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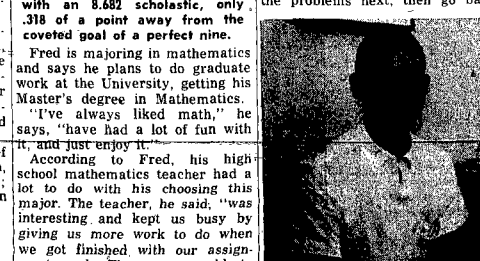

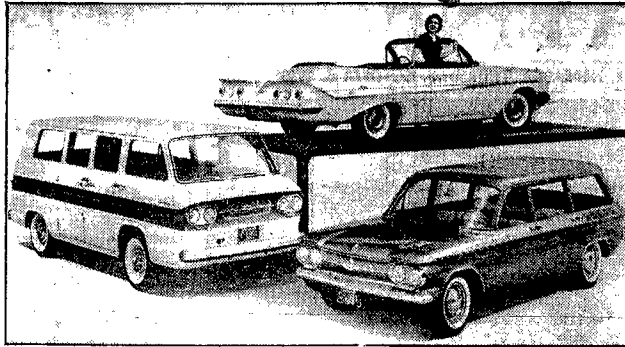

Wildcats Take 7-6 Conference Win From Doane Friday

The football forecasters won't crawl so far out on the limb this weekend after last week's Nebraska College conference outcomes.

Only Chadron State, with its 12-0 win over Nebraska Wesleyan, came out as expected, and Chadron comes to Wayne Saturday night for a toss-up scrap with the Wildcats.

Hastings dumped Peru, 19-7; Central Missouri humbled Kearney, 7-19, and Wayne startled Doane, 7-6.

Picking the Chadron-Wayne winner will be tough on the basis of records. Wayne's win over Doane balanced the Wildcat record at 2-2 for the season and 1-1 in the NCC. The Wildcats have scored 35 points to 79 by the opposition.

Chadron has won two of three, scoring 38 and giving up 33.

The Chadron-Wayne football rivalry, dating back to 1912, shows Chadron with a 21 to 14 edge in victories. In the past decade, however, the Wildcats have beaten the Eagles six of 10 times, including last year when Wayne spoiled Chadron's homecoming, 16-13, on a late field goal.

Wayne survived the Doane contest with only minor injuries except for Puetz's sprained ankle. Rod Tietz returned to duty after missing three games with a back injury. Because of the lay-off, Tietz went back to his end post after starting the season at quarterback.

Neither Doane nor Wayne moved with ease against alert defenses in their game at Crete Friday night. The first half went scoreless although both teams managed one major threat. Late in the second period Tietz intercepted a long Doane pass on the Doane 45. Nine plays took the Wildcats to the 18 where Skeeter Mahler's field goal attempt fell short.

A Tiger pass play, Ray Graves to Bob Armstrong, covered 51 yards as perfect blocking paved Armstrong's way until Bill Puetz, the last Wayne defender, eluded a blocker and hit Armstrong from the rear on the Wayne 25. This was the play that sprained Puetz's ankle. Doane ran out four plays before the half ended.

Late in the third quarter Wayne started a 64-yard drive that ended in the fourth period with Fullback Dick Chochon ramming the final yard to score. Mahler's kick was perfect.

Then Doane's Ron Barker took the Wayne kickoff on his 10 and returned it to score. The tying point was missed when Ray Best's kick was wide.

Wayne Drops 31-0 Conference Game To Pierce Friday

Wayne High's Blue Devils learned a lesson in football the hard way Friday night, absorbing a 31-0 shellacking by Pierce's hard-tackling and crisp-blocking Bluejays at WSTC's Memorial stadium.

The loss was Wayne's second in the Husker conference West division against one victory. The Blue Devils will travel to Neligh Friday for their fourth straight conference tilt. Neligh is winless in two league tilts.

Mark Gruett, a 175-pound senior halfback, was the Bluejay offensive leader. He scored two touchdowns on runs of 40 and 19 yards and had

several other runs which aided Pierce touchdown drives. Outstanding defensive work by Dennis Wragge and Doug Lesser put an effective damper on Wayne's passing attack and halted several Blue Devil threats.

Wayne was plagued by an evening of poor blocking and sloppy tackling. Pierce runners got off several good gains after it appeared they were trapped by Wayne tacklers. It was easily the poorest defensive performance by the Blue Devils all season.

The game was only 3½ minutes old when Pierce pushed across its first marker. Dick Zierke capped a 54-yard march with the opening kickoff by plunging the final yard. Gerald Retzlaff's placement for the extra point was low. Big plays in the drive were a 15-yard slant over left tackle by Gruett and a 16-yard pass from Zierke to Gruett.

A 48-yard run by Gerald Ehlers gave the Bluejays a 12-0 lead with 7:38 remaining in the second quarter. His slant over right tackle came after Duane Maas had recovered a Buster Likes fumble on the Pierce 46.

The winners scored two touchdowns in the final 2½ minutes of the first half to lead 25-0 at intermission. Gruett ran 40 yards for the first around left end and Retzlaff added the placement. Another Wayne fumble led to the fourth touchdown. Lesser recovered on Wayne's 44. Zierke then tossed a 21-yard pass to Wragge. Two plays lost six yards but Gruett then circled left end from 19 yards out for the tally.

The final touchdown came with the fourth quarter only slightly over a minute old. The scoring play was a Zierke-to-Wragge pass which covered 85 yards, 30 of them in the air.

This tally followed Wayne's most serious threat of the evening. The Blue Devils managed a first down on the Pierce 1 but a five-yard penalty for illegal procedure and stout Pierce defense prevented the score.

Surprisingly, Wayne outplayed the Bluejays 20-14. Three fumbles at key moments prevented the Blue Panthers from collecting at least one touchdown. Pierce held a 383-228 advantage in total yards from scrimmage.
