## Disease-Free Pig Laboratory Sets Open House Today

Open house will be held today and evening in the new specific pathogen-free pig laboratory east of Wayne. Drs. L. A. Jensen and J. M. Brown said they will have a litter of pigs in the laboratory to show uses of the various pieces of equipment.

The laboratory, first of its kind in Nebraska and the fifth in operation in the United States, is located on the industrial site at the east edge of Wayne.

Purpose of the laboratory is to raise young pigs free from virus pig pneumonia, atrophic rhinitis, enteritis and several other minor diseases contracted from other hogs.

Young pigs are delivered surgically under sterile conditions and kept in the laboratory four weeks.

Such pigs will be used for breeding stock by hog breeders. Hogs reared under these conditions are healthier and grow faster, Dr. Brown said.

Use of pigs under this plan calls for removal of other hogs from the area and a complete sanitation program to be carried out on yards, hog houses and equipment at the farm while the pigs are in the laboratory, so that the new pigs will be in an atmosphere free from specific germs.

By following sanitation procedures set up in the plan, herds have been kept disease free up to seven years, Dr. Jensen said.

Complete details of the plan may be learned at the open house at the laboratory today.

## Stuart Man Killed In Laurel Crossing Accident Tuesday

Robert L. Wallinger, 29, Stuart, was killed about midnight Tuesday when his northbound truck trailer collided with an eastbound train at the railroad crossing ¾ miles north of Laurel.

It was the second truck-train fatality within a year at the crossing. Aug. 25, 1959 two truck drivers died when their truck was involved in a similar collision.

Wallinger swerved his truck into the ditch in an attempt to miss the train but was unable to stop his vehicle quick enough. The truck and trailer overturned and burst into flames.

The truck, owned by Robert Greenfield, Stuart, and its load of hay were almost completely demolished.

Wallinger is survived by his wife and four small daughters.

## Preliminary Report Places Wayne Population at 4,191

The city of Wayne showed a gain of over 600 persons in the 1950 census, a preliminary report by the Bureau of Census revealed this week.

The report lists the city's population at 4,191 compared to 3,595 in 1950. This represents a gain of 16.6 percent. The city's gain more than offsets a drop of about 200 persons in the Wayne county total, which fell slightly under 10,000.

Wayne's population had increased over 54 percent since 1940, the report showed. The population was listed as 2,719 in 1940.

Pierce came back for six runs in the sixth and a 15-10 lead. Seven walks and a single enabled Wayne to tie the count in the final inning and set the stage for Pierce's winning rally.

The winning run came with two men out. Nave walked after two strikeouts and then Elwood Kiffly to short center. Shurtzoff Dan Helgren got his glove on the ball but failed to hold it and Nave crossed the plate for the winning run.

## A Foot in The Door

Just before recessing for the national political conventions, the House passed a new minimum wage bill by a narrow 214 to 203 vote. That bill, it is expected, will be acted upon by the Senate shortly after it reconvenes Monday. It provides for an increase in the minimum wage to \$1.15 from the present \$1, to take effect next Jan. 1. It also extends wage-hour law coverage to retail companies operating five or more stores in two or more states, with the requirement they must pay at least \$1 an hour.

As of now, all retailing is exempt from the Federal law on the sound grounds that it is local business, entirely susceptible to local needs and attitudes and local competition and so, if wage-hour legislation is needed, the law should be of a state or local nature.

In any event, some may believe that non-chain retail stores or chains operating entirely within one state, have nothing to worry about so

as our many neighboring towns enjoy.

Along with citing this delay in giving Wayne its rightful service, we would like to voice our objection to the centralization of NE Nebraska telephone directories into one huge book incorporating 42 towns. This can only bring further confusion for the local patron seeking a local number and offers little advantage to local telephone customers.

far as this bill is concerned. That belief reflects dangerous optimism. For the bill is just one more example of the "foot in the door" technique. If one group of retailers can be reached this time, the precedent will be established for ultimately reaching all.

As a consequence, small independent retailers, as well as others, are taking a firm stand against extension of the law to local retailing of any type. They — individually and through their trade associations — are pointing out that the proposed law is inflationary and would reduce job opportunities for youthful, unskilled and marginal workers whose productivity would not compensate for the arbitrary pay scale.

Congress and the Administration, before finally approving such far-reaching legislation, should certainly give full consideration to their impressive case.

## County Agent's Column

**Tomato Blight**  
Many gardeners around the state are becoming quite disturbed because the leaves of their tomato plants are turning yellow and dying.

The condition may be due to Septoria leaf spot or blight. The disease may occur on plants of any age, but injury becomes more evident at this time of year when the plants begin to set fruit. The lower leaves of the plants are the first to be affected by the disease and they turn yellow and die. Upon

close examination of the leaves, they will show a spotted condition. These spots actually develop before the leaf dies. Under favorable conditions there is progressive loss of foliage until only a few leaves are left at the top of the stems and the fruit are exposed to sun scald. There are three measures of control for leaf spot: Sanitation — Remove the old diseased foliage or plow it under thoroughly. Rotation — It is desirable to plant the tomatoes in a new location in the garden each year. Spraying or dusting — Zineb, maneb or napha plus zinc sulfate with a teaspoon of common household detergent added to each gallon of solution should be sprayed on the tomatoes at least weekly if the weather is wet and

at least two-week intervals during dry seasons. Stable Fly Control Stable fly populations are becoming severe due to weather conditions favorable for their development. For control of stable flies, spray inside and outside of barns, fences, lower portions of trees and shrubs with a one percent dilution of diazinon or Icaran. One gallon of the 24-percent emulsion concentrate of either should be mixed with 25 gallons of water. For control of flies on animals, use the following: pyrethrum, and dipyrone butoxide (pyrethrum) preparation with or without organophosphorus such as tabatraz, or organophosphorus such as tabatraz, or organophosphorus such as tabatraz, or organophosphorus such as tabatraz. Daily applications are necessary for control on animals.

## Capitol News . . . Special Session Sets Tone For Busy Fall in Capitol

LINCOLN — The statehouse, normally without much activity in August, is buzzing this year. Primarily this is the result of the revival of the two-party system in Nebraska which produces controversies and maneuvers as party members in the Capitol jockey for political advantage. The special session of the Legislature this week set the tone for a busy fall. This will lead into the election in November, a meeting of the Legislative council and the regular gathering of lawmakers in January.

There will be a new governor in January, which will produce the usual ruckus as department heads are removed and replaced with those of the new governor's choice. The Legislative council is composed of the current members of the Legislature who have been studying state problems the past 18 months. They sit as a body and make recommendations to the next Legislature. Every session of the council someone questions whether reports accepted by the body constitute endorsement of the proposals or whether the function of the council is merely to forward the information to the next Legislature.

Recommendations of the council, carry considerable weight with the Legislature and a high percentage of proposals become law that originally came from council study committees. A special session always produces considerable fireworks. This is because of two factors: One, the senators, although many will not publicly admit it, do not like to be called back into session. The other reason is that most special sessions occur during the hot months and the heat wears tempers thin quickly. An attempt was made to get the Legislative chamber air-conditioned but there was not enough time for a permanent installation and law does not permit use of earmarked funds for a temporary one.

Instead, the senators got 20 fans to keep the air moving. These add to the problem of hearing the lawmakers speak, even though they have microphones. There are also those senators who are not in sympathy with any proposals produced at a special session and who feel that these should be held only when there is the greatest emergency and where time is a factor. An example was the special session of 1952 when the lawmakers were summoned to get appropriations authorized to stamp out a hog disease that threatened to engulf the swine industry in Nebraska. The disease, vesicular exanthema, was highly contagious and could have gone through Nebraska's important hog industry like a prairie fire in dry grass.

There was another special session that year also, to handle the problems encountered by heavy flooding. Both lasted seven days each, costing a total of \$6,085. **Summer Work** Students back to employment offices in summer to find work to help foot the bill for education in the fall. But the danger in summer work is that a student

may like the money he is making and decide not to finish his education.

State Labor Commissioner Donald Bastemeyer, however, urges teen-agers, boys and girls alike, not to chuck school just because they had a good job during vacation. Bastemeyer says he hopes the youngsters find their work profitable and instructive. But he added, "Let me urge you not to become so enamoured of that paycheck that you fail to return to school this fall and complete your education."

Students who drop out of school generally have a harder time finding work, suffer more prolonged periods of unemployment, are paid less and are promoted more slowly than those who finish their education, Bastemeyer said. "Jobs with a future for you," he told teen-agers, "require more basic education than ever before."

Bastemeyer reminded those with a yen to do work that this is possible after school hours. Most jobs, he said, are open to those who are 16 years old or more and some to those who are 15.

**Drunken Drivers** Alvin Scissors, director of the State Motor Vehicle department, says he may ask the 1961 Legislature to permit the department to deny driving licenses to motorists who lost permits in other states. In Nebraska, Scissors said, from 3,000 to 3,500 persons lose their licenses every two years because of drunken driving. Scissors commented that Nebraska participants in a Federal listing of drivers who have lost their licenses for drunken driving or who have had permits revoked for violations causing fatal accidents.

A clearance center for names of such drivers is to be maintained by the U. S. Commerce department. Under the plan, drivers in the two categories will not be able to escape their records by moving to other states. The Commerce department of the Federal government estimates that about one million drivers' licenses are currently in a revoked status in the United States. They make up about one percent of the total number of drivers and are considered "poorer than average" risks by insurance companies, it was said.

Here's another: If the Federal government does not start paying off the present debt, in the next 30 years we will pay taxes for interest charges equal to the \$290 billion principal of the debt — and still owe all of it. Waste and unnecessary spending by government flatten the pocketbooks of all of us — even the so-called "common man" for whom the politicians weep — Citizens Public Expenditure Survey.

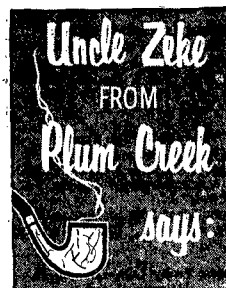

## Farm News and Views

**YOU'LL HEAR** much talk during the next several months about the growth of the national economy. According to the speakers, the rate of growth will be "about right," but "not enough" or "normal," depending upon each person's interpretation. Important considerations to keep in mind are the two basic prerequisites for true growth of the economy. The first is savings or, as the economists say, "postponed consumption." The second is investment of these savings to increase productivity. An increase in the country's money supply without a corresponding increase in the total physical volume of goods and services will result only in higher prices, which is inflation, not growth.

**SOYBEAN FIELDS** are wealthier than normal this year in areas where cultivation was delayed by excess rain. Farm managers suggest you order a re-cleaner for your combine now, if it isn't equipped with weed seed

removal screens. It often takes several weeks for delivery. Re-cleaners are available for most combines at a cost of from \$100 to \$150. Only one percent foreign material is allowed in No. 1 beans. A recleaner will be a big help in removing weed seeds and foreign matter that could otherwise cause your beans to be docked.



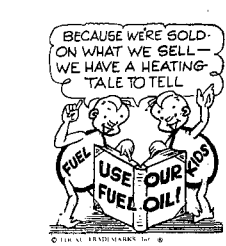


