Wayne Man Dedication Speaker



ALFRED SYDOW, Wayne, was honored Friday at ceremonies dedicating a new 230,000-volt transmission line at Columbus. Sydow is president of the organization which built the line to bring power from Ft. Randall dam to a terminal substation at Columbus. The line was built with funds borrowed from REA. David Hamil, REA administrator, commended Sydow and other officials of the Nebraska Electric Generation and Transmission cooperative for constructing the \$3,650,000 line at a savings of more than a million dollars under REA engineers' estimates. This is the first such line built with REA loan funds. Former Gov. Robert Crosby was master of ceremonies at the dedication. Other speakers included Gov. Ralph Brooks, Sen. Carl Curtis and Repr. Larry Brock.

City Council Gives Tentative Approval to New Standpipe

Tentative approval for the construction of a new water storage standpipe was given by Wayne city councilmen at their regular meeting Tuesday night.

The approval followed a recommendation of the city's engineers which cited the current lack of storage facilities in the town in case of an emergency and also added that it would help to solve a water pressure problem in the northwest section of the city.

The council instructed the engineers to prepare plans and specifications for a 750,000-gallon standpipe to be located on high ground near the northwest corner of the city limits. The project will probably not be let for bids until next spring, when sufficient funds can be accumulated to pay construction costs.

The engineers said cost of the standpipe would probably be about \$60,000 in addition to costs of extending current mains to the new tank.

The report of the engineers cited the need for at least 600,000 gallons of storage for emergency use. The present elevated tank, which was erected in 1914, holds only 35,000 gallons. This supply would last only about 20 minutes if the city's pumping facilities were knocked out by a disaster.

In other action the council adopted a resolution creating sanitary sewer districts in Westwood addition and Cecil Wriedt subdivision. No objections to the creation of the districts were filed. Bids on the project will probably be let Sept. 6.

A special meeting is planned at 7 p.m. Tuesday to give final approval to plans for the sewer construction and to advertise for bids.

Commissioners Vote to Discontinue Bounties

Wayne county commissioners Tuesday adopted a resolution which would discontinue the payment of bounties for predatory animals. The county had been paying bounties for coyotes and foxes.

The major project underway is remodeling the hog house. The east half has been converted to farrowing stalls. Lienemann is working on the west half. How about the future of the hog business? "That's a good question," answered Lienemann. "I intend to be consistent and produce about the same number every year. It should average out all right in the long run."

County Agent Harold Ingalls said he expects about 100 entries again this year in the 4-H beef division.

Monday will be entry day with judging of horses taking place at 2 p.m. Beef judging will be Tuesday and dairy stock judging Wednesday.

Beef judge will be Dwayne Zimmerman, Lincoln, dairy judge, Charles Frederick, Creighton, and hog judge, Frank Munn, Waverly.

Tuesday night prize-winning livestock and 4-H beef champions will be paraded before the grandstand. Parade of prize-winning horses and dairy stock champions will be Wednesday night.

A popular children's event will be held again this year with races and horseshoeing; events slated for both Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons. Cash prizes will be awarded winners in events and all entrants will receive free tickets for rides on the midway.

Entries are limited to children 14 years and under. Wayne Jaycees will help manage the contests.

The annual Jaycee Kiddie parade is on tap again this year, with cash prizes in three different classes Wednesday at 2:30 p.m. Youngsters may enter in costumes, pets or bikes and trikes divisions. No entry blank is needed. The children need only appear at 2 p.m. ready to compete.

Tuesday night's stage show will feature Tex Ritter, long-time cowboy entertainer and a favorite of western entertainers.

Ritter has a long list of engagements in movies, radio, television and stage appearances backed up with records and albums over a long period. He has starred in more than 70 western pictures and made personal appearances all over the world.

Backing Ritter will be Hank Morton, a wry-faced pantomime comedian who is a veteran of television, radio and movies. One of the highlights of his act is a bass fiddle that falls apart while he is accompanying Ritter in a musical number.

Johnny White and the Sons of West are the musical group with the show and bring with them a long record of radio, television and personal appearances. They combine comedy and serious singing for country and western style music fans.

A dancing group known as the Dakota Cloggers will furnish colorful action and round out the western theme in entertainment. Eight dancers and a caller make up the group, all of whom range in age from 12 to 15.

Wednesday night's entertainment will be the talent show under the direction of Mrs. Gerald Seim, Hartington.

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Highway 35 Blacktop Nearing Completion

Blacktopping of the nine-mile stretch on Highway 35 from Wayne to the Carroll junction is expected to be completed today, Harold Schwarzenbach, resident engineer, reported Wednesday.

The road will not be officially opened to traffic until shoudering operations are completed, he added. This will probably be in about two weeks.

Wakefield Farm Becoming Pig Hatchery

Ben Lienemann, young Wakefield farmer, is fitting his present farm buildings to his needs in setting up a pig hatchery.

A former soil conservationist with the Soil Conservation service, Lienemann started farming this spring four miles north of Wakefield. He is combining the pig hatchery with his 200-acre farming operation.

Lienemann doesn't feel he is increasing the hog supply with his hatchery. "I'm just specializing. Feeders prefer to buy their pigs rather than raise them. People hatched their own chickens in the past but they don't do that anymore."

"I've found a very good demand for the pigs I've produced so far. Part of them were sold on contract — that was to guarantee myself a market since I'm just getting started. A few were sold privately and we had a lot of requests which we could not fill. We have made a list of requests for future use."

The operation has been profitable on paper but the money is all going right back into the hatchery. "We're just getting started now,

Dr. Burkhardt Quits Norfolk To Join Wayne State Faculty

Dr. Allen P. Burkhardt, Norfolk schools superintendent 29 years, resigned Tuesday to accept a position as education professor at WSTC.

The announcement was made following a Norfolk school board meeting Tuesday morning. Burkhardt's appointment to the WSTC faculty was confirmed at a State Normal board meeting in Lincoln Tuesday.

The Normal board also approved four other appointments to the local faculty.

Dr. Leonard A. Brubaker will be Wayne Prep director and associate education professor. He will succeed Dr. Joe Nichols as Prep director. Nichols resigned to become Fremont assistant school superintendent. Dr. Brubaker has been curriculum coordinator in the Bryan, Ohio, public schools.

Forrest E. Hazard will be an assistant English professor. He has been teaching freshman English at the University of Wisconsin and is a candidate for a doctorate there. Florence Tooby, formerly on the faculty at Pierce college, Athens, Greece, will be an English instructor.

Douglas A. Spencer will be supervising social studies teacher at the local faculty.

Social Security Agent Sets Visit Next Week

Robert W. Fahnstocck, Norfolk Social Security office field representative, will be at the Wayne courthouse from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. next Thursday.

Social Security beneficiaries under age 72 can earn as much as \$1,200 per year and still receive all of their payments for that year according to Clifford Kittelson, Norfolk office manager.

Beneficiaries should not wait until they have earned \$1,200 before reporting. They should report as soon as they think they will earn over \$1,200. For example, farmer beneficiaries may now know, because of crop conditions, that their net earnings will be over \$1,200 this year.

Beneficiaries must include in the \$1,200 earnings in the year before becoming 65 in the case of men or age 62 in the case of women and also earnings in the year after becoming age 72.

Wayne's baseball team assured itself of a spot in the Elkhorn Valley league playoffs this week with successive shutouts over Laurel. The locals capped a 2-0 decision Thursday and a 9-0 victory Sunday. Both games were played at Laurel.
Wayne closed its regular season play last night against Bloomfield on the local diamond. This followed the annual Merchants' Night game with Winside Tuesday night.
Don Goeden hurled a neat three-hitter in gaining Thursday's victory. He struck out 15 and gave up only three walks, one of them intentional. The lanky righthander faced only three men in six of the nine innings, getting all three Laurel batters on strikeouts in the second and ninth.
Wayne took a 1-0 lead in the second inning after two men were out. Rudy Kelsch doubled to left center and scored on Goeden's double to right center.

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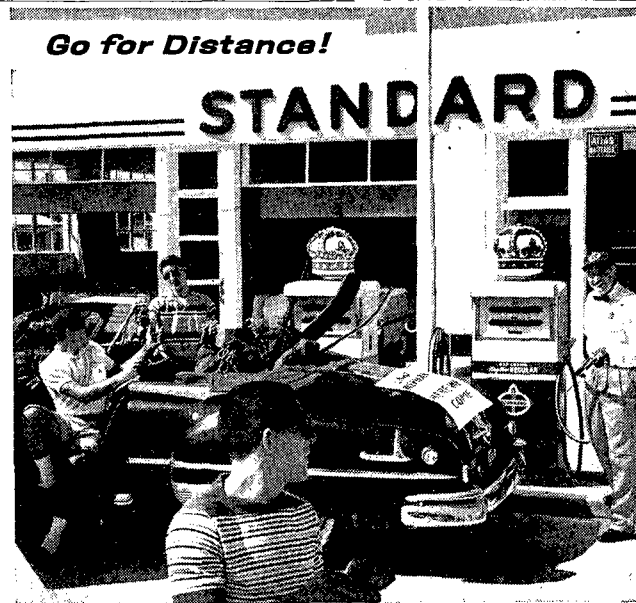

You may not agree with an editorial . . . but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

Dog License Scoreboard

About a month ago we commented on the laxity of Wayne city officials in enforcing the dog licensing ordinance. Here is how the licensing scoreboard stands to date:

May 10 — Deadline for securing 1960 licenses. Only 16 licenses issued by city clerk.

June 9 — Police issued reminder to dog owners about securing 1960 licenses. One week later the licensed dog total was 67.

June 16 — Police warn dog owners of start of enforcement drive on licensing ordinance. Total licenses raised to 82 in following week.

June 30 — Council instructs police department to start strict enforcement of licensing ordinance.

July 7 — Only one license issued

in week following council instructions.

Aug. 8 — License total now at 93, only slightly over half of the dogs listed on the rolls of county assessor.

The dog licensing ordinance was revised a few years back to afford more protection to local citizens. This revision included the provision that dogs must have a current rabies vaccination. This provision was added to act as a safeguard to the health of local citizens.

It would seem such an effort to protect local citizens is worthless if nearly half of the dogs in the city are allowed to go without licenses and many of them, it might be suspected, without the benefit of rabies vaccinations.

We think the city council should take steps to see that the provisions of the dog licensing ordinance are strictly enforced and that it be done immediately.

By improving ourselves we lessen the burden for all.

No Time to Waste

Citizens and taxpayers who are interested in economy in government would do well to make their view known — without delay. For during the remaining life of this Congress, the big spenders are going to be active.

They've made a successful start already — in the top-heavy vote overriding the President's veto of the Federal pay raise bill. This measure will add about \$750 million a year to Federal spending and will increase the postoffice deficit to more than \$850 million a year.

Much more of the same is in the works, as the U.S. Chamber of Commerce points out in a report. For example, a Senate aid-to-education bill would spend \$1.8 billion over a two-year period and a House bill would provide \$1.3 billion in four years for classroom construction. Another Senate bill would appropriate \$1.7 billion for a wide variety of subsidies including urban renewal, college housing and community facilities; a House bill would spend \$1.4 billion for similar purposes.

So it goes, down the list of measures based on "let the government do everything and pay for everything" attitude. In a general election year the urge to spend and spend and spend in an effort

to attract votes is powerful indeed. It can be countered only if the public votes against the big spenders and for economical and efficient government.

Suppose you earn \$4,500 a year and put in a 40-hour week. If that's your situation, you work all day Monday and until 1:45 p.m. Tuesday without making any money for yourself. The money you earn in that time all goes to the government in taxes.

If you earn more than \$4,500 a year the amount of your time given to the tax collector rapidly and progressively increases. And if you get into the really big income brackets, very little of your working time results in take-home pay for you.

It's commonly said and believed that defense costs are almost solely responsible for the present burden of taxation and the size of the Federal budgets. But the fact remains that, in the 1955-'61 period, defense costs rose only 12 percent while non-defense items rose 43 percent.

If we Americans spent more time trying to get our tax money spent wisely, we'd have money enough left to make us happy — and not the raft of worries caused by the lack of it.

If a man has the ability to pay, he has nearly every problem licked, except taxes.

Blueprint for Peasantry

Two members of the American Farm Bureau federation board of directors recently laid down a point-by-point program which, in that organization's view, is essential to the future of American farming. They rejected government price-fixing and other rigid controls, calling them a "blueprint for peasantry." The whole program is designed to give farmers greater freedom and to advance the welfare and the interests of both producer and consumer.

One point is this: With less interference from government, the marketing system will be freer to operate effectively and efficiently. This will encourage the expansion of market outlets and the production of quality products in line with market demands.

This is more than theory — there is ample factual evidence to back it up. Meat is a prime example. The livestock producers, to their great credit, have always opposed government aids and controls, even when times were bad. Their faith lies in free enterprise as does the faith of the packers and other elements in the meat industry. The result, over the long years, has been prosperity for producers and an improved and fairly priced product for consumers.

It would be well if American agriculture kept that in mind during this election year, in which candidates for office will be offering all kinds of promises in search of votes. Any program in which government is the boss is a "blueprint for peasantry."

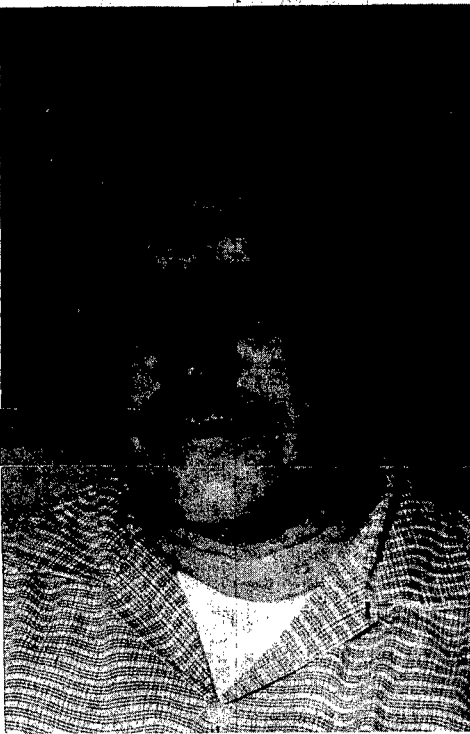

Capitol News . . . Special Session Points Up Need for Air Conditioning

LINCOLN — There was one thing certain in the special session of the Legislature. That is senators won't long stand for working without air conditioning.

It is expected that the special meeting which ran into this week will spur work toward cooling the legislative chamber. The shirt-sleeved lawmakers toiled in sticky, hot weather during their special meeting. The heat takes a heavy toll on energy of the lawmakers who expend much of this in debate and maneuvers on the floor.

There is money in a fund being accumulated for maintenance of the Capitol and its grounds. Complete air conditioning of the structure with funds available now is not feasible. But it took an August meeting of the solons to start the ball rolling on air conditioning by areas of the building.

The governor wanted a temporary installation put in for the lawmakers but the law would permit expenditure of the money only for a permanent installation. Time prohibited a permanent installation between the time the call for the special session was issued and when the senators met. Fans were placed strategically throughout the chamber but they interfered with hearing of the debate.

Some senators remarked that the heat would not have been so bad had they been able to dress for it.

The State Board of Equalization says that when it cut the 1960 state property tax levy two cents for every \$1,000 taxable value of goods held by Nebraskans. The previous levy was \$8.45 per \$1,000 assessed value. The new one is \$8.43.

A sharper reduction had been anticipated but State Tax Commissioner Forrest Johnson said a State Supreme court decision cut the value of railroads which accounted for the levy not being reduced further. The high court had set up a formula for assessing railroads in handing down a decision on an appeal from values set by the board last year.

The board said state agencies need \$20.4 million to operate this year from tax funds. An additional \$16.5 million is available from cash receipts such as taxes on cigarettes and liquor and driver's license fees.

Also to be raised from tax funds is \$2.5 million for buildings at state institutions, some \$800,000 for the University of Nebraska college of medicine physical plant, \$1.6 million for the teachers' retirement fund, a third of a million for research in new uses for agricultural products and some \$400,000 for improving state parks.

Board of Control

Pay hikes have been handed out to all but one of the superintendents of state institutions.

AS SCHOOLS around the country closed for the summer, a number of campaigns were started to help teenagers get summer jobs. It was a good idea. Local regulations requiring working certificates even in summer and the Federal minimum wage requirements, Social Security and income tax deductions often make hiring temporary help a lot of trouble. The day of the casual summer job, such a help to eager youngsters in other days, seems to be passing — one more casualty of creeping public and private bureaucratization. — Miles City, Mont. Daily Star.

County Agent's Column

Spray Cattle Now

Livestockmen who are interested in cattle grub control with corral should plan to spray animals as soon as possible.

"We would suggest treatment be completed by Sept. 15," reports Robert E. Roselle, college of agriculture entomologist. "The usual recommendations say treatment can be made until Nov. 1. However, we find it is very difficult to do an effective job of spraying after hair thickens in the fall.

"Some of the many erratic results with corral may be due to late spraying and the fact the spray did not penetrate to the skin. Corral sprays must reach the skin if they are to be effective.

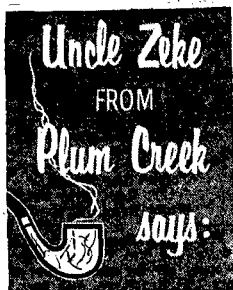
"Spraying now will control hornflies for a period of time. We do not think spraying with corral should be considered as a replacement for backrubbers for hornfly control in the range areas. Experiments conducted in Nebraska indicated the length of control with corral was about equal to other recommended insecticides."

Calcium Often Needed

Calcium is required by laying hens in varying amounts according to their individual rates of production.

"Folks who look at the feed tag or, listen to the feed salesman who says there is plenty of calcium in the ration may be fooled," states John Skinner, college of agriculture poultry husbandman.

The level of calcium adequate

DEAR MISTER EDITOR:

The session at the country store Saturday night was what them society writers would call the "crowning event" of the season. Herb got things off on a high level when he brung up a item he saw in the papers about the experts in Washington claiming installment buying was getting out of hand.

According to Herb the piece said as soon as the Congress got back in session they was going on credit buying. Art figured this would make it as hard to git in debt as to git out, sorter for a hen in 50 percent production is not adequate for one in 80 percent production. Conversely, a ration containing sufficient calcium for a hen in extremely high production may be slightly unpalatable to a hen at a lower level of production. The solution to the problem, he said, is to include a feeder or two of oyster shells or other calcium carbonate supplement and allow the hens ready access to it.

Skinner added this assures every hen enough of the calcium to satisfy her own desires, which is usually more than adequate to make the kind of egg shells we want.

Unripened Tomatoes

Nothing can beat the flavor of a home-grown, vine-ripened tomato. But if you're not a "backyard farmer" here's some buying advice from a University of Nebraska food specialist.

"There's nothing wrong with buying tomatoes that are slightly green," according to Kathryn Cooley, "but be careful how you ripen them.

"To ripen successfully, tomatoes should be mature, grown to their full size and just ready to turn color. Keep them at room temperature, but not on the window sill," she recommends. "The light is fine, but the heat will spoil tomatoes and turn them a yellow color instead of red."

Don't chill tomatoes before ripening. They become pale, watery, soft and lose their flavor. After they have obtained the degree of ripeness you want, place them in the refrigerator.
