EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

Sanity Test

The false notion that the Federal government can legislate away human shortcomings and values out-manned economic laws may be coming to an end. Whether this is true will be tested when impending efforts are again made to amend the Federal wage-hour law to extend coverage and boost the minimum wage.

Proponents of wage-hour revision run into forces that can no longer be swept under the rug by legislative fiat — namely inflation, unemployment and imbalance of the gold flow from the U. S. These forces have reached their present proportions mainly because the free market system has already been coerced, regulated and taxed to the danger point.

Legislating another increase in the wage level will mean more cost increases to pass along to consumers in higher prices and another turn in the inflationary spiral. It will mean further unemployment and a further weakening of the ability of American business and industry to compete with foreign producers of everything from neckties to automobiles. As this ability to compete is restricted, more and more of the nation's gold and resources will drain away to other countries.

What is most sorely needed is a demonstration of faith in the ability of private citizens to run their own affairs to the benefit of themselves

You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

and our country, if the regulators and spenders will give them a chance.

Impertinence

Impertinence of public servants reached a new high in the state of Washington. A bill was introduced in the Washington legislature to prohibit service station operators from exhibiting signs showing how much gasoline tax motorists have to pay. Violation of the act would be a misdemeanor. Under the proposed law the only manner in which the station operator could post such a sign would be by conforming to regulations requiring him to explain what portion of the total tax goes to the Federal government, for state highway taxes — Federal and state — now total an average of about 10 cents a gallon. Gasoline is a necessity and yet the tax on it is far higher than on luxuries. It is widely believed the tax has reached the point of diminishing returns so far as a source of revenue to government is concerned. Motorists are turning to the new compact cars. If the gas tax excesses continue unabated they will be forced to drive less and everyone will be penalized — consumers, industry and government.

Is the public supposed to accept this abuse of the taxing power without a murmur? Apparently so, if legislation such as proposed in Washington state is adopted.

Capitol News . . .

Gravel Roads to Disappear In Projected Highway Plan

LINCOLN — Eventually, every town in Nebraska of population of more than 100 will have a dustless surface road, if the State Highway Department gets its way. The program to get rid of gravel roads in Nebraska has been accelerated during the last four years.

To some extent it is being pushed along by using an armor coat on lightly traveled highways, such as spurs leading to small towns off main highways.

"This cheaper type of treatment, while not as durable as a full-fledged base and bituminous mat job, does offer considerable service where adaptable," says Acting State Engineer John Hossack.

Actually, says Hossack, the process of converting gravel roads to hard top ones will be a "soft of snow-balling operation."

The clue to this is in the maintenance costs, Hossack added. Every time a gravel road is replaced by a dustless surface one, the state saves \$300 per mile per year in future maintenance costs.

Therefore, the more roads we convert, the more money we save, which in turn may be used to convert more roads," Hossack said. That is one of the reasons the department doesn't want to add new roads to the state system he pointed out.

Gravel roads are not the only problem, however. The acting engineer noted. He said many miles of narrow pavement must be widened and other road defects cured.

There will always be problems in the highway field, Hossack said, and he added that he feels Nebraska is making headway.

Tax Penalties

The Legislature is again concerning itself with how stiff should be the penalties meted out to tax violators.

Winning initial approval by a wide margin on the floor was a proposal setting a 50 percent penalty for failing to report tangible property for taxation and five times the amount due for intangible property.

Intangible property includes such items as stocks and bonds and money in the bank.

The new bills replaced those enacted in 1958 that had stronger penalties. They were pushed by the then Sen. Terry Carpenter, Scottsbluff.

The 1958 penalties were declared unconstitutional, thus resulting in the new legislation this session.

A few senators felt the penalties might still be too stiff but others said intangible penalties should be strong because it is difficult to get some of this type of property on the tax rolls.



The foreign visitor tours are part of Morrison's announced program to aid stepping up flow of tourists to Nebraska, thus boosting the state's economy.

He also named a state culture resources committee, consisting of five members — Herbert Burton, Dr. Walter Miller, Fred Wells, Mrs. M. E. Vance and Mrs. Philip Sorenson, all of Lincoln.

Purpose of the group, said the chief executive, is to focus attention on Nebraskans' "vast amount of talent, both existing and potential, in all the arts."

Awards will be given to help those interested in the theater, music, painting and writing to encourage continued work in the state.

Budget Committee

Salary bills before the Legislature, if passed, would cost the state \$406,208 in tax dollars, the Unicameral's budget committee says. Seven pay hike bills were analyzed by the committee.

Of the total \$280,000 would go to boost pay of judges of the district court and \$70,000 for state supreme court judges.

Other bills would add to the budget also, making the final total \$850,148, the committee said. However, most pay bills still alive earlier in the session, either are whittled down or killed before the lawmakers go home.

County Agent's Column

Plan Seed Needs Now

With spring just around the corner, it is time to review your 1961 oats and barley production program," a University of Nebraska seed authority reminds farmers this week.

Warren Sabs, manager of the Foundation Seed division of the college of agriculture, said a choice of varieties is available from certified seed producers local seedmen.

Vitamin Supplement For Swine

Swine raisers should include a vitamin supplement in soybean meal that is composed primarily of corn and soybean meal.

This advice comes from Leo Lucas, University of Nebraska swine specialist, who adds that at present antibiotics are not recommended for sow sows unless there is an extremely high disease level in the herd.

A ration in which the major sources of protein are high quality alfalfa, meat scraps and caneage would be "borderline" for vitamins, according to Lucas.

To determine possible need for adding a vitamin supplement to this type of ration, the Extension animal husbandman offers this formula:


