Outline Disease-Free Pig Program Future in State

The SPF disease-free pig program in Nebraska has a bright future, provided the necessary precautions are taken to maintain a disease free status and that only genetically superior animals are sold as breeding stock.

This "situation" for swine producers from SPF Nebraska was outlined in Wayne Wednesday by Leo Lucas, Extension animal husbandman of the University of Nebraska, at the first of four "Rooter's Days" being held in the state. The special swine days are sponsored by the College of Agriculture and the Nebraska Breeders and Feeders association.

Yvonne LaDon Willers, Winside, is one of 10 University of Nebraska students selected by the state committee of the Nebraska Congress of Parents and Teachers associations to receive a \$120 scholarship award.

Yvonne, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Willers, was a junior in Teachers college and a member of Kappa Delta sorority.

Awards were made to individuals who have made a significant contribution to education and have maintained high scholastic averages. All recipients are enrolled in programs leading to teaching certificates.

Money for the scholarships comes from the Honorary State Life memberships purchased by the individual units.

Wausa's Vikings took advantage of Wayne Prep's rugged ball-handling and leaky defense Friday night to hand the Panthers their first defeat of the season, 60-57 in overtime at WSTC's Rice gym.

Prep will travel to Ponca Friday. Ponca will play host to the Panthers Tuesday.

The rugged ball-handling and lack of offensive rebounding allowed Prep to maintain its lead over the Vikings after Wayne had appeared to be off to an easy win in the opening period.

Two 20-foot jump shots by Ken Headlee in the last 48 seconds of the regulation game enabled Prep to send the game into the extra session. Headlee's second shot with 21 seconds remaining sent the game into the extra session with the score knotted at 53-all.

The overtime period was half over before Prep managed another point. Wausa, meanwhile, had taken a 53-52 lead in four points by Rowland Anderson and a pair of free throws by Johnson. EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From the basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

Amos 'n Andy Bookkeeping

Expansion of the Social Security system to include medical care for elderly persons offers some tough nuts to crack. Experience shows that in political things we advocated that are unworkable.

Richard Sturges, columnist for the Washington Daily News, reveals some not very comforting statistics on the entire Social Security setting: "In its first quarter century," he says, "Social Security took in \$70 billion. It paid out \$50 billion of that and has \$20 billion of government built-up in the kitty. Against that \$20 billion there are obligations at the present rate of benefits, of \$30 billion."

If you wonder how the Social Security system has reached such a pass, the answer is simple: Sturges cites a not unusual case — a pensioner who died for three years, starting in 1937. Then

he retired. Since then he and his late wife together have drawn \$13,400 in benefits while their total contributions to the fund had been \$40. But, in the case of young people starting to work, circumstances are reversed: They can never hope to take out as much as they are forced to contribute.

There is little justification for further taxing in the name of Social Security, already overtaxed younger workers to provide medical care for millions of elderly persons who are both able and willing to care for themselves.

Sen. Harry F. Byrd, a distinguished Democrat who has as great an understanding of the fiscal problems of the Federal government as any man does not mince words: "I am opposed to . . . compulsory medical service and hospitalization under the Social Security system. I am convinced this would lead to socialized medicine with the possibility that it would bankrupt the Social Security trust fund."

Morrison called for spending of \$82.6 million in tax dollars for all agencies for the next two years, comparing with the \$76.6 million appropriated from tax funds for state government by the 1959 Legislature.

Other features of the morning program will include a movie entitled, "Know the Seed You Plant," produced by the Minnesota Crop Improvement association.

Richard Mills, associate secretary-manager of the Nebraska Crop Improvement association, will discuss the topic: "Is There a Difference?"
