**Council Gives Approval to Begin Water Storage Plans**

The city council Thursday night gave approval to Blackland Engineering to go ahead with plans for the construction of a 500,000 gallon standpipe water tank.

The council felt they should not delay on the matter since only a short supply of water is available for emergencies with the present facilities.

The engineering firm from its preliminary survey suggested the standpipe type of construction be used since it is considerably cheaper than the elevated type of tank. Cost of the standpipe tank of 500,000 capacity would be about \$65,000 while an elevated tank of the same capacity would be in excess of \$150,000.

The site picked from the survey would be a square acre north of the north line of the cemetery and 180 feet west of the west line of Westwood Addition.

Tentative plans would call for a 10 inch line to run from 12th and Sherman to the new tank and an eight inch line from the new to the present elevated tank. A valve would then be installed in the old tank, and when full, the water would then go to the new tank.

The council will present a proposition to the voters on the establishment of a downtown parking lot at the next general election.

Plans for the construction of three tennis courts west of the city pool were also discussed and the engineering firm was authorized to draw up specifications for possible construction this summer.

The type of courts planned would meet the requirements for tournament play, and also provide an ice skating pond during the winter.

The council also approved the paving of two blocks on Third from Sherman to Blaine. Bids to be opened Mar. 21.

**Experiment Station Meeting Scheduled Mar. 7 at Wisner**

Is the thief of your farm profits Vitamin A. A deficiency, poor results from fertilizers, the new leaf-eating pest "face fly," or low returns from oats? Fresh answers to these problems and many others are promised at the public meeting of the Northeast Nebraska Experiment Station Association at the Wisner auditorium Tuesday.

Dale Flowerday, superintendent of the Experiment Station, will open the meeting at 10:00 o'clock a.m. with some new results on seeding methods, and rates for oats, and silage yields with different oat varieties. The hope for new crops such as castorbeans and high amylose corn will be explained by Don Hanway, Chairman of the Department of Agronomy, College of Agriculture. Chemical weed control, fertilizer rate and placement, and the latest crop variety tests at Northeast Station will not be overlooked by John Furrer, Bob Olson and Superintendent Flowerday who will fill out the morning crop and fertilizer program.

You may have your own questions about beef cattle feeding, and disease or parasite control answered by a college expert. After a brief discussion of their special subjects John Matsushima, Crosby Howe and Bob Rossell will "take on all questions" from the crowd.

All farmers and friends of farmers are invited by the Experiment Station Association and the Winside Chamber Commerce to attend.

The Popular party also nominated Rev. Robert Shirk.

Dan Echtenkamp was nominated at the Citizens party caucus but withdrew his name a day later.

A replacement was not named for the ballot within the legal time limit so only three candidates will be on the ballot for school board posts.

A three point platform was adopted by the Popular party at each of its three caucuses. They are:

### Fair Chance

A mighty effort is being made during the current session of Congress to provide medical and payments for everyone receiving benefits under the Social Security system.

The case against this extremely controversial proposal should be thoroughly understood. First of all, it would provide the medical aid to a certain age group whether or not they were in need. Large numbers of Social Security beneficiaries have substantial incomes from other sources and are able to meet their medical costs. There is no reason why the general taxpayers — who contribute to the Social Security fund — should pay these bills.

## Heavy Free Requests Cause Bill Shortage for Senators

Lincoln — The Legislature of the future may take a good look at the problem of distributing copies of bills introduced. Requests for the copies often result in a shortage of printed legislative bills for senators.

State Sen. Hans Jensen, Aurora, raised this question and suggested that those wanting the copies pay a \$2.50 fee. He feels this would eliminate half the requests and assure that sufficient copies of bills would be available for senators. The budget committee is studying the problem.

Sen. J. W. Burbach, Crofton, said he doesn't think a fee would be proper at this stage of the session but would be a good idea for "future consideration."

Sen. Harold Stryker, Rising City, said perhaps a solution would be that those requesting copies of bills go through their state senators.

Some solons say they get a request that says: "Send me everything that is free."

There are some 1,300 individuals and firms on mailing lists who receive free copies of proposed legislation.

In the 1959 session 17,300 pounds of bills alone were mailed to those on the lists, plus 7,471 pounds of copies of daily proceedings of the Legislature.

There are 12 full time employees in the legislative bill room for the first two months of the session. This drops to seven for the remainder of the six-month-long meeting.

**Park Bill**

Final point of a lot of maneuvering in the Legislature on the question of a sales and income tax is a bill to increase the state property tax levy for parks. This proposal was hung up in committee for some time as sales taxers successfully blocked attempts to get it reported to the floor.

They tried to tie the 22¢ of a mill increase to a sales and income tax, thus providing it would be effective only if a sales


