Wayne Explorers Plan Canoe Trip

Winside Trustees to Consider Sewer Use Fees at Meeting

Farm Economist to Special Education Need To Use Funds For Speak Here Tuesday Studied in NE Nebraska Sewage Disposal

Everette Peterson, Agricultural Extension Economist at the University of Nebraska is to be the featured speaker at the Winside Sewerage Disposal Board meeting on Tuesday, at 8:00 a.m.

Peterson's talk will deal with how our agricultural surplus can help underdeveloped countries in the world. He will use slides to show actual conditions in India, Thailand and Pakistan which he visited early last year.

Family Extension agent, Harold Jones, emphasizes that every one who has country residents should be invited to attend.

Extension board member to replace Mrs. Frank Gilchrist, whose term has expired, is Mrs. J. W. Jones, who will report on the past year's activities.

Swine raisers from throughout Nebraska will converge at Wayne Wednesday for the first in a series of four area Rooters' Days sponsored by the University of Nebraska College of Agriculture.

The special all-day swine meeting at the city auditorium will focus attention on all aspects of efficient and profitable swine production.

Researchers and Extension specialists from the college will discuss the SPF (Swine Free) pig program on Nebraska farms, latest developments in swine buildings and facilities, problems in swine reproduction, and swine nutrition.

Starting off the Rooters' Day program at 9:30 a.m. will be a new area Swine Sanitation: A key to disease and Parasite Control, with many scenes shot on Nebraska farms.

Remainder of the morning session will focus on the SPF program on Nebraska farms, and swine buildings and facilities, with Leo Measland, E. A. Olson, Extension animal husbandman and agricultural engineer, respectively, as speakers.

The afternoon session will cover problems in swine reproduction and swine nutrition from the research side. Dwayne Zimmerman and Donald Hutman, Extension professors of animal husbandry, will discuss the two topics.

By attending the sessions, farmers will be able to obtain information which will be helpful in answering some of the following questions confronting the swine industry, on the basis of their own operation.

Directors Re-elected By Wayne Industries

Wayne Jeffrey, A. L. Swan and John Weiling, plant pathologists from the University of Nebraska, and County Agent Harold Ingalls, are the organizations' annual meeting Tuesday night.

The Tri County Association for Mentally Retarded Children met Thursday in Eastport with featured speaker Dr. Dick Campbell from the Special Education Department, Lincoln.

During the week, Dr. Campbell spent several days visiting school superintendents and others in this area to determine the special education facilities needed in northeast Nebraska.

Plans were made to hold a testing clinic in March to determine how many children might need additional help.

In his talk Thursday Dr. Campbell stated that there are six groups of youngsters that his department is equipped to help. Mentally handicapped youngsters who are developing from one-half to 5 1/2 years rapidly as normal children are one of these groups.

Others include orthopedically handicapped, those with visual difficulties, the hard of hearing, blind, deaf, hearing speech therapy, and nondominant youngsters.

He discussed the type of educational program which has been found to be the most successful in helping youngsters who are slow learners. In general this program should provide a half-day instruction in reading and arithmetic given by specially trained teachers at a slow and pace that the individual can understand in a group of no more than 10 other children. The other half day the child would spend with his own parents as they study social science, music, science and physical education.

Remainder of the cost of the disposal plant not collected by sewer use fees would be financed by bonds.

Three sites for the system have been proposed — on the south, the southeast corner, and the northeast corner of Winside. Of the three, engineers recommended the construction of a lagoon-type system on the southeast corner of the town, at a cost of \$15,410.

This would require a 50 x 600 acres of land. They also recommended the construction of a 900 lineal foot sewer along Main street to serve homes without sewer service. Estimated cost of this improvement, \$5,117, could be assessed against the benefited property.

The engineer's report said the town could finance the lagoon by a construction grant from the federal government of \$300,000 and the issuance of \$1,500 in general obligation bonds. The bond of trustees plan on the sewer use fees paid over the next five years to cut down the amount necessary to be financed by the bond.

The \$39,000 plan, proposed on the northeast corner of the town, would be a package treatment plant, of which general construction would be higher. The second plan, costing \$29,225, which would be high cost because of 750-ft sewer outfall line that would be necessary.

Shearing School Set in February

Persons who want to learn how to shear sheep will get a chance to do at a shearing school at the College of Agriculture, Lincoln, Feb. 22-24.

The sheep shearing school will be open to experienced and inexperienced shearers. Edward Warnick, Chicago, will be on hand to help conduct the school.

Frank Stigall, member of the Midwest Wool Marketing cooperative, Kansas City, will be on hand to answer questions. He will lead a discussion on repair and maintenance of sheep shearing equipment during an evening meeting the first day of the school.

Those attending the school will get an opportunity to shear 10 head of sheep. Practice shearing will be interspersed with demonstrations by Warner and Ted Doane, Extension sheepsman at the college.

Anyone interested in the school should complete an application form available at the Wayne County Extension office. Completed application forms must be returned to Doane by Feb. 11. There will be a slight fee to cover cost of materials needed at the school.

Winside's village board of trustees will hold a meeting Feb. 6 to consider an ordinance setting up a sewer use fee in preparation for the future construction of a sewer disposal plant. The fee will be based on water usage.

Attorney John Addison has been asked to draw up such an ordinance for consideration at the meeting.

A preliminary report on the proposed sewage treatment plant was presented to the board at their last meeting by the engineering firm of B. H. Becklund and Associates, Omaha. The report listed three types of plants for consideration in cost from \$15,410 to \$28,499.

The study was necessary so when they are ready to build the town can apply for Federal aid. This aid amounts to 30 percent of the construction costs, excluding land.

The board said the purpose of the sewer use tax now would be to build a reserve of several thousand dollars so construction can begin prior to 1966, thus fall within the state requirements. The state has recommended that towns in this area presently using South Logan creek for sewage disposal build sewage plants prior to 1966 or have federal aid withdrawn.

The red, white and blue truck will be used for parcel post deliveries and box pickup and distribution.

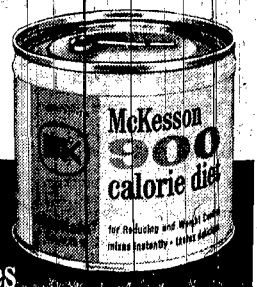

EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

You may not agree with an editorial. . . but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given a careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

Deep Roots in Economic Law

The magazine recently devoted a full page to the thesis that this nation needs more, not less, law. In the course of its discussion, it stated: "Whatever means have been used, the power is no longer directed toward the whole of the economy of the U.S. or the rest of the world. The entrepreneur, the tax reformer, the legislator can do a lot more to meet these needs than any of the current orthodox 'pro-labor' groups, such as a minimum wage law which would be a case of increasing the living standards of the poor, or a law which would simply limit the number of hours of work."

The current minimum wage proposals are a good example of the wrong way to go about it. Not only would the wage be increased, but the law would be extended to millions of workers in local enterprises, notably, retailing, who have heretofore been exempt. One result, as the magazine points out, would be that the affected enterprises would have to lay off marginal workers as possible. A second result, in all likelihood, would be a new wave of price increases. That is, a new wave of inflation. A third result, which is directly tied to the first, would be to deprive great numbers of unskilled people of the opportunity to gain experience that would qualify them for better jobs.

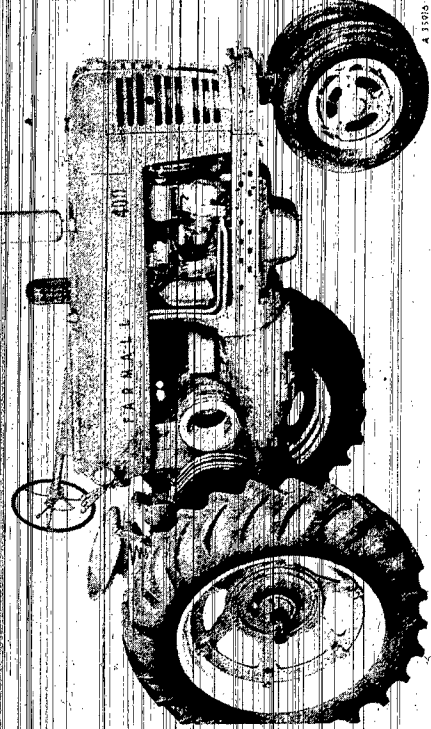
