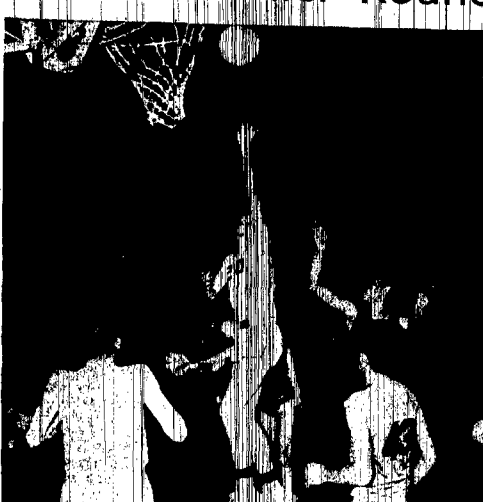
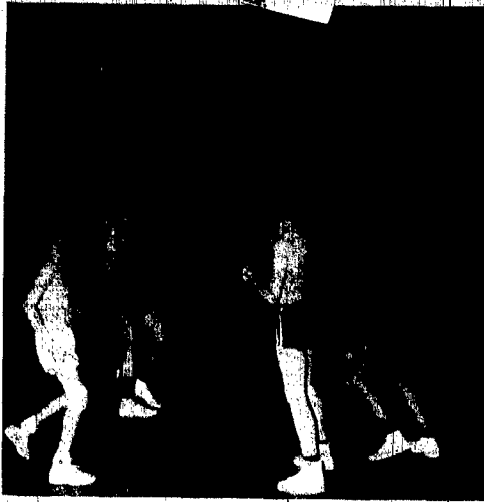


# The Junior High Basketball Tournament First Round Highlights

## Over 1,200 Hours Spent in Fire Calls and Maintenance

Wayne's Volunteer Fire department spent approximately 747 man hours answering 28 fire alarms in Wayne during 1960. An average of 16 men answered each call.

Of the 28 alarms, three were residential, three mercantile, three farm calls, eight grass fires, eight auto and tractor, two false alarms and one rescue. In the calls, one life was lost and approximately \$9,500 in property damage was incurred.

About 465 man hours were spent at department drills and state fire schools of instruction, plus many uncounted hours devoted to maintaining equipment.

The department said it wishes to thank the public for its cooperation in the past, but asks for its cooperation in the future in abiding by Wayne City Ordinance 7-313, which states in part: "It shall be unlawful for any person to build or cause to be built or set out, any fire in the open air within the fire limits. It shall be unlawful for any person to burn any substance in any incinerator, stove or oven, regardless of type of construction, within said fire limits."

## Amount of Support Corn Still Growing

Corn from the 1960 crop is going under loan in a record movement in many areas throughout the county, according to the Department of Agriculture's latest report on price-support programs.

Lloyd Morris, chairman of the Wayne ASC committee, said today the speeding-up trend is apparent in the amount of corn moving under the support program locally.

Through January, Wayne farmers had put 652,000 bushels of the 1960 crop corn under price-support loans and purchase agreements. Of this total, 652,000 bushels were farmed-stored. A year earlier, through December 1959, 500,000 bushels of the Wayne county 1959 crop corn had been put under the support program.

## Set Chinese Play At WSTC Next Week

Included in the total are college students in resident instruction but not correspondence or extension students or Hahn school pupils.

## Chamber of Commerce Starts Dues Drive After Successful Past Year

Wayne Chamber of Commerce, first organized in 1908 as the Wayne Commercial Club, enjoyed a very successful year in 1960. The Chamber's broad program, which is more than a retail program, touched on subjects from hogs to home-makers. It is now conducting the annual dues drive.

Reprinted below is a newspaper clipping of 1960 that tells of the establishment of the Commercial Club and its objectives. Following this is a brief summary of the 1960 accomplishments that shows how closely the organization has followed the objectives as originally set.

The city of Wayne, which with its splendid surrounding country and intelligent and most progressive people is one of the most promising points in northeast Nebraska, has set itself to the work of organizing and maintaining an effective local improvement association, and on Thursday evening the 28th, held a large meeting at its opera house to that end. The opera house management had donated the use of the building and the Wayne brass band was out in force. As a first step toward launching a club, Mr. J. F. Hanson, secretary of the Fremont Commercial club, had been invited to be present and his address was the main feature of the evening. Articles of association of a form calculated to secure effectiveness and permanence were adopted and in a membership campaign followed up the next day more than two-thirds of the business concerns of the city were enrolled. The enrollment is being continued, and it is expected that every business interest in the city will participate, the articles of association being on a basis such as gives the club a reliable monthly income. In the circulation of the membership lists on Friday, sixty names of firms, banks and individuals were secured, no one whom the committee had time to see refusing to join." (1908)

## Home Show Space Now Nearing Booth Capacity

So far 375 feet of booth space, a display of five automobiles and the flowers for the lobby have been planned for the annual Wayne Home Show. This total is made up of 27 different exhibits.

Chamber of Commerce secretary Ken Parke, said he still has some space left, but asked persons interested in booth space at the show to contact him as soon as possible, since work on the booths is now underway.

The show, which is lining up to be even bigger and better than last year's excellent show, is scheduled for Mar. 13-14.

## 620 County Farmers Have Conservation Plans Working

Thirty-eight farmers became operators with the Wayne County Soil Conservation district during 1960. This makes a total of 620 farmers who have a conservation plan on their farms. With the assistance of the ASC and Extension service, the 1960 program was designed to promote conservation education, technical services and financial assistance in meeting local conservation problems. Approximately \$30,000 of ACP cost sharing was used on 215 farms in the Wayne County Soil Conservation district to help establish needed conservation practices.

Some of the major accomplishments of the district this year are: 40 miles of terraced constructed, 2,080 acres of farm land newly contoured, nine dams constructed, 22 new farmstead windbreaks established and 247 acres of cropland drained by tile and open ditches. Many ditches were opened into waterways and speeded to grass. Several wildlife habitat plantings were made and several farm ponds were stocked with fish.

The outstanding educational activity for the year was a Conservation School day held at Wayne for all grade school children. This is an annual program sponsored by the Izaak Walton League in cooperation with the district. Twenty schools participated in this program and approximately 800 students and parents observed this activity.

Other educational activities in which the district participated were the Siouxsian Better Farming program and the county "picture award" program.

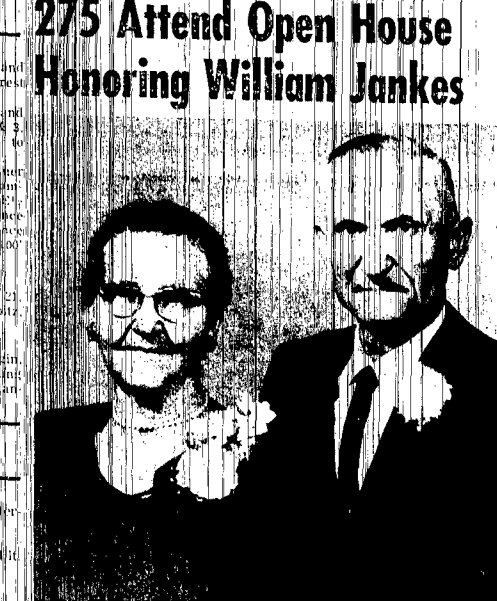

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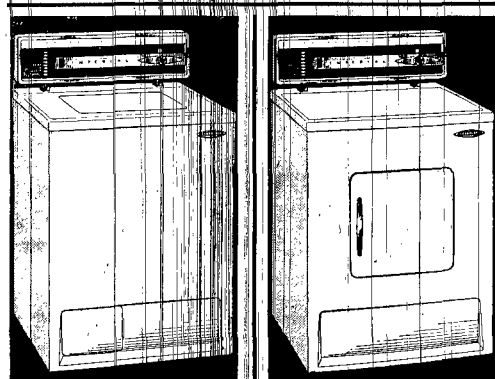

# EDITORIAL COMMENT

You may not agree with an editorial — but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

## A Forward Step, But . . .

Wayne's city council last week decided to put before the city's voters the question of whether to "acquire off-street parking facilities in the downtown business area."

The decision has much merit. Wayne is in need of such type of planning for future expansion. It is hoped local voters will consider the value of such a proposal in the light of parking problems which will arise with future growth of the city.

We do not feel that Wayne is confronted with a parking problem at the present time. But now is the time to consider problems which might arise in the future. When the city does develop a major parking problem, it will have to be solved. It is better to solve the problem now than to wait for it to arise and inflate the value of property in and adjacent to the business district.

While the parking situation is before the council there are two improvements which should have immediate attention — employee parking and enforcement of existing parking regulations.

The main cause of most current complaints about parking in Wayne evolves from the fact that a large number of local employees park their cars on Main street, often for the entire day. Drives to curb this practice have been made several times in the past, but proved of value for only a short period.

Action by the council now to create more parking turnover on Main street will help to eliminate many current parking complaints. Perhaps a two-hour parking limit on Main would "mooch" employees' cars off and make room for customer parking.

Another step which would also prevent many complaints would be the strict enforcement of the city's parking regulations. A more liberal distribution of warning tickets and a few appearances of violators in court would soon solve the chronic problem of getting drivers to park their cars properly.

The city council has shown considerable foresight in placing the off-street measure on the April election ballot. We hope the councilmen will also see fit to institute the two other proposals we have stated here.

## A Dangerous Principle

Economists are predicting the new Federal administration will take quick action to aid depressed areas. The immediate steps may include more job insurance, more public works and other measures to alleviate what is felt to be the growing problem of joblessness.

What many do not seem to realize is that government itself can create unemployment as a result of over-regulation of our free market economy. The January issue of Nation's Business presents a telling case against impending proposals

to raise the minimum wage and extend coverage of the Fair Labor Standards act. This act was conceived with the best of humanitarian intentions toward "those who toil in the factories."

As with most government activities, the wage-hour law had an innocuous beginning. In 1938 the minimum wage was set at 25 cents an hour, raised to 40 cents in 1945 and 75 cents in 1949. In 1950 it was set at \$1. In 1960 both houses of Congress had bills under consideration that would have boosted the minimum wage to \$1.25 and extended coverage to a point that legislators felt would actually result in Federal coverage for all employees of all businesses. Congress adjourned without making changes.

The new Congress will probably receive similar measures for increasing the minimum wage in the near future. A bill has already been introduced in the Nebraska Unicameral which would establish a State minimum wage of \$1 per hour and extend its coverage to many businesses not now under the Federal law.

The irony of the minimum wage law is that, aside from its humanitarian goals, it is becoming a prime cause of unemployment. No less an authority than the U. S. Department of Labor studied the economic effects of the minimum wage after it was raised in 1950 from 75 cents to \$1 an hour. The Department found "significant declines in employment in most of the low-wage industry segments studied."

Increasing wages by government decree simply means fewer jobs for marginal workers and increased wage costs all along the line in order to maintain wage differentials. And this is true even for businesses not covered by the law.

To determine potential results of extending and increasing the minimum wage as proposed in the last Congress, Nation's Business queried firms in all parts of the country. These queries showed that a variety store chain operating in eight southern states would be hit with a \$360,000 a year increase in wage costs. It would have to fire 110 workers — the youngest and oldest women employees. A Louisiana druggist with five stores would have to discharge 50 of his 140 employees to stay in business. Some of them are teenagers; some elderly widows supplementing their Social Security checks with part-time work. A Cincinnati department store would have to lay off 90 employees, raise its prices ten percent, eliminate overtime and no longer consider hiring unskilled persons older than 50.

Multiply these instances by thousands and you get a pretty good idea of what overregulation can do. And in this instance it would almost certainly give another turn to the thumb-screws of inflation.

The most telling indictment against the Federal and State minimum wage is in the dangerous principle involved — that of government injecting itself as final judge and jury in the bargaining area between employer and employee.

July 1 there will be a new member of the State Board of Control, which governs state institutions. He will be James Murphy, Omaha attorney and partner of the board.

Murphy was named by Gov. Frank Morrison to succeed Charles K. Moran, currently chairman of the board.

Both are Democrats. July 1, Vice Chairman Harold Peterson, a Republican, will move into board chairman and Mrs. Ethel Kirwin, member, will be elevated to vice chairman. Murphy did considerable work for the governor in his election campaign.

## Fake Kits

Law enforcement officials revealed they have been investigating for some time distribution of counterfeit driver's licenses, draft cards and birth registration cards.

Al Scissors, director of the State Motor Vehicle department, said the cards were being used primarily by minors to buy liquor.

He estimated about 1,000 fake kits were in circulation, with the driver's license bearing the fake number of LI-157269.

## Legislature Works

State senators have settled down to the drudgery of proposing legislation. The type and number of bills introduced so far indicate to veteran lawmakers that the solons might well set a record length this session and possibly break the high of 739 bills introduced in one session. At the end of the 20-day production period for individual senators 670 measures were in the hopper, four less than for the 1950 session which set the record of 739 bills.

## Small Schools

In the opinion of State Education Commissioner F. B. Decker, Nebraska students are being "short-changed" in high schools which operate with 25 students or less.

Decker said such small schools are limited in the courses they can offer, have a difficult time attracting high caliber teachers and operation costs are high.

What kind of farm program do we need?

Fifty farm and business leaders in NE Nebraska advise little change. This seems to be the majority opinion of folks attending recent farm policy meetings at Emerson.

The suggestions which met with most favor included measures to expand domestic consumption, to find new uses for farm products and to expand exports.

Most of those attending agreed that continuing the price support and storage program is a necessary but temporary solution. However, they felt that a compulsory crop acreage retirement is needed to make the program effective.

Many voiced the hope for an orderly return to free market prices.

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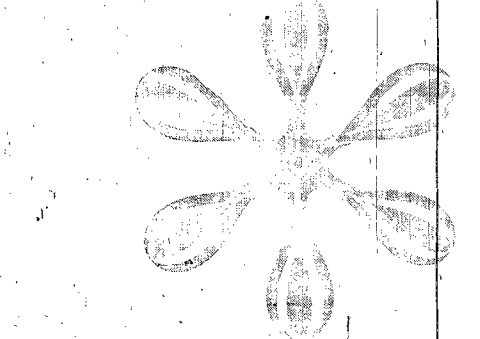

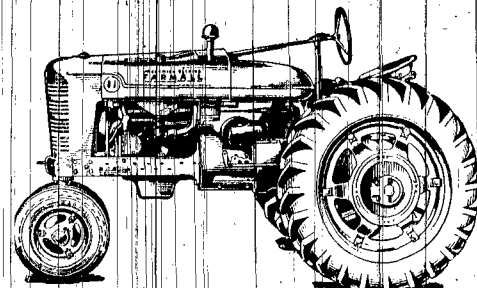
