Grain Storage Ready?

Will you be able to store this year's corn and mile on your farm?

If storage space is not avail-able and if you intend to store at your local elevator it will pay to check now with the op-

All elevators and terminals are filled and it is extremely doubtful if you will be able to find stor-



age space available for your grain, according to Howard Elm, executive

Many farmers in Nebraska will

If you are building or buying new facilities for storing grain this fall, here are some ideas that will help ensure safe storage of corn and milo. According to E. A. Olson, agricultural enginerat the University of Nebraska, farmers should consider these

Concrete floor should include a vapor barrier to help keep ground moisture from causing grain spoilage. Use a plastic sheet or lapped, rolled roofing on top of a thin layer of concrete which has been placed over the gravel fill. The storage floor that is four to six inches thick should be placed over the vapor barrier.

sprinkling to keep surface damp.

New concrete may not be thoroughly dry before grain is put into storage. To keep moisture from migrating into the grain, a plastic sheet of two mil. thickness can be put on the floor before filling with grain.

fore filling with grain.

"Frame storages with doublewall thickness will do a better
job of protecting the grain from
weather. Best results can be expected if wall framing is covered with sheathing followed by
building paper and exterior siding.

If metal storages are erected, be sure to read the instructions be sure to read the instructions prepared by the manufacture to aid in construction. This will save time and help prevent leaks that might develop due to care-less workmanship.

Concrete will be stronger if kept wet for five to seven days after pouring. This can be done by covering concrete with straw, earth or building material and sprinkling to keep surface damp.

tight at the eves and roof ridges Openings in these places will let snow blow in on the stored grain resulting in spoilage. Ventilators on the roof or gable ends should be constructed to keep out snow and rain

on the roof or gable ends should be constructed to keep out snow and rain.

If natural air drying will be used, the system should be planned and designed before building construction starts. In large flat storages, the system can be built so the main air duct can serve as a storage partition in addition to providing for air distribution.

Agrating systems also are in-

air distribution.

Aeration systems also are important and should be included when heated air batch dryers will be used and if the storage has a capacity of 2,000 bushels or more. Aeration helps keep grain cool and helps prevent in-sect and mold damage. It also helps prevent moisture from ac-cumulating on the top of stored

cumulating on the top of stored grain.

Storages should be built to keep out rats. In frame storages, a 24-inch strip of hardware cloth (hail screen) should be placed between the sheathing and the siding around the building just above the foundation. A galvanized metal strip eight inches wide should be placed around the outside of the building just above the hardware cloth.

When building a storage out of lumber, farmers can save time and material by using an engineered grain storage plan. This will assure building a storage that is strong enough to hold grain pressures on the walls and yet save money by not using more materials than are required.

county extension offices and building material dealers have plans for grain storage and corn cribs designed for economy and easy construction. Most plans have material lists that make it easy to determine building costs in advance.

# **Expect Economy Balancing** Concern to Continue Decade

LINCOLN—The Census bureau has reported what many Nebraskans aiready know—there are less farms and they are bigger. The bureau said in 1959 Nebraska had 90,475 farms. compared with the 1954 total of 100,846.

with the 1954 total of 100,846.
Additionally, the bureau reported the average size of the farms in 1959 was 527 acres as against 470 acres five years earlier. And, as expected, the farms were worth more. The average value per farm in 1959 was \$47,804 as against \$34,494 in 1954.
Farms, the plight of them and what can be done to help the tillers of the soil who man the state's biggest business—agriculture—tave been the subject of much talk this year.
Agriculture is one of the key

much talk this year.

Agriculture is one of the key talking points for public office seekers at the national and even at the statehouse levels. The overbalance of agriculture in Nebraska has been the subject of state and legislative concern for more than a decade. It caused creation of the State Resources division. This is an agency of state government whose sole function is to try to lure industry, and thus payrolls, into the state to balance the economy.

There is a Constitutional

to balance the economy.

There is a Constitutional amendment on the Nov. 8 ballot to permit cities and counties to take steps to try to make their localities attractive to industry. Both candidates for governor, Republican John Cooper, Humboldt, and Democrat Frank Morrison, Lincoln, are plugging for bigger industry in Nebraska.

It is expected this economy.

It is expected this economy balancing idea will be continued in the next decade.

#### Road Building

The State Highway department plans a lot of road building in the next two years, It reckons that there will be \$110 million worth of new construction, of which \$71 of hew construction, of which \$71 million would come from the Federal government and the re-mainder from cash receipts such as the levy on gasoline and li-

ccuse fees.

How the money will be spent and where will be decided later How the money will be spent and where will be decided later this fall by the Advisory State Highway commission. The commission now is holding area meetings getting sentiment of citizens on road needs. But the final determination will be made on the basis of the department's system for rating roads to determine which get priority. Overall, the Highway department expects to spend nearly \$143 million the next two years, including administrative costs, road maintenance and operation of truck weighing stations. This would compare with about \$137 million for the past two years.

#### **Budget Requests**

Gov. Dwight Burney has issued a directive to state department heads regarding state spending. Burney says if they want to lower budget requests for the next two years they should note why such cuts cannot be made now.

To be sought will be authority to close pools that do not comply with health department regulations. Inspections show, Filipi said, that only 48 percent of the pools carry the proper amount of chlorine.






