Sample Farm Survey in Area

The 1960 sample survey of agri-culture will be conducted in Wayne county during the next several weeks, it was announced dody by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce.

The 1960 sample survey of agriculture will callect information on ownership and size of forms, acreage and harvest of crops, and livestock production and inventories. Information will be collected also on farm equipment, farm income, construction of new farm buildings, farm contracts and farm operator debts. This survey will supplement information collected in the 1959 census of agriculture.

Farms in the county which will be covered in the 1960 sample survey of agriculture were selected at random under the Census Bureau's scientific sampling program to provide a representative cross-section of all farms in the country. Information collected locally will be combined with that collected in combined with that collected in collected rates of the country to provide national estimates.

Going on for nine or ten weeks, it has an increasingly unsettling effect. The business of the nation and the world seems to stand still while the conflict grows louder and angrier."

In an era which is forever gone there was compelling reason for prolonged campaigning. Means xof communication and transportation were primitive by comparison with those of today. If a candidate was to be seen and heard he had to hit a long, long trail. But now planes and trains which him about in almost no time. Radio and television are at his beck and call. It is for this reason, primarily, that many look on the traditional type of campaigning as an unhealthy, unnecessary and excessively expensive anachronism.

Moreover, the wear and tear on the candi-

Moreover, the wear and tear on the candidates is fearsome. Mr. Childs quoted President-clect Kennedy as saying, at the end of 14 hours of grinding work. "I can't imagine why Adlai Stevenson ever thought he wanted to do this for a third time." And he tells of a weary Mr. Nixon, after 20 hours of campaigning, trying to speak at midnight to an airport crowd through a faulty loudspeaker.

Moreover, in Mr. Childs' view, much of this effort is entirely wasted. He writes, "The outstanding conspicuous example is the airport rally. Most airports are five to 10 miles from the center of town. If the organization works hard it is possible to get a crowd of a few thousand out to hear the candidate. ... But he will be talking to the faithful and the converts who have long since determined to vote for 'him.' There is small political profit in that.






