It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all wallable facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

if you read the editorial and give scrious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, us a reader, have given careful thought to an important a problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlanked.

What Kind of Medical Aid?

There will be Federal legislation dealing with the problem of the medical needs of the aged. The question is what kind.

One proposal which seems to have developed considerable support, particularly in political circles, would give medical, hospital and mursing home benefits to everyone drawing Social Security payments, whether or not they are in need. The dangers of this have been pinpointed by Sevretary of Health, Education and Welfare Fleinmer.

The proposal calls for a one percent increas. In proposal caus for a one percent increase in the Social Security tax to meet the added costs. But this, the secretary says, would be inadequate. In addition, there would be insistent pressure for improving the schedule of benefits and lowering age requirements. So the project, in his words, "could easily lead to an addition of four to five percent to the presently scheduled nine percent rate. This increase, plus the increase that will be required under the retirement, survivorship and disability features of the program, could very well bring the payroll tax up to somewhere between 15 and 20 percent." That, coming on top of all our other taxes, would certainly approach it not reach an unbearable point.

The best solution to the problem so far proposed is found in the Milks bill, which passed the House by voice vote. It is a voluntary plan. It would provide medical aid for the actual needy—not everyone who has reached a certain age, regardless of his financial status. And it is based on Federal-state cooperation with heavy emphasis on local responsibility and administration.

Let's Put a Curb on Wild Spending

There was a slight victory for the economy-minded citizens of the nation in the surplus of ounded citizens of the nation in the simplis of \$6.1 billion achieved in the Federal budget for the 1960 fiscal year. This was much larger than had been forecast.

What makes this surplus really look good is it most certainly is a great improvement over the \$12.4 billion deficit of fiscal '59.

But what of fiscal '61? Unless economy-minded cirizons keep their eyes on the Congress and exercise their voices, fiscal '61 threatens to roll up a deficit even bigger than that of fiscal '59.

Soil-testing farmers who fol-low their college agronomists' fertilizer recommendations have the best chance of growing high-profit yields at lower unit costs of production.

"Surveys indicate that farmers who generally use fertilizers at rates close to levels recommended by state agricultural colleges have a substantially high er income than non-users," says Delno Knudsen, University of Ne-braska agronomist. "Accurate soil tests are the guide that can tell a farmer what nutrients are

needed," he adds.

Knudsen points out that now is the ideal season for testing softs. Here are some steps for taking hased on suggestions by

Here are some steps for taking samples, based on suggestions by Nebraska soil specialists: Divide your farm for sampling purposes into areas of uniform soil types. Never mix samples on different soil types.

For the sampling job you need
a spade or sampling tube, a clean
pail, a soil sampling container
and an information sheet. You
can get the container and the information sheet from your coun-

ty agent.

Take a core six inches deep from the surface soil. Repeat this process in 15 to 20 places in the

process in 15 to 20 places in the uniform area.

Mix the soil in the pail and fill a pint container with the mixture. This makes a composite soil sample.

Fill out the information sheet and send the samples to the soil testing laboratory.

Irrigation Wells

There still are plenty of irrigation wells being drilled in Nebraska. But the pace is slower than that prompted by the drought of 1985-58, according to statistics in the State Water Resources division.

It is expected that in the next year there will be more than two million acres of land in the state irrigated by wells. Seven years ago, only half a million acres were being irrigated by water from wells.

Drilling hit a peak in 1956 when 4,000 new wells were put down. Dan Jones, head of the division, says there now are 23,-273 wells registered with the state. Land irrigated by surface water climbed from \$30,800 acres in 1953 to 715,000 in 1959.

Water specialists estimate Nebraska's underground water reserves total about 10 years of total rainfall. To store the supply above ground would require a tank as large as the entire state and 20 feet deep.

There currently is little regulation over drilling of wells by the state except that they must

be registered and properly spac-

be registered and properly spaced.

Driving Licenses
The State Motor Vehicles division is considering pushing in the Legislature a proposal to require a picture of the holder of a driving license be affixed to the permit.

Alvin Scissors, department director, said such a photograph would leave no doubt in the mind of any law enforcement officer that the person was authorized to have the license.

Scissors also has proposed that the license be issued from the Capitol, instead of by county treasurers. This is sure to kick off a storm if pursued, observers noted, especially by those who favor retention of as many government services as possible. Scissors said there is high interest in the photograph proposal by liquor dealers, bankers, merchants and insurance companies who feel such a license would serve as an "excellent means of identification."

ALL CONCENTRATE beef ra-ALL CONCENTRATE beef rations are becoming popular with farmers who have mechanical feeding systems. Ground ear cora or rolled barley is usually the main ingredient of these rations — no hay or other roughage is fed. Livestock editors say cost of gain on high concentrate rations may be slightly higher than when roughage is fed, based on limited tests to date. Also, it takes a higher quality feeder animal to efficiently use an all-concentrate ration. Keep this in mind if you're buying feeder cattle to go on one of these all-grain rations.

Army Reserve Unit's Value Amazes Staff at Ft. Carson

EDITOR'S NOTE: Herald Publisher Alan Cramer last week flew with several Nebraska and Kansas newsmen to Ft. Carson, Colo., for a two-day visit with the 89th Training division, an Army reserve unit composed of men from Nebraska, Kansas and Colorado. Following is an account of the trip.

of the trip.

Operation NEWSLIFT began
Thursday, Aug. 12 when newsmen from several Nebraska
towns and cities met in Omaha
for the flight aboard Navy Convair to Colorado Springs and Ft.
Carson. For two days the group
visited, observed and even took
part in the training of the 89th
division.

part in the training of the 89th division.

Under the command of Maj. Gen. C. C. (Monte) Parrish, Great Bend, Kan., the 89th "Rolling W" division is carrying out a training mission. In event of mobilization this unit would move intact to Ft. Carson and conduct regular eight-week basic training of raw recruits, who in turn would serve as replacement troops to the combat units.

In addition to the eight-week basic, additional training in speialized fields from mortar firing to cooks and clerk-typists is con-

ialized fields from mortar firing to cooks and clerk-typists is conducted. This advanced training would be given on the basis of the soldier aptitudes.

The 89th is the first unit of its kind. Right now the officers and experienced men of the division are teaching the men who will be the teachers that will have a canability of turning out 14,000

are teaching the men who will be the teachers that will have a capability of turning out 14,000 combat-ready soldiers every eight weeks.

And they are doing a splendid job. Regular Army personnel, who serve as critics at the two-week camp, a re constantly amazed at the proficiency of the following the server of the Colorado. Springs Free Press expressed it this way. "Most of us have a tendency to look-upon the U.S. Army Reserve as just another group of civilian soldiers who play at being soldiers once each week throughout the year and during the summer don their uniforms for two weeks and practice with broom-sticks in somebody's back yard or on the unused high school football field. Nothing could be farther from the truth."

Saturday morning the group traveled by bus to Colorado Springs where they visited the headquarters of The North American Air Defense command (NORAD). Here they were briefed by Brig. Gen. Andrew R. Lolli, deputy chief of staff for plans and operations.

In cooperation with the Canadian government, this outfit is responsible for the detection of an air attack which they believe, by necessity, will come from the north over the Canadian border.

Extensive radar equipment is used for this work. Land, sea and air-based equipment comes into comes into

used for this work. Land, see and air-based equipment comes into play in the elaborate warning system. All military services play a vital role.

In addition to the warning system, the command has that command has that command the command that the various Nike missile bases throughout the country.

Gen. Lolli told the group this command is primerly concerned.

Gen. Lolli told the group this command is primarily concerned with manned bombers. It is their belief that at the present time the Soviet Union poses no great threat in the intercontinental missile field and that any present attack must be with manned aircraft.

aircraft. In regard to retaliatory measures, Gen. Lolli explained that in addition to the Nike bases which have an accuracy record of more than 83 percent, NORAD maintains direct contact with the Strategic Air command. With the two-hour warning the radar can give on presently known enemy aircraft, SAC can retaliate within minutes.

aircraft, SAC can retaliate within minutes.

The ICBM, however, poses a different problem, Gen. Lolli admitted that at the present time, NORAD has no missile capable of intercepting a rocket fired at intercontinental speed and range.
