Wayne's swimming pool will close the season Sunday, Manager John Bernthal announced this week. The pool will be open from 3 to 5 and 7 to 9 p.m. weekdays prior to Sunday.

Start Registration At College; Expect New Record High

Wayne's population jumped about one-third this week as WSTC students flocked to town to begin the 1960-61 school year. An accurate enrollment total will not be available until registration is complete, but it is expected to top last year's record 1,262.

Some of the men students are temporarily housed in the Rice auditorium basement pending completion of Berry hall's east wing. Beds, desks and chairs that will go into the new dormitory have been set up at the Rice building.

Freshmen and new students, probably 450 or more, jumped into a whirlwind orientation schedule Wednesday. They will be busy at most constantly through Saturday registration.

The student body includes more distant students than usual — six from Hawaii, one from Alaska, one from Massachusetts, three from Iran, one from Austria and one from Panama.

Returning students are finding the campus in a state of disarray because of numerous construction jobs. An excavation for a new steam pipe tunnel across the middle road was being closed today.

The area between the Rice building and Memorial stadium is being graded for surfacing as a parking lot. Expansion of the parking lot north of Wayne Prep is also underway.

A new fire escape from the administration building auditorium was completed during the summer. Rooms in the academic buildings are all renumbered.

47 Added Students Swamp Faculty as '60-61 Term Opens

Enrollment at Wayne city schools jumped to 625 students this year from 578 pupils last year, according to early figures released by Supt. Stanley Westergard Tuesday.

The increased enrollment may require the addition of two more teachers, Westergard told the school board Tuesday night. The critical situation, he said, lies in the first grade, where 35 students are enrolled.

The fifth grade is the next largest single class with 30 pupils. Other grades have larger enrollments but are divided by using combination rooms.

Principal Fred Rickers has requested an extra teacher, perhaps on a part-time basis, to handle sections of arithmetic, English and social studies and relieve classroom crowding.

Three combination rooms are now in operation. Mrs. Lena Miller has 10 in second graders and 11 third graders. Mrs. Mildred Witte has nine each third and fourth graders and Richard Oxenford has 13 fifth graders and 12 sixth grade students.

Westergard said average students were placed in the combined rooms. Single rooms in the divided grades contain high and low students of the grade.

He emphasized that children in the combined rooms will receive work in their own grade and their being combined with a group of higher or lower grade will have no effect on the instruction they will receive.

Present plans are for no students to be in a combined room more than one year.

Enrollments in elementary grades at Wayne are: Kindergarten, 42; first, 35; second, 34; third, 45; fourth, 35; fifth, 43; and sixth, 41. Total enrollment in these grades is 375 compared to 236 last year.

Both Westergard and school board members said the increase was greater than was anticipated. Classrooms for the extra sections are available, but more teachers are needed.

Enrollment at Wayne jumped from 520 last year to 575 this year. Carroll was estimated at the same as last year, about 50.

Schedules for high school students call for classes to begin at 9 a.m. with dismissal at 11:50 a.m. Lunch hour is from 11:50 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. with dismissal at 3:30, except this first week when classes will be let out at 2:30. Grade school lunch hour has been set from 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

In other business the board discussed seeding the new school grounds, open house and dedication of the new building, elected a new commercial teacher and granted a pay increase to a custodian.

The board accepted an offer to scold and fertilize the portion of the school yard west of the building for \$488.20. Leroy Barner appeared for Merchants Firestone to make the proposal to the board. The board had previously contracted with Merchants to seed the area immediately around the school with bluegrass for \$310.

Board Chairman Mrs. Don Wightman instructed Westergard to make plans for an open house and dedication of the \$440,000 elementary school the second week in November during National Education Week.

Richard Aadland was elected to a commercial spot at \$4,200 to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Mrs. Marcile Thomas. Custodian Leonard Schwane was given a wage increase of \$25 per month from \$250 to \$275.

Bills totaling \$16,543.77 were approved, including a payment of \$8,956.90 to Christiansen and Sons for work on the two buildings. The meeting was recessed to further allow discussion of the teacher shortage.

4-H Calf Sale Set At Wayne Sept. 15

Wayne's annual 4-H calf sale will be held at 8 p.m. next Thursday at the Wayne sale barn. About 40 calves are expected to be sold.

County Agent Harold Ingals said 4-H members should have their calves in place at the sale barn by 2 p.m. for judging. A packer buyer will appraise the calves at 4.

The sale will start at 8 p.m. with the heaves being auctioned in order of their placing in the judging.

Local Farmer Has Champion Oats at State Grain Show

Leo Hansen, Wayne, exhibited the grand champion sample of oats in the certified seed division at the Nebraska state fair Saturday.

Hansen, who showed a sample of Burnett oats, will receive a trophy awarded by the State Fair board. A record number of entries competed in the show.

Wayne county's 4-H livestock judging team placed tenth in competition Saturday among 46 teams. John Dorsey, Wayne, placed sixteenth in the individual rankings out of 273 participants.

Jerry Meyer was awarded the only purple ribbon among county exhibitors in the 4-H baby beef competition. He received a purple and a blue in his Hereford steers.

Donald Meyer won two blues on his Hereford and Angus heifers. Marlis Williams received a blue and a red for her Hereford and Shorthorn steers. Karen Willers received the same awards.

In the open class Hereford show, Hervale and Lorilee farms, Wayne, showed the Nebraska champion bull. Hervale also showed the Nebraska champion female and took first place in the Nebraska get-of-sire competition.

A boar bred by Ed McQuistan, Pender, was named the grand champion Duroc. It was exhibited by Don Fruan, Grand Island. McQuistan showed the reserve champion.

Councilmen Award Sewer, Water Contracts Tuesday

Contracts for construction of sanitary sewers and water mains in Westwood addition and Wriedt subdivision were awarded at a special meeting of the Wayne city council Tuesday night.

Successful bidder on the two projects was Cornhusker Well and Supply, Lexington. The two bids by the Lexington firm totaled \$24,830, about \$6,000 under the city engineer's estimate.

Specifications for the projects call for completion within 45 days. It is hoped they can be completed so that street paving may also be installed this fall.

W. Meyer Steers Bring \$24.50 at Omaha Market

Willis Meyer, Wayne, marketed 24 steers averaging 1,412 pounds at Omaha this week. They brought \$24.50 compared to the slaughter steer top of \$25.75.

Hans Rethwisch, Wayne, sold 24 steers averaging 1,266 pounds at \$24.

Cornhusker was the lowest bidder among three firms competing for the projects. Other bidders and their total prices were: L. E. Ball Construction Co., Norfolk, \$25,532; and Neely and Askwith, Tilden, \$26,480.45.

The successful bid was, \$11,855 for the water mains in the two building areas and \$12,975 for sewers. Cost of the water main extensions is borne by the city. The sanitary sewer costs will be assessed against the benefitted property.

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Under the trimester plan it is possible for a student to complete a four-year baccalaureate program in slightly less than three years. For teachers in service, the regular summer session, starting about June 5, would be retained, followed by a three-week August post-session.

"I am of the opinion many colleges would welcome the trimester system," Dr. Brandenburg said, "and those who do not wish to attend the third trimester may omit this term without complicating their pursuit of the

Brandenburg Urges Change To New Trimester Calendar

In an address to the faculty opening the 1960-61 school year, WSTC President W. A. Brandenburg urged consideration of the trimester calendar starting in September, 1961.

"This college has a physical plan with value in excess of \$12 million," Dr. Brandenburg pointed out. "Unlike many colleges, we are already using it in all 12 months of the year, but the question must be asked: 'Is fuller use of the plant possible?'"

The president then expressed the opinion that a trimester calendar would increase plant utilization by at least 25 percent over that possible under the present program. WSTC is now operating on the conventional two-semester plan with a nine-week summer session and August post-session. The summer offering is largely for teachers in service.

"By starting the first week of September, increasing the instructional period from 50 to 60 minutes and reducing the traditional college vacations, the first trimester may be completed by Christmas, and this without any compromise on class time and instruction standards," Dr. Brandenburg stated.

The traditional first semester ends about Jan. 25 in most colleges, followed by several days of vacation before starting the second semester.

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The price of 1960-crop corn in Wayne county will be supported at a minimum of 99 cents per bushel, ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell announced today.

The local rate is based on a minimum national average of \$1.06. The minimum rate may be increased if the final 1960-crop corn support price as determined in October is higher. It will not be reduced.

As in the past, Sundell said, the price support program for corn will be carried out through loans on farm or warehouse-stored corn and through purchase agreements. These will be available from harvest time through May 31, 1961 and will mature July 31, 1961.

To be eligible for support corn must grade No. 3 or better, except that corn grading No. 4 because of test weight only will also be eligible. Corn must meet certain moisture requirements and must also be in adequate storage.

Torrid Temps Aid County Corn Crop

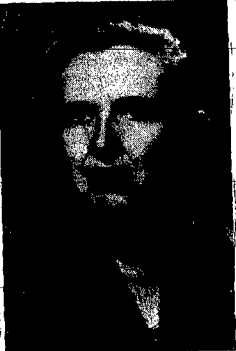

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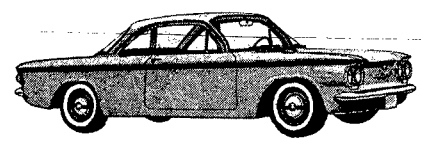
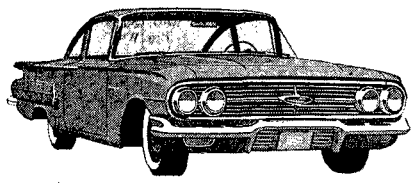
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WINSIDE 228 Enrolled at Winside School; Name Cheerleaders

EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

Facing Up to Facts

A deadlock between the houses of Congress resulted in the killing of measures which would have increased the minimum wage under the Federal wage-hour law. Democratic Candidate John Kennedy has avowed to make this one of the big issues of the current political campaign.

The minimum wage issue is bound to be called to the attention of the nation in the next two months and will undoubtedly come before Congress when it reconvenes.

Ever since the Federal wage-hour law was passed, in depression days, certain service industries, retailing among them, have been exempt. This exemption was threatened in 1949 but was maintained. The legions of people who favor keeping this exemption are not against higher wages. But they face up to an inescapable set of facts.

One is that retailing is a local business which must adapt itself to widely differing local needs, customs and standards. An outlet of the biggest national chain must still compete at the local level.

Another is that retailing has room for marginal and part-time workers, including teen-agers and housewives whose value is limited. If wages are artificially forced up to where they pass that value, retailers will have no choice save to reduce employment of this nature to the maximum degree.

You may not agree with an editorial . . . but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

Another is that elimination of the retail exemption, like an increase in the minimum wage, would be inflationary.

An increase in the Federal minimum wage and removal of the retail exemption is a serious threat to the economy of many small towns such as Wayne. It should be in the public's own interest to make these facts known to our Congressmen when they campaign throughout the area this fall.

A 20-Minute Supply

Wayne's city council is currently considering creation of a new standpipe which would give the city a reserve of approximately 750,000 gallons of water in case of emergency.

Some people will question the necessity of expending \$60,000 for this project. The most concrete argument against such thinking is the fact that the present storage tank would furnish only a 20-minute supply of water in the case of some emergency which knocked out the city's pumping facilities.

A major fire at the same time as such an emergency could result in a large portion of the town being destroyed for lack of water to fight the blaze.

The council is to be commended for planning the new standpipe as a protection for the residents of the city.

County Agent's Column

Elm Leaf Beetle
Elm leaf beetles have been reported in several counties which skeletonize elm leaves and, in severe cases, can cause the foliage to turn brown.

The larvae are about 1/4-inch long, yellowish in color with dark spots and stripes, states Robert E. Roselle, Extension entomologist at the college of agriculture.

The elm leaf beetle can be controlled with a mixture of one quart of 25 percent DDT emulsifiable concentrate in 100 gallons of water. Arsenate of lead also may be used at the rate of four pounds to 100 gallons of water. The Omaha city forester reports good control of the beetle with a mixture of DDT and arsenate of lead.

Corn Sorghum Field Day
New developments in the production of hybrid corn and sorghum varieties will be reported at a special field day Tuesday on the college of agriculture campus.

The event begins at 9:30 a.m. 1/4 mile north of the intersection of 48th and Holdrege streets in Lincoln. Those attending will get a chance to see corn breeding work at research plots under the direction of Dr. John Longquist and Norma Williams, members of the agronomy department.

The group will meet on the agronomy farm, 72nd and Adams streets, at 1:30 p.m. to observe sorghum breeding and testing work under the direction of Dr. O. J. Webster, U. S. Department of Agriculture member stationed

at Lincoln.

Eggs To South America
Eggs shipped from the Midwest and mountain areas can be delivered to South American countries in a condition that will compete favorably with eggs currently offered for sale there.

Capitol News . . .

Board of Control Approves Some Hikes in Relief Pay

LINCOLN — Some Nebraskans on relief rolls will get higher payments from the state Oct. 1. The Board of Control, which handles the state's welfare program, approved raises up to 10 percent, based on need, for those recipients not now getting the maximum allowable under the law.

To be affected will be about 11,600 persons, the board estimates. Total hike is \$553,743 in state and county funds during the remaining nine months of the current biennium.

The board said it is studying the maximum payments to see if they are realistic with the possible idea of recommending changes to the 1961 Legislature. Now state law says the aged may receive only \$70 per month, the blind \$100, disabled \$65 and \$100 for the mother and first child under the aid to dependent children program. The next three children get \$15 each and \$10 each is paid in relief for each child after four.

The increase is the first for the needy since December, 1958. The board emphasizes those getting maximum payments now or who are in nursing homes will not get any of the boosts. Only the Legislature can change the maximum payments.

Hikes as approved by the board will go to more than 8,000 aged, 535 blind recipients, 779 persons who are disabled and to 944 family units which have 2,229 children.

Farm Storage
Farmers who do not build storage facilities for the 1960 mid-crop may lose 30 to 40 cents a hundred pounds by selling on the open market. That's the opinion of representative of state and Federal agricultural agen-

Voter Lists
The list of those registered to vote in an election, by state law, is open to inspection by the public.

Paul Quinlan of Secretary of State Frank Marsh's office said he has received many inquiries as to whether the public has access to the names of registered voters. State law, Quinlan said,

provides that in towns in which voter registration is required, it is the duty of the registration clerk to post in a conspicuous place in his office, the names of those who appear on the books as qualified voters.

The question has come up because of interest this year in getting out the vote for the November general election.

Agriculture
State Agriculture Director Pearl Finigan says one of the failings of agriculture in the past has been its inability to maintain its market.

"This," Finigan says, "was caused primarily by a lack of imagination and aggressive research programs."

He made the comment in announcing the Agricultural Products Research Committee has authorized a firm in Wisconsin to start three research projects, each to last a year, on the use of agricultural starches in the paper industry. Total cost of the work will be an estimated \$99,000, Finigan reported.

The announcement came after reports that Nebraska's crop production this year will come close to breaking records and that there will be a shortage of space to store the crops.

Farm News and Views
You Must File and pay self-employment earnings taxes in order to be eligible for retirement and survivor benefits under Social Security. You can't put off paying taxes until a few years before retirement and expect to receive payment. Only three years of back payments

are accepted by the government. Older farmers have been eligible to receive benefits after paying into the program only a few years because they were near or beyond 65 years old when the law went into effect.

Lamb Feeding Prospects look good this season, even though slaughter-lamb prices in late winter and early spring may average \$2 lower than last year. Price forecasters believe feeding profits will be almost as good as last season. Main reasons for their optimism are low feeder prices and expected lower feed costs. Best feeding program will be one which makes use of low cost stalk field gains this fall. Then get lambs on grain by mid-winter so they will be ready for sale sometime in March.

Board of Control
There is controversy again in the Board of Control, which governs state institutions. This time it concerns the educational program at the institutions, formerly headed by Dr. Vernon Hungeate, who resigned some time ago, effective Sept. 1, for the college position in Colorado.

Hungeate charged that adequate administration and supervision of educational programs by a Board of Control is "outmoded and inefficient." He said he hopes the Legislature "will change this system which permits politics, friendship or personal bias to enter educational relationships with handicapped children, juvenile delinquents or any state wards."

Hungeate continued that the board would not ask State Department of Education for help in evaluating programs at the institutions to lead to some type of approval of what is being taught. The board's attitude, he added, indicates it is not particularly desirous of "maintaining their educational programs on a par with those in Nebraska Public Schools."

He had praise for Charles Leeman, board chairman, but none for Vice Chairman Harold Peterson and Mrs. Ethel Kirwin, a member. The board, Hungeate said, should welcome active cooperation with other state departments but this has not always been the case. He said only six of the board's educational programs have the approval of the State Educational department and seven do not.
