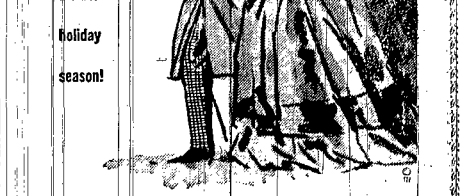

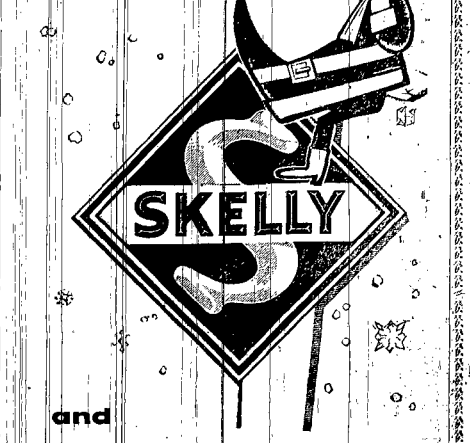

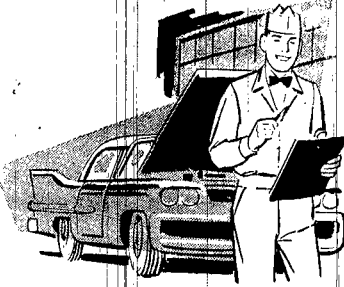

Redel Ties Record in 64-40 Winside Win

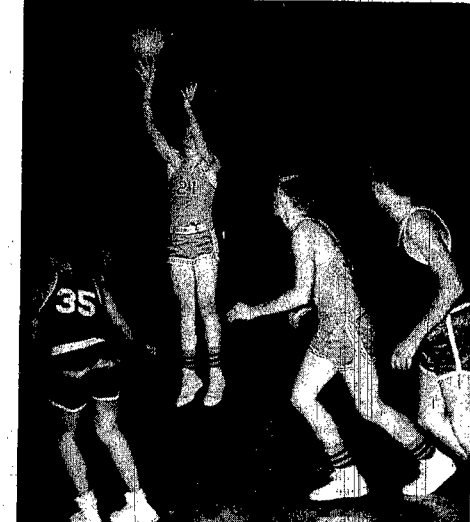
