District 25 Students Await School Completion



DISTRICT 25 school students are eagerly anticipating the completion of their new building, which is expected about Nov. 1. An architect's sketch of the \$35,000 structure is shown above. The one-story school includes a full basement. District students opened the 1960-61 term Monday in the former District 73 and 25 schoolhouses. The teachers are Mrs. Dorothy Kai and Mrs. Rosalie Taylor. The district was formed earlier this year through the merger of four Leslie precinct districts. The building project is financed through a \$35,000 bond issue.

Predict Record Enrollment For WSTC Fall Semester

WSTC begins its golden anniversary year as a state school next week when new and returning students will flock to the campus.

College officials predict a new enrollment record but hesitate to estimate the amount of the increase. Also a matter of doubt is the completion date of Berry Hall's east wing, though it should be ready for occupancy soon after the school opens. The east wing will be available later in the fall.

New students will arrive Tuesday. A full day of testing (aptitude and intelligence) Wednesday is the start of a busy-four days of orientation and registration. Form students will begin returning next Thursday for registration—seniors Thursday, juniors and sophomores Friday.

The faculty has nine newcomers, all of them replacements for professors who resigned or took a leave of absence.

Raymond Kelton succeeds Rex Conner as band director and associate professor of music. He holds a doctor's degree from North Texas State college. His bachelor's and master's degrees in music were earned at the University of Arizona.

Kelton has taught at East Central, Okla. State college and in Dallas, Tex., public schools. Conner resigned to accept a position at the University of Kentucky.

Dr. Leonard Brubaker will be Wayne Prep director and associate professor of education. He holds a doctorate from Ohio State university and has been

supervisor and curriculum coordinator of the Bryan, Ohio public schools.

Dr. Brubaker succeeds Dr. Joe Nichols, who resigned to become Fremont assistant superintendent of schools. He began his duties there Wednesday. Dr. Nichols' successor as education division chairman has not been announced.

Dr. Allen Burkhardt, Norfolk superintendent since 1931, has joined the faculty as professor of education. He earned his doctorate at the University of Nebraska.

Robert Campbell, who earned his doctorate at the University of Iowa this summer, will be assistant professor of physical education. He formerly taught at Wartburg, Ia. college, where he received his bachelor's degree. In addition to teaching, Campbell will be assistant basketball coach, relieving Carl Ellermeier, who continues as head track coach and assistant football coach. Ellermeier will also teach physical science.

Antony Garlick, assistant music professor, has two master's of music degrees from the University of Toronto and Santa Cecilia conservatory, Rome, Italy. A former organist and choir director at several English and Canadian churches, he succeeds Albert Carlson, who retired.

Forrest Hazard, candidate for a doctorate at the University of Wisconsin this summer, will be an assistant professor of English. He has been an English instructor at Wisconsin.

Florence Tooby will be an Eng-

lish instructor. She has a master's degree from the University of California and taught at Hibbing, Minn. Junior college. Hazard and Miss Tooby replace Mrs. Ruth Emery and Perchehr Kasra in the English department.

Dr. John Violette, associate biology professor, succeeds Dr. Raymond Dillon. He has a doctorate from Yale university and has been teaching at Wisconsin State college, Whitewater.

Douglas Spencer, formerly a teacher at Cherokee Heights school, Madison, Wis., will succeed Milton Ochsner as social studies supervisor in Wayne Prep. He has a master's degree from the University of Wisconsin.

Two others will serve as part-time teachers. Dr. C. Allen Roehl, who was on the summer faculty, will be assistant psychology professor. Mrs. Norma Vorce will be a speech instructor.

Two returning staff members who have been on leave of absence are Lyle Seymour and Robert Ogan. Two others completed master's degree requirements—Gwyn Christensen at the University of Wisconsin and Ray Kihne at Ball State, Ind. university.

City Council Asks Bids on \$60,000 in Street Paving

Plans and specifications for nearly \$60,000 worth of street paving were approved by the Wayne city council at its meeting Tuesday night.

Bids on the paving projects will be opened at a Sept. 20 special meeting. It is hoped all or most of the paving can be completed this fall. The city engineer's estimate of cost for the five paving districts is \$59,700.

Slated to be paved are the following streets: Fairacres road and Sunset drive in Westwood addition; Sherman street from Tenth to Twelfth; Walnut drive in Cecil Wriedt subdivision; Walnut street from Ninth to Tenth; Ninth street from Windom to Pine Heights road; Tenth street from Pine Heights road east to the city limits, and Fourth street from the alley between Windom and Walnut east to Dearborn.

The council will hold a special meeting Tuesday to open bids on sanitary sewer and water main construction in Westwood addition and Wriedt subdivision.

In other action Tuesday the council passed an ordinance revising through streets established in the city earlier this year. The revision makes First, Pearl and Logan through streets for their entire length through the city with the exception of Seventh street. Traffic previously was stopped at Third street on Pearl and Logan. Third

remains a through street, but only west of Pearl to Blaine.

Another ordinance passed bans parking on the south side of Twelfth street from Main to Pearl. A proposed ordinance which would create a paving district on West Third was tabled for further study.

Payment of \$5,000 to Stanley Morris for his former machine shop building was approved. The council had okayed the purchase earlier this year. The building is located on city property.

Two building permits in the fire zone got approval. They went to Farmers elevator to enlarge its present office building and to erect a feed storage building.

Permits granted recently by City Clerk Howard Witt included: Donald Hansen, \$16,500 residence, Westwood addition; Wayne county, \$1,500 garage north of county jail; Mathilde Harris, \$500 enlarge porch and make apartment entrance.

A claim of \$150 by Wayne Gilliland for a haystack destroyed in a recent fire near the city dump was approved. Gilliland said he felt the fire was caused by burning trash blowing from the dump. He urged the council to consider installation of the land-fill method at the new dump as soon as possible to avoid any possibility of further fires.

After 4½ years on crutches, it's reasonable to expect an 8-year-old boy to find it hard to hold back when he gets the chance to move around actively.

That's the problem for Terry Pedersen, the perky little redhead who won the hearts of all NE Nebraskans following the amputation of his right leg in June. It's hard for him to avoid overdoing things when he has so many new everyday activities to experience.

A fund started last month by gifts from friends was turned over to Terry's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Don Pedersen, Wayne, this week. The contributions, totaling \$1,198.85, came from Nebraska, Kansas, Iowa, Minnesota, South Dakota and Wisconsin in amounts ranging from \$1 to \$25.

About \$300 of the amount went for Terry's new artificial leg, which he secured at Rochester, Minn., last month. It replaces the leg which was amputated after a series of unsuccessful operations to correct a birth defect.

Terry went back to classes in School District 34 Monday, the first time without crutches. He still carries a short cane. Not that he needs it. He discarded it for batting in softball. Before long he expects to do his own running.

Mrs. Pedersen, speaking for Terry and the entire family, offered thanks to the many people who participated in and contributed to the Terry Fund this week when the money was turned over to her.

She said: "We want to express our most sincere appreciation to the people who initiated this drive to assist Terry and to the many wonderful people of the immediate area and throughout the country who contributed to his aid. It is difficult to express in words how deeply we feel about this wonderful assistance. We only hope that when we say 'thanks' you will know it comes from the bottom of all our hearts."

600 Expected for Opening of City Schools Tuesday

About 600 students are expected for Wayne High's opening of the 1960-61 term Tuesday, Supt. Stanley Westergard said this week. Last year's total was 583.

Westergard estimated about 300 students in the junior and senior high school, which will use the old building. Grade students will attend the new elementary school.

A workshop for faculty members will open at 9 a. m. today. Westergard will explain school policies and the teachers' manual. New teachers will be introduced and a tour of the elementary school is planned.

Chamber Secretary K. N. Parke will give the welcome following the noon luncheon. School Board President Mrs. Don Wightman will introduce other board members and Westergard will introduce the teachers. Norfolk Mayor Warren Cook will give the address.

The afternoon session will be a discussion of the Joplyn and Sidney reading program.

Laura Fredrickson will open the Friday sessions with a demonstration of audio-visual equipment. A business meeting of Wayne City Educators association is set at 1 p. m. Junior and senior high instructors meet at 2 p. m. to hear Principal Fred Rickers discuss the schedule and plan the first day of school.

Two Drivers Hurt In Tuesday Truck Crash at Winside

Two truck drivers were injured in an accident about noon Monday a quarter mile west of Winside at an intersection on Highway 35.

Clifford Victor, Laurel, suffered multiple bruises and a fractured right hand. He was released from the Wayne hospital Tuesday.

Victor was driving a pickup east on a county road when it collided with a truck pulling a trailer with a tractor. The other vehicle was driven by Lyle Jenkins, Norfolk. He was treated for minor injuries by a Norfolk doctor.

Damage to Victor's pickup was estimated at \$1,000. The Jenkins truck was described as a total loss by State Trooper Carl Scheel. Damage to the tractor was about \$500.

Town Levies Increase Up to 13 Percent; Rural Districts Average Near 34 Mills

Taxpayers in all Wayne county towns will face tax increases varying from one percent to 13 percent in 1960, County Clerk C. A. Bard said this week.

The increases vary from slightly under one percent in Sholes to 13.3 percent in Winside. The increases represent from 26 cents per \$1,000 valuation in Sholes to \$8.44 per \$1,000 in Winside.

Wayne taxpayers will pay \$62.96 for each \$1,000 of assessed valuation. This is an increase of \$1.22 over the previous year. Main reason for the hikes is a 5.4 mill increase in the levy for operation of the local school district.

Slight increases were made in the state county and Wayne city tax levies. Another 3.2 mills was cut from the school bond levy, which was necessarily doubled last year to meet early bond obligations.

The state levy is up .16 mills. The county levy increased .12 mills, due largely to depleted reserves in the county road fund. The Wayne city levy was cut 3 mills. The school levy which is also in Carroll, is 23.44 mills compared to 18.04 last year. In addition there is a 5.04 levy for the school bond issue in both Wayne and Carroll.

Because of increases in town and school levies, Winside property owners will pay \$8.44 more for each \$1,000 of assessed valuation. The town levy was increased two mills to 17.60. The school levy jumped 6.16 mills. The total Winside levy is 72.10 mills compared to 63.66 the previous year.

Hoskins residents will pay \$6.44 more for each \$1,000 of valuation. The village levy increased from 28.56 to 31.62 mills and the school from 4.74 to 7.70. Since the village converted to a Class I school last year, residents must also pay the 6.28 free high tuition levy.

Area Weather Turns Humid After Rains

NE Nebraska weather turned hot and humid this week following weekend rains which ranged as high as eight inches in parts of Wayne county.

The thermometer reached the week's high of 92 Tuesday. Lows of 52 were recorded Thursday and Friday before the heavy rains.

The official rainfall in Wayne was recorded as .85 inches last Wednesday and a total of 2.55 inches Saturday and Sunday. Heavy rains in south Leslie precinct Saturday night washed out many fences and caused some other damage. Rain reports ranged as high as six to eight inches.

The levy increase in Carroll represents a hike of \$2.12 in taxes for each \$1,000 of valuation for taxpayers there. The village levy remains at 38 mills. The increases are the same as those in Wayne.

Increases in Sholes were the least in the county. In addition to the raises in county and state levies, the free high levy raised .14 mills. The school levy is down .16 mills.

Residents of the Heikes addition in Wakefield will get a break on their taxes since the levy is down 1.10 mills. This will bring a cut of \$1.10 in taxes for each \$1,000 of valuation.

Levies in rural school districts vary from a high of 21.80 mills in District 71 to none in Districts 57 and 86. The latter two districts are closed and contracting with other adjoining schools. In addition to these school levies the rural district taxpayers must pay the free high tuition levy of 6.28 mills.

The new District 25, created through the merger of four Leslie precinct districts, has a school levy of 11.76 mills. Another 5.26 mills will go for bonds for the new school building being constructed. The total levy for the district is 39.53 for property in the Pendora fire district, 38.78 for that in the Winsler fire district and 39.29 in the Wakefield fire district. The average levy for the four districts last year prior to the merger was about 34 mills.

The average total levy for the 92 taxing districts in the county which have Class I (rural) schools is 33.92 mills. Last year the average was 31.33. This means the average taxes on farmland throughout the county will be up about \$2.60 for each \$1,000 assessed valuation.

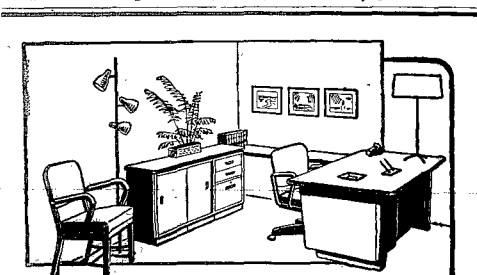

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## \$29,000 Student Grant to College

A Federal grant of \$29,070 to WSTC will boost the student loan fund during the coming school year, Dean of Administration Russell Owen said today. However, only \$11,628 is available the first semester.

The college must match one-ninth of the Federal grant but cannot use the money from tax or commercial enterprise sources. For this purpose Wayne business firms and individuals have contributed \$1,405, which is a little more than necessary to match the first semester Federal grant.

The college, however, will need \$3,290 to match the full-year grant. Contributions are being accepted at both Wayne banks.

Dean of Students Donald Merriman said the scholarship committee has divided the money into 65 equal loans for qualified students.

WSTC is one of some 1,400 colleges participating in the National Defense Education act under which the grants are authorized yearly by Congress.

# EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

## What Did He Expect?

The head of the big steel union has made a complaint and a request to one of the presidential candidates. Some 100,000 members of his union are unemployed and 300,000 more are working a short week. Steel production, of late, has been running at a mere 53 percent of capacity. So he wants the government to move in and "take more vigorous steps" to improve the steel employment picture.

This brought an apt comment from the Portland Oregonian: "Well, what did he expect when he kept his 1,100,000-member union on strike for months last year until stopped by a Federal injunction and obtained a settlement which did not alter the costly work practices imposed by the union?"

That settlement, in other words, increased wages and other payroll costs without doing any-

thing about featherbedding and make-work within the industry. Only one result was possible and it has come about: We imported 4.4 million tons of foreign steel last year as against only 1.5 million tons of export. This year's imports are expected to be nearly as large. To quote the Oregonian again, "Why should the United States, the greatest steel producer in the world, need any imports from abroad? Obviously, it doesn't — but foreign prices are lower and quality is improved vastly."

You can raise wages to any level. You can put featherbedding work rules into effect which result in waste and inefficiency on any conceivable scale. But you can't make people buy a high-priced product when they can get the same product elsewhere for less. And that goes for every thing we use — not just steel.

## Capitol News . . . State Growing More Aware Of Civil Defense Progress

LINCOLN — The state of Nebraska is becoming more and more conscious of civil defense preparations. Since the office of civil defense was set up under Gov. Val Peterson, who would run a six-year term in 1953, there has been steady progress.

Legislation has been enacted providing a line of succession and other emergency measures in case of attack. This requires a Constitutional amendment and will be on the November ballot. Subject of the amendment is highly controversial.

Now, the state is planning a \$300,000 bomb-proof underground building in Lincoln to serve as the seat of government in case of enemy attack. A fallout shelter will be constructed in the basement of the governor's mansion at a cost of \$2,400.

Of the cost for the government center, \$140,000 would be the state's share, obtained from the special institutional building fund, levy. The remainder would be footed by the Federal government.

In addition to housing state offices in an emergency, the building would provide overflow space for use by state departments as soon as the structure is built. It would be located within 15 minutes travel time from the Capitol, immediately north of the state-house about a mile and a quarter. The building would be self-sufficient, have its own power and emergency 24-hour emergency supplies of food and water.

Construction is not expected to start before next summer.

**Aging Population**  
The problems of the aged have come in for a close look by a group of persons interested in them.

At a Nebraska conference on the aging, similar to the White House conference on children and youth, the group opposed urging a liberalization of Social Security benefits.

But in drafting its suggested program for submission to the 1961 White House conference on the subject, the Nebraska committee said the Legislature should supply funds for checking a portion of the elder citizens to determine medical needs.

It recommended a closer relationship between the medical pro-

feSSION and nursing homes and development of rehabilitation facilities at all general hospitals with a capacity of more than 50 beds.

The Nebraska group also opposes any government plan to slow voluntary health insurers from further growth and service. Also recommended was establishment of a state commission to act as a clearing house for information on Nebraska's senior citizens. The committee also feels that construction of recreation centers for the elderly in communities should be encouraged.

**Schools and Industry**  
There need to be more graduates of technical schools in Nebraska. That's the belief of Dr. F. B. Decker, state education commissioner.

Decker said technical schools do more than anything else to boost industry. He cited the demand for such graduates at the Nebraska Vocational-Technical school, Milford.

About 200 are graduated at Milford a year and two Omaha private schools turn out about 250 each, Decker said. He added the demand for these is so great that it is a problem to keep the students from quitting their courses to take outside employment.

Meanwhile, the Tenth Federal Reserve district had something to say about industry in Nebraska between 1954 and 1958. The district said the number of manufacturing workers in the state dropped 1.2 percent during the period, although the dollar value of goods manufactured increased 28.8 percent.

During the four years, the district continued, there was a boost of 8.7 percent in the number of firms in Nebraska employing more than 20 persons. The district said in 1958 the state had 59,553 manufacturing workers and 411 firms employing more than 20 people.

On the dollar volume which climbed from \$394.2 million to \$507.6 million, the district said some of the hike could be the result of higher prices.

**State Fair**  
The Nebraska State fair may head for a record attendance if experience in other states is a

guide. State Fair Board Secretary Edwin Schultz said attendance at major fairs over the country this season suggests the 1960 run in Nebraska from Sept. 3-9 may hit a high mark.

The record of 328,000 was set in 1958 and a five percent hike over the 1959 attendance would be a new high, Schultz said. In 1959 the total turnout at the annual Nebraska exposition was 324,000.

## County Agent's Column

**New Look**  
Wayne county will have more than 30 4-H members exhibiting and participating in the 1960 Nebraska State fair, which opens Saturday.

The 4-H exhibits will appear in a new setting, reports W. M. Antes, state leader of 4-H and young men and women at the University of Nebraska.

The large exhibit room in the second floor of the 4-H building is being redecorated with a new coat of paint. The exhibit tables and booths will be arranged like spokes in a wheel. An information desk will be placed at the hub of the huge wheel. In addition, 4-H members will serve as hosts to greet visitors who tour the exhibits.

Some 2,000 4-H club members are expected to attend and actively participate in some phase of the 4-H program at the State fair. Many other club members will send exhibits to make up a total of 5,000 exhibits in the 4-H division.

**Should You Rent Equipment?**  
Should you rent farm equipment? Maybe, or maybe not. You have to know your operation well enough to know whether it will be more profitable to pay the rental fee in order to get the job done or whether there is still a different way of solving your problem that is even better for you.

Here is a schedule recommended to dealers by the Farm Equipment Retailers' association:  
One day — one percent of new delivered price; one week — five percent of new delivered price; one month — 15 percent of new delivered price; two months — 25 percent of new delivered price; and three months — 33 1/3 percent of new delivered price.

On the surface these rates might seem a bit high, but the

key to the matter is whether you are smarter to rent a unit for perhaps \$180 during a busy season and get the job done on time with maximum profit or whether it would be better to spend \$550 every year to own a similar unit. If you can put the difference between the annual cost to own and the cost of short-term rental to a more profitable use, then it is probably good business for you to rent.

Economists suggest that you can afford to pay up to 20 percent of the price of new equipment annually in rentals and do it profitably. If you need equipment for a longer period of time, then you can probably better afford to own it yourself.

**Feeders to Meet**  
Livestock feeders from the Nebraska feeding areas will be attending the 1960 convention of the Nebraska Livestock Feeders association in Lincoln Oct. 5-6. Livestock men from some adjoining states are also expected at this year's event.

The program Oct. 6 opens at 9 a.m. with a panel group discussing "This Feeding Game." The panel will be moderated by Dr. Paul Guyer, extension animal husbandman, Nebraska college of agriculture. Following the panel, the convention will hear an address on "Face the Future With Facts" by A. V. Nordquist, agricultural statistician, USDA and Nebraska Department of Agriculture.

**GRASSROOTS OPINION**  
ABOUT THE BEST remarks made at a recent conference of state governors, came from a Federal official, Budget Director Maurice H. Stans. He said: "Government at all levels must cease trying to be supermarts for every imaginable public service and instead concentrate on essentials." A government, like a family, can afford only so much. ## Farm News and Views

PERMANENT PASTURES are the most neglected acres on most farms. Fall is the best time to renovate most of these pastures, since more time is available and erosion won't be as great on rolling land. Main management consideration, aside from applying correct amounts of lime and fertilizer, is to kill back permanent grass by plowing. It's about the only way to be sure a newly-seeded legume will survive.

THREE WAYS to control grubs with insecticides are available to livestock farmers this fall. One is Co-Ral which is sprayed on

cattle's backs. Another is Trodene, a bolus that's administered orally. The third is Rid-Ezy, a new mineral-insecticide mix that is added to the feed. Best time to treat is before the end of November. All healthy cattle can be treated except dairy cows, baby calves or animals to be slaughtered within 60 days.

USE A distributor to fill silos or metal bins with shelled corn. Capacity will be increased, stress on buildings reduced and quality of grain improved. A distributor lessens the chance of trash collecting in pockets or layers to interfere with drying or aeration of grain. Powered or gravity operated models are available.

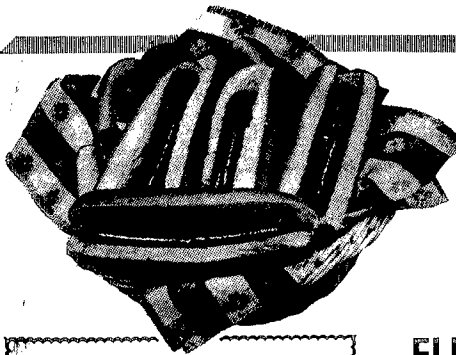

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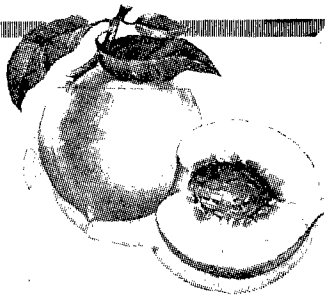
