Annual 'Messiah' Scheduled Sunday at Rice Auditorium

The Wayne State Teachers College music department will present its twenty-third annual performance of "The Messiah" Sunday night, a major event of the college's fifteenth anniversary year.

Directed by Professor Russel Anderson, head of the college fine arts division, the chorus will number about 275, accompanied by an orchestra of 50. Dr. Benjamin Bernstein directs the orchestra.

Presentation of the oratorio will begin at 8 p.m. in the Rice Memorial Building. Joining the college in sponsorship is the Wayne Kiwanis Club, whose members will assist in stage arrangements and ushering. Admission is 50 cents for adults and high school students, 25 cents for children.

The soloists include two Wayne State music graduates, a present music student, and an Omaha pastor who has gained renown for his singing gospel.

The Rev. John W. Boehr, a member of the Grace Bible Institute faculty in Omaha, will sing the tenor solos. He has sung "The Messiah" solos numerous times and is scheduled to do so again this year with the Omaha Symphonic Chorus. He is a regular soloist at First Congregational Church in Omaha.

The soprano soloist, Mrs. Cletus Sharer, Wayne (formerly Vona La Wilson), was a 1959 graduate of WSTC and sang the "Messiah" solos in 1959.

Mrs. Richard Glidden (formerly Clarice Nesson, Hartington), now teaching at Bayard, Ia., was a 1955 WSTC graduate and sang "Messiah" solos that year. She will do the contralto solos.

James Elsberry, Wausa, a senior at Wayne State, will sing the bass solos. He has sung in the college choir four years and also has performed as a soloist and member of vocal groups at many local and out-of-town functions.

Pianists for the oratorio will be Judith Maurer, sophomore from Humphrey, and Professor James Day. Organists will be Jerry J. Johnson, junior, Sioux Rapids, Ia., and Professor Anthony Gartick. Among the chorus members are many former college students and other singers from the Wayne area.

The district of which Denesia is chairman includes eight counties in NE Nebraska.

The exploring program is the third phase of Boy Scouting, designed for high school age young men to give them the opportunity to develop responsibility and leadership.

New Certified Seed Directory Available

The new 1960-61 fall and winter edition of the Nebraska Certified Seed Directory is now available, according to Harold Ingalls, county extension agent.

This directory lists the certified seed growers of hybrid corn, hybrid sorghum, oats, spring barley, bromegrass, alfalfa, sudan, sweet clover, soybeans, sorghum varieties and other grasses.

In general, there are three requirements for Nebraska certified seed. First, only varieties approved by the Nebraska Agricultural Experiment Station may be certified. Second, the field and seed must be inspected prior to harvest to see that it is free of noxious weeds, varietal mixture and disease. Third, the seed must pass the requirements established for germination and purity in the laboratory before it can be sold as Nebraska Certified.

Approve Plans for New WS Cafeteria

Plans for a new food service center at Wayne State Teachers College received approval Monday by the State Normal Board. A January 20 date for bid opening was set tentatively for the cafeteria building, which will cost an estimated \$850,000.

Arrangements for the revenue bond issue are being handled by Storz-Wachob-Bender Company of Omaha. No tax money will be used for the construction. John Latenser, Jr., and Sons of Omaha are the architects.

Final approval of the project is subject to action by the attorney general and Legislature.

The food building will have a seating capacity of nearly triple the present college cafeteria.

In other action, the Normal Board approved leave of absence during the second semester for Mr. and Mrs. Russel Anderson, who plan to travel abroad. Anderson is chairman of the division of fine arts, and Mrs. Anderson is associate dean of students.

Dr. William Pefley will assume Anderson's teaching duties. His most recent teaching was at Eastern Washington College.

Little Change in 1961 ACP Program

The Wayne County Agricultural Conservation program will be instituted Jan. 1. Lloyd Morris, chairman of the county agricultural stabilization and conservation committee, announced today. He added that request for Federal cost-sharing to aid farmers in establishing approved conservation practices for the protection of our limited soil and water resources will be accepted at the county ASC office.

Morris points out that the 1961 ACP will be substantially the same as that for the 1960 program. The county ASC committee will administer the ACP as in previous years.

The program has been carefully worked out to meet the most critical conservation needs in the county. Special emphasis is again being placed on the practices which provide long-range conservation benefits. These practices are very vital and, by their application on farmlands, we are insuring society that our productive resources will be retained, he said.

Participation in the ACP, says Morris, is entirely voluntary. However, each and every farmer and land owner having erosion problems will be given the opportunity to request Federal cost-sharing assistance to aid them in carrying out needed eligible conservation practices on their farms.

The cost-share rates for the various practices are established at a level whereby the Federal government will share about 50 percent of the average cost of performing the practice. The farmer must bear the remaining cost of completing the practice. This policy is referred to as cost-sharing.

Requests for assistance should be filed at the Wayne ASC office within 30 days prior to the time you intend to begin application of the practice.

Name Directors at Chamber Meeting

Bob McLean, Bob Green, Bob Merchant and Dr. J. M. Brown were elected to the board of directors of the Wayne Chamber of Commerce at the Chamber's annual meeting Monday night. The men were selected from a slate of eight men.

In the business meeting a report of the year's program was given by Chamber secretary Ken Parke. He also showed slides of different segments of past activities.

The members present also approved a resolution changing the selection of the annual meeting night. It has always been held on the first Tuesday of December but now it will be up to the board to decide on a suitable date in that month.

Guest speaker for the evening was James Prestop, Chamber manager from Columbus. His talk centered around the point "Chart Your Course Then Set Sail." In this he developed the theme of planning the point you want to reach then moving ahead with an optimistic outlook.

New Hunting, Fishing Permits Now on Sale

The 1961 hunting and fishing licenses will be on sale Dec. 14, but do not go into effect until Jan. 1, 1961. However, hunters are reminded that new licenses will be required for pheasants before the season closes in January.

The licenses have been redesigned with a big red-colored "61" printed across almost one-third of the face of the permit. Added is background art on Nebraska's more popular fish, bird and animal species and a conservation message.

Costs for 1961 permits are the same as in 1960: Resident fishing, \$2; resident hunting, \$2.50; resident fishing and hunting, \$4; upland game-bird stamp, \$1; nonresident hunting, \$15; nonresident fishing, 5-days, \$2; nonresident fishing annual, \$5; resident trapping, \$2.50.

14,633 Meals Served in Hot Lunch Program

In the first two months of operation, the hot lunch program at the Wayne Elementary school has served 14,633 meals according to the kitchen report for that period. This averaged close to 400 trays in 50 minutes each day.

As representative figures, these meals used 1,100 pounds of flour, 594 pounds of butter, 15,544 bottles of milk (8 oz. size) and 2,150 pounds of meat.

Members of the church held testimonial dinner in honor of Rev. Meske and a grocery shower was given the pastor and his family. A reception luncheon and grocery shower for the new pastor is planned after the service Sunday.

Rev. Meske has been appointed circuit counselor of Circuit IV of the Northern Nebraska District of the Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod.

Circuit pastors from Wayne, Winslow, Laurel, South Sioux City, Martinsburg and Pender are expected to attend the installation services and participate in the rites.

Lead See-Saws in Daily Tabulations; Town Races Close

Show 92% of 1959 Corn Is Resealed

In Wayne County, as of the end of October, 686,963 bushels of corn had been resealed and 33,250 bushels redeemed out of a total of 1,947,284 bushels of 1959 crop corn placed under support. The total amount of corn still held under resealed on Wayne county farms is 886,983 bushels.

Across the nation, nearly one in every five bushels of 1959-crop corn placed under support had been resealed as of Oct. 31. About one bushel in eight had been redeemed through loan repayment. Corn of the 1960 crop was beginning to go under support at about the same rate as the 1959 crop.

Wayne led 14-10 at the end of the first quarter but their offense was leading enough to let Tekamah stay within throating distance. Don Meyer handled most of the rebounding chores in the first period, snagging two offensive and three defensive rebounds.

Don Larson picked up the rebounding chores in the second period and began pumping in field goals. Getting six rebounds in the quarter, Larson led the scoring for the game with 29 points.

The Blue Devils hit a cold streak at the beginning of the third quarter, but Tekamah kept them ahead with fouls. Tekamah's center, John Georgeson, nicked on four fouls in the quarter, all against Larson. Larson hit 11 for 16 free throws during the game.

Meyer continued to work the defensive boards well, and with Larson, controlled the boards.

Bus Likes, along with Kenny Denesia, kept the defense open by dropping in long shots. Denesia's short jump shots from the side played a key role in Tekamah's missed shots.

Likes hit 14 points and Denesia 10. Tekamah lost three starting players during the game via the foul route when Chuck Shamburg, John and Phil Georgeson all picked up five fouls.

The Blue Devils collected only nine fouls for the entire team. Wayne faces a stiffer test in their court power Friday when Norfolk comes to the Blue Devils' home court. The B team game time is 6:30 with the varsity taking the floor at 8 p.m.

## Wildcats Open Season with Split from Winona, LaCrosse

Wayne State eagles split their opening pair of games last week-end, beating Winona (Minn.) State, 60-49, and losing to La Crosse (Wis.) State, 65-63.

In both games the Wildcats trailed by a slim margin at half-time, and both times surged ahead after intermission to gain wide margins. However, they did not hold their advantage over La Crosse and finally lost in a heart-breaking way on a pair of tie-breaking free throws from a foul just as the game ended.

With 2 1/2 minutes to play La Crosse tied the count at 63-61, then soon regained possession on a Wayne fumble. After stalling out the clock, La Crosse broke for a field goal attempt, and Wayne's Dennis Torgerson fouled Dean Conrad. The buzzer had ended the game when Conrad connected on both free throws.

Charles Rachow scored 20 points to lead both teams for the second night. Against Winona Friday he earned 23, with 10 long corner shots and three free throws.

Victory over Winona was the second for Wayne, whose coach, Al Svenningsson, graduated from Winona in 1958. The Winonans lost to Wayne, 85-74, here a year ago.

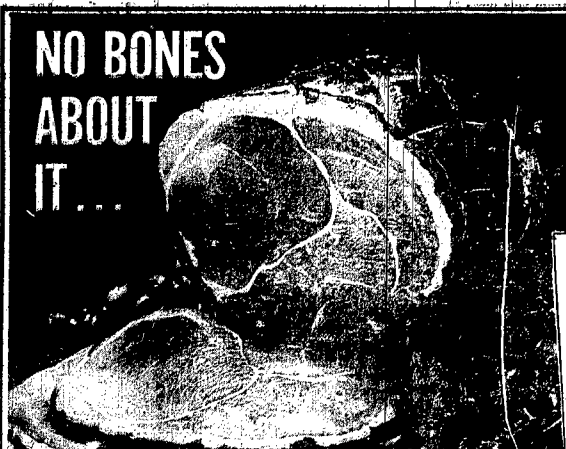

The health program will include reports on polio, heart, mental health, cancer, looking forward to later years when the unexpected happens, and tuberculosis.

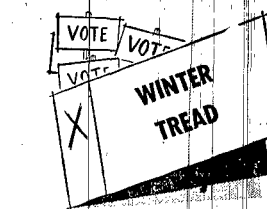

### 20 Years Ago

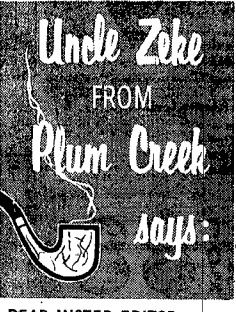

# See a 10% Rise in Cost of State Government, 1961-63

It is going to cost more to operate state government during the 1961-63 two-year period. This is no surprise in view of the upward trend of the past years. How much more is the question. Gov. Dwight Burney says he will recommend no more than a total hike of 10 percent in property taxes levied for support of state government. That would put the total at around \$60 million for the two years. It is always figured that the Legislature will add more to the total.

The results: more outlay from taxpayers for state government. Burney also is expected to recommend adoption of a sales tax when he gives his budget message to the lawmakers. He has long advocated such a levy. There will be much argument over the sales tax in the coming session and apparently considerable support among the legislators for the broadened basis. In past sessions there has always been a hard core of senators in favor of a broadened base. Burney, as a legislator, nearly got a sales tax enacted, losing by three votes. . . . While there have been numerous sessions favoring a broadened base they have not been able to get together on what should be exempted and other problems with the end result that a broadened tax proposal has been biting the dust session after session. . . . One thing is certain. Senators will be hard pressed to find the extra revenue needed to operate the state in the coming two years.

### Capitol Maintenance

Rewriting of the state capital will require expenditure of \$125,000 in the next two years. That's the report of James Delehant, superintendent of buildings and grounds for the state. . . . The rewriting has been underway for several years to accommodate the flood of mechanical equipment in the building. An appropriation of \$85,000 was made by the 1959 Legislature to continue the rewiring project. . . . The extra money is needed the next two years, Delehant reports, because of higher labor and material costs.

### Special Session

Nebraska's lawmakers will meet Dec. 12 in a special session to set pay of the solons. Gov. Dwight Burney formally fixed the date at Dec. 12 after this had been recommended as the time to start the session by the senators. . . . The special session is necessary in order that the Constitutional amendment approved Nov. 8 hoisting pay from \$872 per year to a maximum of \$2,400 became effective in January. . . . As passed the amendment is not self-enacting and needs legislation to fix the level of pay. There appears little doubt but what the senators will set the amount at \$200 per month — the maximum allowed. . . . The session will include the proposal to boost the pay and a bill to pay session expenses, estimated at about \$5,000.

### Glenny Report

Nebraska's higher education program is getting close scrutiny in a series of reports being readied for the 1961 Legislature. Coordinator of the project is Dr. Lyman Glenny, employed by the state to give a look at where higher education is going in Nebraska. . . . It could well be that Glenny's conclusions and recommendations, to be made to the 1961 Legislature, may be controversial.

### County Agent's Column

Omaha Market Hog Show Features Two Innovations. The third annual Omaha Market Hog show, to be held at the Omaha stock yards Feb. 11, will feature a pair of innovations, according to Show Chairman R. E. Cunningham, secretary of the Omaha live stock exchange. . . . The big change will be separate divisions of competition for pure bred and crossbred hogs. . . . Entries in each class will compete in their own division right down to the wire — then champions of both classes will go against each other for grand championship of the show. . . . The second principal innovation in the upcoming Omaha show will be a switch to one weight category — 2,000 to 4,000 pounds for the 10-head trucklot entries, and 200 to 240 pounds for the individual hog selected from the trucklot for individual competition. . . . The event is sponsored by Omaha live stock interests and the Extension services of the University of Nebraska and Iowa State college. . . . The bumblebee cannot fly. According to the theory of aerodynamics which may be readily demonstrated through laboratory tests and wind tunnel experiments the bumblebee is unable to fly. This is because the size, weight and shape of his body in relation to the total wing spread makes flying impossible. However, the bumblebee, being ignorant of these profound scientific truths, goes ahead and flies anyway and manages to make a little honey on the side.




