What can be said to that, on the basis

of known facts, is that the hustle will have to be principally provided by the Soviets — and to a miraculous degree. For instance, to make our living stand-

ards approximate those of the Soviet Union, we'd have to get rid of four out of five of our homes, nine out of 10 telephones, 14 out of 15 miles of paved roads and 19 out of every 20 cars and trucks. We're that far ahead.

This is no argument for complacency—or for underestimating Soviet achievements in science, industry or any other field. But it makes no sense to minimize our own achievements—or to ignore the fact that the American system has done more for more people than any other economic system known to man.

All across the nation an increasingly bitter debate is being waged over the issue of whether or not private and parochial schools should be included in any Federal aid to education bill that Congress passes this year.

This has always been a hot issue that can stir tempers to the boiling point in rather quick order and for that reason we think it would be wise for everyone concerned in this matter to give a little thought to what might well be behind the injection of the religious issue into this Federal aid to education question.

Personally, we have a sneaky suspi-cion the religious issue has been tossed into the pot this year as a diversionary, tactic to take people's minds away from the main issue which is whether or not the nation really needs to put the long arm of the Federal government into our local school systems.

The question of permitting private and parochial schools to participate in any federal aid to education program is a constitutional issue that should have no bearing whatsoever on the determination of whether there should be any Federal aid program at all.

Those who want, a giant Federal aid to education program approved by Con-

gress are prone to claim that we are in an educational emergency which necessitates the Federal government giving a helping hand to the state in financing school needs. The facts belie this argument, however, as they clearly show that dtring the past decade our state governments and local school districts have

ments and local school districts have done a magnificent job of catching up on their school needs and, with but very few exceptions, have the financial resources to continue on their own in the next dec-ade without any help from the Federal government. government.

Because the true facts do not sub

Because the true facts do not substantiate any necessity for a big Federal aid to education program, the proponents of Federal aid are attempting to get away from the facts and cloud this controversy with a lpt of emotional arguments that are completely extraneous to the main issue involved.

One of these is the religious argument. It's a real dilly at getting people so stirred ap they are inclined to forget everything else, and in this particular fight the battle over including private and parochial schools in any Federal aid to education program is becoming so intense it is making people forget we don't even need any Federal aid for our schools in the first place.
