Winside School Plan Now Filed With State Committee

The Winside school reorganization plan has been filed with the state committee and the hearing has been set for May 12, according to county superintendent Gladys Porter.

The plan calls for the reorganization of Winside Districts 11, 16, 21, 24, 25, 29, 31, 35, 39, 53, 58, 63 and 79. District 60 was omitted since petitions have already been filed on merging a portion of the district with Hoskins District 9. The new district would be called 931.

There is a feeling in Winside, according to a city official, that unless the plan receives the approval of the voters, there is a possibility The Winside high school might eventually close.

In stating their reasons for the reorganization, the Wayne county committee said they felt a unified school system would provide equal educational opportunities for all pupils in the area, equalize the school tax levy for people in the district and equalize the per pupil valuation. It would also provide better facilities ranging from the library to a lunch program not available to single room school districts.

The committee said they expect the present public school building to be adequate for high school, but an elementary school would have to be erected. It could be built on present school grounds. Also, the present high school building should be improved and remodeled as needed to meet state standards for high schools.

Transportation shall be provided either by the purchase and operation of school buses or contract by the district for bus transportation.

The total evaluation for the district would be \$4,391,675.

According to the committee figures, the probable enrollment would be 54 students with three other districts contracting.

\$249,590 School Budget OK'd for Wayne Schools

4-H Speaking Contest WSTC Band Concert Shows 4.78 Mill Increase As Surplus Funds Depleted

The Wayne County 4-H Timely Topics Speaking contest will be held at 10 a.m. Saturday at Wayne district courtroom.

There will be two divisions for the contestants: the senior division for those 4-H members 14 years and over, and a junior division for those under 14 years.

The boy and girl winner of the senior division will compete in the district contest held the first day of the Junior Leader camp at Nebraska State park, June 6 and 7.

Wayne State's band will present its spring concert at 3 p.m. Sunday in the administration building auditorium. The public is invited to attend the free performance.

Director Raymond Kelton has chosen a program featuring several original numbers, some favorites of standard band repertoire and also selections from popular musicals.

Most original is a suite of sixteenth century French dances to be performed by a brass ensemble of James Blaherty, Lyle Rostad, Fred Bahle, Marilyn Jahacek and Dave Anderson, accompanied by Organist Anthony Kaerle.

An operational budget of \$249,590 was adopted Monday by the Wayne school board for 1961-62. In it, the board is asking for \$170,500 from local direct taxes.

This is \$28,900 over last year's budget and will require an increase of approximately 4.78 mill.

The 1960-61 levy was 23.44 mill with an additional bond levy of 5.04 for a total of 28.48. The new levy will total about 33.26 mills.

Much of the increase came about because of a surplus in the budget that resulted when tuition was increased some years ago, but finally been exhausted. This surplus of about \$21,000 was used to purchase equipment in the new school and was not included in last year's budget. It also was used to pay architect's fees.

The table shows a comparison of the budgets for the two years.

Ingalls said the usual length of infection is about two weeks and the recommended control measure is 1 1/2 pints of malathion in 20 gallons of water per acre.

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Congressman Beermann Asks Service Academy Application in May

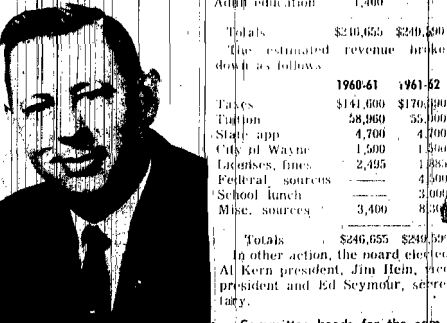
Applications for a service career at West Point, Annapolis, the USAF Academy, and the Merchant Marine Academy were asked this week by Third District Congressman Ralph Beermann.

From the results of this examination Beermann said he will nominate and principal and three alternates to West Point, three principals and 15 alternates to Annapolis, eleven to compete for one USAF appointment, and ten to compete with others named by the Nebraska Congressional delegation for three appointments to the Merchant Marine academy.

All nominations will be for entrance to the service schools in July, 1962. Applicants must be 17 and not have passed their 22nd birthday by that date. In addition, each applicant must meet certain mental and physical requirements.

Applications should be directed to Congressman Beermann's office, Room 134, Post Office Building, Washington 25, D. C.

The deadline for applications is June 9, this year.

Funeral Services For Mrs. J. Rieck Held Last Saturday

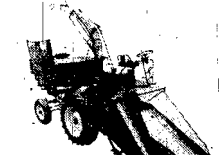

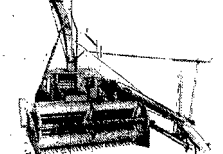

Quality Market Is The Best Market

A big change is taking place in the housing market. Until recently the fastest increasing element in the population was within the age range of 35 to 55 years. This is the range in which home buying is most frequent. It is also the age group within which incomes are relatively high and prospects for rising income are the best. Therefore it is easy to see why we had a booming housing market from the end of World War II to the late 50s.

Now the prospect is that for the next several years this age group will grow very little. (This reflects the low birth rate of the 1930's and early 1940's.) In addition, we have the fact that close to two-thirds of the families in this age range are already home owners. Consequently, the possibility of numerical expansion of home buying within this crucial age range is much more limited than it has been for a generation.

It does not follow, however, that the possibility of a good market from this group of people does not exist. The possibility exists in good measure, but it is a different sort of possibility than that which existed amidst the housing shortage of the earlier postwar years. It comes about in this way.

Many of the home owners in this age range bought their houses when both their families and their incomes were smaller than they are now. They have desired for a larger house, a better quality house, a more attractive neighborhood. At the same time, they are usually under no pressure to move. These people want to be sure that the next house they buy is really what they want. They are more conscious of housing value, because of their first home buying experience. Consequently, they are able to wait and willing to shop around until the desire and the offering coincide.

The alert builder will take a keen interest in this market for a number of reasons. First, he will be dealing with prospective buyers whose credit is likely to be good and who will have relatively little trouble in arranging financing. Second, his prospects are able to pay relatively high prices, thus permitting — yes, even requiring — the builder to use attractive design and quality products.

Builders who have seen this possibility and who have carefully studied how to take advantage of it have had successful results both in times of shortage of mortgage money and even in times of economic weakness. The reasons for this are the good credit standing of the prospects and their ability to remain unaffected by a short business recession. Another reason is that the builder himself is able to take advantage of the better prices of materials and greater productivity that exist when there is slack in building generally.

This year should be an especially good year for the quality builder. He will find his prospects in a favorable buying mood; building costs are stable; and financing is readily available.

Storage Space Problems Are Often Solved By Built-Ins

Big home or little home, large household or small, there is hardly a family that can say it has adequate storage space. The lack may be general — from attic to the basement — or it may be confined mainly to certain rooms, such as kitchen, bathroom or family room.

Lumber and lumber paneling are ideal for creating built-ins to correct the lack of storage facilities. For lumber will fit into any decorative scheme and it is economical and easy to work with. This is especially true of softwoods and some of the most readily available are the species that grow in the western pine region.

Built-ins naturally should be appropriate to the room. This sounds elementary, but it takes some planning and forethought to work out the sort of built-in that will do the best job in a specific situation.

For example, storage space in a kitchen should be coordinated with work areas. Drawers and cabinets should be planned to hold heavy equipment below counters and cupboards to contain lighter items should go above. Consideration should be given, too, to space for mixers, toasters, blenders and other small appliances that a housewife may not wish to keep out all the time.

In a bathroom — even in a small one — there usually is space to box in the area under the basin. This will provide room for towels, extra soap and bathroom tissue, and perhaps also for built-in things such as hot water bottles. If the bathroom is fairly good-sized, the cabinets may be built on the wall to hold these supplies, medicines and other necessities.

A family room, of course, can provide storage space for myriad belongings. These may include movie and slide projection equipment, card tables and game supplies, hobby materials and radio-phonograph equipment. Space also might be set aside in this room to display a collection of gold, china and glass, athletic trophies or perhaps, prized examples of photography.

The storage wall is another concept that works in many rooms and will provide a great deal of varied storage space.

It is most useful, perhaps, in a child's bedroom, where a wardrobe closet arrangement will hold both hanging and folded clothing, and drawers or even bins can be utilized for sports equipment and toys.

However, it can be used almost anywhere, to advantage. These built-in units can be designed to cover a whole wall and will save space often occupied by furniture.
