"Don't try to push them beyond their ability nor take them by the hand in areas where they can walk alone," he said.

The Wayne operation was the first acquired by the firm after its organization earlier this year. It has two other college food service contracts.

Good Intentions Not Enough

Present efforts to revise the Federal wage-hour law have two facets. One involves an increase in the minimum wage. The other involves extending the coverage to some 1.4 million workers, largely employed in retailing, who have hitherto been exempt.

Numbers of people approve such proposals as these on humanitarian grounds. But what they fail to take into consideration is that, in addition promoting inflation, the changes would in all likelihood work to the severe disadvantage of the groups they are supposed to help.

Taxpayer's Dollar, a publication of the U.

Taxpayer's Dollar, a publication of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, puts the case this way: "The estimated impact of the proposed legislation on the small businessman, the farmer and on low income, marginal workers has convinced many persons of the need to resist not only the proposed rate increase but any effort to extend coverage to other classes of workers. Apart from severe unemployment predicted through any excession of cowerage, the inflationary aspect of any increase has been cited. This would be reflected not only in the increased cost of goods and services to the individual consumer but would add to the cost of government as well."

In other words, higher minimum wage rates and broadened coverage would both reduce employment opportunity for the unskilled, youthful and marginal workers and increase their cost of living. They'd thus lose twice — and these are the workers who can least afford to lose. It seems to be a case where good intentions can't repeal

to be a case where good intentions can't repeal natural economic law.



Governor's Disability Sure To Get Legislative Notice

LINCOLN — One problem is sure to get attention in the 1961 session of the Legislature. That s the question of when a governor is disabled and when he is ready to return to duties after obing disabled.

Deputy Attorney General Clarence Meyer said fixing this blank spot in state statutes should be one of the first orders of business when the lawmakers convene in January. Meyer says Nebraska should not be without a governor for a minute.

The situation came to light originally with the first illness of Gov. Ralph G. Brooks. Brooks suffered a mild stroke in April, 1959. He was ill twice after that and each time the problem came

surtered a milo stroke in April, 1959. He was ill twice after that and each time the problem came up again. The enigm a was heightened because the governor was elected on the Democratic ticket and the lieutenant governor is a Republican.

It has been suggested that some type of a board or commission, which has one or more physicians as members, should make the determination as to when a governor can or can not carry out duties of his office.

Meyer says solution of the matter is not easy. He cited the case at the national level which developed when President Eisen-

case at the national level which developed when President Eisenhower had a heart attack. The deputy said that Congress tried to solve the situation but did not do so. Concluded Meyer: "The problem transcends political interests."

The Legislature would first ave to authorize Nebraska participating in the medical care program. Then the Welfare de-partment would have to come up

program. Then the Welfare de-partment would have to come up with regulations on who could be included among those not now receiving relief payments. And, concedes Woods, this will be the most difficult job the department has to face.

High Moisture Corn storage will be the safest crop insurance for many farmers this fall. There are several new airtight structures on the market this year. Also, conventional silos will keep high mostare grain in good condition if the top is sealed with a plastic cap after filling. The best time to harvest corn for silo storage in either shelled or ground ear form, is after most-ture content drops below 35 percent. This will usually occur 50 to. 80 days after politication. If corn gets below 25 percent most-ture it will be too dry for safe storage without adding water at filling time.
