



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
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# 23 Enrolled in Remedial Speech Clinic



Twenty-three e-hildren are learning their felters this month at WSTC—learning to speak them correctly, that is, because they have some kind of speech or hearing difficulty.

They are enrolled in the remedial speech clinic offered each summer by the college to correct speaking thandicaps through intensive therapy. It is a free service, accredited by the State Department of Education.

To prepare for the clinic, Dr. Helen Russell, speech instructor, interviewed about 60 children and selected the 23 who could best be benefited by the training. This number is about the maximum she can accomodate in small groupseach child getting at least 15 hours of therapy. The program, lasting through July, is equivalent to a full semester or training in a regular school term with a therapist.

A typical class of five pupils went through this routine one day:

summer include delayed speed severe articulation defects, hea-ing, cleft palate, stuttering an foreign dialects.

When parents continue to with their children through year, improvement is usually ticeable. Dr. Russell noted five children returning from 1959 clinic speak better now.

of the 23 enrolled, 19 live in towns other than Wayne. Two come from Columbus. The ages range from five to 16, though most are in elementary grades. Some of the children come five days, a week for 45-minute sessions. The others come three-days a week for 75 minutes.

CORN BELT CATTLE FEEDERS still finish three times as many cattle for market as the western states, despite rapid increases in feeding activity in California, Texas, Colorado and Arizona. Agricultural economists expect feedlet expansion in western states to continue for several years.

CONTROL TOADSTOOLS

Many gardeners and lawn en-thusiasts are finding toadstools, mushrooms and puffballs in their-lawns and gardens.

According to John Weihing, plant pathologist at the College of Agriculture, these pests can be controlled by the use of pariogen that spray should be used according to the directions given on the label of the container.

He suggests that if mercuric chloride is used, a solution of one to 1,000 mercuric chloride should be made by adding a 7½-grain tablet of mercuric chloride to one pint of water. He added that a drop or two of liquid delergent should be added to this solution to give it greater wetability.

should be added to this solution to give it greater wetability. Then loosen the soil where the fungus is present and soak the area with the mercuric chloride solution at about one pint per square foot of soil surface.

# **Special Sessions Unusual: Fourteenth Session Slated**

LINCOLN — A special session of the Nebraska Legislature is an unusual occurrence. They have been held only 13 times in the history of Nebraska, seven since the Unicameral was adopted in 1937.

The announcement by Gov. Ralph Brooks that he would bring the lawmakers to Lincoln Aug. I would be the fourteenth such meeting. Senators can call themselves into session or the governor-many do so by proclamation. Brooks announced he wanted the solons to take immediate action to do something to bolster the state's industrial economy.

to bolster the state's industrial economy.

The jast special session was in 1954. It lasted 12 days and cost \$6.388 in tax money.

It is estimated a session of about seven days would require an expenditure of about \$8.000. Seven days is the quickest that the Legisluature could transact business and adjourn. Senators get no extra pay, just expenses of a trip to the Capitol and back or one round trip per person:

Hugo Srb, clerk of the Legislature, said he could easily be ready to receive the senators Aug. 1. He said he has material on hand for the meeting and can gather a staff of stenographers to handle correspondence for the lawmakers. Mileage costs for the senators, based on past experience, would be around \$844. Srb said.

The governor announced he would call the Legislature into session—to consider a Constitutional amendment and transfer of \$100,000 from the Agriculture department Bureau of Animal. Industry to the Resources division. The Resources division. The Resources division is designed to attract industry to Nebraska.

Brooks said the Constitutional ameniment he had in mind would be to allow Nebraska municipalities to issue revenue boads—in order that they might buy and lease building sides and plants to private industry.

A law permitting this was declared unconstitutional by the State Supreme court in 1957. The court held the law violated a sec-

tion of the state Constitution which forbids giving or loaning of the state's credit to aid an in-dividual, association or corpora-tion. The court also said that money realized from revenue

Announcement of a special session of the Legislature by Gov. Ralph-Brooks kicked off a political storm. It is expected some of this will carry over into the session.

One of the nominees for governor, John Cooper, Humboldt Republican, is also a stale senator. He charged Brooks called the session to further the governor's -campaign for the U. S. Senate at the taxpayer's expense.
