Increase In Milk Per Cow Pays

The annual milk production of the average Nebraska milk cow, substantially less than the na-tional average, could be raised if more dairymen kept production records.

The individual average for Ne-braska milk cows is 5,610



records.

The individual average for Nebraska milk cows is 5.610

pounds of milk annually, compared with an average of 6,440

pounds per cow in herds across the U.S.

The average production of Nebraska cows enrolled in dairy herd improvement programs is 9,880 pounds of milk.

A summary of Nebraska records shows that dairy cows that produce 12.881 pounds of milk and 459 pounds of butterfat were about three times as profitable as cows it hat produced 5.120 pounds of milk and 244 pounds of butterfat.

According to this annual sum-

According to this annual sum-mary of the Nebbaska Dairy Herd Improvement association, the higher producing cows re-turn \$337 in the value of product over feed cost while the lower producing cows returned \$132.







Not only were preturns much grater for the higher producing cows but the better cows marketed more feed for their owners. For example, the lower producing cows at a \$19 worth of feed fluring the year while, the higher producing cows consumed \$174 worth of feed.

As preduction increases the feed flowing radually increases high returns above feed cost increase intendenced 5.120 pounds of mik returned to heir dwners \$2.10 for every dollar's worth of feed they consumed while cows that produced 5.297 for each tellar's worth of feed consumed.
