



# The Junior High Basketball Tournament First Round Highlights

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## Over 1,200 Hours Spent in Fire Calls and Maintenance

Wayne's Volunteer Fire department spent approximately 747 man hours answering 28 fire alarms in Wayne during 1960. An average of 16 men answered each call.

Of the 28 alarms, three were residential, three mercantile, three farm calls, eight grass fires, eight auto and tractor, two false alarms and one fire. In the calls, one life was lost and approximately \$9,500 in property damage was incurred.

About 465 man hours were spent at department drills and state fire schools of instruction, plus many uncounted hours devoted to maintaining equipment.

The Department said it wishes to thank the public for its cooperation in the past, but asks for its cooperation in the future in abiding by Wayne City Ordinance 7-13, which states in part: "It shall be unlawful for any person to build or cause to be built or set out, any fire in the open air within the fire limits. It shall be unlawful for any person to burn any substance or any incandescent stove or oven, regardless of type of construction, within said fire limits."

## Allen Man Receives Doctorate at Nebraska

Corn from the 1960 crop is going under loan in a record movement in many areas throughout the country, according to the Department of Agriculture's latest report on price-support programs.

Lloyd Morris, chairman of the Wayne ASC committee, said today the speeded-up trend is apparent in the amount of corn moving under the support program locally.

Through January, Wayne farmers had put 652,000 bushels of the 1960 corn crop under price-support loans and purchase agreements. Of this total, 652,000 bushels were farm-stored. A year earlier, through December 1959, 500,000 bushels of the Wayne 1959 crop corn had been put under the support program.

Nationally, farmers had put more than 152 million bushels of 1960 crop corn under price support through December 1960, compared with over 122 million bushels of 1959-crop corn put under support through December 1959. Of the 1960-crop total, 130 million bushels were farm-stored, 21 million bushels warehouse-stored, and 1.2 million bushels under purchase agreements.

**Wildcats Fade in Losses to Chadron**

Basketball fortunes change rapidly. WSTC's Wildcats discovered last weekend in losing a pair to Chadron State, and also losing one of their scoring aces to injury.

A week earlier Wayne had upset conference speculation by downing both Doane and Peru — both times coming from half-time deficits. At Chadron, the Wildcats handled the Eagles with relative ease in the first halves, but failed to hold their advantage in either game; Chadron produced 10-point winning margins, 71-61 and 78-68.

The Wildcats, who not long ago visioned title hopes, will have to scrap for a place in the four-team NAIA district playoff. They will entertain Nebraska Wesleyan Friday and go to Peru Saturday.

Last weekend's NCC campaign left Wayne, 3-5, in fourth place behind Peru, 7-1; Kearney, 5-2, and Wesleyan, 3-3. Chadron and Hastings share fifth with 2-4 records while Doane trails at 2-5.

Wayne started out strong against Chadron Friday and was handling their hosts neatly until Ron Marcellus sprained an ankle in a dash for the basket after stealing the ball at midcourt. He already had hit eight points when the injury happened with about eight minutes left in the first half. He did not suit up for the second game and may not be able to play this week.


Chadron's Felix Sanford, a 6-6 freshman center, proved he ranks with the league's best on defense as he regularly foiled Wayne's scoring efforts near the basket. The Cats resorted to outside shooting, including five late long shots by Charles Rachow, which kept Wayne alive but not enough to lead.

In the second game Chadron sprang quickly to an 11-3 lead before Wayne managed a goal after seven minutes. Then the Wildcats zoomed into a lead and stretched it to 42-31 at the half. Larry Coney, back atop the Wayne scoring race, hit 19 points in that first half and added five more in the second to get high point honors, though he fouled out later. Denny Torgerson and Jon Garcia also were foul-out victims of a whistling spree.

In fact, Chadron lived on fouls, hitting 32 of 43 free throws, while Wayne scored 20 of 28.

Wayne will be underdog in both outings this week. Wesleyan defeated the Cats 82-75 last month, and have lost to Wayne only three times in the last 10 years.

The Wildcats have fared better against Peru — in fact, have beaten the Bobcats the last five times. But despite the Wayne win of two weeks ago, Peru will rule the favorite on its record.


