticipates is a tight fiscal operation at the blind school where he feels there might be about \$20,000 too little to finish its operation for the next year.

EARLY WEED KILL

Results from north central experiment stations show one plant of yellow mustard uses twice as much nitrogen, twice as much phosphorus and four times as much water as a well developed oat plant. Common ragweed uses three times as much water as a corn plant. One lambquarter in a hill of corn reduces the yield by one-third. As a result, weed control is important. The earlier weeds are killed, the less depressing the effect on the yield.

TIME TO CUT RED CLOVER

Red clover should be cut before it reaches full bloom for maximum yield and highest quality hay.

The best plan is to start cutting when the clover reaches half bloom and complete harvesting by full bloom. Clover hay cut at this stage will be considerably higher in protein and total digestible nutrients than hay cut at a later date.

Red clover also may be used for silage or as green chop. If red clover is cut early, it is possible to get three or four cuttings of green feed in a season.

Red clover hay slightly excels alfalfa in total digestible nutrients and net energy. But ranks below alfalfa in protein. Pure red clover hay supplies about two-thirds as much digestible protein as an equal

Farm News and Views

SPRAYING CORN for weed control may pay well this season. Weed control has been hampered this year due to bad weather. The application of 2-4-D to fields which ordinarily do not have a weed problem may be quite profitable. Tests show that pigweed averaging only one plant in 20 inches of row can reduce corn yields 15 bushels per acre.

To avoid damage, use a sprayer boom equipped with drops and spray on days with no wind and temperatures below 85 degrees.

HOLD UP SALE of bred dairy heifers until late summer, advise farm economists. Demand for top grade bred heifers will continue firm and prices are expected to strengthen from present levels on into the fall as dairymen seek fall freshening heifers to maintain or increase their herd's production and milk base. Delaying sales will also give you a good return on your pasture.

BALING STRAW, instead of letting it lay, may be good business this summer. Check the market in the area this summer. Last spring many farmers, particularly dairymen, ran short and paid up to \$30 a ton. Some ran short and even used low-quality hay for bedding.
