Council Forms New Paving District for West Third Street

An ordinance which would result in paving of Third street from Sherman to Blaine was adopted at a Wayne city council meeting Tuesday night. This is the second paving district created by the council through ordinances in recent months. If a majority of the resident property owners abutting the affected portion of Third street file written objections by Oct. 19, Tuesday's ordinance will be voided and the paving will not be installed.

The ordinance was the only action at Tuesday's meeting. Another special meeting is planned Tuesday night to consider bids on several other paving projects throughout the city. They are: Part of Faircrest road and Sunset drive in Westwood addition; Sherman street from Tenth to Twelfth; Walnut drive in Wriedt subdivision; Walnut street from Ninth to Tenth; Ninth street from Windom to Pine Heights road; Tenth street from Pine Heights road east to the city limits; and Fourth street from the alley between Windom and Walnut east to Dearborn.

Building permits issued recently by City Clerk Howard Witt included: Joseph Rieken — \$25 garage addition, South Douglas street; Roger Claussen — \$500 remodeling and addition, Roosevelt park.

Another major construction project will get underway at WSTC late this year. Plans for a food services building to replace the present cafeteria were approved by the State Normal board Monday.

President W. A. Brandenburg said the board authorized opening of bids in early November. Construction will begin immediately in order to complete the work by September, 1961.

The building, 126 by 196 feet with two levels, will include two main dining rooms accommodating 375 diners each and two small private dining rooms, with 50 and 100 capacity. The present cafeteria, operating at or near capacity, seats 250.

Dining rooms will be on the upper level along with waiting rooms, a foyer, kitchen, coolers and dishwashing facilities. The lower level will have men's and women's lounges, food and equipment storage rooms and a large unfinished room. The front entrance leads into stairways going to the upper and lower floors.

No cost estimate is available yet. Construction will be financed entirely through revenue bonds with no tax money involved.

Management of the present cafeteria service has been awarded to a new concessionaire, Institutions, Inc., Omaha, a group of former Epley hotel executives. The new operation was the first acquired by the firm after its organization earlier this year. It has two other college food service contracts.

Another meeting is planned Oct. 13 at Wakefield to establish a permanent organization. All parents and friends of retarded children are urged to attend.

Foreign Material In Soybeans to Bring Discounts

Soybeans from the 1960 crop placed under the price support program will be eligible for a premium or may receive discounts depending on the foreign material content, according to County ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell.

The basic loan rate for Wayne county soybeans grading No. 2 and containing between 13.8 and 14 percent moisture is \$1.76 per bushel.

When the foreign material in the soybeans is one percent or less, the premium will be two cents per bushel. In addition, a schedule of premiums applies when moisture content is less than 13.8 percent.

The discount applies when foreign material exceeds two percent. Soybeans with 2.1 to 2.5 percent foreign material will be discounted one cent per bushel. Each additional one-half percent foreign material is discounted one cent — the discount for five percent being six cents per bushel. In addition there are discounts for splits, damaged kernels and test weights.

Loans Available on Storage, Equipment

With crop prospects pointing toward a record harvest this fall, farmers are being reminded that government storage facility loans — as well as loans for drying and ventilating equipment — are still available to farmers who need additional storage capacity on their farms.

According to ASC Chairman Carl Sundell, CCC loans are available for most storable crops in amounts up to 80 percent of the cost of the approved storage structure. The loans are payable in four annual installments beginning a year after the loan is made. Interest is four percent.

Storage equipment loans may be made for up to 75 percent of the delivered and assembled cost (excluding labor) of mobile conditioning and ventilating equipment to cure and dry grain. Loans are repayable in three annual installments with four percent interest. Applications for both types of loans may be filed at the county ASC office.

Wool Incentive Pay Set for 1961

A shorn wool incentive price of 62 cents per pound has recently been announced by the Department of Agriculture for the 1961 marketing year which begins Apr. 1, 1961.

County ASC Chairman Carl Sundell points out that the 1961 price is the same as for the first six years of the program. Payments to producers will follow the same methods as under the current program.

Shorn wool payments will be equal to a percentage of each producer's cash returns from wool sales. The percentage will be that required to raise the national average price received by all producers up to the incentive price of 62 cents per pound.

The payments for the 1961 marketing year will be made on shorn wool and unshorn lambs marketed between Apr. 1, 1961 and Mar. 31, 1962.

Oct. 1 Date Set For Payments on 1960 Soil Bank

Annual payments due Wayne county farmers who have conservation reserve contracts will be made beginning Oct. 1, according to ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell.

The chairman made the announcement in response to numerous questions about the time when payments would be made. Wayne county farmers have conservation reserve contracts in force covering about 13,700 acres of cropland and will receive payments totaling about \$208,100.

Since the growing season is generally over by Oct. 1 and compliance with the contracts has been checked, annual payments are made after that date. Checking farms with contracts is necessary because designated cropland must be kept out of production during the life of the contract. Designated land may not be grazed or a crop harvested from it.

Sundell also announced there will be no new conservation reserve sign up this fall for the 1961 crop year. He said this information could not be given earlier until it was determined whether Congress would authorize expansion of the conservation reserve.

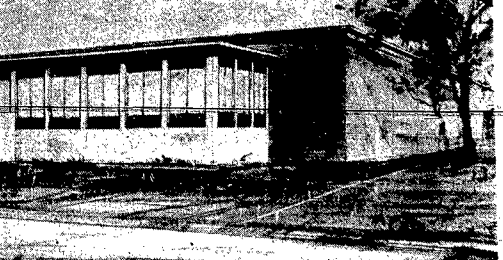

EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

Domination by the Misguided

There will be one real point at issue when Nebraskans go to the polls in November. Stated simply it is this: Is public education in Nebraska going to be controlled by the people or a misguided few backing a proposed constitutional amendment?

This question will be decided by the outcome of a vote on a proposed constitutional amendment to abolish the State Board of Education and make the commissioner elective.

To friends of this amendment, abolition of the State Board and election of the commissioner are important, but they are not fundamental. They are merely the focal points of a campaign to achieve lower standards—lower than the present minimums now prescribed.

Despite the fact it once voted an incompetent into office, Nebraska can survive with a elected commissioner. But it can not afford any lowering of its already minimal education standards.

Proponents of the amendment are no doubt sincere in their convictions, but nevertheless mistaken. They are today the greatest threat to public school improvement in this state.

Nebraska is still trying to do by persuasion and education what other states have done by legislative action and financial inducement. The present system is sound and has brought many improvements. It gives all areas of the state a voice in school control and prevents domination by urban areas. It is based fundamentally on voluntary action, locally initiated and controlled.

Stronger, larger, more efficient school districts would help solve the financial problems of many local school districts in the state and should bring educational improvements.

The real danger in November's vote on the amendment is that of letting a misguided few dominate Nebraska's idea of what its schools should be. With the American penchant for favoring the underdog, proponents of the amend-

County Agent's Column
Rat Control Campaign
There is need for an all-out campaign to control rats in Nebraska, Robert E. Roselle, extension entomologist, declared. . . . We are currently at the peak in rat populations in Nebraska and several surrounding states. This is the third year in a row of high rat populations. The seriousness of the problem is not readily evident because rats and mice are in the fields. When harvest time approaches these rodents will return to farmsteads to feed on stored grain.

Due to the critical shortage of storage space for the bumper crop this year, many farmers may decide to erect their own storage bins. If so, they should take steps to make these facilities rat-proof. . . . There is a need for whole communities and counties to start rat control programs. A million rats were killed in Lancaster county last year through such a program, Roselle said. **Fall Fertilizing Pays**
Many Nebraska farmers are already making plans for their fall fertilizing programs. These farmers say fall fertilizing helps them make money and save time and work these ways: . . . Getting the job out of the way before the spring "rush" season. . . . Generally favorable conditions in the fall when the ground is firm and dry and it's easier to get spreading machinery in the field. . . . Quick deliveries of plant food. . . . Ready availability of grades and amounts a farmer wants. . . . There's a big potential for profitable fall fertilizer use on a number of different crops. For example: . . . For next year's corn crop, you can plow down and disk in this fall the nitrogen, phosphate and potash fertilizer you would ordinarily add in the spring. Fall fertilizer in many cases gives as good results as fertilizer added in the spring. . . . On medium to heavy soils, there is little chance of nitrogen loss, when the soil has cooled down to about 50 degrees. On sandy soils, losses from leaching can occur. . . . For winter wheat, you can apply fertilizer carrying phosphate and a small amount of nitrogen with the seed at planting time. Extra nitrogen can be topdressed in the spring. . . . On legume-grass pasture, a topdressing of phosphate fertilizer will pay off in more tons of better quality forage with a higher protein content next season. The nutrients put on this fall will help the legumes resist winter killing. . . . Permanent cool season pastures will give extra grazing days this fall, earlier grazing next spring, more grass and more protein per acre if you add a topdressing of nitrogen phosphate fertilizer.

Good Intentions Not Enough

Present efforts to revise the Federal wage-hour law have two facets. One involves an increase in the minimum wage. The other involves extending the coverage to some 1.4 million workers, largely employed in retailing, who have hitherto been exempt.

Numbers of people approve such proposals as these on humanitarian grounds. But what they fail to take into consideration is that, in addition to promoting inflation, the changes would in all likelihood work to the severe disadvantage of the groups they are supposed to help.

Taxpayer's Dollar, a publication of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce, puts the case this way: "The estimated impact of the proposed legislation on the small businessman, the farmer and on low income, marginal workers has convinced many persons of the need to resist not only the proposed rate increase but any effort to extend coverage to other classes of workers. Apart from severe unemployment predicted through any extension of coverage, the inflationary aspect of any increase has been cited. This would be reflected not only in the increased cost of goods and services to the individual consumer but would add to the cost of government as well."

In other words, higher minimum wage rates and broadened coverage would both reduce employment opportunity for the unskilled, youthful and marginal workers and increase their cost of living. They'd thus lose twice — and these are the workers who can least afford to lose. It seems to be a case where good intentions can't repeal natural economic law.

LINCOLN — One problem is sure to get attention in the 1961 session of the Legislature. That is the question of when a governor is disabled and when he is ready to return to duties after being disabled.

Meyer says Nebraska should not be without a governor for a minute. The situation came to light originally with the first illness of Gov. Ralph G. Brooks. Brooks suffered a mild stroke in April, 1959. He was ill twice after that and each time the problem came up again. The enigma was heightened because the governor was elected on the Democratic ticket and the lieutenant governor is a Republican.

It has been suggested that some type of a board or commission, which has one or more physicians as members, should make the determination as to when a governor can or can not carry out duties of his office. Meyer says solution of the matter is not easy. He cited the case at the national level which developed when President Eisenhower had a heart attack. The deputy said that Congress tried to solve the situation but did not do so. Concluded Meyer: "The problem transcends political interests."

Welfare Problems
Nebraska's Welfare department is studying what effects a law enacted by Congress would have on the state. The legislation provides for medical payments to those over 65 years of age. This includes those on relief rolls and others not on them but who need financial aid for hospital and doctor bills. State Public Welfare Director Frank Woods estimates there are 150,000 Nebraskans 65 years of age or older. But he says not all of these would be affected by the legislation. Of the 150,000, Woods stated, 15,000 are on old age assistance rolls and would be included. How many of the remainder could be affected would depend upon what type of standards would be set by the state. The Legislature would first have to authorize Nebraska participating in the medical care program. Then the Welfare department would have to come up with regulations on who could be included among those not now receiving relief payments. And, concedes Woods, this will be the most difficult job the department has to face.

Public Improvements
Periodically a statement comes from the tax commissioner's office reporting the amount of money spent for properties, automobiles and airplanes, typewriters and public improvements. This category of state government involves expenditure of funds for building of roads, acquisition of land for non-highway purposes, automobiles and airplanes, typewriters and office equipment. The (Nebraska) Citizens council made a 10-year study of this seg-

ment of state spending. It showed that the hike in this category was 146 percent with the increase in road building accounting for just about all of the boost. **Williams Leaves**
Richard Williams, an assistant attorney general, will leave state government service Oct. 1 to join a Lincoln law firm. Williams has been in the attorney general's office for eight years. He had high praise for the men working in the office under Atty. Gen. C. S. Beck. Williams said his financial future prompted the move. This is normally the prime reason for long-time state employees to enter private employment, regardless of the type of work they handle. Williams worked with extradition and educational problems for various state agencies, among other duties.

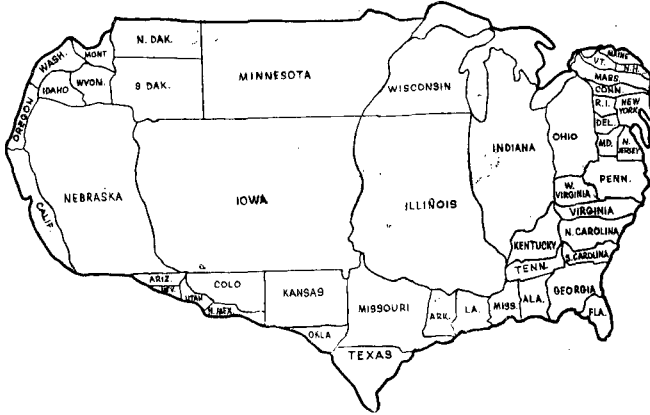
