E. J. Bernthal, pastor Grace Lutheran Church IMPLICATIONS OF THE EICHMANN CASE

The sensational trial of Adolf-Eichmann, former chief of the Nazi Gestapo's Jewish Affairs Section, presents a circious complex of legal technicalities and points up some very grave moral implications.

Here is a trial in which there seems to be no question as to the fact that Eichmann in a calculated, systematic, totally ammoral manner exterminated some six million members of the human race for no other reason than that they were judged "undesirable" by a few, but the only real question about which the trial will revolve is what to do with a man-like that.

Indeed, it is most striking that, not since the trial of Jesus Christ, which also occurred lat Jerusalem, has all of mankind stood trial as here again in the case of this long sought chief of the Third Reich's Department 4B.

Perhaps the most decisive issue upon which this pointer case hinges is the basic question of pers of a 1 responsibility. Can Adolf Eichmann be excused for his monstrous crime by the fact that he was acting under orders from higher authority? And if not, what, then is the authority which transcends the authority under which he acted? But if, as preedent in the history of jurisprudence has indicated, a distinction must be made between an act of war and a "genuine crime," then patently there must be a higher law than one distilled out of the customs, sanctions and mores of human society.

Then too, there is the question of punishment. It is ee m squite generally conceded that if Adolf Eichmann is convicted, there is no punshment which [can fit his crime. The death penalty would seem merciful and too' trivial. On the other hand, if Eichmann be allowed to twe and lesson and a warning maybe such elements.

ed to the world as a lesson and a warning, maybe such clemency and the attendant "glamour" of it all will only produce the opposite effect from what it was hoped to produce, or at least nullify any probable ethical instruction. Executed criminals are quickly forgotten. Witness the fading memory of those condemned in the Nuremberg and Japanese war criminals trials. How inadequate can human justice be!

# Capitol News . . . **Realignment Big Question**

One fact emerged from debate in the Legislature over reducing Nebraska's Congressional dist-ricts from four to three. That was the realignment of the state will be an issue at virtually every stage in the legislative mill.

stage in the legislative mill.

"I'm going to fight it all the way across," reported Sen. K. L. Bowen, Red Cloud, chairman of the government and military affairs committee. Bowen's committee sponsored a proposal that was rejected by the lawmakers who substituted another by a 22-18 vote and then advanced it off the initial debate stage by a 29-11 margin.

As sent off the first debate stage, the easternmost district would be comprised of Washington, Douglas, Sarpy and Cass counties.

The western district, coyering

counties.

The western district, covering more than two-thirds of the state's land area, has as its eastern boundary the eastern sides of Boyd, Holt, Antelope, Boone, Nance, Merrick, Hamilton, Clay and Nuckolls counties.

The middle district would encompass the remaining counties, including Lancaster.

ncluding Lancaster.

Nebraska must redistrict because its population growth, as measured by the 1960 census, did not keep pace with the national increase. The plan given initial approval by the Legislature, was approved by a coalition of western and northern senators.

Bowen said if the committee plan is ignored by the Legislature, committee hearings should be done away with since they serve no function.

Western senators were the prime movers in the amended version on grounds the west would not have a Congressman who would be tuned to the needs of ranching and wheat areas. Conceivably, they argued, under the committee proposal which would not have a Congressman could come from the Missouri River counties.

The suggestion tentatively approved would put Reps. Phil Weaver, Falls City, and Ralph Beermann, Dakota City, in the same district. Thus, one would lose his Congressional seat in the next election.

The Unicameral has never been redistricted since its inception in 1937.

Rural legislators in many instances feel that redistricting, especially if population only is a guide as now required by the Constitution, would allow Lincoln and Omaha to dominate the body. Urban senators say the number of persons each represents is sharply varied and realignment is necessary.

The state did not build another hospital. It established the Nebraska; Psychiatric Institute in Omaha, to be jointly under the Board of Control, which governs state institutions and the University of Nebraska. Research programs were begun. A series of governors, legislatures and boards of control went along with increased expenditures; for aiding the mentally sick.

The Institute and out-patient clinics began treating the mentally ill intensely and earlier. As early as five years ago a mental patient needed 24-hour treatment. Now, says Wittson, in a large number of cases, this no longer is true.






