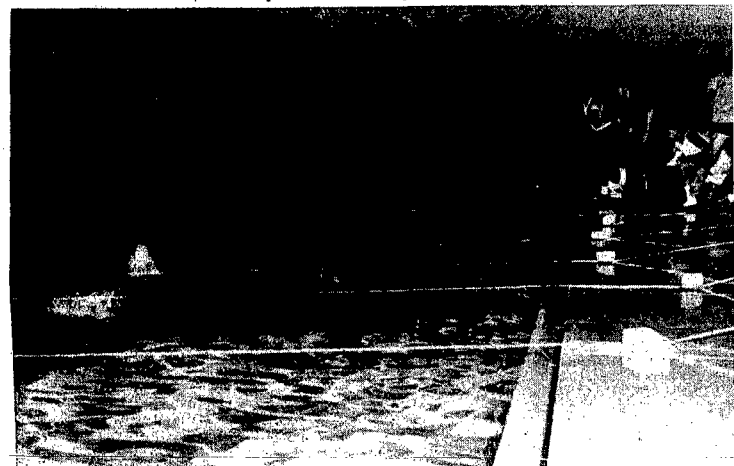


DORCEY STEER FAIR CHAMP

Annual ASC Elections Set; Ballots in Mail Wednesday

Ballots for the annual Wayne county ASC precinct elections will be mailed to eligible voters Wednesday, Chairman Carl Sundell announced today.

Farmers have until Sept. 6 to cast their ballots for the five-man precinct committees which will administer the local farm programs. Ballots will be counted at the Wayne ASC office Sept. 8.

The ballots contain the names of nine to 11 candidates in each precinct. The three top vote-getters will make up the precinct committee. The next two will serve as alternates.

The candidate getting the most votes in each precinct will be the chairman and is automatically a delegate to the county convention Sept. 22. A new county committee, which will take office Oct. 1, will be elected at that convention.

The precinct and county committees are responsible for the administration of the CP soil bank, marketing quotas, allotment, price support and wool incentive programs.

Ballots in the precinct elections will be counted and questions on eligibility to vote settled by a tabulation board composed of Ernest Siekfen and James Maben, Wayne, and Alden Johnson, Wakefield. George Noakes, Wayne, is a board alternate.

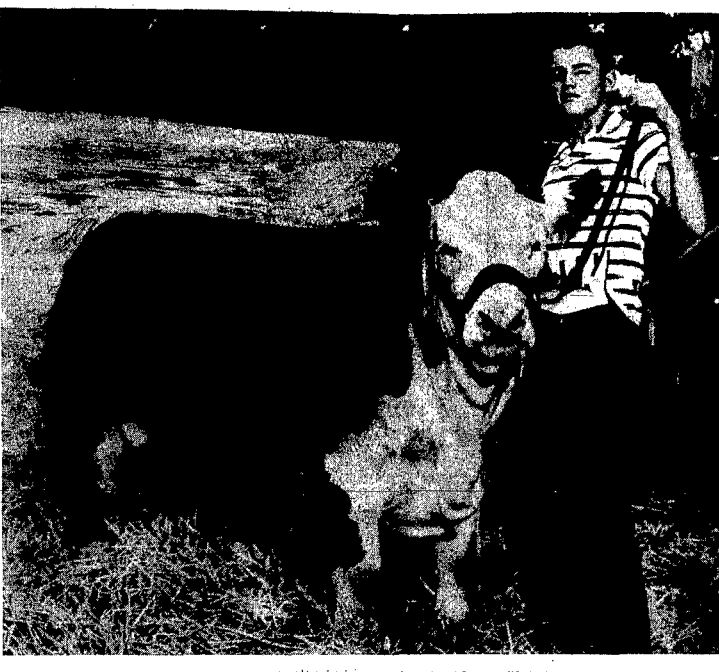
A. V. Teed, son of Elma Gale and John W. Teed, was born Feb. 19, 1876 in Ninevah, Ind. He began teaching in 1894 in Jerico Springs, Mo. In 1898 he became Newcastle superintendent of schools. He married Gail Fields Apr. 15, 1914 at Ponca.

He served as Dixon county superintendent from 1904 to 1915, when he was appointed assistant state superintendent of education. After serving two years in that office he came to WSCS where he founded the department of rural education. He served in that capacity until his retirement in 1936.

He was a past president of Kiwanis club and a member of the School Master's club of Nebraska. Mr. Teed was a member of the Presbyterian church.

Survivors include his widow; a daughter, Mrs. James J. Fehrenbach, Santa Maria, Calif.; three sisters, Mrs. Edna Gunderson, Long Beach, Calif., and Mrs. Stella Miller and Myrtle Teed, Newcastle.

Mrs. Fehrenbach came to be near her father several weeks before his death. Mr. Fehrenbach came by plane for the services.

Meyer's Reserve; Attendance Hits 3,300 Tuesday

John Dorcey, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Felix Dorcey, Wayne, showed the grand champion steer at the Wayne county 4-H baby beef show Tuesday.

The 1,010-pound Hereford was crowned champion by Judge Dwayne Zimmerman, Lincoln, in front of the grandstand Tuesday night. As exhibitor of the grand champion steer, Dorcey will receive the Walter J. Herman memorial trophy.

Fair Board President Leland Herman expressed pleasure over attendance at Tuesday night's grandstand show. About 1,300 persons jammed the stands to see the program which featured Tex Ritter, radio, television, movie and recording star. About 3,300 persons entered the fairgrounds gates for Tuesday's activities.

Reserve champion steer was shown by Don Meyer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Don Meyer, Wayne. Don showed a 910-pound Hereford to second spot in the show. Both steers placed in the same order in the heavyweight Hereford steer division.

Mark Dorcey took top honors in the lightweight Hereford steer class with an 840-pound calf and went on to compete against his brother for championship honors. Mickey Topp, 10, son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Topp, Pilger, showed the reserve champion in the lightweight division. Jerry Meyer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Don Meyer, and Don Williams also showed purple ribbon winners in this class.

Jerry also showed the champion Angus steer and champion Shorthorn steer. Marlis Williams, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hollis Williams, Carroll, had reserve champion Shorthorn steer.

In fat Hereford heifer competition, Don Meyer nosed out Larry Witter for championship honors, while David Longe had the top Angus fat heifer and George Langenberg showed the reserve champion Angus heifer.

The champion Shorthorn heifer was exhibited by Verdel Beckstrom. His brother, Duane, showed the champion Shorthorn breeding heifer.

Only two clubs had entries in groups of five calves. Both entries were awarded purples by Zimmerman but he placed Beat 'Em All first and Brenna Go Getters second.

Dixon County Fair Opening Set; Entry Day Wednesday

A record number of entries in the 4-H divisions is expected for the annual Dixon County Fair next week, Secretary Roy E. Johnson said today.

The fair will open Wednesday at the Dixon county fairgrounds in Concord. It will continue through Friday.

All fair buildings were repainted this year, Johnson said, and the grounds is in readiness for the opening. About 80 calves will compete in the 4-H baby beef show, while 4-H hog entries are expected to be high again this year.

Wednesday is set as preparation and entry day. Gates will be thrown open to the public at 8 a.m. Thursday.

Thursday afternoon's program will open at 1:30 p.m. with flag-raising ceremonies by the Allen Legion post and high school band. The Emerson high school band will play in concert following the ceremony.

A 4-H talent program will be offered at 2, followed by a horse show and races. Two midget baseball games are slated for the afternoon with Concord meeting Wakefield at 2:30 and Allen opposing Emerson at 3:30.

The evening program opens at 7 with a concert by Emerson high school band. At 8 the grandstand show will be a variety program of music and comedy. At 9 Concord meets Dixon in softball to close the day's program.

Judging and placing of awards will continue throughout the day Thursday. All departments and exhibits will be open to the public.

Friday gates open at 8 a.m. with the midway in operation and the boys' tractor derby at 11. Following a 4:30 flag-raising ceremony by the Allen Legion post, Laurel high school's band will appear in concert.

At 1:45 fairgoers will be treated to the grand parade of prize-winning livestock.

A style show featuring entries from 4-H clubs is on tap for 2 while a horse show with prizes and ribbons is set for 2:30. Also at 2:30 Martinsburg takes on Ponca in midget baseball, followed at 3:30 by Newcastle and Dixon in a pee-wee baseball contest.

Following supper the Laurel high school band will appear in concert at 7 with the grandstand show starting at 8 and featuring 4-H and county extension clubs.

The fair closes with a softball game between Allen and Ponca at 9.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

You may not agree with an editorial . . . but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

Practical Stories Considered

Wedding stories in the newspapers are often the bane of many folks because there is very little news in them while at the same time they give the name of nearly everyone on the invitation list.

Editors have cursed, pulled their hair, stomped their feet and sworn they were finished with wedding stories as they are now being printed. Yet they never seem to make any drastic change. Now editors are considering the possibility of practical stories. (Note: the use of the word "practical" is studiously avoided.)

The following is a sample of a wedding story going the rounds which is said to have appeared in Chewelah, Wash. Independent and recently was brought to life by Russ Hill, editor of the Davenport Wash. Times. The story:

Miss Jennie Jones and Bob Henry were married at the Jones mansion last night.

They were married by Rev. Josiah Butterworth, who last week called at this office and gave us a nice order for handbills. He is also going to give some time to the real estate business and will write fire insurance. So say the business cards we recently printed for him.

Jennie and Bob left on the 10 o'clock train for Milwaukee.

The man or woman who doesn't take the trouble to vote thereby deprives himself of a logical right to complain about the state of his city, state and nation.

Guiding 'Economic Destiny'

The Federal government owns and operates many thousands of commercial businesses. Over 100 of these are engaged in insuring, lending and engineering loans in agriculture, foreign trade and investment. These institutions have loaned about \$23 billion directly and have guaranteed something like \$80 billion more. This represents about a tenfold increase during the past 14 years.

Federal aid to states, localities and individuals has climbed from \$147 million in 1930 to \$7.7 billion in 1958. So far this century non-government employment has just about doubled while employment—Federal, state and local—has increased 650 percent. Every sixth American adult is employed by government and still the plea for expanding the functions and power of government is clamorous and continuous.

Last year a panel of seven economists, including Prof. John K. Galbraith, Harvard university, stated: "We reject the notion that government governs best which governs least. The Federal government is our only instrument for guiding the economic destiny of this country."

We reject that statement completely. The best means of "guiding the economic destiny of this country" is the free vote of the free consumer in a free market. If untrammelled, such votes will determine what the people most want and will channel capital, raw materials and labor away from the offering of goods and services that are considered less desirable and into the making of goods and the rendering of services which the people want and for which they are ready and willing to pay.

When government determines these matters for us, the result is \$6 billion worth of farm products annually that the people do not want. A condition of that kind never happens in the free market but always happens in a government-controlled economy.

Free, untrammelled competition to produce goods and render services in accordance with the demand of free people as expressed in the free market is far and away the best method of guiding "the economic destiny of the country."

Dog License Score Improved

A drive by Wayne's police department this week resulted in the licensing of 17 more dogs in the city for 1960. The total Monday morning was 112, a vast improvement over recent years.

However, a third of the dogs listed by city residents with the county assessor are still without licenses and, perhaps, valid rabies vaccinations.

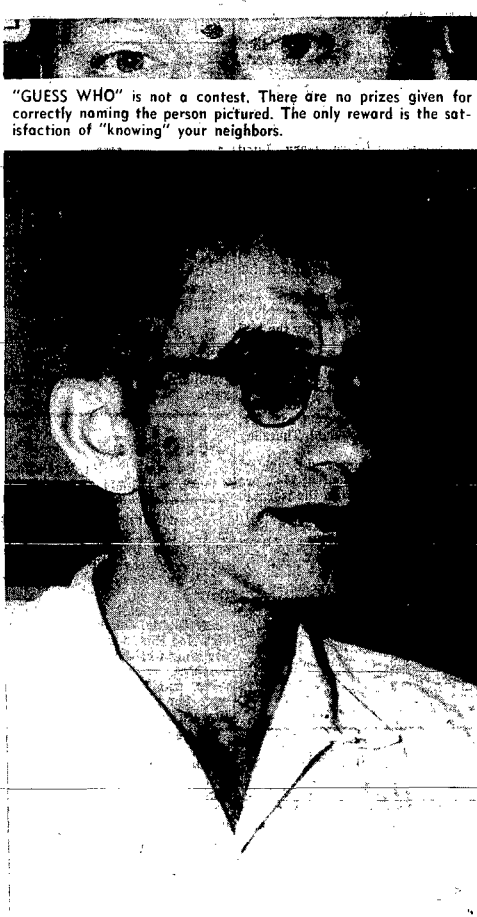

Capitol News . . . Schools Under Close Watch On State Fire Regulations

LINCOLN—Schools have come under close scrutiny of the state fire marshal's office. There will be a crackdown this fall on schools failing to meet state regulations.

G. E. Ekstrand, deputy fire marshal, said he will "make examples" of some schools if necessary to stress the importance of conducting fire drills as required by state law. Reports on these must be submitted to the fire marshal's office.

But, says Ekstrand, some school officials don't take the drills too seriously and submit reports without actually holding the exercises. "We're going to clamp down on these schools," Ekstrand said, "because they're dealing with human lives."

Penalty for school officials violating the fire drill statute is a fine of \$5 to \$100 with each missed drill a separate cause of action. Regarding fire detection systems in country schools, cheaper units have been okayed. Small schools had complained they were forced to comply with fire regulations that were unfair. Strict interpretation of the rules, they said, would make them install expensive systems requiring electricity and in some cases the fire warning unit would be worth more than the building.

Under the revised schedule, schools of less than 5,000 square feet in area may use a cheaper detection system not employing electricity.

Rules governing fire protection in Nebraska schools will become effective Sept. 1. State Fire Marshal Joe Davis says he will grant extensions to schools showing "good intent."

Employment Security

The first paychecks to unemployed Nebraska workers were distributed in the late 1930's. Since then there have been considerable changes in the employment security program.

State Labor Commissioner Donald Bastemeyer says that a review of the history of the program, which has been in effect for 25 years, shows the number of workers with unemployment insurance protection has more than doubled.

The dollar benefits received weekly and the duration of the compensation have been extended, he added. In April, 1957 the unemployed worker got \$8.67 for 16 weeks. Today the figure is \$28.59 for 26 weeks.

Bastemeyer said "over the years the unemployment insurance program has come to be recognized as a first line of defense against both personal hardships for the wage earner and unemployment and recessionary influences for the nation."

In 1958, the latest compiled figure, \$7.8 million was paid to unemployed Nebraska workers. Bastemeyer says there are 11,855 Nebraska employees subject to state unemployment insurance

laws who have contributed \$6.5 million to the fund from which paychecks are drawn.

Industry Search

The State resources division is getting set to step up plans to attract industry. To help do the job is \$35,000 allocated to the division by the special session of the Legislature. The money will be used in part for research and the remainder to aid communities that are looking for new industrial plants.

Dave Osterhout, chief of the division, began a tour of the east immediately after the session ended to contact prospects for new industries. He will talk with representatives of companies already interested in coming to Nebraska.

The action of the Legislature will be used by the division also to denote that Nebraska now has a more favorable attitude toward obtaining new industries. Also passed by the Legislature, as expected, was a bill putting a Constitutional amendment on the November ballot. The amendment, if passed, would allow cities and counties to issue revenue bonds to buy or build sites for industries.

Bonds would be paid off from rent paid by the industries. They would get no tax exemption and land could not be acquired by condemnation. An amendment to do a similar thing was turned down by voters in the 1958 general election.

Legislators felt generally, however, that Nebraskans would better understand the proposal now and therefore would approve it.

Sundry Claims

The Sundry Claims board has recommended the state should pay \$7,025 to persons for damages incurred as the result of some incident involving the state.

Claims totaling \$50,979 had been filed with the board, composed of the tax commissioners, auditor and attorney general's offices and the clerk of the Legislature.

Recommendations are made to the next session of the Legislature which then decides whether to pay the money.

Farm News and Views

MIDWEST LIVESTOCK FEDERS are making a fast shift to harvest and storage of high moisture corn. The experience shows feeding results may not be much different from corn stored at regular moisture levels but the big advantage is efficiencies gained in harvesting, handling and storing. They say you can put up a silo to handle high moisture corn at a cost no greater, and at times less, than some of the more permanent cribs.

What's more, it's easier to feed from these structures. You can

use either regular concrete silos or the newer airtight structures.

AFTER WATER PROBLEMS this last spring, many farmers are planning drainage improvements in their fields. Two grades of tile are recognized - standard and extra-quality. Tile of at least standard quality must be used to receive a government incentive payment through the soil conservation program for tile drainage.

CHECK ELECTRICAL WIRING for dangerous overloads if you have installed new mechanical feeding devices or other electrical equipment this summer. Specialists claim that, in too many cases, motors are too large for the old wiring. Besides the condition of insulation, check the size and length of electric lines. If a 2-horsepower motor is 100 feet from the fuse box and operating on 230 volts, a No. 12 wire is needed. At 200 feet from the fuse box, a No. 8 wire is required for safe operation.

County Agent's Column

Cows Need Minerals Dairy cows need minerals while they are on pasture, just as they do when they are being dry lot fed.

The first need of cows when they are on pasture, as well as the year around, is salt. An ounce of salt per day is considered sufficient for most cows. Whether it is fed loose or in block form makes little difference. Calcium and phosphorous are the two other minerals that the dairy cow needs during both the summer and winter.

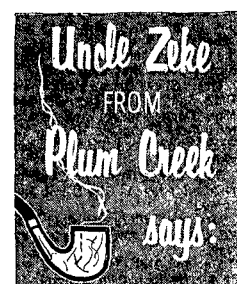
Of the two minerals, phosphorous is the one that is most likely to be lacking. This is true of those cows that are on an all roughage diet. This is true to a lesser degree with calcium since most legumes are excellent sources of calcium. Also cows apparently utilize calcium in their feeds more efficiently than they do phosphorous.

Dry cows, as well as those during lactation, often need extra minerals while on pasture. Dry cows generally receive little or no concentrate feed, which normally would be a good source of minerals. Secondly, dry cows that produced heavily during the lactation quite often have depleted their body stores of calcium and phosphorous.

Dairy cows will take care of their own mineral needs if they have free access to salt and some form of calcium and phosphorous. Either steamed bone meal or dicalcium phosphate are good sources of the two.

Steamed bone meal is much more palatable if it is mixed with salt. A reasonable mixture would be one part of bone meal to three parts of salt. But if steamed bone meal and salt are mixed, it is generally wise to have another source of salt in addition. Otherwise they will eat a lot of the mixture just to get the salt.

DEAR MISTER EDITOR:

But anyhow, in one of them graduates. That's what George W. Fischer, Washington State university acting dean, figures a young man can earn with the time he spends getting a college degree. Here are some facts to help high school graduates make a decision.

In his lifetime, the average college graduate earns about \$100,000 more than the average high schooler. To warrant these earnings the college man spends nine months a year for four years in school. He spends about 20 days a month in the classroom and studying, says Fischer. So he spends about 720 days of work getting his college degree worth \$100,000 - good pay and high school grads can get it. Even if a young man plans to farm, Fischer believes a college education is necessary. "Today farming is a big and exacting business. If a young man has a real opportunity to farm, he should go to college by all means. His chances for success will be much greater," says Fischer.
