# EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

You may not agree with an editorial... but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

## Split Tickets

Although Wayne county again went Republican, party lines across the state and nation apparently couldn't hold voters, either Republican or Democratic. The vote, such as in Nebraska, was split, with voters voting for "the man" and not the party. Here we filled the state offices with Republicans and then elected a Democrat governor. Governor-elect Morrison has been quoted as saying he also votes for the man and not the party. Statements like this are excellent for raising the hackles of any loyal party worker. As one straight ticket voter put it, "It's like hiring a man to dig a ditch, and then taking his shovel away." They feel to do a good job a person must have members of his own party in office with him, thus giving him and his party more power to carry out their platform.

Split ticket voters counter with the statement that if the best man is elected, he will do the best job and opposite party members can keep a cross-check on each other. At any rate, the next few years should prove interesting, particularly in the White House. A sidelight to the presidential election developed here when we received an anonymous phone call after last week's Herald was published, informing us that Kennedy had been elected president. Our issue carried all the local election highlights, from the power district directors through Congress. We thought the large daily papers and the television stations did a fairly thorough job of reporting the presidential race, since their facilities are somewhat larger than ours. However, they didn't seem too greatly interested in Wayne county as a voting body. But for anyone who might have missed it, Senator Kennedy did defeat Vice President Nixon for the presidency.

## Last Breakneck Campaign?

Was this year's presidential campaign the last in which candidates will tour at breakneck speed for months on end, exist on a subsistence basis so far as sleep and food are concerned, wear themselves and all the many members of their entourages out and perhaps exhaust the minds and tempers of the electorate? That, of course, is something of a rhetorical question and only time and events can provide the answer. But many politicians, newsmen and

## County Agent's Column

**Milo A Good Buy**  
Since 1957, milo has taken its place as one of the important crops on Nebraska's farms. But many livestock producers and feeders have been skeptical of its value as a livestock feed. Such skepticism is not justified. Numerous feeding trials in Nebraska, as well as in other states,

established the feeding value of milo in comparison to the feeding value of corn. Milo is worth 90 to 95 percent as much as corn for feeding cattle, 95 percent for hogs and 100 percent for sheep. The advantage for milo over corn is in the price. When corn is selling for \$1 a bushel, its price per cwt. is \$1.79. If you consider milo worth 90 percent that of corn, then you can afford to pay \$1.61 per cwt. for milo when corn is selling for \$1 a bushel. However, milo is expected to be at an average price of \$1.40 per cwt. This gives milo an advantage of 21 cents per cwt. over corn as feed for cattle and even more for hogs and sheep. For cattle and hog feed, milo should be coarsely ground or rolled. For sheep there is no advantage in grinding milo.

## Capitol News

# "Switched Republican" is 8th Democratic Governor

Nebraska's new governor, Democrat Frank Morrison, Lincoln, hit the charmed circle after 20 years in politics. Morrison, 55-year-old attorney, the state's thirty-first chief executive and the eighth Democrat, takes office in January. Until then, he says, he doesn't plan to make any major appointments.

Morrison worked in the Young Democratic organization 20 years ago, and first ran for a major office in 1948, seeking a Congressional seat. The next election he tried for governor but lost in the primary. In 1954 the attorney tried again for Congress, lieutenant governor in 1956 and in 1958 lost a whirl of the U. S. Senate post, now held by Republican Roman Hruska.

Morrison admitted in general election campaigning that he was "raised a Republican" but switched parties in the 1930s. He added that he never votes a straight ticket.

Shortly after his election, Morrison conferred with Republican Gov. Dwight Burney and made the rounds of the statehouse, getting set for a "smooth transition" in January. Morrison carried few counties in the general election and won the chief executive's post by big margins in populous Lancaster and Douglas counties.

**Accidents**  
There were 41,670 industrial accidents in Nebraska last year, an increase of 4,322. That's the report from Albert Arms, presiding judge of the Nebraska Workmen's Compensation court. The total ranked second only to the 1945-46 fiscal year when there were 41,412 mishaps. During the 1959-60 fiscal year which ended in July, Arms reported, benefits paid out to those injured amounted to \$4.2 million, compared with \$1.5 million in the 1945-46 period.

Part of the boost in accidents, the judge said in an annual report, can be traced to mislead construction work in Eastern Nebraska. He also felt that employers, in the Cornhusker state may be doing a more thorough job of turning in accidents since most of the boost involved less serious types of mishaps.

**Budget Hearings**  
Budget hearings, jointly by Republican Gov. Dwight Burney and Democratic Governor-elect Frank Morrison set the stage for government spending the next two years. After the hearings both men will make recommendations to the next Legislature. One of the big problems will be what to do about higher education which is fighting the salary problem yet and competition from other schools for faculty. The University of Nebraska is seeking \$5.6 million more in tax funds and the four teachers colleges at Wayne, Chadron, Peru and Kearney, \$2.7 million more.

**Switchover**  
It is expected there will be considerable traffic between Nebraska and Washington, D. C., in the coming months. Coming home will be the flock of Republicans who have served under the administration of President Eisenhower. Replacing them are expected to be several Nebraska Democrats. One Nebraskan already has a high position in the administration of John Kennedy. He is Ted Soransen, named special counsel to Kennedy. Soransen, Lincoln, and Robert Kennedy have been top advisors to the President-elect.

Among those Republicans returning will be Secretary of Interior Fred Seaton and Ambassador to Denmark Val Peterson.
