

No More Extension On Conservation **Reserve Contracts**

ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell this week announced that conservation reserve contracts which expire in 1980 or later years are no longer cligible to be extended for an additional period of years.

Previously, contracts entered into for five years or less have been cligible for extension up to the maximum of 10 years upon application filed with the country ASC committee at any time before the original expiration date.

Sundell said the extension on
