

PRINCESS VOTE TO TALS SOAR

Hope for New Armory Rises; Larger Building Site Needed

Wayne city councilmen will meet next Thursday, with Major Fales, National Guard official, to discuss the possible construction of a new National Guard armory in Wayne.

Wayne's armory was scheduled for construction in 1956, but due to reorganization that took place in the following four years, most armory construction was stopped.

In the meantime, another problem has been presented. The new Army criteria for armory construction calls for five acres of land. Wayne, located three acres, the 1956 requirement, to the Guard in 1956, but now more land will be needed.

In May, 1959 the Wayne unit was reorganized and split between Wayne and O'Neill. This was taken as a final blow to Wayne's armory chances at that time. It is now after new standards have been set by the Department of Defense on unit size armories that there is again hope.

National Guard officials were in Wayne last week to check on an armory site.

Construction, if all requirements can be met and if the bill for construction of an armory here passes Federal legislation, could be set for the fall of 1961 to fall into the 1962 fiscal year.

Discuss Plans for Special Retarded Children's Classes

Dixon - A group of parents, school superintendents and school board members interested in the problems of educating mentally handicapped children, met at the Wayne city hall Tuesday afternoon. Purpose of the meeting was to obtain more definite information about forming special classes for these youngsters.

Dr. Jack Campbell of the special education division, Lincoln, led the discussion. He stated that 10 years of education costs the Nebraska taxpayer about the same as one year if a corrective or other state-supported institution proper education can enable them to become independent members of society. Without this education these children might have to be placed in institutions.

Dr. Campbell stressed that wherever educational programs are in operation, there are waiting lists of parents who want to enroll their children. It has been shown that special classes take the pressure off the slow child and give him a chance for success in school. These classes would help youngsters who have from one-half to five-sixths the mental capacity of normal children.

Persons attending the meeting expressed the hope that such an educational program could be started in this area.

Hunter Finds Body Of Missing Patient Hanged in Granary

A letter from an Iowa hunter in Nebraska led Wayne county Sheriff Don Weible to the discovery of the body of a Martinsburg man Saturday.

Leo Burke, 51, a patient missing from the Norfolk State Hospital since Nov. 11, was found hanged Friday in a granary in a field 10 miles west and one-half south of Wayne.

The body was first discovered by John Beam, Martins, Ia., who was hunting in the field, when he opened the door and looked inside.

Sheriff Weible said Beam, after finding the body, wrote a letter to Sheriff Weible who received it Saturday morning. Weible, county attorney Charles Mellemhoff and State Trooper D. J. Knottwell, Norfolk, then made the investigation.

Burke was believed to have been dead about two weeks.

10 Years Ago

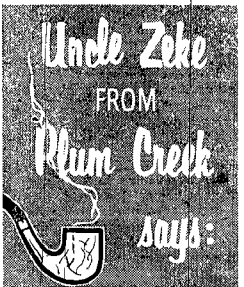

Capitol News

Activity for Legislative Posts Starts in Lincoln

Support is beginning to build up among state senators for the post of speaker of the 1961 Legislature.

This is not only an honorary position, recognizing service of a lawmaker in the Unicameral, but a functional one as well. The speaker's main duty is presiding over the Legislature in the absence of the lieutenant governor.

State Sen. William Moulton, Omaha, and Sen. Don Thompson, McCook, appear to be front-runners for this job when the 1961 regular session convenes Jan. 3. The current speaker, Sen. Harry Pizer, North Platte, has retired from politics.

There is also reported to be considerable behind the scenes activity pointing toward chairmanships of the important standing committees of the Legislature.

These are the groups that originally hear bills aired at public hearings, then make recommendations to the entire Legislature.

The special session this week was concerned with pay of the state senators. It is expected to end early next week. Members of the session were those elected in 1958. The new solons begin their work January 3, and will get higher pay as a result of work of the current special session.

Among the top problems of the 1961 session will be reapportionment of Congressional districts, whether to broaden the state's tax base and disposition of the problem of whether to change the Board of Control which governs state institutions.

Education Funds

An emergency appropriation will be required by the State Department of Education to operate the schools for the Deaf at Omaha and the Blind at Nebraska City.

Dr. F. B. Decker, commissioner of education, said the request — the first by the department — was prompted by the department taking over the two schools in July from the Board of Control.

There was considerable controversy preceding transfer of the schools to the department.

State Spending

The Nebraska Citizens council, a private tax research, has looked into the problem of state spending over a 10-year period.

Some of the findings are startling. The Council, for instance, discovered that 85 percent more money is being spent by state government today for postage than 10 years ago. The total for the fiscal year ending last July was \$237,759. Use of the telephone and telegraph has climbed 127 percent from 1950, the Council reports.

Travel expense of state em-

ployees went up 58 percent during the decade, a lesser amount than most of the other categories. Those expenses show up in state spending records as "operating expenses."

There are 13 separate items in the category, dealing with communication and transportation, publishing, printing and advertising, heat, light and power and miscellaneous expenses.

Fire Code

A new fire code for Nebraska is continuing to kick up controversy at educational institutions. The latest to complain was the University of Nebraska which said the regulations would require expenditure of \$16 million if they are complied with across the board.

Previously objecting were the state teachers colleges at Wayne, Chadron, Peru and Kearney. They have estimated expenditures of a quarter of a million dollars to meet the requirements.

Neither the colleges nor the University included the expenditures in budget requests for 1961-63 spending.

Fire Marshal Joe Davis says school officials should blame their own organizations, not him, if they feel the fire rules are not proper. Davis said five of the eight members of the committee that wrote the regulations represented school groups and agencies.

The marshal said he is not in full agreement with the regulations but by law he must enforce them, which he is doing. The rules were adopted July 1, 1959, and have the force of law. Deadline for complying was Sept. 1 of this year.

One of the main complaints against the rules is that they require addition of fire detection or other type equipment to recently built structures that were considered fire-safe when constructed.

Davis said he feels the rules are too strict in some respects and do not allow enough area for an exercise of judgment by his inspectors.

Standby Legislators

Nebraska senators are expected to begin announcing soon standby legislators under a new law now in effect. The law is designed to provide Nebraska with continuity of government in the event of an enemy attack and the regular senator is unable to serve.

This law and three other associated measures were passed by the 1959 Legislature but could not become effective until passage by voters of a Constitutional amendment. Sen. Joe Vosoba, Winbur, was the first solon to name substitute legislators.

County Agent's Column

Increase in Milk Per Cow Pays
The annual milk production of the average Nebraska milk cow, substantially less than the national average, could be raised if more dairymen kept production records.

The individual average for Nebraska milk cows is 5,610 pounds of milk annually, compared with an average of 6,440 pounds per cow in herds across the U. S.

The average production of Nebraska cows enrolled in dairy herd improvement programs is 9,880 pounds of milk.

A summary of Nebraska records shows that dairy cows that produce 12,881 pounds of milk and 459 pounds of butterfat were about three times as profitable as cows that produced 5,120 pounds of milk and 244 pounds of butterfat.

According to this annual summary of the Nebraska Dairy Herd Improvement association, the higher producing cows return \$337 in the value of product over feed cost while the lower producing cows returned \$132.

Not only were returns much greater for the higher producing cows, but the better cows marketed more feed for their owners. For example, the lower producing cows at \$19 worth of feed during the year while the higher producing cows consumed \$17 worth of feed.

As production increases, the feed cost gradually increases but the returns above feed cost increase much more rapidly. Cows that produced 5,120 pounds of milk returned to their owners \$2.10 for every dollar's worth of feed they consumed while cows that produced 12,881 pounds of milk returned \$2.97 for each dollar's worth of feed consumed.

Key To Fire Safety

Good housekeeping is the key to fire safety, a University of Nebraska safety expert said this week. R. L. H. Schrieber, Extension safety specialist at the college of agriculture, pointed out that new is the time of year to check attics, closets and basements for combustible material that has gathered over the summer.

"Old clothes, furniture, newspapers and magazines are good fuel for a fire," he commented. He also urged residents to check heating systems for hidden defects. A heating system may work perfectly while the weather is mild, he explained. However, it could become a definite fire hazard when maximum heat is required.

Children left without competent supervision, overloading of electrical outlets and careless smokers are commonly behind many fires, Schrieber said.

First National Grew from J. T. Bressler's LaPorte Bank

The First National Bank of Wayne came into existence Aug. 25, 1885 with the signing of the Articles of Association. The present bank actually grew from the Logan Valley Bank of LaPorte that was organized by John T. Bressler in 1880, Wayne county's first banking institution.

Bressler reorganized the bank in Wayne in 1885, when the railroad went through Wayne. Signing the Articles of Association in 1892 with Bressler were D. C. Patterson, Eugene L. Jones, J. W. Jones, Henry Loy, Frank A. Dearborn, John S. Lewis, Jr., Edward Perry, Frank Fuller, James Britton and John Perry.

Bressler was named president, Patterson, cashier, and Eugene Jones, assistant cashier. Each officer received a salary of \$66.66 per month.

The articles called for a capital stock of \$30,000 in 500 shares, of \$100 each with the opportunity to be increased in any sum not to exceed \$100,000.

The first year Bressler continued as president with Perry as his named vice president and Dearborn as cashier. The first major change in the office setup came in 1887 when two more directors were added to make a total of seven.

In 1888, Bressler was still president, with Loy as vice president, Dearborn as cashier and William S. Gillette as named assistant cashier.

A year later, J. M. Strahan was elected president, George Boral, vice president, and H. P. Wilson was named cashier.

First plans for the present bank building were made at the annual meeting Jan. 11, 1899 when Dr. Art Frank Northrup and J. F. Wilson were selected as a committee to procure plans and specifications for a bank building. The building was completed in 1900.

Printed on page two is a copy of the original notice authorizing the bank to begin business.

Drive-In Banking Offered to Patrons

One of the new service features of the First National Bank is the drive-in deposit system that allows customers to transact their banking business from their cars.

Located on the north side of the new building, the drive-in window provides an all-weather service point for customer convenience.

Most all deposit and withdrawal activity can be handled at the window with little effort on the part of the customer.

Safety Deposit Service Enlarged

Over 100 new safe deposit boxes will be available to customers of the First National Bank, in addition to the 450 boxes moved from the former bank site.

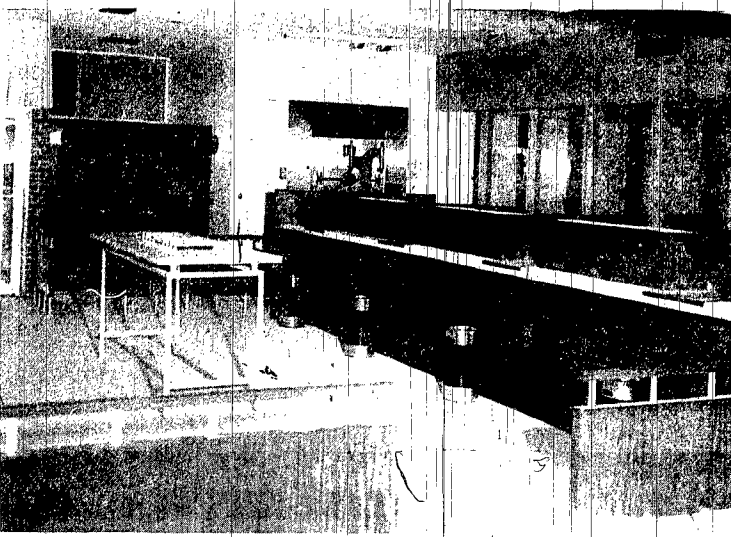
"The public is realizing more and more the necessity of keeping their valuable papers in a safe place," said Al Voorhis, assistant cashier, "and this led us to provide greater safekeeping facilities for them."

All the safe deposit boxes in the First National Bank are fire proof.

"They are all easily accessible for the customers," Voorhis said, "and the new booth facilities in the safe deposit lobby allow the customer to conduct his business in the same private atmosphere of his office or home."

The idea of privacy in the safe deposit system is only a part of the planning that went into the new First National Bank building to give customers the privacy needed to transact their business when away from their office or home.

"We hope our customers will think of our new facilities as their 'office away from their business' in the years to come," Voorhis said.

Night Depository Service New Envelope Mechanism

The night depository service of the First National Bank is no longer limited to persons having deposit books. Now everyone can take advantage of the night depository by using handy envelopes supplied by the bank.

These envelopes carry all the necessary information on them so all the different types of deposit services, note payments, loan payments and most business of that type can be taken care of after hours. The customer simply has to fill out the blanks, place the correct amount in the envelope and slip it into the after-hours depository.

The customer will notice a slot at his envelope when he puts it in the slot. This is a special mechanism that pulls the envelope into the vault, a great safety factor over the usual gravity type drop. Once the envelope is shipped in the slot, it is impossible to retrieve.

"This should be a great help to people who find it difficult to get to the bank during the hours we are open," said Al Kern, "and we hope they will take full advantage of this new service."

are just a few of the services, but a new feature has been added along these lines.

Private offices, in addition to the regular loan area, have been made available to the customers. Now the type of loan transaction that requires more involved processing can be taken care of in the privacy of a single office.

This allows the bank officers to discuss the transaction with the individual as if he were in his own office or home. Just one of the added conveniences of the new concept in banking, the customer's office away from his business.

Music System for Bank's Customers

First National Bank customers will find a little added pleasure when transacting their business in the new bank building. A special music system has been installed to add greatly to pleasant, quiet business atmosphere in the building.

The music is filtered throughout the building, just loud enough to be pleasing to the ear while not being distracting to the conducting business. The music system is just one of the many new innovations that will be displayed at the open house Saturday.

New Bank Offering Special Park Area

Patrons of the First National Bank will find a new and welcome convenience at the new bank site -- a special parking place in the rear. In designing the bank for customer convenience, the officials had the area in back of the building hard surfaced to provide all-weather parking.

The new area provides nine parking spaces, while still allowing traffic to flow smoothly through the drive-in banking area. The public will also find the lighted area a convenient parking space while shopping at night.

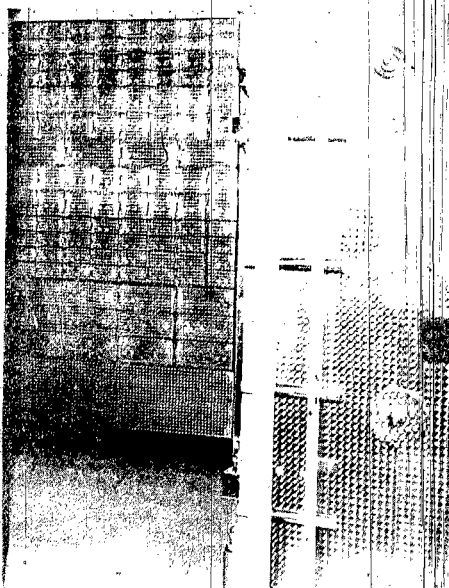
