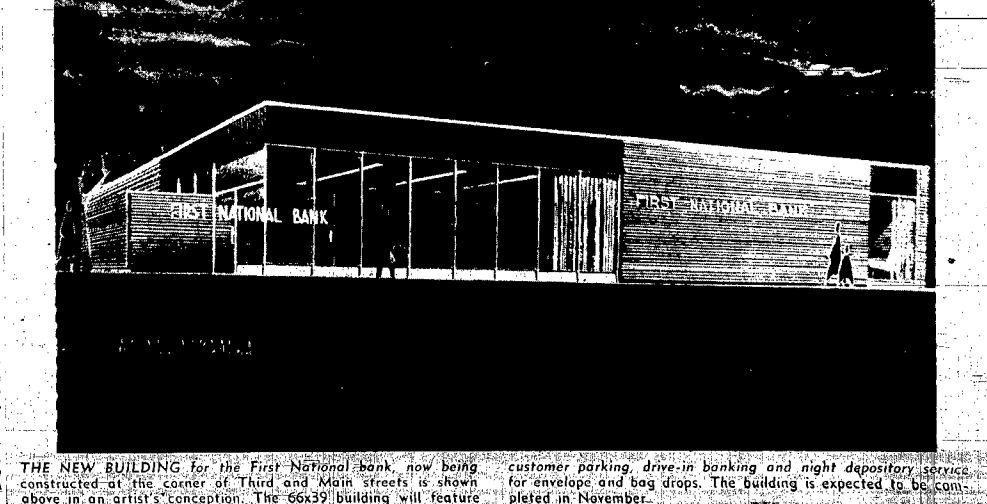

Capitol News... State Fair Preparations Are Swinging Into Top Speed

LINCOLN—The problem of a pension for World War I veterans will continue to come up in Congress. That's the belief of Louis R. Eby, Director of Veterans Affairs for Nebraska. He says he thinks the pressure on Congress by World War I veterans and other quarters to provide an adequate pension for all who served in the Great War will produce one in the next session of the lawmaking body.

A pension bill has been passed by Congress but Eby said it benefits the young veteran and widows and children at the expense of the older, or World War I veterans. This is because of income levels of the pension, Eby says, which counts social security as income for the older veterans, thus reducing to a low figure the number who can qualify.

Young veterans do not qualify for much social security if they were unable to work and thus could get as high as \$100 per month from the government under the new pension, he added. Therefore, he says, he feels a separate pension bill affecting only World War I veterans will come about, probably in the next meeting of the lawmakers.

Thirty eight states have given bonus payments to veterans of the first war and some to World War II servicemen. But in Nebraska a Veterans Aid Fund was established with income going to needy veterans and their families as an outright gift. Nebraska has about 24,000 veterans of World War I.

Tax Cut Likely State Tax Commissioner Forrest Johnson indicates it is possible to cut the state property tax about 10-cents for every \$1,000 worth of property owned by a Nebraskan.

OATS SUPPLIES will not be as short as expected some months back. The latest government crop report indicates yields are setting new records. Even with a smaller acreage, total production promises to top last year by about six percent and carryover supplies will be higher than expected.

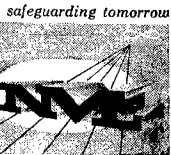

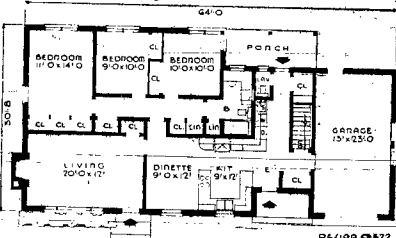
