Wayne Explorers Plan Canoe Trip

Swine Raisers Will Attend Special Rooters Day Here

Swine raisers from throughout Nebraska will converge at Wayne Wednesday for the first in a series of four area Rooters Days sponsored by the University of Nebraska College of Agriculture.

The special all-day swine meeting at the city auditorium will focus attention on all aspects of efficient and profitable swine production.

Researchers and Extension specialists from the college will discuss the SPF (Swine Free) pig program on Nebraska farms, latest developments in swine buildings and facilities, problems in swine reproduction, and swine nutrition.

Starting off the Rooters' Day program at 9:30 a.m. will be a new area Swine Sanitation: A key to disease and Parasite Control, with many scenes shot on Nebraska farms.

Remainder of the morning session will focus on the SPF program on Nebraska farms, and swine buildings and facilities, with Leo Measland, E. A. Olson, Extension animal husbandman and agricultural engineer, respectively, as speakers.

The afternoon session will cover problems in swine reproduction and swine nutrition from the research side. Duwayne Zimmerman and Donald Hutman, Extension professors of animal husbandry, will discuss the two topics.

By attending the sessions, farmers will be able to obtain information which will be helpful in answering some of the following questions confronting the swine industry, on the basis of their own operation.

The Tri County Association for Mentally Retarded Children met Thursday in Eastport with featured speaker Dr. Dick Campbell from the Special Education Department, Lincoln.

During the week, Dr. Campbell spent several days visiting school superintendents and others in this area to determine the special education facilities needed in northeast Nebraska.

Plans were made to hold a testing clinic in March to determine how many children might need additional help.

In his talk Thursday Dr. Campbell stated that there are six groups of youngsters that his department is equipped to help. Mentally handicapped youngsters who are developing from one-half to 5-6 per cent rapidly as normal children are one of these groups. The others include orthopedically handicapped, those with visual difficulties, the hard of hearing, blind, deaf, hearing speech therapy, and nondominant youngsters.

He discussed the type of educational program which has been found to be the most successful in helping youngsters who are slow learners. In general this program should provide a half-day instruction in reading and arithmetic given by specially trained teachers at a slow pace and that the individual be understood by a group of no more than 10 other children. The other half day the child would spend with his own grade as they study social science, music, science and physical education.

Remainder of the cost of the disposal plant not collected by sewer use fees would be financed by bonds.

Three sites for the system have been proposed — on the south, the southeast corner, and the northeast corner of Winside. Of the three, engineers recommended the construction of a lagoon-type system on the southeast corner of the town, at a cost of \$15,410.

Shearing School Set in February

Persons who want to learn how to shear sheep will get a chance to do at a shearing school at the College of Agriculture, Lincoln, Feb. 22-24.

The sheep shearing school will be open to experienced and inexperienced shearers. Edward Warnick, Chicago, will be on hand to help conduct the school.

Frank Stigall, member of the Midwest Wool Marketing cooperative, Kansas City, will be on hand to answer questions. He will lead a discussion on repair and maintenance of sheep shearing equipment during an evening meeting the first day of the school.

Those attending the school will get an opportunity to shear 10 head of sheep. Practice shearing will be interspersed with demonstrations by Warner and Ted Doane, Extension sheepsman at the college.

Anyone interested in the school should complete an application form available at the Wayne County Extension office. Completed application forms must be returned to Doane by Feb. 11. There will be a slight fee to cover cost of materials needed at the school.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

You may not agree with an editorial . . . but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given a careful thought to an important problem and the editor is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

Deep Roots in Economic Law

The magazine recently devoted a full page of space to the thesis that this nation needs more, not less, law. In the course of its discussion, it stated: "Whatever means have been used to reach that power is no longer directed toward the whole of the economy of the U. S. or the rest of the world. The enterprise, the tax reformer, the legislator can do a lot more to meet these needs than any of the current orthodox 'pro-labor' proposals such as a minimum wage hike which would increase unemployment by forcing employers to shed out workers who simply aren't needed more than at any time."

The current minimum wage proposals are a good example of the wrong way to go about it. Not only would the wage be increased, but the law would be extended to millions of workers in local enterprises, notably, retailing, who have hitherto been exempt. One result, as the magazine pointed out, would be that the affected enterprises would have as few marginal workers as possible. A second result, in all likelihood, would be a new wave of price increases—that is, a new wave of inflation. A third result, which is directly tied to the first, would be to deprive great numbers of unskilled people of the opportunity to gain experience that would qualify them for better jobs.

County Agent's Column

The attorney general brought a case to test the right of a governor to fire a department head without a cause and without a hearing if the head did not have a definite term of office. Public Power
It is expected that the state's public power problems will be subject of considerable discussion by the Legislature's public works committee. The committee, headed by Sen. Arnold Rubnik, Plymouth, met informally and agreed to invite public power officials before the committee, to recommend solutions. There still is sentiment in the Legislature for an antitrust study of the problem before the lawmakers attempt to get into the matter legally. Rubnik says he is a supporter of public power and that he feels the system is good. But he added, if there are weaknesses in it, they should be corrected. Rubnik says the power people have been attempting to solve their problems ever since he has been in the Legislature. Sen. Hans Jensen, Aurora, says the progress, if any, has been "real, real small."

Teacher Scholarships

The State Board of Education would like to see legislation passed to set up scholarships for 215 prospective teachers. Scholarships, the board feels, would help finance schooling for five preservice teachers from each legislative district who would receive \$400 per school year up to four years. The prospective teachers would not have to pay back the money as long as they remained in Nebraska and taught school for each year of benefits. If the teachers failed to teach in Nebraska a given number of years, they would be required to pay back the amount at \$400 per year with five percent interest. Cost of the proposal has been estimated at \$86,000 for the first year, \$172,000 for the second, \$258,000 for the third, and \$344,000 for each year thereafter. The board also has a new chairman, Hamilton Milton, Fremont, who replaces Frank Landis, Lincoln. W. Ray Hill, Seward, is vice chairman, replacing Milton.



consumed in this country about one-fourth is alfalfa. High yield crops are a wonderful feed, but good judgment is necessary. Alfalfa is outstanding in the amount and kind of protein it contains and, on the average, 100 pounds of alfalfa provides about 15 pounds of digestible protein. Even the best grasses usually furnish not more than five percent of digestible protein in the cured hay. Alfalfa is also high in digestibility and minerals if cut at early stage and properly cured. A weakness of this crop is its low energy content and care should be used that sufficient grain is fed to obtain balance of nutrients at all times.

Thinking that we are going to be obliged to look ahead and based on something pretty soon lost the whole future of Agriculture is impractical, and as you well know, that makes the future of our economic structure, for you and I have already seen, what cities in agriculture means to the general economy of our nation. The bad that apparently the Agricultural problem has become the football of politics, for it is far and away the important factor in the political expediency of any political party. Then to the leaders of the various farm organizations don't seem able to resolve their differences and based upon one unified course of action. You wouldn't think much of two doctors, in consultation, who could argue so long and vehemently over the treatment to be prescribed for a desperately ill patient, that in the end the patient died before they could reach a decision between themselves. This isn't the time to be looking back or reprimanding. It's the time for looking ahead. We have too much at stake right now to gamble over how best to do what we do now and in the immediate future, can't well determine the destiny of Agriculture for a long time to come. The immediate task lies in getting the job done regardless of the sacrifice, even to the extent of "cutting a little grow" on the part of the dissenting factions.


