### Alleged AWOL's Captured Tuesday

Two youths allegedly absent without leave from the U. S. Navy were apprehended near Wakefield Monday night after a bad check writing spree and short escape.

The two were Earl Hattig, Concord, and Roland Jenkins, Uniontown, Pa. The Navy alleges the pair has been AWOL since April 23.

The check writing spree first brought attention to the youths in Wayne Friday. They issued \$105 in no account checks to local merchants and were apprehended that evening by Wakefield Police Chief Lawrence Graffis.

Jailed at Wayne, the two were released to the custody of two Navy officers Monday afternoon. On the pretext of getting a change of clothes for Hattig, the group stopped at Concord where both escaped.

They were recaptured at Cottonwood Grove, two miles northwest of Wakefield about 8:30 p.m. Monday. State patrol officers, Sheriff Gus Schutt and Graffis participated in the recapture.

### NSIA Gets 2,900 Petition Signers in Wayne County

Over 2,900 Wayne county residents signed petitions circulated by the Nebraska School Improvement Association calling for abolishment of the State Board of Education and election of the state education commissioner. It was reported this week.

The proposal will be on the November ballot following the filing in Lincoln of 71,880 signatures by the NSIA.

Local spokesmen for the association said nearly 1,000 signatures were obtained in Wayne county towns. Signatures sent in from surrounding counties included Stanton, 1,179; Thurston, 1,038; Cedar, 614; and Pierce, 590.

The proposal, if adopted in November, would return the supervision of the State Education department to an elected official as it was prior to 1954.



## County Crop Outlook Excellent; Weather Ideal as Residents Suffer Hottest Day

Wayne county's crop outlook is excellent, County Agent Harold Ingalls reported Wednesday. Hot sun, ample moisture and lack of any severe storms make the picture very bright, he said.

Crops throughout the county were spared by one or more inches of rain Tuesday following the two hottest days of the season. Weather Observer Archie Wert reported 1.09 inches of rain in Wayne Tuesday. Amounts estimated at two inches fell southeast of the city causing some local crop damage.

Tuesday's rain brought the year's total to 15 1/2 inches, nearly 4 1/2 over the 45-year average, Wert said. The thermometer soared to 102 degrees in Wayne Monday afternoon following a high of 94 Sunday. The mercury dropped to a high of 86 Tuesday, but humidity remained high.

Supt. N. H. Brugger said Wayne's light plant established a new record peak shortly before noon Monday when the load was 2,250 kilowatts. The previous high was 2,100 kilowatts. Brugger said the day's output of 34,500 kilowatts was about 2,500 more than the record established last July.

"Oats are looking quite a bit better than average," Ingalls said in his crop report. He added that many farmers are starting to cut the crop for silage.

A fairly heavy corn borer infestation is reported in early planted corn and many farmers have treated their fields. The second cutting of alfalfa is short.

## New Paving, Sewer Districts Topics For City Council

New paving and sanitary sewer districts and annexation of two tracts of land provided the business for a lengthy Wayne city council session Tuesday night.

The council took steps for paving on a portion of Westwood addition and Sherman street following the filing of petitions from residents in the area requesting the move.

The city's engineers were asked to prepare plans and specifications for paving of Sherman from Tenth to Twelfth street and Faircrest road and part of Sunset drive in Westwood addition. The petitions bore signatures of more than the required 60 percent of resident property owners in the area.

The council also received a request from Fred Vorce for establishment of a paving district by ordinance to pave Tenth street from Pine Heights road to the east city limits. He said four of seven property owners are in favor of the move.

This paving would be on the north edge of a tract annexed to the city Tuesday night. It is owned by Elmer Harrison and will be called Second Pine Heights addition.

Steps were also taken for the annexation of a 600 x 300-foot addition to Greenwood cemetery. The annexation will be taken to District court for approval as an unplatted addition to free the city of any street maintenance obligations in the tract.

A special meeting is planned at 7 p.m. Tuesday to consider resolutions of necessity on sanitary sewer systems in Westwood addition and the Cecil Wriedt subdivision. The ordinance on the Tenth street paving is also expected to be passed.

Tabled for study following a brief discussion Tuesday was a request by the engineers for negotiation of their contract with the city. The engineers' new proposal seeks separate fees for paving and sewer work in new additions to the city. These would range from six percent of construction costs on projects involving \$250,000 or more and 12 percent on those \$5,000 or under.

City Attorney Budd Bornhoff advised the council the city has a valid contract with the engineers that will not expire until May 1, 1961. It covers all engineering services at a fee of \$500 per month. He told the council he felt the time for renegotiation was next April.

A request by K. M. Olds for the council to establish a special power rate for residential electric heat was tabled until a report is received from the engineers. A tentative rate will probably be established at the council's July 25 meeting.

Richard Carman again asked the council if any means could be found to allow him to construct a

## Dog Licenses . . . A Matter of Health and Safety

Wayne city ordinance provide that all dog owners must license their animals by May 10 of each year. As of Thursday, only 85 dogs had been licensed in the city.

A month ago the police department issued a notice that unlicensed dogs would be impounded and the owners forced to go through court proceedings to reclaim them.

It is up to the city council to see that ALL of the dogs in the city are licensed. If court proceedings are necessary to bring about this end, the police department should be instructed to enforce the ordinance.

## Relaxation Destroys New-Found Protection

Wayne citizens seem threatened with the possibility of losing a measure of protection afforded them only a year ago.

In recent weeks the city council has been asked for relaxation or revision of its municipal governing setback of new buildings being constructed.

We are unalterably opposed to such a move. This ordinance was prepared after several years of complaints and pleading by local residents, to furnish a measure of protection to the town's citizenry.

Not only a year later it is in danger of repeal if the requests are granted. It would seem the law is not to be achieved . . . but only when it does not protect them adversely.

The ordinance specifies no building in the residential district shall be nearer than 225 feet from the front street line.

## How to Cause Unemployment

A strong, well organized campaign is on to increase the Federal minimum wage and to extend the wage-hour law to retail and other service industries which have been exempt ever since it came into being during the height of the depression.

Many people support the campaign on understandable humanitarian grounds. But there is every likelihood that the project increase and extension would produce serious problems for those who are opposed to be helped and everyone else as well.

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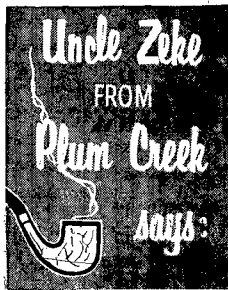

# Proposal to Abolish Education Board On November Ballot After Petition Drive

LINCOLN — Every July a state government board comes into the limelight from relative obscurity the remainder of the year. It is the State Board of Equalization and Assessment, composed by law of the governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer and the tax commissioner.

During July the board meets to equalize the property assessment in the counties preparatory to fixing the state property tax levy. The board has great powers. It fixes the assessed valuation of railroads for the purposes of taxation and the franchise value of public service corporations. A franchise is the right to do business.

It also equalizes the assessment of property in the counties and has the power to raise or lower the taxable worth of any county, or a class of property in a county, such as town lots and improvements.

The board determines the amount of all taxes required for state purposes and the rate of taxation upon all property in the state necessary to raise the money to operate state government.

This is done before Aug. 2 of each year. The current state levy is \$8.45 for every \$1,000 assessed value of property owned in Nebraska. That means if a Nebraska man had a house whose assessed value is \$2,000, he would pay \$16.90 to the state on it, in addition to local taxes.

Actual work on how much money is needed and the probable levy required to raise it is done in the tax commissioner's office, then presented to the board for discussion and action.

### School Petition

A proposal to abolish the State Board of Education will be on the November ballot. It calls for approval of a constitutional amendment abolishing the elected board and providing for election of the state commissioner of education.

A petition drive by the Nebraska School Improvement association got the necessary 42,107 valid names of voters on petitions asking that all voters be given the opportunity to ballot on the proposal at the November election.

Before 1953, the head of the education department was elected on a non-political ticket. A constitutional amendment approved by voters authorized establishing the elected board.

A similar campaign by the association failed in 1928 and a bill introduced in the Legislature in 1957 was defeated. The association has said it feels the board has too much power and authority which should be kept by the Legislature.

The group and the board and Commissioner F. B. Decker have been at odds many times over policies but association spokesmen say there were no personalities involved in its campaign to oust the board in favor of an elected superintendent.

The association feels that the people would have a more direct

say on school matters if they could vote on the commissioner, rather than the individual commissioners.

### Safety Patrol

Members of Nebraska's Safety patrol for the past five years will have bigger paychecks. Col. C. J. Sanders, patrol chief, said raises averaging \$20 per month will be given every four years after the first five years with the patrol.

The pay scale for the first five years remains the same. Patrolmen out in 60-hour weeks, have no Saturdays, Sundays or holidays off and receive an extra pay for overtime. Each trooper averaged 141 hours of unpaid overtime last year, Sanders said.

Without the new raises, which will be based on years of service, troopers get \$450 per month, sergeants \$510, lieutenants \$550 and captains \$610.

### School Costs

The per-pupil costs of educating children in one-teacher rural schools in Nebraska ranges from \$240.83 in Sarpy county to \$577.15 in Garden county. That's the report from the State Education department's statistical division chief, W. A. Schindler. Sarpy has only two such schools while Garden county has 20.

School costs include total expenses of districts plus depreciation. Considering the state as a whole, Schindler said, the average cost in the one-teacher rural schools is \$314.87 per pupil. The average number of pupils taught per teacher is the major factor in determining the per-student costs.

### Revenue

Liquor and gasoline tax revenue collected by the state ran ahead during the first six months of this year as compared with the same period in 1949.

Gasoline tax collections for the first six months were up a half million dollars over a similar time in 1949. Liquor taxes climbed some \$44,000 higher than the first half of 1949.

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## County Agent's Column

### New Tree Plantings

It's time now to cultivate tree plantings for better survival. Cultivation is needed to eliminate competition from weeds and conserve the available water supply.

Extreme care should be used in cultivating evergreen species, cedar, pine and fir. The soil should not cover any part of the trees. In addition, trees should not be injured during cultivation.

It takes but a few minutes to cultivate the new windbreak planting which will grow and give you protection for many years, once established. The care trees receive during the summer months determines the future success of the planting.

### Rain Sale Aug. 5

A total of 116 yearling rams and 43 yearling ewes have been consigned to the purebred ram sale Aug. 5 at the Nebraska State fairgrounds. Judging begins at 9 a.m. and the sale at 1 p.m.

Ted Doane, college of agriculture animal husbandman, said the ram consignments include 43 Hampshires, 25 Suffolks, 19 Corneduffs, 13 Shropshires, nine Southdowns and seven Cheviots. The ewes include 10 Hampshires, four Suffolks, eight Corriedales, nine Southdowns, eight Cheviots and four Shropshires.

### Power and Safety Day

New Farm equipment ranging from an air conditioned tractor driver's helmet to a composite materials handling system will be on display at Tractor Power and Safety day on the college of agriculture campus July 21.

Lloyd Herbut, chairman of the agricultural engineering department, says the feed handling systems gather feeds such as silage, grain and supplement, mix the feeds in correct proportions and distribute mixed feeds to feed bunks.

Other features of the program will include four experimental tractors: —Oliver Twin '88 tractor featuring two tractors attached side-by-side "siamese" style; —Allis-Chalmers fuel cell tractor which generates its own electricity for power; —International hydrastatic drive tractor consisting of an engine-driven hydraulic pump which supplies fluid to high pressure hydraulic motors at each rear wheel or ahead of the final drive; —John Deere 80-10, a new large four-wheel drive tractor.

In addition to experimental tractors there will be a parade of some 50 tractors tested at the Nebraska Tractor Testing station during the past year.

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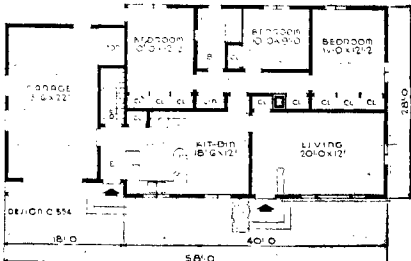
