

Normal Board Size the Same, WSTC to Start Trimester

The state normal board Monday approved the recommendation in the Glenn report that would increase the membership of the board from six to 11 and that members have no connection with the four teachers colleges.

The Glenn report came from a study of Nebraska's higher education retained last year by the legislative council committee.

However, the board approved a Glenn recommendation to drop the graduate programs at three of the colleges, Wayne, Chadron and Kearney, if accreditation is not received from the North Central Accrediting Association by 1963. Peru has no graduate program.

The schools have been asked to seek accreditation again. They applied for it two years ago but were turned down.

Officials have previously stated it is not unusual for the association to deny such accreditation on the first application. When granted, all degrees previously awarded will carry the full weight of the accreditation.

Other positions of the board: A new policy on the appointment of funds is being studied.

The board will try to cut programs where classes are small and have little attraction.

Wayne will probably be allowed to experiment with the trimester plan for three years.

Higher salaries for faculty members and Ph. D. holders would be desirable.

The trimester school system will go into effect next September at Wayne State. President W. A. Brandenburg, said Wednesday after returning from a State Normal Board meeting.

The board authorized WSTC to experiment with the three-term plan for three years as a test of its value.

While some details of the system remain to be decided, enough essentials have been settled so that it can be put into effect next fall.

The trimester, pioneered a few years ago by the University of Pittsburgh and since adopted by several other colleges, provides three terms of about 15 weeks.

The first probably will open early in September, the second early in January, the third late in April. The present system has two semesters of 18 weeks.

The traditional June-July summer session will continue for benefit of teachers-in-service who want further education.

Among advantages cited earlier for the trimester are its greater utilization of facilities and the opportunity for students to finish a degree course sooner.

Details of Wayne's trimester plan will be announced later, Dr. Brandenburg said.

The board gave final approval to letting contacts for WSTC's new food service building, at a total bid figure of \$655,042. Construction will begin soon.

Officials have previously stated it is not unusual for the association to deny such accreditation on the first application. When granted, all degrees previously awarded will carry the full weight of the accreditation.

Lean, Meat Type Hog Best for Coming Show

Wayne county swine producers are being introduced to the main emphasis in live hog marketing at the 9th annual Market Hogs show in Fremont. It will be placed on the merit of the animal from a carcass viewpoint.

"The basis for this demand by the consumer for high quality lean pork in small cuts," said Leo Lucas, Extension animal husbandman of the College of Agriculture, "at the same time, the demand for lard has declined and there is no foreseeable change in the price of lard in the future."

"The live hog that will hand up a desirable carcass will be trim, meaty and within the 190 to 240 pounds range," he said.

Test Water Salinity For Better Production

Have water tested for salinity. Poor quality water may be causing reduced production of livestock and poultry. As you go into the winter months when water consumption is normally lower, don't overlook this factor that possibly will hold consumption even lower.

Doane Agricultural Service nutritionists point out that tests show feed consumption declines whenever total salt content of water exceeds 10,000 p.p.m. (parts per million).

Poultry production is adversely affected at a much lower level - 7,000 p.p.m. If your water supply tests out above 1,000 p.p.m., look for a new source of water. There are no economic means to desalinate water at this time.

High Moisture Corn Must Be Ground Or Rolled Before Feeding

High moisture grain must be ground or rolled before being fed to cattle to get most economical gains, according to Doane Agricultural Digest. Experiments show that 20% to 25% of the grain may not be digested if the grain is left whole.

With a basic value of \$9 per ton on the grain, this means you can afford to pay 24c to 28c per ton for grinding or rolling. Extra processing can be done as the corn is harvested. However, make sure your mill is set to only barely crimp the grain.

Poor Quality Hay Can Hurt Milk Production

Poor quality hay hurts milk production seriously. However, farm managers believe that ensiled grain feeding can compensate for most of this cost.

As a general rule it's best to feed both poor and good hay together through the entire year. If you can't do this, you must change over to much better hay, then plan on increasing grain feed as much as 300% over your normal concentrate to hay ratio.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

You may not agree with an editorial — but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

Occupation Deplorable Issue

Interest in Wayne's new two-party political system has been overshadowed this week by activities in the Second ward. Battle lines have been drawn on what is one of the biggest issues to come before the citizens of Wayne — should a college faculty member be elected to the city council?

It is deplorable this question has become an election issue. When Wayne's second party was organized last year, it was only to foster friendly competition and to stimulate interest in local government. This issue is not the choice of either Wayne political party. Both of our parties saw it to nominate faculty members for the Second ward post. But proponents of a petition drive for a third candidate have chosen this issue as the reason for their actions.

The Second-ward race in the Apr. 4 election is not going to be a contest over which candidate will make the better councilman. Both men are amply qualified to fill the post. Normally this would be enough for an election race. But, this year's Second ward election will not be decided on qualifications and personalities. It will be decided on the basis of whether or not an integral

segment of the city's population is to be denied a chance for representation in local government because of long-standing prejudices.

If one segment of the community is to be denied such a right by unwritten laws, what is to prevent this ban from spreading to other segments? Next year it might ban grocers, the following year it might ban doctors. A person's occupation should be no criteria for holding municipal office.

Each segment of Wayne's population contributes to its economic well-being and progress. Anyone who spends his money here, owns property here and pays taxes here should have the right to sit on the governmental body which determines how his tax money is spent.

Now is the time for Wayne to cast off this hypocritical attitude. Now is the time to stop considering college personnel as second class citizens and recognize them for what they are — an integral part of the community with the same right to a voice in the management of community affairs as any other citizen.

As a voter, it is up to you to cast your vote on the abilities of the candidates, not their occupation.

Capitol News

Last Bill Will Be Division Of Congressional Districts

Lincoln — Nebraska will be given plenty of opportunity to state their views on proposed division of the state into three instead of four Congressional districts.

The Legislature's government committee hustled out its plan for the districts a day after a public hearing on 10 proposals.

Sen. K. L. Bowen, Red Cloud, committee chairman, said the action is so the people "won't be in the dark" as to what is proposed. He will ask that the bill be the last item of business in the current session of the Legislature. That means it won't come up for action until June.

Here are the districts outlined in the plan and rough population of each:

District 1: Chase, Dundy, Hitchcock, Hayes, Frontier, Red Willow, Gosper, Furnas, Phelps, Kearney, Franklin, Adams, Webster, Hamilton, Clay, Nickolls, York, Polk, Fillmore, Thayer, Butler, Seward, Saline, Jefferson, Saunders, Lancaster, Gage, Otoe, Johnson, Nemaha, Richardson, Pawnee. Population: 470,000.

District 2: Washington, Douglas, Sargey and Cass. Population: 405,000.

District 3: The remainder of the state, basically the entire northern portion of Nebraska. Population: 400,000.

The committee division was on a horizontal basis.

There were two main trends of thought for dividing the state outside the general area of the second district vertically, that is by a line from north to south, or horizontally, by a line from east to west.

Proponents of the various ideas talked on a myriad of subjects

they said entered into why their particular plans were best. The subjects included the east-west routing of most major highways, economic likeness, ability to campaign in a given district, industrialization versus agriculture and taxable wealth of proposed districts.

Richard Spelts, Grand Island, former chairman of the Republican party in the state, appeared as a citizen and outlined some of the basic problems involved.

He urged the committee to "move with caution" because such a subject "tends to tear a state apart rather than weld it together." Spelts appeared for no particular plan, nor was he against any of them.

But Spelts made these observations:

If Congress decides to increase its size to 450 members, Nebraska would not lose a representative.

Senators should "not deal in personalities" of those currently serving in Congress.

Nebraska roads run from east to west because the nation expanded that way and regarding the argument that the rivers run that way also, Spelts said the rivers were here before people, and should not be a factor in redistricting.

A good candidate will find the people who are voters, regardless of the size of a district geographically.

About the fears of those in rural areas or small towns that big cities would elect all the Congressmen, he pointed to Grand Island, biggest city in the current fourth district. Grand Island, Spelts said, has never had a Congressman, senator or governor.

County Agent's Column

Scabie Eradication

Local sheepsman were told last week about a new state-federal program designed to eradicate a sheep disease called "scabie".

Although not as complicated, the scabie eradication program is similar to the brucellosis program initiated a few years ago, says Dr. Swope, representing the state veterinarian's office.

"Scabies, or scab in sheep, is caused by parasitic mites that feed on or in the skin of domestic animals," Swope points out. "The disease is highly contagious and is spread by contact and through infected facilities. It causes reduced wool yield, loss in weight and general un-

derliness. It may result in death of the animals unless they are properly treated."

All states west of Nebraska and the western half of South Dakota are scabie-free. In order to become a scabie-free state, Nebraska must be declared an "Eradication Area." Federal and state veterinarians are administrative responsible for making the program a success.

One of the first steps in the program involves inspection of all sheep flocks in Nebraska. Inspections have been completed in the Panhandle counties and are starting in other counties. There also will be a need for routine checks of areas where sheep are imported regularly. Any infected flocks must be quarantined and must be treated at the expense of the owner. Infected flocks must be inspected again 60 days after dipping. The state can quarantine an area if necessary.

Once the state is declared an Eradication Area, there will be strict regulations relating to the movement of sheep in and out of Nebraska.

Feeding Milk Replacers
An important part of a dairyman's harvest is the calf crop. It pays to do a good job of raising the calves, and this task is complicated by the trend away from whole and skim milk feeding and toward a system of milk replacers and calf starters.

There are some "tricks of the trade" which help make a milk replacer system successful:

1. The milk replacer should include 50 to 75 percent of dry milk products.

2. Adopt a definite feeding schedule and follow it closely. Commercial milk replacers should be fed exactly as recommended by the manufacturer.

3. Keep track of dry feed eaten. Calves should not be weaned until they are eating at least one pound of starter per day.

4. At least three-fourths of the dry feed eaten as a starter ration should be an 18 percent protein grain mixture.

5. Calf starter must be palatable. Distasteful, extremely hard pellets or an excess of very fine material all limit intake.

6. Limit grain consumption. Up until 16 weeks of age small calves should be limited to four pounds of grain per day. Larger calves (Holstein and Brown Swiss) can be allowed up to five pounds per day.

7. Keep feed boxes clean. Only a very small amount of starter should be allowed to accumulate in the feed box. Fresh starter should be fed each day.

8. Encourage the early use of starter at early age. Encourage starter consumption by placing grain in calf's mouth after milk feeding the first two weeks.

9. Feed trace minerals and salt. Young calves need supplemental sources of the trace minerals.

10. Feed only high quality roughage — the quality of the roughage fed is much more important than the kind.

Railway Commissioners
Initial approval was given by the Legislature to a bill that eventually would change the size of the state railway commission. Now, there is a three-member commission, whose members are elected at large for six-year terms.

Under the bill that passed its first floor test by a 32-5 count, voters would ballot in 1962 on a Constitutional amendment. The amendment would have from three to seven commissioners, elected from districts containing substantially the same population.

The bill was the result of a study by a group of senators between legislative sessions. The exact number of the commissioners would be left to the Legislature, if the Constitutional amendment were approved.

State Engineer
Naming of John Hossack as state engineer by Gov. Frank Morrison was not entirely unexpected. It has been traditional that governors have had difficulty times trying to get qualified people to head the highway department from private business or other states.

Hossack and the Colorado highway department will exchange information under a program Morrison hopes will result in Nebraska getting more ideas on how to step up its Interstate Highway mileage.

The new engineer named C. C. Strobel as his deputy. Both Hossack and Strobel have held acting titles since the resignation of Roy Cochran and the firing of Deputy Henry Schlitt by the late Gov. Ralph G. Brooks.

Work of Hossack was praised by Morrison, and Hossack said the exchange of information between Colorado and Nebraska was a "good idea."

Osteopaths and Judges
The Legislature this session dealt finally with the subject of osteopaths and initially with the merit plan for selection of judges. A committee killed a bill that would have permitted graduates of osteopathic colleges (accredited by the state health department to take the state examinations for licensing in medicine and surgery).

The Legislature declined to revive the osteopathy bill, a measure that has shown up frequently in legislative sessions over the years.

On the matter of judges, the judiciary committee advanced a bill to the floor calling for adoption of the Missouri Plan for judges. The proposal would go to the voters in the form of a Constitutional amendment. If cleared through the Legislature and approved by voters, judges would be named by the governor as vacancies occurred.

They would run for re-election on their merit, every six years.
