Over 10 Percent Of 1959 Support Corn Is Redeemed

The 1960 national corn crop is now estimated at four billion 182 million bushels—or four percent below the record 1959 production, according to the latest U. S. crop estimate received at the Wayne county ASC office.

The nationwide corn yield for 1950, as of Sept. 1, was estimated at 50 bushels in 1959 and a 10-year average of 41.6 bushels. Production of all wheat is estimated at one billion 368 million bushels. the second largest crop of record. It is more than a fifth larger than 1959 but six percent less than the record crop of 1958.

Polio

The Stafe Health Director, Dr. E. A. Rogers, says there has been an "unprecedented" low number of polio cases in Nebraska this year. Rogers said the low total is almost "miraculous." At this time last year 109 Nebraskans had been stricken with the disease as against 12 for a cordisease as against 12 for a cor-responding period in 1960.

He said the increasing number

responding period in 1960. He said the increasing number of people receiving anti-polio vaccime has helped cut the total. But, the doctor added, the 'notorious unpredictability' of the disease itself is a factor in the low rate. Just because there was a low incidence this year doesn't mean that Nebraskans should forget to take their shots, Rogers continued. Introduction of oral vaccine against polio, probably late next year, will probably result in a higher inoculation level, the doctor said. The new vaccine, to be taken as a pill, will supplement the type that is injected with a hypodermic needle.

Mental Cases

The Board of Control, which governs state institutions, is considering establishment of a new one. Board members are expected to ask the Legislature for funds to build an institution to care for "borderline mental" cases in children.

This institution would functionas a child guidance center for

for care.

Board members got into the problems publicly after a committee of state senators probed into the suicide death of a boy at the Kearney Boys Training School. It was brought out that the youth could not be helped at mental institutions, and had been transferred frequently.

Just how much the new institution would cost or where it would be located has not been decided. The Legislature would have the final say on establishment of the institution, its cost and where it would be situated. Some thought has been given to Western Ne brask a, possibly Scottsbluff, where there already is a mental health clinic operated by the state.
