## Carroll Girl Wins County Spelling Crown Saturday

Judy Stevens, Carroll eighth grader, became Wayne county's 1961 spelling champion Saturday afternoon at the city auditorium. Miss Stevens won over 99 other students who competed in the sixth annual event sponsored by The Wayne Herald and Wayne Book Store. She will represent Wayne county in the Midwest Spelling Bee at Omaha this spring.

Daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leo Stevens, Judy defeated Marcia Krusemark, sixth grader from District 7, in the final spell-down. It was the third year Miss Stevens competed in the county bee. She was runner-up in the town division a year ago.

The championship hinged on the word, "fathom." Marcia misspelled the word, spelling it "fathum." Judy then spelled the word correctly and spelled "portentous" to gain the title.

As the champion, Judy received a \$115 portable typewriter. Marcia received a \$25 pen and pencil set. The final spell-down between the town and rural champions required 14 words to determine the champion. Judy correctly spelled retroactive, mutilation, globular, transport, extrajudicial, treacherous, fathom and portentous. Marcia spelled calico, conveyance, defendant, eccentric, corsage and fabulous before missing fathom.

Steve Sumner, Wayne High eighth grader, was the town division runner-up. He received a \$25 savings bond from the First National bank. When he was eliminated, Wayne High lost its chance for permanent possession of the trophy which goes to the champion's school. Three consecutive championships are needed to gain permanent possession. Wayne High students had won in 1959 and 1960.

The rural division runner-up was Kathleen Baker, District 183 eighth grader. She received a \$25 savings bond from the State National bank. The 100 contestants were cut to 17 before the oral spell-down was started. 10 in the rural division and seven in the town division. These 17 spellers went through the entire preliminary list of 200 words before any of them made an error.

We were moving so slow that when we reached the office where my husband works, I got off the bus, went to his office to let him know where I was, went back and got on the same bus and stood it out for a few more hours.

## Change in Rule for Market Hog Show

Wayne area swine producers were reminded today that the rules for entering the ninth annual Midwest Market Hog Show at Fremont Mar. 11, have been altered slightly since the first announcement.

The rules now state that the show is open to anyone, but each exhibitor will be limited to one pen of three market hogs. In addition, each exhibitor must be at least eight years of age, according to Leo Lickes, Extension animal husbandman at the University of Nebraska.

Hog producers interested in entering animals in the Show should contact County Extension Agents in Iowa or Nebraska or the Livestock Department, George A. Hornel Co., Fremont, for Show rules and an application blank. Applications must be postmarked not later than Mar. 4, 1961.

Lucas says the purpose of the show is to further interest and knowledge of desirable type, weight, and finish of market hogs. While pigs should be clean, no credit will be given for special fitting or showing.

## Show 41% of Local Retail Dollar for Food and Cars

Just how the average Wayne county family spent its retail dollar during the past fiscal year, tripping on some kinds of purchases and expanding on others is revealed in the latest market data findings.

All in all, it appears, local residents did not become so disturbed at signs of the current recession as to curtail their purchasing generally. As a result, most retail lines stood up well.

The details are from the comprehensive study of consumer buying made by the Standard Rate and Data Service on the basis of Federal, state and local reports. All sections of the country are covered.

The study shows that the nation's consumers, despite considerable unemployment, spent \$218 billion in retail stores in the year as against \$209 billion in fiscal 1959.

In Wayne county, a major portion of the retail dollar went for food and for automobile purchases and operation. This commitment received 41 percent of the dollar.

The total so-spent in local stores in the 12-month period was \$4,567,000. A breakdown shows that \$2,218,000 of that amount was spent for food locally. This is exclusive of expenditures made in restaurants.

Dealers selling cars, trailers, boats and other automotive equipment of a non-industrial nature had sales of \$1,665,000. Gas filling stations accounted for an additional \$694,000 in the year.

The rest of the retail spending picture in Wayne county appears in the totals recorded by the other types of stores. Most of them compared well with the fiscal 1959 figures.

The principal ones, as shown in the SRDS report, are: General merchandise stores, with a sales volume of \$518,000, apparel shops, \$294,000, home furnishings stores, \$226,000, and drug stores, \$194,000.

## Growth of Wayne Cited as Reason For New Service

Wayne telephone service will be changed to dial operation in the summer of 1962, according to W. G. Schulz, manager of Northwest Bell. Plans to convert to dial service are the direct result of the growth of Wayne, Schulz stated.

A new addition to be built between the present building and garage will house the dial equipment and provide for four additional garage stalls and storage facilities. The one-story addition will be 34x39 feet of masonry construction that will fit in well with the existing building. Present plans call for construction to start in mid-1961, Schulz said.

Engineering of the new system is underway and equipment will soon be ordered. The system will be tailor-made to serve Wayne customers for local and long distance service.

It will be installed in the building addition early in 1962. After the changeover to dial service, some of the old apparatus will be removed from the present building, making room for additional equipment in the future and for larger business office quarters. The present busi-ness office will be temporarily relocated until after the conversion to dial.

The new equipment will make it possible for customers in cities that have direct distance dialing to dial their own long distance calls direct to Wayne telephones. It will also be designed to permit Wayne customers to dial their own long distance calls to telephones in other cities when Wayne is connected to the customer Direct Distance Dialing network of some future date.

The new local dialing equipment will be designed to improve service to many ways. One feature will be the reduction of the number of customers on rural lines to eight or less with the ringing adjusted so that customers will hear only one other ring besides their own. Extensive work will be done on other outside lines and cables to prepare for the dial service. A new buried cable will be placed to Norfolk and all long distance circuits will be on it, making the lines storm proof.

Schulz explained that although the new equipment will arrive early in 1962, it will take several months to complete the installation and test it to assure that it is ready to take over the handling of calls. Local telephone men will be trained to operate the equipment.

The new telephone numbers will be the type that work best for local dialing of calls and will fit in with the nationwide system of long distance dialing by customers. By making use of these numbers now, a change at some later date will be avoided. The numbers will consist of seven digits and the first three numerals for all phones will be 375.

A directory including the new numbers, information about proper dialing of calls, numbers to dial to reach the Fire and Police departments, the Sheriff's office and how to reach the telephone company for service calls will be issued at the time of the changeover.

Starting soon, new telephones that are installed will be equipped with dials. A little later on, a special group of repairmen will start the job of repairing all telephones for dial operation.

Schulz pointed out that Wayne's office now serves over 2,200 telephones, nearly three times as many as in 1940. The new dial system will be the most modern available, engineered and designed to meet the telephone service needs of Wayne customers now and in the foreseeable future.

He explained that he is happy to be able to announce this telephone service improvement program for Wayne and he said, "Dial service is easy to use and I am sure everyone will find it enjoyable in every way."

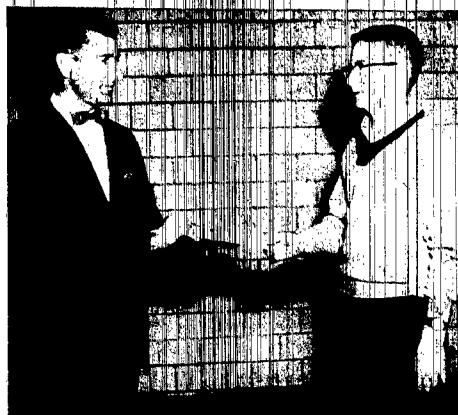

# EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is the person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

## Give Public The Facts

Two bills were introduced in the Nebraska Unicameral last week that should be of particular interest to every taxpayer in the state. They are LB 305 and LB 306 introduced by three of the Legislature's most prominent members — Sen. Joe Vinsona, Wilbur S. Stin, Hal Bradenbaugh, Dakota City, and Sen. J. O. Peck, Columbus.

LB 305 amends a law already on the books that has to do with publishing claims and proceedings of Class II and III schools (schools in districts with up to 50,000 population having both elementary grades and high school). The amendment spells out the fact that schools shall publish the proceedings of a school board meeting instead of "a brief statement of proceedings which may be of interest to the public" as decided by the board secretary. Actually, such proceedings are already published by the county boards and city and village boards and the publishing of the goings on in school board meetings should be a boon to better understanding of schools the state over.

Cost of such publications would be very insignificant — probably about \$100 a year.

LB 306 would require Class I schools — those having elementary grades only — to publish an annual budget. This same requirement is already made of Class II and III schools under existing laws.

School people and school board members throughout Nebraska should welcome such legislation. Since the largest portion of the tax dollar goes for schools and education, it is only natural that people would want to know how the money is being spent. Such publicity should bring a better understanding of schools and school people.

## Remember Who Pays!

Efforts to broaden Nebraska's tax base are gathering a full head of steam in the current session of the Legislature. Bills have already been introduced which would "replace" the state property tax with a sales and/or income tax.

Proponents of one of the sales tax measures state their bill will "replace" the present \$30 million state property tax with a sales tax that would produce \$50 to \$60 million for the state coffers.

Admittedly such a measure would probably better equalize the tax burden on Nebraska residents, but we doubt seriously if it can produce any form of tax reduction. Proponents of the sales tax measure forget to mention that this \$50 to \$60 million is still going to come from the

The time has come for joint effort by Nebraska's long-suffering property taxpayers. State your views now. Voice them to State Senator Perot Clausen and other members of the Legislature. Let them know there is a bottom to the pocket of Nebraska taxpayers. It is time the government stopped treating these pockets as a bottomless pit from which to draw funds for the ever-increasing demands of our swelling bureaucracy.

## Caucus Consideration

Caucuses to name candidates for important community positions will be held Tuesday by the Popular and Citizen parties. There are two vacancies coming up on the Wayne Board of Education and it is important that truly interested people be nominated for these jobs.

But many people feel it is a mark of shame to run for a public office and be defeated. They fail to realize that even in defeat, they are head and shoulders above a person who was interested and had the qualifications, but failed to take his chances with the voters.

People who put their community service on a level that very possibly interferes with their free time and absorbs much of their energy can only be admired, even if they don't attain the office they are seeking.

The "losers" also provide an excellent source of help for the winners. These are people the office holders feel they can call on for assistance because they know the problems and aims of a school board and are interested, or they wouldn't have been candidates.

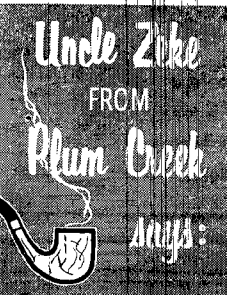

J. H. McBride, Minden, has been re-elected chairman of the Advisory State Highway Commission. Vice Chairman is Merte Kingsbury, Ponca. The commission, at its regular meeting also heard Sen. Cecil Craft, North Platte state he feels the state should concentrate more on its secondary road system.

The highway department told the commission that about 40 percent of the state's primary and secondary matching money is going to secondary roads compared to about 33 percent in other states where money is channeled through the counties.

There's probably no job this winter that will pay you better wages than checking over your machinery and getting it in shape for next year.

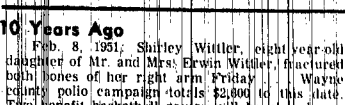

## Propose New Distribution Formula for Gasoline Taxes

Lincoln — A controversial area would be opened up by a bill introduced in the Legislature regarding gasoline tax funds. Sens. Jack Romans, Ord, Matt Wylie, Elgin and George Fleming. Sidney propose legislation to revise the manner of distributing rural mail route gasoline tax money.

They want to base the distribution formula on miles of rural mail routes in a county instead of population.

Under the present formula, administrative expenses and refunds are deducted first from revenue received from the state's seven cents a gallon tax on gasoline. Fifteen percent of the remainder goes to counties for graveling or otherwise improving rural mail routes.

In past sessions, lawmakers have been hesitant to get into the question of law in which the mail route provision is found. The proposal could be expected to produce a considerable activity this session. Meanwhile, there will be another try to make sure that no

State Fair Board Secretary Edwin Schwartz said a change in length of the annual exposition, approved by the fair board, would save about \$10,000 in payrolls and gate charges. The board decided to open the 1961 fair on Saturday, Sept. 2 and continue through Thursday midnight.

Theme of the 1961 event will be the Civil War Centennial. Schwartz said the fair board, despite the tightest financial year in some time, hopes to launch a second 10-year expansion plan including new buildings, one of which would be a Future Farmers of America structure, expected to cost between \$80,000 and \$70,000.
