





LINCOLN—The problem of a pension—for—World—War I—veter ans will continue to come up in Congress. That's the belief of Louis R. Eby, Director of Veterans Affairs for Nebraska. He says he thinks the pressure on Congress by World War I veterans and—other quarters to provide an adequate pension for all who served in the Great War will produce one in the next session of the lawmaking body. The director feels such a pension will be based on age and income.

A pension bill has been passed by Congress but Eby said it benefits the young veteran and

The state owns 250 acres of land on which the fair is held and activities of the department, an agency of state government, are pair, for jout of fair revenues and legislative appropriations.



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
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
