"A Pleasure" Says Countian Of 48 Years in Sheep Shows

"By George, I would have answered Cradoc Morris, when asked if he would again go into the sheep raising business, if he had it to do over Morris has been raising champion sheep for nearly a half century.

At 81, he is still farming north east of Carroll and raising a champion line sheep line. He has raised his sheep in a major show for the last time in 1950 at Lincoln.

Morris made his first show at the Interstate Fair at Sioux City in 1912.

"I got the idea," he said, "from watching my neighbor, J. R. C. Pritchard, ship hogs to the state fair each year and decided to try it myself with sheep. At that time, everything was shipped by boxcar, so Pritchard and I shared in telling about his many trips that took him on the show circuit covering most of the middle states, including the International show in Chicago. He saw the tag and ear became his home, as it did with other showmen. The ear tag gained feed and water for the sheep, plus a heat and a small heating of the showman.

Purple ribbons are no uncommon with Morris, as he has shown champions from county fairs to the International Exposition. His biggest year for awards was 1931 when the show circuit took him through Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma and Texas, where he picked up 112 ribbons, including five champion purple ribbons.

Specializing in Oxford sheep, he has shipped animals to buyers as far as Washington in 1931 a sheep that from Washington and looked all over Michigan, Illinois and Indiana, recognized as top sheep country, finally coming to the Morris farm to select a ram from the flock.

Morris said the early years were the best years for sheep as far as the number being raised.

"Times were hard," Morris said, and people seemed to think the

their way to school and the terrible "blizzard of '88" struck. They made it to the school and shortly after their arrival, his father picked up all the students and their teacher and took them to the Morris home.

"I would probably have saved our mother's life that day," he said. "Mother was helping father get in as much of the livestock as possible. When the storm became too severe, she started back to the house but in the blinding snow, she was going right on by. The well was near the house and when she stumbled on to it she realized she had missed the house. She then turned and made it safely in. Had she gone on straight, there was nothing ahead of her but open prairie."

The annual meeting of the survivors of the blizzard is being held this month in Lincoln, and Morris and his wife are thinking of making the trip.

The Morris family may have been the first people in Wayne county to live in a pre-cut house. The family was originally settled near Red Oak, Ia., and moved to Wayne county when Cradoc was four years old. His father, knowing there would be no housing of the unbroken prairie, bought a building before leaving the Red Oak area, folded the walls down, covered them with the roof intact and shipped it here. Upon arrival they put up the roof, set up the walls and moved into their ready-made home.

Recalling the house, Morris said he and his brothers could lay in bed and count the stars through a crack in the roof. In snow weather, his father would sweep a path through the snow in the house so he and his brothers could get to the rest of the house without wading in the snow.

Mr. and Mrs. Morris both like to travel and in 1958 they left home June 10 and returned the last day of August, covering some 7,000 miles in the Pacific northwest and Canada. This may not seem too unusual for an elderly couple, except they had a pickup truck equipped with a sleeping cab, complete with stove.

"It was a pleasant trip, we just backed up and jogged along at our leisure," Cradoc said.

Morris' father and mother were both Welsh and the language was spoken in their home. "But I've gotten rusty on the language since married this American girl," he said.

He has been married to "that American girl" for 57 years, and they have four children, Harold, at home; Wilma in Washington, D. C.; Donald in Wichita, Kan., and Sherin in Illinois.

"Handling the animals is just too much work, so no more shows," says Cradoc, ending a half century in the show ring.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this haste the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

You may not agree with an editorial... but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

Gold - and The Wage-Hour Law

Numerous factors contributing to the present balance of payments deficit, which resulted in a substantial decline in our gold reserves. The deficit is the difference between the total amount of money we spend abroad and the total amount others spend with us.

Moreover, the problem could be made still more severe and still more difficult to solve or alleviate by certain factors which, on their face, seem to have nothing to do with international monetary matters.

The U. S. Chamber of Commerce points out that the proposed increase in the Federal minimum wage would make further inroads on the gold storage at Ft. Knox. And there's nothing to be gained in this view, increasing the minimum wage far beyond the Federal wage hour law to protect local businesses such as retailing, which have always been exempt would mean higher prices for U. S. businessmen. Capital would be encouraged to invest in lower cost overseas areas, thus increasing the gold outflow.

The higher minimum wage would set loose new inflationary forces all along the wage price line. These increased costs would make it more difficult for American products to compete in foreign markets, where the competition is already extremely keen, largely because of our existing wage standards. Also, the increases would make it easier for foreign producers of many kinds of goods to expand their American sales. So we'd sell less abroad, others would sell more in our home market and the payments imbalance would swell.

Protection of the gold reserve has become a major domestic problem. It wouldn't make sense for the government to aggravate it through legislation which would make it together for us to compete in the world's market place.

Capitol News Bills Pour in as Lawmakers Revamp or Eliminate Laws

Lincoln — Bills continue to pour into the Nebraska Legislature now in its second week. Hundreds of senators will have through Jan. 30 to introduce bills, then only standing committees or the governor may do so. The first batch of activity produced 111 proposed new laws, many of them eliminating obsolete sections of statutes or harmonizing them with others.

Early indications are there will be much debate over proposals introduced to allow other elected officials to run for governor, having the governor and lieutenant governor run for four-year terms as a team, and extending term of state senators to four years.

Now, every elected official but the governor cannot seek the governorship without waiting for two years after his term expires. Even the lieutenant governor cannot file for the governorship without abiding by the same provision of the constitution that requires the waiting period.

Veteran observers noted that the first few days of the bill introduction period produced fewer bills than normal. Many senators feel there will be less legislation proposed this session. Others think the total bills will hit the 800 mark.

Governor Morrison

Frank Brenner Morrison, a 55-year-old Lincoln attorney and Democrat, is Nebraska's thirty-first governor. He is the eighth Democrat to hold the office. What type of person is he? Morrison is six feet three inches tall and weighs 225 pounds. He has a firm handshake, curly hair, good speaking voice and likes to meet people. He was born at Golden, Colo., May 20, 1905, and was graduated from the University of Nebraska law college in 1931 and began practicing in Maywood in Frontier county in 1932. His middle name is the family name of his mother. The Morrisons have two sons, Frank, Jr., and Jon, and one daughter, Jean. Both Morrison and his wife, Maxine, were Republicans once but changed parties in the 30s.

Morrison has been dabbling in politics for about 20 years, won many primaries for various offices but never got real close to a general election victory.

The new governor plunged into duties of his office with vigor after his inauguration at which he asked Nebraskans to join him in efforts to "make Nebraska grow." He says he will emphasize consolidation of functions in his administration, attraction of industry and explore how to improve the tourist business. Among his specific proposals were those calling for executive authority for the highway commission which, now is advisory, replacement of the Board of Control for management of state institutions, and changing responsibility for collection of fuel, cigarette and oil taxes from the agriculture department to the tax commissioner's office.

Attorney General

Attorney General Meyer is a named Jerry Vitamas as his deputy and appointed Mel Kammerlohr, Hastings, as an assistant attorney general to replace Vitamas. Vitamas had been an assistant attorney general for several years after serving as assistant clerk in the State Supreme court. Former Attorney General C. S. Beck was elected to a district judgeship in his home town of North Platte.

Budget Approach

The budget committee of the Legislature is taking an unusual approach to state spending this session. In this week began a series of "pre-budget" hearings which its chairman, Sen. Richard Marvel, Hastings, described as "fact-finding" hearings. These will be designed to find out how each department functions and as much about its fiscal operations as possible before public airings of the agencies' requests for tax funds are held.

County Agent's Column

Use Home-Grown Feeds
From a practical standpoint, feed rationing should consist mostly of home-grown grain and roughage. A simple ration of corn and alfalfa hay, properly balanced with needed supplements will produce good, reasonable cost. The amount of supplement needed in a ration depends on the kind and amount of feed used and the percentage of protein in the supplement. When corn and alfalfa is used, no other supplement may be needed.

To balance a ration when either grain or roughage has been fed, require about four percent pounds of protein for each 100 pounds of feed. Blended rations of medical practice may vary from three to five percent protein on a dry matter basis. Two pounds of a 20 percent supplement are needed to equal one pound of a 40 percent feed. Rations of concentrate to roughage may vary from a safe practical one-third to one-half of grain to each two pounds of hay and one-third of hay and one-third of alfalfa. At good value, offered separately or a mixture of two parts roughage to one part hay.

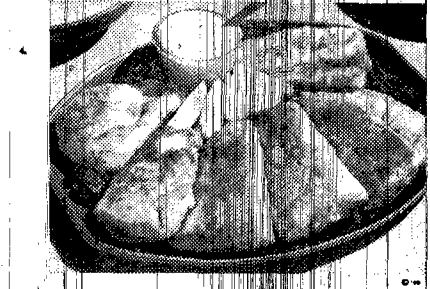

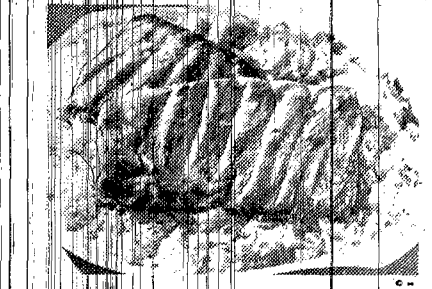

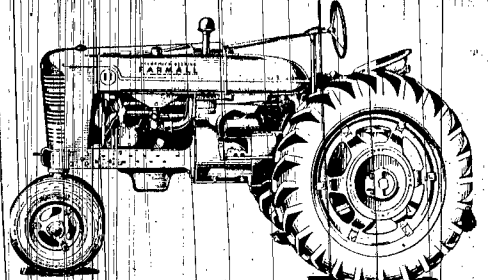
