1956 to 1959 Storage Payments Start Soon

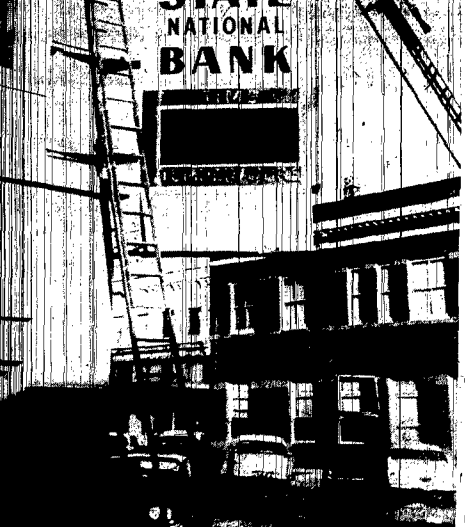

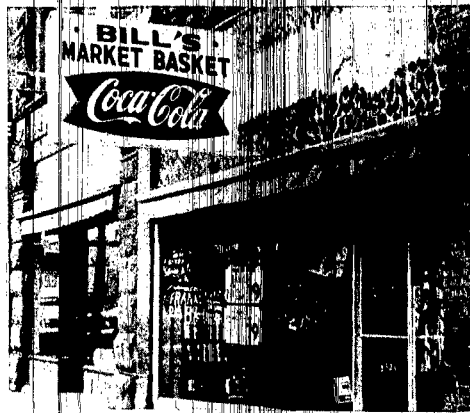

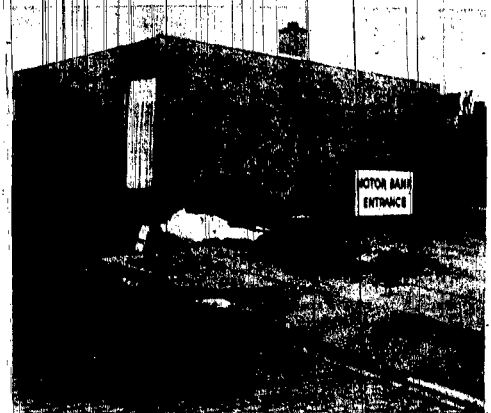

Flame Cultivation May Become More Important

Flame cultivation, to control weeds and grass in corn, soybeans and cotton, may become increasingly important, according to a report by Bill Fletcher, agricultural editor for the Doane Agricultural Digest.

Flame and labor costs and improved equipment such as miniature plows have stimulated new interest in this method of weed control. Flaming is normally done with plants from 6 to 12 inches high.

Backing their advice are results from Minnesota trials that show pigs given 13 square feet of floor space gained 11% faster on 0.5% less feed than pigs given 9 square feet. A critical point is feeder space 1.5 to more than 4 pigs per feeder hole.

## Allow More Space For Pigs to Make Management Easier

Allow more space for growing pigs and you'll reduce feed costs and cut down on winter management problems. This recommendation is carried in the mid-December issue of the Doane Agricultural Digest.

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## Self Feeding Silage May Not Save Labor

Self-feeding silage is practical and will save money for most dairymen, advises the Doane Agricultural Digest.

Major savings come from lowered equipment and machinery cost. Based on labor at 75¢ per hour, it will be economical to feed from bunker silos than uprights with mechanical conveyance up to 300 tons of silage. This will hold true only so long as increased spoilage loss is under 5%.

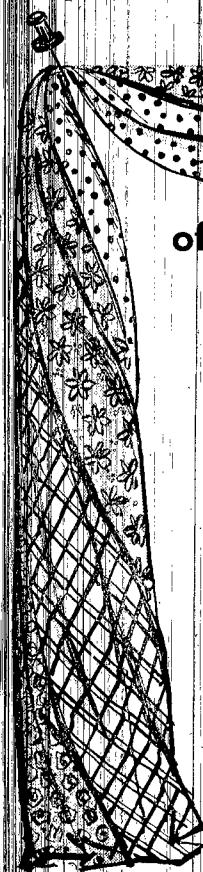

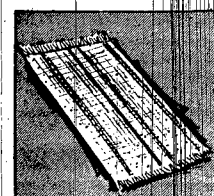
