Steiner Single Robs Wayne Hurler of No-Hitter Monday

A clean single by Keith Steiner with two out in the ninth inning robbed Don Gordon of a no-hit pitching performance Monday night as Wayne downed Laurel 2-0 in an Elkhorn Valley league game.

The victory was the third straight in league play for Wayne and came before about 1,500 fans who jammed the local ball park for the holiday tilt. A fireworks display followed the game.

The game was a tight pitching duel between Gordon and Laurel's Jerry Wisneski. Gordon fanned 12 and walked only two. Wisneski gave up only two hits and walked three. He struck out nine. Ironically, it was his wild pitches which were responsible for both of Wayne's unearned runs.

Wayne took a 1-0 lead in the second on two errors and a wild pitch. Roger Denesia was safe on Jon Erickson's error at first, took second on a wild pitch and scored when Laurel's catcher, Walsh, threw wild to third as Denesia attempted a steal following Denny Lott's strikeout.

The other run came in the eighth. Rod Tietfort was safe on an infield error, took second on a wild pitch and moved to third on the same play as Walsh's throw went into center field. Rudy Kelsch fanned but Hop Rothliebber hit a sacrifice fly to center to bring in the run.

Wayne's two hits were an infield single by Kelsch in the first and a single to right by Gerry Bogner in the fifth.

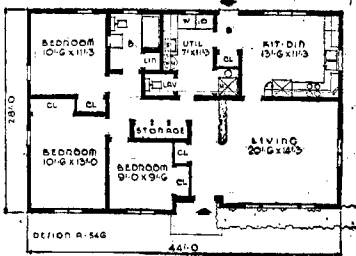

DESIGN A 546. The large family type kitchen has built-in range oven and cabinets. Its windows overlook the garden. Opposite but adjoining the kitchen is a versatile utility area containing washer, dryer, water heater, utility sink, and storage cabinets. The separate lavatory is economical because of the compact plumbing arrangement. Sliding doors form a cubicle for the heater. A door leading from the utility room can route traffic to the bedrooms and front door, which means the living room does not become a hall. Storage space is exceptional, including floor to ceiling

wardrobe type closets in the bedrooms, linen closet in bathroom, large storage closets in hall, and coat closets at both front and rear entries.

The exterior uses the basic materials of asphalt shingles, brick, horizontal and vertical siding to capture a simple, modern charm. Basementless, there is 1,203 square feet of living area and 13,534 cubic feet.
