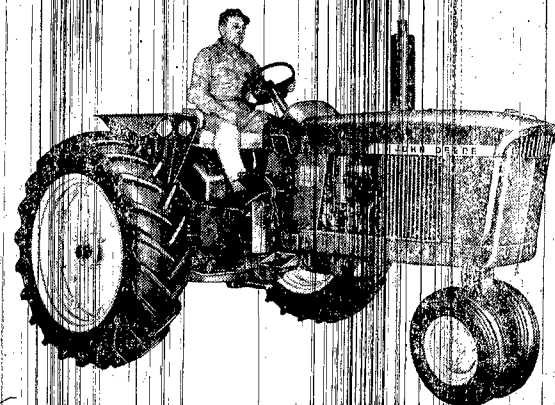

Favored Bancroft, Wayne Prep and Thurston gained best round victories in the District 11 Class D basketball tournament which opened Monday night at WSP's gymnasium.

Semi-final games were scheduled last night with Prep opposing Thurston at 7 and Bancroft facing Emerson Sacred Heart at 8:30. Finals will be played at 9 p.m. today with Wednesday's winners vying for the right to play in the regional playoff at Norfolk Wednesday.

Bancroft, ranked sixth in the state Class D ratings, had little trouble of disunity in Homer 57-23 in Monday's opener. Coach Ed Tushla's Braves had the most in double figures as they escaped to an easy win. Emerson's Dennis Engelhart paced the winners with 20 points. Walker Nelson, a 6-6 junior, followed with 16. Homer was led by Bill Dunlap's 17 points.

Big Terry Wignett's sparked Thurston's 49-34 victory over Hoskins. The 6-7 junior tallied 22 points while Dennis Munderloh added 13. Jim Befada and Tom Anderson hit 11 apiece for Hoskins. The Braves managed only two points in the second quarter to provide Thurston with its winning margin.

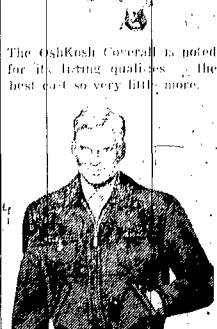

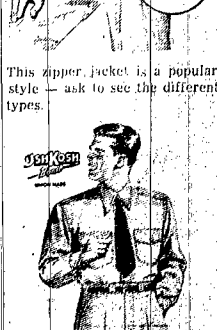

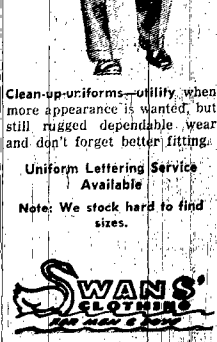

Sanity Test

The false notion that the Federal government can legislate away human shortcomings and cut out natural economic laws may be coming to an end.

Proponents of wage-hour revision runs into forces that can no longer be swept under the rug by legislative fiat — namely inflation, unemployment and imbalance of the gold flow.

Legislating another increase in the wage level will mean more cost increases to pass along to consumers in higher prices and another turn in the inflationary spiral.

Plan Seed Needs Now

Capitol News . . .

Gravel Roads to Disappear In Projected Highway Plan

LINCOLN — Eventually, every town in Nebraska of a population of more than 100 will have a dustless surfaced road, if the State Highway Department gets its way.

To some extent it is being pushed along by using an armor coat on lightly traveled highways, such as spurs leading to small towns off main highways.

"This cheaper type of treatment, while not as durable as a full-fledged base and bituminous mat job, does offer considerable service where adaptable," says Acting State Engineer John Hossack.

Therefore, the more roads we convert, the more money we save, which in turn may be used to convert more roads," Hossack said.

Gravel roads are not the only problem, however, the acting engineer noted. He said many

miles of narrow pavement must be widened and other road defects cured.

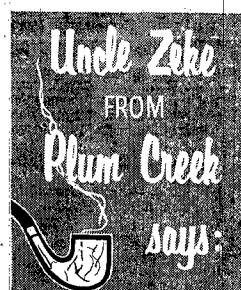
There will always be problems in the highway field, Hossack said, and he added that he feels Nebraska is making headway.

Winning initial approval by a wide margin in the floor was a proposal setting a 50 percent penalty for failing to report tangible property for taxation and five times the amount due for intangible property.

A few senators felt the penalties might still be too stiff but others said intangible property should be strong because it is difficult to get some of this type of property on the tax rolls.

The Legislature has indicated it doesn't want to let the 100th anniversary of Nebraska as a

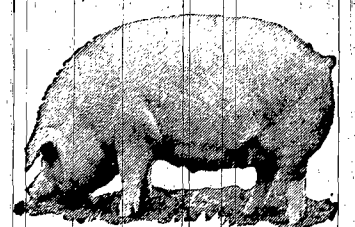
