Tenth street from Pine Heights road east of the city limits and Fourth street from the alley between Windom and Walnut east to Dearborn.

Oct. 3 Start Set For City Schools Hot Lunch Program

The hot lunch program is expected to get underway Oct. 3 at the Wayne city schools.

Equipment has been arriving daily to set up the kitchen and serving facilities and surplus commodities of butter, cheese, flour and dried milk are being received from the government.

As in most area schools, the price for meals will be 30 cents for students purchasing a meal ticket. A five-meal ticket will be \$1.50. Otherwise, single meals will be 35 cents.

Although the serving schedule still is being determined, it is probable that elementary students will be served first, starting about 11:10 a. m. High school serving will start at 11:50 a. m.

Superintendent Stanley Westergard said the schedules will be subject to revision after it is learned how many students will participate.

Willers' Angus Top At 4-H Beef Sale

An Angus steer shown by Karen Willers, Wayne, was named grand champion at the annual Wayne 4-H baby beef sale Thursday night at the Wayne sale barn. The 920-pound steer was sold to El Rancho for \$31.50 per hundredweight.

The reserve champion was a Hereford steer shown by Lee Nielson, Wayne. It sold to Wayne Grain and Feed for \$28. Second top price at the sale was \$29.50 paid by Sherry's for a Hereford steer shown by John Claus, Wayne.

The top heifer was shown by Terry Janke, Winside. The Hereford sold to the State National bank for \$28.

The 39 calves sold averaged \$27.26 compared to last year's \$29 average, reflecting the lower cattle market. Chuck Spndahl, Carroll, had the top calf last year, receiving \$36 per hundredweight.

Auctioneers for the sale were T. J. Hughes, Orville Lage and James Troutman. The sale is sponsored by the Wayne Chamber of Commerce.

Norfolk Manager Cites Changes in Social Security

The 1960 amendments to the Social Security law makes qualified disabled people under age 50 and their dependents eligible for cash benefits starting in December, reports Clifford Kittelson, manager of the Norfolk office. The December checks will arrive early next January.

Another important change lowers the length of time a person has to work in order to qualify for old-age insurance benefits. A minimum of six quarters or 1 1/2 years is needed by those who reached retirement age (65 for men, 62 for women) in 1956 or earlier. Those reaching retirement age this year will need at least three years of coverage.

The earnings limitation for beneficiaries under 72 remains at \$1,200 a year. There will be a change next year in the method of figuring loss of benefits for those who earn over \$1,200.

These and a number of other changes affect many people in this community, said Kittelson.

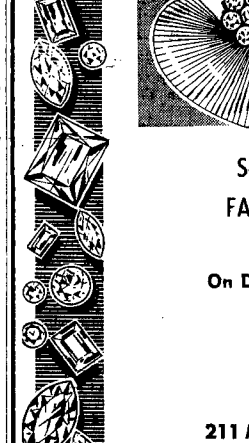

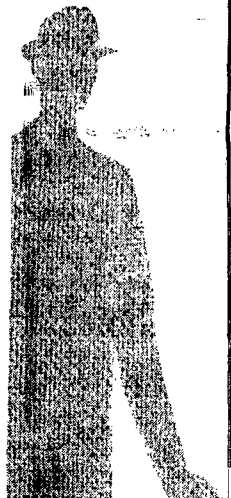

Pirates Whip Blue Devils 26-6 Friday in Husker Loop Tilt

Wayne High learned Friday night that football games are not won on offense alone. The Blue Devils outdowned and outtrashed Plainview but dropped a 26-6 Husker conference decision when they were unable to halt the speedy Pirate backs.

Coach Harold Maciejewski's green team will travel to Madison Friday night for their second conference tilt. Madison dropped a 26-0 decision to Pierce Friday. Wayne outscored the Dragons 26-13 last year.

Gene Hinrichsen, a speedy halfback, was the big thorn for Wayne Friday night. The 146-pound senior scored three touchdowns and two extra points after the Pirates had spotted Wayne a 6-0 lead in the first 1 1/2 minutes of the game. Hinrichsen had runs of five, 59 and 67 yards for his tallies.

Marlin Lessman was again the big gun in Wayne's attack. He accounted for 207 of Wayne's 229 net rushing. He averaged 7.7 yards for 27 carries, scored the lone Wayne touchdown and was a workhorse on defense throughout the evening.

Wayne had a 17-9 advantage in first downs and led 311 to 247 in total yards gained, but three fumbles proved costly.

Lessman accounted for a good portion of his rushing total in the first 74 seconds of the game. After Brunk's kickoff went into the end zone, Wayne took over on its own 20. Lessman slanted outside right tackle on the first scrimmage play and raced 44 yards to the Plainview 36. He darted off the opposite tackle on the next play, cut back and raced 36 yards for a touchdown. His plunge for the extra point fell short.

The remainder of the first period was scoreless. A Wayne fumble on the first play of the second quarter set the stage for Plainview's first tally. Sophomore Don Meyer fumbled on the Wayne 30 and Ed White recovered for the Pirates. It took six plays to get the touchdown with Hinrichsen circling right end on a pitchout for the final five yards. Brunk's plunge for the extra point was no good.

Only nine plays later Plainview enjoyed a 12-6 lead. Wayne was held for downs and Lessman's kick rolled dead on the Pirate 35. Ron Webber got six yards in two carries to the Plainview 41. Hinrichsen then rounded left end and raced 59 yards untouched for his second touchdown. A pass for the extra point fell incomplete.

Wayne moved to the Plainview 13 with the ensuing kickoff but the threat was stopped by the halftime intermission.

Weber gave the Pirates an 18-6 lead with the second half only 68 seconds old. He skirted right end with a pitchout and ran 58 yards to score. Hinrichsen plunged for the extra point to make it 18-6. The Blue Devils attempted to stay in the game with a march of their own. They moved 52 yards

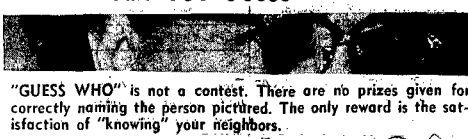

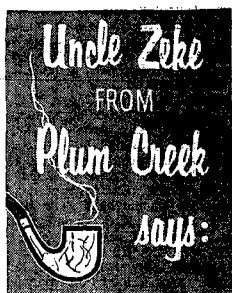

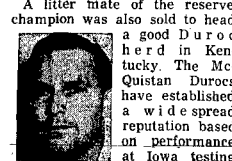

They crowd about their large membership — many people are forced into membership by school boards using tax funds, intended for education, to pay dues for each elector in the school district. I am one of those forced members. They use the same words with the same spelling and the same pronunciation as I do, except the words have special meanings. Could the key be dialectical materialism? If parents and taxpayers would investigate the statements made

Carroll, Neb. In the July 21 issue of The Wayne Herald, in the editorial comment section, you printed a letter by someone else headlined "NSIA Stands for Stagnation" in regard to sponsoring the petition drive to elect the state commissioner of education. By printing someone else's opinion and attaching their name to it, an editor can influence public opinion while not actually committing himself. Of course, it is an editor's privilege to print those items with which he agrees and reject those with which he disagrees.

So I was glad to note your editorial in last week's issue (Sept. 15) committing yourself by not putting someone else's name to your editorial headlined "Domination by the Misguided."

In the first paragraph of your editorial you state, "Is public education in Nebraska going to be controlled by the people or a misguided few backing a proposed constitutional amendment?" This seems to me to be inconsistent when the fact is the proposed amendment would change the commissioner of education from appointment by a six-man board to election by all Nebraska voters.

I don't mean to imply that the voting method is perfect and that it has not been abused. However, that could be said of all our elective offices, I believe. It's not a question of which method is perfect, but rather which is the better method. So far, I have not found anyone of whom I have asked who knew anything about, not even the name, of our representative on that six-man board, except one person who thought his address was Fremont. In contrast, nearly everyone knows something about our present commissioner of education and does have an opinion, either favorable or unfavorable. I believe that is a better condition for intelligent voting.

In the fifth paragraph of your editorial you state, "Proponents of the amendment are no doubt sincere in their convictions, but nevertheless mistaken." This seems to me to be a broad statement for anyone to make. If it is correct, the proposed amendment should be defeated, regardless of how small a percentage of the people of Nebraska agree. However, I, for one, do not believe that the "press" or any other minority group should decide what is best for all other groups. That is too near to Russia's system as I understand it.

In the sixth paragraph of your editorial, you make favorable comment on the present condition of our present system, generally, under the present commissioner of education, with which I agree for the most part. As you stated, "It is based fundamentally on voluntary action, locally initiated and controlled." I believe Mr. Decker realizes now some things cannot be forced on people against their will.

The proposed amendment, in no way, prevents the election of Mr. Decker, but he would have to get it by a vote of the people of Nebraska rather than an appointment by six men.

I heartily agree with paragraph seven of your editorial. I feel sure that our local four-section school district is entirely too small for today's conditions. But I think our people here should decide what is best for us rather than a department in Lincoln or Omaha, the press or some other remote group, after the factors have been presented to us.

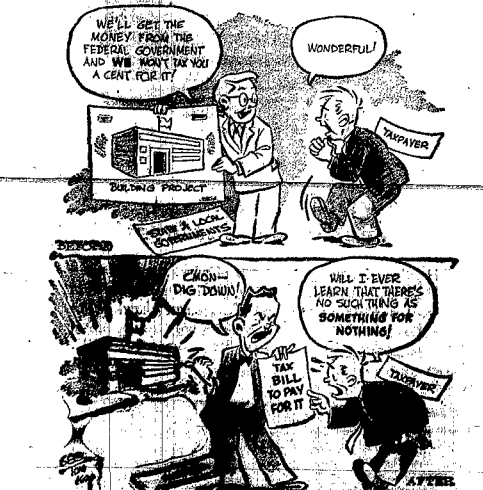
Several factors need to be considered. Nebraska's present property tax system means, in urban-rural consolidation and the resulting equal mill levy, farmers with three to five times the property tax values of urbanites will pay three to five times the school tax. Wayne county's farm taxable property proportion to non-farm taxable property per capita, when I checked with the county assessor in, I believe, 1957 was 2.58.

Even with this difference in taxable property, consolidation may be advisable due to the inefficiency of the small school district in many cases. But that, I think, should be the decision of the local people involved, after considering other factors such as educational opportunity, road transportation, etc. Unless the merits of a proposal can be pointed out to the local people involved for a favorable vote, I doubt, in most cases, if it has enough merit to warrant the proposed change.

I'm sorry I cannot feel qualified to say which method is the better positively. However, as an example, suppose you were presenting a "special interest" group or some foreign ideology and the furthering of your cause depended on a man of your choice being educational commissioner. Which method would you think easier to manipulate? Let's have both sides presented and pick the better of the two.

In the Aug. 11 issue of your paper appeared an editorial instructing how we farmers should vote in the coming fall election. Again, if you are positive you are qualified to know what is best, a system with you as dictator probably should be set up. To comment on that would take another letter.
