

School Board Asks Sidewalk On 4th, 5th from Sherman

The Wayne Board of Education met with Dave Ingalls of Marshall Nursery, Arlington, Monday night to discuss the landscaping of the lawn around the new elementary school.

In other action, Dr. L. A. Johnson moved that the Board of Education go on record asking the Wayne city council to start action on having sidewalks installed on both sides of Fourth and Fifth streets from Sherman to the school property.

Supt. Westergard said student teachers will take two weeks of "on the job training" in the Wayne schools from Nov. 29 to Dec. 9.

The Board also approved an extra \$25 for Mrs. Arnold Maurer, school nurse. This brought her pay to \$125 for examining 70 students.

Also approved was a bid of \$246.44 from Merchant Oil Co. for four tires for the school bus.

It was brought to the Board's attention that since the elementary students are not in the high school building, they might consider the removal of the school stop signs at each corner of the building.

Warn Operators to Observe Parking Regulations Here

Following the complaint of property owners on Windom street near 10th, the city council directed city police to crack down on parking violations throughout the city.

Property owners complained that they were unable to get out of their drives because of the cars parked too near the driveway; that their cars were moved in order to park more cars; other cars were being parked too near stop signs on traffic so as to interfere with traffic movement around corners.

The council said that regular checks will be made in known trouble spots and that every rule of parking will be observed or tickets will be issued.

A check on Windom street by a Herald reporter Tuesday night revealed a car parked within three feet of a stop sign, seven cars parked heading the wrong direction from 10th to 11th streets and four cars parked over two feet from the curb between the same streets.

New Engineering Contract Gets Council's First Okay

Wayne city council has tentatively approved a new contract with B. H. Backlund and Associates for engineering services. The new contract calls for the payment of \$100 a month to the engineering firm with work to be paid for by established hourly rates.

The lone difference was on the controversial initiative proposal to abolish the State Board of Education and to provide for election of state education commissioner. County voters supported this proposal 2,090 to 1,748, although it was defeated on a statewide basis.

County voters also approved the other eight amendment proposals, which won majorities throughout the state and apparently satisfied the constitutional requirement for 35 percent of the total vote.

The council, in taking action to the request of the Board of Education to remove the stop signs at the corner of the high school and replace them with "Slow School" signs. More on this can be found in the Board of Education story on page one of this issue.

The council also approved the contracts for the sewer and paving districts, a formality for bonding history.

A change order of \$301.00 was granted in the contract with the Cornhusker Well and Supply Co. to pay them for "Y" connections used in putting in sewer. The connections had not been included in the original letting.

Greg Kane was granted a building permit to erect a 24 x 40 frame building on the center 60' of Crawford and Brown's Outlots at an estimated cost of \$11,500.

Incumbent Alfred Sydow and newcomer Leland Thompson won seats on the Wayne County Public Power district board of directors in Tuesday's non-political balloting.

They were the victors in the three-way race for the directorship. Thompson will succeed Ed Grubb, who trailed in Tuesday's voting. The totals were: Sydow, 2,810; Thompson, 2,426, and Grubb, 1,973.

Sydow was the top vote-getter in 16 of the county's 17 precincts. He and Grubb trailed Thompson in Sherman precinct by 10 votes. Thompson ran second in nine of the 17 precincts in addition to winning Sherman.

County Maintains Traditional GOP Status in Election

Wayne county voters maintained their traditional Republican domination in Tuesday's general election, following the example set by Nebraska as a whole.

Despite a record turnout in 1950, the total vote was about 450 ballots below the record 4,657 established in 1940. Tuesday's total of 4,205 ranks only fifth among those for the last seven presidential elections. It exceeds only the 1944 and 1948 totals.

About 1,675 voters turned out in the three Wayne wards. The Second ward was the top polling place with 690 ballots cast.

County voters gave Vice President Nixon about a 2,150 vote margin over Senator Jack Kennedy in the presidential race. Nixon had 3,138 votes to 979 for Kennedy. Reflecting the traditional GOP domination of the county, Sen. Kennedy trailed all but two of the Democratic candidates for state offices.

Incumbent Carl Curtis received a better than a 2 1/2-1 margin from county voters in his bid for reelection to the Senate. Curtis totaled 2,961 to 1,087 for Democrat Robert Conrad, who was named to the ballot after the death of Gov. Ralph Brooks.

A reverse of the state outcome was provided in the county ballot for governor. Republican John Cooper, who was defeated by Democrat Frank Morrison, held a 2,644-1,344 margin in Wayne county.

Republican candidates won majorities for all state offices from Wayne county voters. Gov. Dwight Burney, who was seeking reelection as lieutenant governor, and Secretary of State Frank Marsh drew the largest totals.

Nixon President By WS And Prep Vote

Wayne State and Wayne Prep students, voting in mock elections this week, bucked the national result on the presidency.

College students gave Richard Nixon nearly a 2 to 1 margin over John Kennedy, and Prep students went 3-1 for the Republican.

Social science students in the freshman through senior classes at Prep voted 72 for Nixon, 24 for Kennedy.

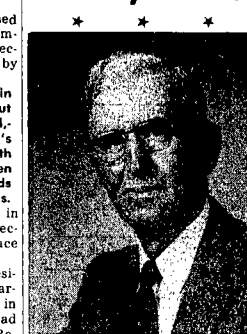
In other balloting they gave: Curtis 59 for U. S. Senator to Conrad's 37; Brock 56 for congressman to Beerman's 40; Cooper 61 for governor to Morrison's 35; Burney 72 for lieutenant governor to Otto's 21.

In the state school commissioner amendment, the students were 76 against returning to the elective system, 24 for the amendment.

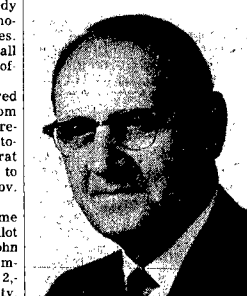
C. of C. Meeting Dec. 5

Schroeder-Claussen Race in Doubt; Canvass Set Friday

Wayne county residents will have to wait until at least Friday before they learn who will represent them in the next session of the Legislature.

Only four votes separated Clarence Schroeder, Hoskins, and incumbent Peter Claussen. Legally after Tuesday's balloting in Colfax, Stanton and Wayne counties, which comprise the Sixteenth Legislative district, Claussen has the slight margin of 4,826-4,822 over Schroeder.

The final results cannot be determined until nearly 400 absentee and disabled voters' ballots are counted in the official election canvass, which will begin at 9 a.m. Friday. It is not known whether the canvass can be completed that day. County Clerk C. A. Bard said Wayne county has approximately 190 of these mail ballots.

Schroeder received a 2-1 margin from Wayne county voters. He trailed the incumbent in Stanton and Colfax counties. The table below gives a breakdown of the unofficial totals in the district's three counties.

Schroeder carried 15 of Wayne county's 17 precincts in building up his 2-1 margin. He lost Leslie and Strahan precincts and gained only a four-vote margin in Wayne's Second ward.

Beermann Apparent Winner Over L. Brock for Congress

Republican Ralph Beermann, Dakota City, appeared Wednesday to have been successful in his attempt to unseat Democrat Larry Brock for Nebraska's Third district seat in Congress.

With 424 of the district's 496 precincts reporting, Beermann held about a 1,600-vote margin.

Wayne county voters, for the first time in three elections, gave their support to Brock's opponent. The incumbent carried the county against Republican Bob Harrison in both 1956 and 1958.

Beermann received 2,372 votes in Wayne county to Brock's 1,688. The large turnout at the polls apparently worked to Beermann's advantage. Brock received about 150 more votes in Wayne county Tuesday than he did in his victory over Harrison in 1958. However, Beermann received nearly 900 more than Harrison received in that election.

Beermann, in running up his 700-vote margin in Wayne county, carried 15 of 17 precincts, losing only in Logan and Leslie. He had only a two-vote margin in Sherman, 81-79.

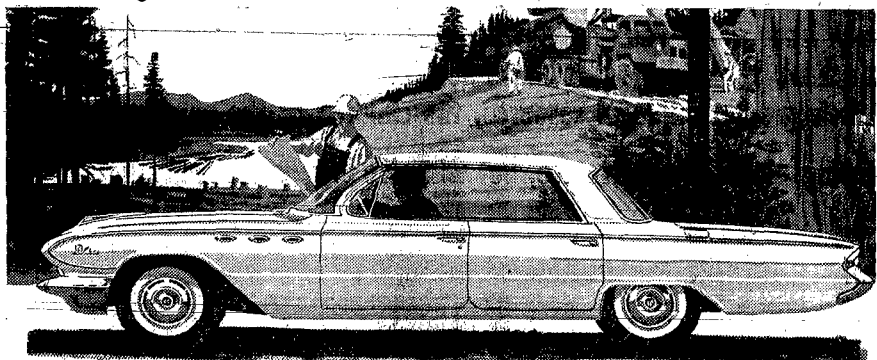

## Wildcats Earn 2nd Place Tie in Defeating Kearney

Wayne State started Kearney State, 19-7, at Kearney Saturday and moved into a second-place tie with Kearney and Hastings. The weekend grid warfare closed conference play for all NCC schools.

Wayne's 4-2 conference mark and high finish upset pre-season forecasts of some observers who consigned the Wildcats to sixth or seventh place in the seven-team circuit.

Coach Gwynn Christensen tabbed the win over Kearney as a whole-team effort, adding that "the boys really wanted this one." He hesitated to single out any players for special praise except for Rod Tietz's sparkplug efforts to keep the team fired up. This was a typical role for the Wayne senior end who has been elected the team's most valuable player for two sea-

sons.) Statistics show the teams nearly even in most respects except in fumbles. Kearney lost four of its six bobbles, one of the losses setting up a Wayne drive that went 33 yards for a touchdown. Wayne lost only one of its three fumbles.

Kearney started out in earnest after the opening kickoff and marched to the Wayne 33 before stubborn defense stopped the Antelopes. The Wildcats found the going tough, had to punt, then Kearney also failed to move, finally setting Wayne to its one-yard line on a punt.

Again Wayne failed to move. Kearney took over on its 22 after partially blocking a Wildcat punt. An eight-yard Kearney loss was offset by a 15-yard Wayne penalty, and Steve Kraus scooted 15 yards for the first touchdown. Gary Liesenfeld converted.

Wayne engineered its first scoring drive in the second quarter, starting from the mid-stripe. Quarterback Larry McHenry hit Tietz for a 35-yard pass play in the drive. Two more plays reached the five, and from there McHenry went into the end zone on a right end keeper. The half ended 7-6 for Kearney.

Wayne took advantage of Kearney's fumble on the first play of the second half and moved 33 yards to score. Dick Chochon plunging the last two. Again Dave Kracl's kick sailed wide.

The Antelopes never got out of their own territory in the third quarter, which ended with Wayne again threatening on the 11 after a push from the 43. Chochon scored from a yard out early in the final period, raising his season total to 54 points. Kracl's kick was good.

Kearney moved to the Wayne 16 late in the game, but ran out of downs after missing three passes.

# EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

You may not agree with an editorial . . . but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

## Ambassador 'Off Base'

Ambassador Val Peterson, in remarks at the WSTC Golden Anniversary banquet, posed some thoughts Wayne citizens would do well to ponder. On the other hand, we consider some of his statements "way off base."

It is unfortunate Mr. Peterson had to make his untimely and misinformed statements during WSTC's Golden Anniversary. To many local citizens it was the one dark blot on an otherwise brilliant and well-planned celebration.

The cooperation of local businessmen and taxpayers with the college in this observance was indeed a good indication of the importance the local citizenry places on the institution. This importance was also recognized by surrounding towns who sent their high school bands to parade in rain-soaked uniforms or, like Norfolk, extended the courtesy of its historical museum to provide many of the antiques for the anniversary displays.

Ambassador Peterson was right in saying Wayne has "leaned on the college." This is no doubt true of any town's attitude toward its largest business. But Wayne has also offered its support to the institution in a multitude of ways — student loan funds, scholastic and athletic scholarships, promotion of the college and its activities, etc.

We also agree with Mr. Peterson that the city should enact zoning around the campus to maintain desirable surroundings. We would go one step further and suggest, as we have several times in recent years, that the city be thoroughly zoned to maintain property values and bring about orderly expansion.

When Mr. Peterson had the brass to suggest local merchants take to their business houses with a paint brush, it was evident he had not even bothered to make a trip through the downtown area. If he had, he might have made note of the fact no fewer than 26 businesses had undergone rather extensive remodeling in the past 10 years.

Admittedly, there are still a few eyesores in the business district. But we feel Wayne's record on Main street building maintenance is well above that of most other comparable cities.

His suggestion that the city establish parks near the campus also points up the failure of Mr. Peterson to familiarize himself with local facts before voicing his opinions. Wayne has established two parks within two blocks of the college campus within the past 10 years, bringing the total in this area to three. A fourth, though not owned by the city, is maintained by the local park crew. We doubt that there is a serious need for more than four parks in the area at present.

The Ambassador was wrong again when he suggested the city acquire land near the college for a future high school. Any thoughtful study would be bound to come up with a location nearer the town's center of population or in the west, where future municipal expansion is most probable.

It is good for a town to receive some objective criticism once in a while. There are many things which can be improved with little effort, but which are overlooked by local people in the bustle of everyday activities. It is unfortunate, however, that so prominent a person as Ambassador Peterson should come to the city and make haphazard statements which have no basis in fact.

## Capitol News . . . State Planes Prove Problem For Each Governor Since '41

Lincoln—A ruckus over use of the state plane is not new in Nebraska politics. It has come up with every governor who has been in office since 1941, some to a bigger degree than others.

Twice Gov. Dwight Burney has been involved in a political fight in pre-election maneuvering about the plane. Once, he fired State Aeronautics Director Jack Obbink for taking Robert Kennedy, brother of John Kennedy, to Kansas City without telling him.

Democrats then said Burney himself used the plane in 1953 with a state senator to make a trip to South Dakota to sell some lots he owned there. Burney said that was right but he had the permission of the then governor, Robert Crosby, and the plane was on state business anyway.

State Departments own and operate nine aircraft, not including National Guard planes. Titles to seven are held by the Aeronautics Department, including three helicopters.

The Game Commission and the Highway Department own planes additionally. Often, departments rent aircraft for special work.

It may be the fighting may bring legislation to better spell out who may use the state airplanes, under what conditions, and who has final authority in such matters.

Now, the governor by law can direct usage of planes owned by the Aeronautics department but it is not clear as to his jurisdiction over craft operated by other departments. The game and highway departments, however, said they report to the chief executive on their use of planes.

## Graveled Roads

Nebraska, by the end of the current two-year period, will have converted 800 miles of gravelled highway to dustless surfacing. That's the picture painted by Acting State Engineer John Hossack.

Hossack says every mile of gravel improved to hard surfacing saves the state \$300 in maintenance costs. The 800 miles will represent a savings of \$240,000, Hossack said, which can be used for surfacing of more roads.

In 1952, there were 5,030 miles of gravel highways on the state highway system, Hossack said. At the end of the current two-year program the mileage will be cut to 2,450, he added.

"We have come a long way with the revenues we have had available to use," the acting engineer commented.

Hossack said one of the reasons the state is hesitant to add new roads to the state system is the cost of maintaining the new mileage "which may set us back a number of years in getting a gravel free state system."

## Sleigh Ride

There are signs Christmas isn't far away. The State Railway Commission authorized a Columbus firm to give sleigh rides to boys and girls in any Nebraska city. The sleigh, motorized, has artificial reindeer appearing to pull it.

## Animal Ailments

Hog cholera has not been a big problem in Nebraska the last two years says Dr. F. E. Ziegenbein, state veterinarian.

Ziegenbein says this is despite the fact there have been a lot of diseased feeder pigs imported into Nebraska by bootleg methods.

But he adds, "Our field men have been on guard at many ports of entry and have made it so miserable for the bootleggers that they had to change the methods."

that "we are nearly helpless to completely stop the illicit importation of swine and livestock under our present law."

The veterinarian also noted that hog raisers have been "somewhat negligent" in the vaccination of their animals for hog cholera.

"Should we have a general outbreak," he said, "I question if we would have enough vaccine to supply the demand."

Ziegenbein commented that erysipelas in swine, however, is no longer a major factor in the production of pork and although there are products for prevention of this disease, as well as cholera, the hog raiser has not immunized to the extent he should for this disease either.

## Cigaretts

Nebraskans smoked a lot of cigarettes during the first 10 months of this year. At four cents tax per pack at the state level, they have paid \$3.7 million in taxes to the state so far this year, at a rate of about a half million dollars per month.

Since the enactment of the cigarette tax law in 1947, Nebraskans have paid \$55.6 million to the state as tax on their smokes. The rate was three cents per pack until 1957 when the Legislature upped the levy to four cents.

## FARM BRIEF

Research conducted the past six years by the University of Nebraska has indicated that chemical desiccants are effective in reducing moisture for harvest of grain sorghum in both wet and dry years. Early harvesting may avoid costly losses and will result in better quality grain.

Treatments were made when 90 percent of the grain was well colored or when the moisture content of the seed was near 40 percent. However, it is advisable to delay treatments until the moisture content of the grain is near 30 percent.

It is important not to overfeed bred sows. Over-fat sows tend to produce fewer and weaker pigs and to crush more at farrowing than sows held in medium condition, according to Leo Lucas, Extension animal husbandman at the college of agriculture. Gilts should be fed to gain 60 to 100 pounds and sows 50 to 80 pounds from breeding to farrowing. Most of the gain should occur during the final one-third of the gestation period. At this time, the energy content of the ration should be increased by adding another pound of grain.

## County Agent's Column

### FOUR ROOTERS' DAYS

Four special swine days will be held in Nebraska this winter. The four area "Rooters' Days" will be held in lieu of the annual statewide Rooters' Day at the college of agriculture, which is being discontinued this year.

The schedule: Jan. 25, Wayne; Jan. 26, Columbus; Feb. 1, Syracuse; and Feb. 2, Beatrice.

Swine producers will be briefed on current research in swine production, including such areas as nutrition, management, breeding and disease prevention and control, according to Leo Lucas, Extension animal husbandman at the college. New practices in swine raising also will be discussed.

More detailed information on the four-area Rooters' Days will be available at a later date.
