# County Maintains **Traditional GOP** Status in Election

Status in Election

Wayne county voters maintained their traditional Republican domination in Tuesday's general election, following the example set by Nebraska as a whole.

Despite a record turnout in Wayne, the total vote was about 450 ballots below the record 4,-657 established in 1940. Tuesday's total of 4,205 ranks only fifth among those for the last seven presidential elections, it exceeds only the 1944 and 1948 totals. About 1,675 voters turned out in the three Wayne wards. The Second ward was the top politing place with 690 ballots cast. County voters gave Vice President Nixon about a 2,150 vote margin over Senator Jack Kennedy in the presidential race. Nixon, had 3,138 votes to 979 for Kennedy. Reflecting the traditional GOP domination of the county, Sen. Kennedy trailed all but two of the Democratic candidates for state offices. Nixon, on the other hand, led all Republican candidates for all of fices.

Incumbent Carl Curtis received a better than a 2½-1 margin from county voters in his bid for reelection to the Senate. Curtis to taled 2,981 to 1,087 for Democrat Robert Conrad, who was named to the ballot after the death of Gov. Ralph Brooks.

A reverse of the state outcome was provided in the county ballot for governor. Republican John Cooper, who was deteated by Democrat Frank Morrison, held a 2,644-1,344 margin in Wayne county. Republican candidates won majorities for all state offices from Wayne county voters. Gov. Dwight Burney, who was seeking re-election as lieutenant governor, and Secretary of State Frank Marsh drew the largest totals.



# Injury Season

As the corn picking season has gotten into full swing, more and more reports of deaths and injuries due to picker accidents have been made. Several people in the Wayne area have become victins of the pickers or power takeoffs over the

No far the victims in this area have been mare and only lost some fingers, a hand or. And this is fortunate, since many others have reported deaths due to picker mishaps.

It is really difficult to call the circumstances surrounding a picker injury accidental. Since nearly every operator of a picker knows the workings of the machine and its hazards, it seems more like premeditation when the operator is in-

more like premeditation when the operator is injured.

Tons of material have been distributed on the safe operation of corn pickers, different agencies have sponsored safe operation drives by putting labels on pickers in the danger spots to remind the operators and each year the news media report the accidents, which should be the only reminder necessary. But operators still continue to disregard safe practices.

Again this year we can only hope we don't lose any subscribers to corn pickers. We realize this is a cold-blooded business-type way to look at the situation, but perhaps if we do this, the picker operators will get their minds on business, and not treat their pickers as friends, but as business associates and respect them.

# City Hunting

We experienced a larger than average run on "No Hunting" signs this year and wonder what in the world went on during hunting season last year.

We asked many of the people buying the signs what their attitude toward hunters was going to be this year. Many simply said that they preferred to be asked before hunters began stalking their fields. In this way they could give the hunters the location of animals and could, in many cases, save the hunter a lot of work by telling them where they had last seen birds.

In effect, it is too bad that hunting isn't allowed in the city limits. Then farmers could try and record license numbers of inconsiderate hunters and in this way, find out their names and addresses. Then the farmers could put on their heaviesr boots, come to town and trudge over their city brothers' manicured lawns, fire their guns next to his house, shoot up his garage and eat their lunch on his patio, throwing sacks and paper about, and in general have a ball.

This might not pay for the hog or steer they

At any rate, hunters are finding more and more "No Hunting" signs and should learn to respect them. Generally these posted areas can be hunted by asking the farmer first.

Nebraskans smoked a lot of cigarets during the first 10 months of this year. At four cents tax per pack at the state level, they have paid \$5.7 million in taxes to the state so far this year, at a rate of about a half million dollars per month.

Since the enactment of the cigaret tax law in 1947, Nebraskans have paid \$55.6 million to the state as tax on their smokes. The rate was three cents per pack until 1957 when the Legislature upped the levy to four cents.

It is important not to overfeed bred sows. Over-fat sows tend to produce fewer and weaker pigs and to crush more at farrowing than sows held in medium condition, according to Leo Lucas, Extension animal husbandman at the college of agriculture. Gilts should be fed to gain 60 to 1,00 pounds and sows 50 to 80 pounds from breeding to farrowing. Most of the gain should occur during the final one-third of the gestation period. At this time, the energy content of the ration should be increased by adding another pound of grain.
