Wayne Firemen Fight Series Of Country Fires Saturday

Wayne firemen fought three consecutive grass fires in the country Saturday night, all within an hour and a half. The fires were nearly burning simultaneously at three different spots and firemen expressed fear that another would start as they were nearly out of water on the last fire.

The first call in the strange series of fires came at 11:15 p. m. when the firemen were directed to a farm 3 miles west and a mile and a half north of Wayne, belonging to Gereon Allvin. As they brought the Allvin fire under control, they were informed of another fire three and a half miles south of their present location, on ground farmed by Don Miller, Wayne.

The firemen answered this call, only to discover another fire burning a mile east and two south of the Miller farm. The men were able to control this fire, but their supply of water was running low enough that another call could have been a bad situation.

The strange succession of fires brought doubt to the minds of the firemen since there was a heavy frost Saturday making it nearly impossible for a grass fire to start from a cigarette.

All the fires were on unoccupied farms and not near any buildings, causing the speculation that vandals might have set the fires. A similar series of fires was reported near Norfolk Monday.

Jan. 31 Deadline For Grain Loans

Farmers have until Jan. 31, 1961, to cover their grains and a number of other 1960 crops under the price-support program, the Wayne County Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Office said today. For wheat, compliance with the individual farm allotment is required in order to be eligible for price support on the crop.

The 1960 crops for which Jan. 31, 1961 is the deadline for obtaining loans or purchase agreements include wheat, barley, oats, grain sorghums, rye soybeans and dry edible beans.

The ASC reminded growers that good storage, which must first be approved by the County ASC Committee, is a requisite for obtaining a price support loan on any farm stored crop. While the farmer himself is responsible for storing a crop covered by a purchase agreement, the condition and quality of the crop will be a determining factor in the amount of the support he receives should he decide to deliver his crop under the support program at the end of the season.

Presentation Set For Distinguished Service Award

Work of determining the recipient of the Junior Chamber of Commerce Distinguished Service award is presently being completed, so the award can be presented at Bosses' Night, set for Jan. 12.

Each year the Jaycees select a young man of the community for this award, basing their decision on leadership and service to the community during the calendar year. Winners need not be Jaycees, but must be between the ages of 21 and 35.

Judges rate the nominees by a system of points, such as: 50 points for contribution to general community welfare during the year; 25 points for evidence of leadership ability, and 25 points for evidence of personal or business progress.

Judges are distinguished citizens of the community who are now over 35.

All nominations for this year's award must be in at the general meeting scheduled for Jan. 5.

Holiday Tourney Preparations Made

Wayne State cagers rested this week before resuming practice for the Christmas holiday basketball tournament here next Thursday and Friday.

The four-team tourney is being sponsored by 51 Wayne business and professional firms who have bought blocks of tickets.

Two games are slated each night, the first at 7:30 and the second about 9:15. Paired in the opening tilt are St. Cloud State of Minnesota and Northern State of South Dakota, followed by Adams State of Colorado and Wayne State.

Since the teams are spread over four states in four conferences, comparing them poses a problem. Probably St. Cloud rates the favorite role after five straight seasons as champion or co-champion of the Northern State College conference. However, Northern, a regular power in the South Dakota intercollegiate conference, and Wayne State should make the tournament interesting.

Adams State, down last year, reports promising new players and a new coaching staff. Jack Cotton, head coach, and his assistant, Darrell Madra, were at Omaha university until this year.

Water Line Break Sunday Headache For Street Crews

Wayne's nearly half a downtown water line broke in the street on Sunday morning, and it will take several days to repair. The break serves only the businesses and the residences in the block and has broken at least four times in the past 10 years.

Wayne police discovered the break early Sunday morning and the street department began work on it soon after. By 5 p.m. the leak had been patched, only to discover another farther down the line. Workmen completed the repair Monday.

The pipe is lead, not iron or steel, and the difficulty apparently goes back to the time when two cream stations used the line and had quick-closing valves on it. The quick shutoffs caused the water to hammer in the line and stretched the pipe in spots, causing weak areas. These now rupture easily.

WS Student Starts Unique Radioactive Work With Eggs

It may be a little early for Easter, but a Wayne State science student is busy preparing eggs.

Ivan Kaiser, junior from O'Neill, is conducting a 21-day survey on the effects of radiation upon fertilized hen's eggs. He injected two dozen eggs with varying dosages of radioactive solutions, then spent the next 21 days circling his incubator like an expectant father.

According to normal events of nature, the eggs should have hatched Dec. 21, but the first chick poked its way out Dec. 19. Several hours later it was still alive in its 104-degree incubator, and scientist Kaiser was still in anxious expectancy over the other 23.

He deemed it possible that radioactivity might have destroyed the fertility of some eggs. What he really wants to observe is the mutations (sudden genetic changes), if any, that may occur in the chicks.

If he can manage to run a chicken house in the college laboratories, he may keep the chickens to maturity for observation of the second generation, provided the radiated chickens are capable of reproducing.

His project was his own idea, and he had no guides in textbooks or scientific literature to suggest the types or quantities of radioactive dosage. What may result he does not know since the minute dosages of weak solution may not produce observable mutations.

Dr. W. G. Ingram, head of the Wayne State science division, termed Kaiser's project a unique effort of student ingenuity.

Now Kaiser is wondering what his family will think of it when he brings a flock of chickens home for holiday vacation. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. H. B. Kaiser, and Louise Allison, Wakefield.



Capitol News . . . Burney Settles Into Job, Will Give Up Reins Jan. 8

Gov. Dwight Burney quickly took over a case of the jitters upon an abruptly becoming governor in September, and says he likes the job. Burney, who also is lieutenant governor, was elevated to the chief executive's post by the death of Ralph G. Brooks.

The experience of assuming such big duties minutes after Brooks' death was unimpressive to Burney, even though he has had years of governmental experience.

A Republican, Burney says he was mainly concerned about doing a good job. The pressure of a backlog of problems and work, resulting from illness of Brooks, a Democrat, took a toll on the 68-year-old Burney for many days. But, he got a grip on the office and began to re-

lax somewhat.

His daily recreation of playing a game of solitaire was interrupted during the first hectic days of his administration. But, he says, he is back on schedule pretty regularly.

One of the high points of his term, which ends Jan. 8, was escorting of him to the special session of the legislature which ended this week by a group of state senators. The senators marched in a body to the governor's office to report the special session — to boost pay of solons — was open and ready for business.

Every Nebraskan, Burney said, should see his governor escorted to the legislative chambers. He says it would renew confidence in those who run state govern-

ment and make its laws.

Jan. 3, Burney will open the Legislature as lieutenant governor and presiding officer, then return to his executive's state and await another committee to tell him, as governor, that the regular session is ready for business.

After Jan. 8 Burney will walk to the legislative chamber and assume the job he was ejected to in November — lieutenant governor.

County Agent's Column

Best Seed Production Year

State fall and good growing conditions have helped make 1950 one of the best seed production years on record, according to Warren Sales, manager of the University of Nebraska foundation seed division.

The Foundation seed division has a good inventory of hybrid corn available for 1951 planting along with foundation seed supplies of the more important varieties of oats, barley, grasses and soybeans.

A sizeable nucleus of an experimental winter barley variety is making good progress. The new variety may be released in 1951 pending approval and recommendations by the Nebraska agricultural experiment station, according to Sales.

The World We Live In

Among the interesting things we read are these rather surprising figures. Perhaps this top-sided division of the world's goods accounts for the great unrest in many countries.

Perhaps our first step to understanding should be a closer look at the world we live in. According to an article by Dr. J. R. Simich Leiper (Associated Church Press), if this world of nearly three billion people were divided into an imaginary town of 1,000 persons, 308 people would be white-skinned and 697 would be non-white (black, yellow, brown). Sixty persons would represent the U. S. population, 940 the rest of the world. About 80 people in the town would be believing communists, and 370 others would be under communist domination. The 60 Americans would have an average life expectancy of 70 years; all the other 940 would average less than 40 years.

Half of the total income of the entire community would go to the 60 Americans, with the remaining half shared by the other 940. The 60 Americans would possess 15 1/2 times as much goods per person as all the rest of the town. On an average, they would produce 13 percent of the total food supply, but would consume all but 1 1/2 percent of it, most of which they would keep for their own future use in expensive storage.

Of the community's total supply of electric power, the 60 Americans would have 12 times as much as all the rest; 22 times as much coal, 21 times as much oil and gasoline, 50 times as much steel and 53 times as much general equipment of all kinds.

With the exception of perhaps 200 persons representing western Europe and a few other favored areas, most of the 940 non-Am-

icans in the imaginary community would be ignorant, hungry and sick. Half would be unable to read or write.

The reason a dollar won't go as much as it once did is because people won't do as much for a dollar as they once did.

How many times I wished they were gifted and could write a book about my stay in our hospital. What excellent care I re-

ceived from all the nurses and aides, and their personal interest meant so much to me. Martha — I shall always think of as second mother. We went through a lot together. As for my brothers, Carl, Fredrick and Alphon, what can I say? Glad working thru them saved my life. The day finally came when Dr. Coe told me I could be home for Thanksgiving. We felt that to be the greatest blessing anyone could enjoy. Being together as a family once again. I wasn't home very long. On Wednesday when two friends came to call and left a lovely Thanksgiving card with

a check enclosed, a gift from the wonderful friends of our community. It was almost too great an emotional shock for someone just out of the hospital. The night I couldn't sleep I kept wondering. How can you do those people thru all these times and they still can't know what it all means to you? When you consider all the you have given us, physical, financial, moral and spiritual. WHAT COULD YOU SAY? All we can say here is thank you and God Bless you.




