

TWO TIED IN PRINCESS VOTE

Impossible to Have Dial Phones in Next Two Years

The Northwestern Bell Telephone company has announced the beginning of a major service improvement program affecting Wayne telephone customers according to W. J. Schulz, manager for the company.

He said the company has been reviewing the matter of dial service in Wayne for sometime. Problems of future growth of Wayne and consequently, phone use, must be considered as well as the integrating of the system into the nation wide dial network which is now moving ahead rapidly.

"As plans are completed for this dial changeover, we will inform the people just as rapidly as definite information is secured," said Schulz. "With the amount of time required for preliminary work, the changeover to dial in Wayne cannot possibly be completed in less than 1 1/2 to 2 years if we could make the decision at this given time."

Christmas Mailing Suggestions Made

Wayne Postmaster, Don Wightman, offers the following suggestions for the Christmas mailing season: (1) Mail early and often. Deposit mail as early in the day as you can, for out going dispatch. (2) Write clearly. Include street number or rural route number in the address when mail is to be delivered in Wayne or other towns that have city delivery service. (3) Place your return address in upper left hand corner of parcel and letters. This makes it possible to return the piece to you if you have an incorrect address on it. It is amazing how many letters wind up in the dead letter office during Christmas time, because of no return address. (4) Wrap your Christmas parcels so they will not be damaged. Use address on ONE side only. Write address on the parcel wrapping. Do not use stickers. These may run off and then you have a lost parcel. (5) If you are sending large quantities of letters, ask the clerk at the window for "LOCAL" and "OUT OF TOWN" labels. The youngsters in bundles and place the paper label under the string.

Wind Damages Buildings and Grandstand at Fairgrounds

Although the heavy snow missed the Wayne area Monday, the wind took its toll. The most serious damage in the county was at the fair grounds in Wayne where the wind ripped the roof from the grandstand and smashed it into the agricultural building behind the stands. One section of the roof stood on edge and looked as if it had been sawed down into the ag building, smashing it. Light wires and power lines that cross the area were also broken down.

Parts of the metal roof were found blown entirely away from the fairgrounds. Most of the other wind damage through the area was confined to shingles and some outbuilding damage. Highways and streets remained clear and dry. In downtown Wayne, there was some concern over the Christmas decorations, but Chamber Secretary Ken Parke said the only loss was two hells and a few boughs of the evergreen rope.

Council Changes Speeds on Main

In taking action on a speed limit ordinance Tuesday night the city council found it necessary to name a street first. The ordinance, No. 561, put back five blocks of Main street under the 35 mile per hour speed limit that had been under the 30 mile per hour limit.

The new ordinance now calls for the 30 mile per hour zone to start at the junction of Main and 7th Street to the city limits. Going south, the 30 mile per hour limit now starts at the intersection of Main and Clark street.

For those of you not familiar with Clark Street, it is the newly named street one block long, that fronts the Morris Machine Shop. The council also discussed the sidewalk situation on 4th and 5th Streets from Sherman to the school property with no definite action taken.

Also up for discussion was a plan for putting up more street lights in the city and plans were made to study the project. In other action, the council heard a request by Loren Ellis to remodel half of the building at 107 W. 3rd Street to serve as a barber shop.

Sheep Clinic and Sale Set Dec. 10

Wayne area sheep producers will have an opportunity to learn more about three major sheep disease problems at a sheep health clinic scheduled for Dec. 10 at the College of Agriculture, University of Nebraska, according to Harold Ingalls, Wayne county agent.

Ingalls said the discussions will be held on scabies, external and internal sheep parasites and the situation on "scrapies." Scrapies is a relatively new disease that affects a sheep's nervous system. The clinic will get underway at 10:15 a.m. It will be followed by the 1960 annual bred ewe sale at 1:00 p.m. sponsored by the Nebraska registered sheep breeders association. This event, also to be held on the Ag campus, will feature an auction of ewes, representing seven breeds - Hampshire, Suffolk, Shropshire, Southdown, Cheviot, Corriedale and Dorset.

Voting Still Open For Girls in 17 Area Communities

Ballots were pouring into Wayne last week in voting to determine who will be NE Nebraska's Yuletide Princess.

At least one candidate had been named from 15 of the 17 towns included in the contest when the first tabulation of ballots was made Saturday noon. This was after only one class of voting.

Wayne merchants are offering \$750 in prizes to girls between 8 and 17 years of age. The \$100 grand prize will go to the girl who receives the most votes in the balloting which ends Dec. 24. Second Rehearsal For Messiah Sunday

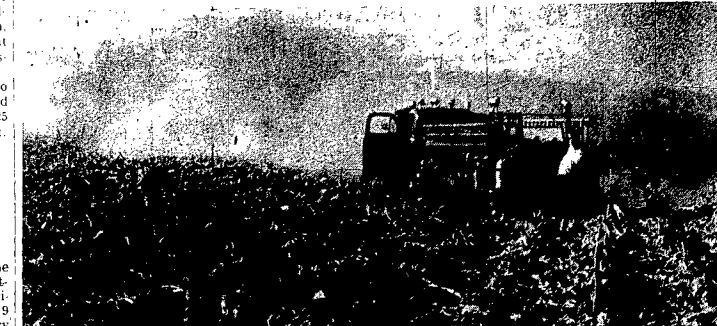
The second rehearsal of the 1960 "Messiah" chorus at Wayne State is scheduled for 2:30 p.m. Sunday in the administration building auditorium.

Capitol News Advisory Hiway Commission To Continue Heavy Influence

The state's Advisory Highway commission will continue to have heavy influence on road building plans under Governor-elect Frank Morrison. Morrison says he even intends to give the commission, a seven-member group, more executive authority than it has had.

Former Republican Gov. Victor Anderson first began bestowing the effect of executive authority to the commission when he said he would abide by commission decisions except in unusual cases.

Democratic Gov. Ralph G. Brooks did not change the status of the commission. Now Morrison, also a Democrat, doesn't plan any drastic changes either.

Power of the commission has been increasing over the years even though it was originally established to advise the governor and state engineer.

Morrison says the governor has certain duties regarding road construction in Nebraska and he doesn't intend to shirk these. But, he adds that "from a practical standpoint, states with executive type commissions have done a better job of road building than we have."

Establishment of the commission took a heavy load off the governor and state engineer in hearing problems by delegations wanting road improvements.

This summer the commission held a series of informational meetings over the state, taking the commission to the people. Everyone involved said the exchange of ideas was mutually beneficial to both highway planners and those wanting road improvements.





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County Agent's Column

Good Timber Prices In Eastern Nebraska

Log buyers are now active in eastern Nebraska, according to Dick Garrit, District Extension forester, Lincoln. Species most wanted by the buyers include black walnut, hickory and basswood, Garrit stated.

The market is used primarily for making veneer and lumber for furniture, the oak for tight cooperage (barrels) and basswood for plywood and other uses.

Prices being paid for prime walnut logs suitable for veneer have been as high as \$400 per thousand board feet, the University of Nebraska staff member said. This means that a good tree 20 inches in diameter with at least 16 feet of clear trunk could bring as much as \$80. Prices for oak and basswood do not come up to that for walnut, but are considerably higher than in recent years, he noted.

Anyone having trees ready for marketing should seek counsel from foresters, Garrit advised. Bids should be received from two or more buyers before the sale is made. Timber can be a valuable crop, but many landowners have had little experience in managing and marketing it, he pointed out.

Interested persons can contact county Extension agents or district foresters, he concluded.

Three "Best Buys" For Farmers Cited

Credit, fertilizer and electricity are the three "best buys" for farmers, according to Director Glenn E. Heitz of FIC's cooperative bank services. A recent USDA study shows, he says, that "for every \$1,000 of working capital added by a farmer to his operation, he received a return of from \$350 to \$400. Recent research, he says, "shows that the last dollar's worth of fertilizer the average farmer actually used on crops and pastured returned an average of \$2.93 per acre." And "Farm output per man hour has more than doubled since 1940," Heitz said. "Thanks in part to farmers increasing by 2.8 times their use of electrical power. Cost per kilowatt in 1949 has dropped from 4.3 cents in 1940 to only 2.6 cents."

Otto Named.

State Sen. Norman Otto, Kearney, is busy at his new job - administrative assistant to Governor-elect Frank Morrison even though Morrison doesn't take office until January. Otto is working out of an office in a downtown Lincoln hotel as Morrison prepares for his administration.

He has been a state senator since 1935 and previously had been a school superintendent, contractor and farmer.

Otto will work not only as Morrison's top aide, but as a liaison between the new governor and the Legislature, which will be predominantly Republican in makeup, although senators are elected on non-political tickets.

The Kearney man was a well liked member of the Legislature where he was considered to have a good sense of humor and to be a hard worker. Otto was defeated in a bid for lieutenant governor in the May 10 primary by Edward A. Dosek, Lincoln, who later withdrew and Otto was appointed to run in the general election.

In the Nov. 8 general election, Otto was beaten by Republican Gov. Dwight Burney who was re-elected to another term as lieutenant governor in January.

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
Apply Rabbit Repellent To Tree Plantings Now

Rabbit repellent should be applied to tree plantings now if they are to be protected this winter. Several products are available for use in protecting trees from rabbits. The most effective seem to be those containing thiram. These included Arasap 22S and SFM and Penco animal repellent. Other effective products are ZJP and Ringwood repellent. These, however, have been reported to be somewhat injurious to evergreen species.

These repellents can be applied either by brushing on the tree or as a spray application. The material should completely cover small trees, and on larger trees the bark should be treated to a height that rabbits might reach during periods of heaviest snow.
