## Council OK's New Parking Ordinance For Three Churches

Wayne city council passed an ordinance Tuesday requiring cars parking outside three of its main parking lots to pay \$10 a day. Grace Lutheran, Zion, St. Agnes and First Methodist Church.

This takes in the north side of Ninth street between Main and Logan streets; the east side of Lincoln street between Fifth and Sixth streets; and the south side of Sixth street for a distance of 150 feet west of Main street.

The council now has a working agreement to purchase the necessary amount of land needed to meet specifications for a National Guard armory from Marvin Olson. The lands will all be given to Highway 36 and be as follows: 13.65 acres to fall out the rear of the armory and I will help the present owner to purchase the same.





# Pierce, Oakland to Vie in Husker Playoff Here Today

Pierce and Oakland will clash in the annual Husker conference basketball playoff tonight at the Wayne city auditorium.

Oakland, the East division titlist, is rated a slight favorite on the basis of superior height and a better season's record. The Vikings have a 12-3 record for the season. Pierce is 9-6 for the season. The Blue Jays took the West division title in a scrambled race.

Oakland has appeared in the league play-off four times but managed only one victory, a 23-17 win over Wayne in 1957. The Vikings lost to Wayne in 1952 and 1957 and to Winside in 1953.

This will be Pierce's first appearance in the play-off's since joining the league two years ago.

Oakland has been picked second by six foot Jeff Bogue, Phil Willard is the tallest of the Viking starters, at 6-4. The other regulars are Brian Rudell, 5-11; Ron Swenson, 5-8 and Steve Tietjen, 5-11. All are seniors except Rudell, who is a sophomore.

Coach Roger Miller will start three sophomores for Pierce. They are Larry Roemer, 6-0; Dick Waracki, 5-11, and Bernie Nave, 5-8. The squad leaders are Dick Zierke, 5-11 and Mark Gruett, 6-0. Both are seniors.



# EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

## Double Talk

When is insurance not insurance? The answer to that is the Federal Social Security system. According to legal interpretation, Social Security benefits are no more than "gifts" handed out to Social Security recipients at the pleasure of the Federal government. If you do not believe this, read the following testimony of the Social Security administrator before the Supreme Court:

"The QASI program is in no sense a Federally administered insurance program under which each worker pays premiums over the years and acquires at retirement an indefeasible right to receive a fixed monthly benefit. . . The contributions exacted under the . . . program are a tax . . . Consistent with the non-contractual nature of QASI benefits is the ruling of the Internal Revenue service that monthly benefit payments are voluntary payments to the recipient by the government . . . a belief has developed . . . that . . . benefits are paid as the result of a contractual obligation on the part of the U. S. government . . . This belief has been fostered to a considerable extent by publications and other statements of responsible officials of the Social Security administration."

The Social Security administration, for public consumption, says: "Beginning Jan. 1, 1960, 5¢ more Social Security tax on every \$100 you earn (and 50¢ more from your employer) . . . provides: Monthly payments for you and your family at retirement or when you are between age 60 and 65 and severely disabled . . . for more information on your rights and benefits see your Social Security office."

As one actuarial authority observes: "When statements as self-contradictory as these are issued

## Don't Blame the Retailer

Inflation!!! Don't think you can escape it as Federal taxes, debt and wages keep rising. Commenting on this, the Bradenton, Fla., Herald says: "Every month we read the cost of living index has risen one or two-tenths of a percent — but long ago we stopped paying any attention."

The retailer is the buffer from which rising costs must bounce off to the consumer — he has long absorbed a percentage of cost increases. He is the first one blamed for high prices, a condition over which he has no control. For this reason he has to be alert to price-raising practices such as the 25¢ an hour increase proposed under the Federal wage-hour act. He knows that would force costs up another notch and that he would stand the brunt of complaints about increases for which he was not responsible.

To bring inflation into perspective. The Herald editors went to the paper's files of 25 years ago and checked advertised prices with those of today. If inflation continues at the present rate, here is what they would be in 1985: Round steak, \$6.25 a pound; pork chops, \$3.50 a pound; can of corned beef, \$2.95; tooth brush, \$2.25; 1985 two-door auto, \$8,900; hamburger, \$2.15.

"Suppose," says The Herald, "what many economists fear does actually happen — inflation quits crawling and runs away!" What a price to pay for public indifference!

that have been introduced, the enigma becomes more intense.

The head of the budget committee, Sen. Richard Marvel, Hastings, urged committee chairmen to report out of committee as soon as possible all bills that will require an expenditure.

Unless this is done it will put the budget committee behind in its work, Marvel commented. He said the group is 10 days ahead of the same committee in the 1959 session.

State Sen. George Syas, Omaha, pointed to the need for weekly reports to the Legislature on the amount of money involved in bills before it. Whereupon, Marvel said this would be done weekly as it was in the last session.

In connection with state spending problems Marvel noted that some of the state-financed retirement programs "will be in serious trouble" soon, and that this area will need close study.

## Nebraska Constitution

The Legislature will again consider the problem — one of long standing — of whether to continue amending the Constitution a piece at a time, to call a convention and do it all at once. Three senators introduced a bill calling for a convention — Sens. Fern Hubbard Orme, Lincoln, Willard Waldo, DeWitt, and Joe Vosoba, Wilber.

In addition, Vosoba says he is determined to do all he can to keep details out of the Constitution that might tie the hands of the state in future problems.

Vosoba feels chances of passing the bill calling for the constitutional convention are much better than in the 1959 meeting when the proposal was killed in committee, raised on the floor, then killed.

A record of 21 proposals have been offered this session to amend the Constitution.

## Norris Bust

Nebraska will take official notice of one of its great leaders. The Legislature voted 38-0 to mount a bust of the late Sen. George Norris, McCook, in a niche in the Capitol. The resolution was introduced by Sen. Don Thompson, McCook, unicameral speaker.

Thompson recounted accomplishments of Norris, known as the father of the Rural Electrification Administration and the Nebraska unicameral Legislature.

The bust would be the first to be placed in the niches in the main corridor of the Capitol.

Gov. Frank Morrison who lived in McCook many years — the home town of Norris — noted that he hopes to get President John Kennedy to visit Nebraska in July or August in connection with the Norris Centennial observance. It will mark the 100th birthday of the Nebraskan.

# What is Mansion's Function Asks Governor Morrison

LINCOLN — What is the function of the governor's mansion? Is it for the chief executive, or a place for state functions, or both? This question has been posed by Gov. Frank Morrison.

It came up with regard to statements over the amount of money required to pay certain expenses at the mansion for the next two years. Outgoing Republican Gov. Dwight Burney recommended \$80,000 for the mansion and expenses of operating the governor's office.

Morrison, a Democrat, said he asked former State Sen. Otto Liebers and Tax Commissioner Forrest Johnson to come up with the figure they felt was adequate. They recommended \$106,000.

To avoid any controversy Morrison told Sen. Richard Marvel, Hastings, chairman of the Legislature's budget committee to disregard all previous figures and arrive at its own.

As guide lines, to the committee Morrison noted that his wife, Maxine, has always done her own housework and cooking and can continue to do so if it is felt by the Legislature that the man-

sion is to be the home for the governor.

If that is the case, the chief executive continued, the staff provided for the mansion is "far in excess of the needs of my personal family." The staff consists of a housekeeper, assistant housekeeper, cook and a student who waits on tables and does other jobs around the house.

But, noted the governor, the very size of the staff indicated the Legislature I wanted the mansion to be the center of official entertainment in Nebraska and "he put to full use for the people of Nebraska." If that is so, he continued, then the staff is no more than adequate for the job.

The mansion and the capitol, Morrison believes, should be on exhibit "as part of a program to stimulate state pride."

## Spending Pressing

The problem of state spending and its relation to where the state can get added revenue that will be needed for the 1961-63 period, daily is becoming more urgent in the Legislature.

## County Agent's Column

### Clarke-McNary Trees

Farmers interested in new tree plantings are advised to order soon. Stocks of some varieties may soon be exhausted. Twenty Wayne county farmers have already placed orders for 9,500 trees. Orders can be placed through the Extension or Soil Conservation Service offices.

Arrangement for use of a mechanical tree planter can be made with the Soil Conservation district.

### Poultry Cannibalism

Debeaking is the only solution to control of cannibalism in poultry.

Mr. Skinner explains:

"Debeaking involves the use of a sharp blade, heated blade," Skinner explains. "The hot blade is run through the feathers and skin to scars a portion of the upper beak. Beaking does not harm the birds' performance and should be done as a precautionary measure when pullets are housed. Additional information on the control of cannibalism can be obtained in Extension Circular 1436 Revised, entitled 'Controlling Cannibalism in Poultry.' Copies may be obtained in county Extension offices.

### Kill Unwanted Brush

Mixing 2.4-D or 2,4,5-T in fuel oil is the best way of killing unwanted woody plants. Adding one part of 40 percent 2,4,4-D to 20 parts oil is about the right mixture. This mixture should be sprayed or painted on freshly cut stumps or the lower two feet of standing trees or shrubs.



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



**Allow More Space For Pigs to Make Management Easier**

Allow more space for growing pigs and you'll reduce feed costs and cut down on winter management problems. This recommendation is carried in the mid-December issue of the Doane Agricultural Digest.

Rising land labor costs and improved equipment such as manure burners have stimulated new interest in this method of weed control. Planting is normally done in early spring. Rooted plants are from 6 to 12 inches apart.

Backing their advice are results from Minnesota trials that show pigs given 13 square feet of floor space gained 11% faster on 65% less feed than pigs given 9 square feet. A critical point is feeder space — no more than 4 pigs per feeder hole.

**Home Cultivation May Become More Important**

In summer cultivation, to control grass weeds and grass in corn, beans and cotton, may become increasingly important. Weed control methods says Bill Fletcher, engineering editor for the Doane Agricultural Digest.

Rising land labor costs and improved equipment such as manure burners have stimulated new interest in this method of weed control. Planting is normally done in early spring. Rooted plants are from 6 to 12 inches apart.

**Self Feeding Silage May Not Save Labor**

Self feeding silage is practical

and will save money for most

dairymen, advises the Doane Agricul-

tural Digest. However, "boss" cows can create trouble so it is necessary that cattle be observed closely. Labor will be about the same as when feed is hauled to the barn.

Major savings come from lower equipment and machinery cost. Based on labor at 75¢ per hour, it will be economical to feed from bunkers rather than uprights with mechanical conveyance up to 300 tons of silage. This will hold true only so long as increased spoilage loss is under 5%.






